## SIT-DOWN STRIKES TIE UP NEW FACTORIES IN AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY

Sit down strikers brought to a halt production in the Chrysler Corporation and Hudson Motor Car Company's Detroit plants today while the American Federation of Labor moved to intervene in steel labor affairs.

This move on the part of craft union leadership, was regarded as the start of a finish fight between the AF of L and the John L. Lewis Committee for Industrial Organization for dominance of union labor.

In Detroit the sit down strike ordered by the CIO unions, the United Automobile Workers, threw almost 75,000 men out of work. The Briggs Manufacturing Company, makers of bodies for Chrysler, was obliged to close when its market was disrupted.

Fickets denied Chrysler officials entry to their offices. While leaders of the rival AF of L and CIO met in Washington to plan membership drives, John Frey, AF of L metal trades leader, announced that he was going to Pittsburgh to investigate the possibility of steel unions joining the federation.

Francis Gorman, president of the CIO, United Textile Workers, announced plans to commence shortly a attempt to unionize textile workers of New England and the south.

Meanwhile labor disturbances occurred in many other areas. A taxi drivers strike in Chicago seemed to have reached a stalemate.

The nation's capitol had its first sit down strike, when 100 waitresses, waitresses and cooks stopped work at the Willard hotel.

At New Castle, Pa., 300 employees of the National Pants Company began the fourth day of their sit down strike.

## WAR CARGO OF SPANISH SHIP MAY BE SAVED

ARCHACON, France, March 9.—The only uncaptured survivor of the Spanish loyalist freighter Mar Cantabrico, torpedoed and seized by the rebel cruiser, Canarias, arrived here today and reported that the ship, instead of sinking, had been towed into port as a prize of war.

His story added a new twist to the fantastic sea incident which became a highlight of the Spanish war. The survivor, Pablo Juandoo, was landed here by a French trawler. He said his ship caught fire, as previously reported, but that the flames were brought under control and the freighter was towed into the rebel port of San Sebastian.

The Canarias made prisoners of 150 of the crew, and 11 were drowned trying to escape.

SAINT JEAN DE LUZ, France, March 9.—Madrid may fall because of the sinking of the freighter Mar Cantabrico with a valuable cargo of war materials from the United States, it was intimated today.

Making no secret of their consternation, loyalist spokesmen said the cargo needed most was American airplanes and machine guns.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9.—Sources close to the Spanish government said here today it was unlikely the Mar Cantabrico cargo of war materials was lost when the ship was burned in the Bay of Biscay. It was pointed out a plan had been made to transfer the cargo to another ship at sea.

Funeral services for Harry Neal, 15, killed in an automobile accident at Strawn early Sunday morning, will be conducted at Little Rock, Ark., Thursday afternoon at 3:30, with Rev. Dr. Otto Whittington in charge.

The decedent was born at Murphyboro, Ark., June 11, 1921, and was one of triplet sons of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Neal of Little Rock.

## HOLD FUNERAL FOR VICTIM OF AUTO SMASHUP

Funeral for Miss Frances May, 21, Eastland girl instantly killed Sunday night in an automobile accident near Ada, Okla., were scheduled Tuesday afternoon from the Church of Christ at Clyde with the pastor, Arthur Slater, minister, officiating.

Burial was to be in Clyde cemetery where her father, Elbert May, was interred several years ago.

Miss May was killed in the wreck when the automobile in which she and two companions rode crashed into a parked truck.

She had been at Ada visiting a sister, Mrs. Cal Smith, since December. Miss May had intended to leave Ada Monday to return to the home of her mother, Mrs. Elbert May.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—President Roosevelt will take personal command, tonight of the supreme court reorganization fight, which has divided his party and may end in compromise settlement.

The president will speak to the nation in a fireside chat at 9:30 P. M. CST.

It was learned that tonight's chat will deal with:

1. Need for court legislation now.
2. Difficulties of the constitutional amendment process.
3. An independent judiciary.
4. Need for invigoration of the federal court from top to bottom.

## Livestock Shipped To Texas Points Shows An Increase

AUSTIN — Shipments of livestock from Texas to Fort Worth stockyards and interstate points during January increased moderately over the corresponding month last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has reported.

Forwardings of all classes totaled 5,186 cars, against 4,972 a year ago, an increase of 4 per cent. Cattle shipments, 3,305 cars, declined 4 per cent from January last year.

Shipments of calves, 661 cars, increased 17 per cent; hogs, 736 cars, increased 23 per cent; and sheep shipments, 369 cars, increased 40 per cent.

"The large year to year increase in marketings to Los Angeles, noted in previous months, continued during January," the Bureau's report said. "There also was a marked increase in shipments of cattle and calves to other California points."

## Texans Spend Only \$3.00 Each Annually Upon Hard Liquor

DWIGHT, Ill.—Texas' per capita hard liquor bill is at the rate of approximately \$3 annually, according to figures released here by Martin Nelson, secretary of the Keeley Institute.

The average Texan consumes about a quart and a half of liquor a year.

Tragic Is the Role Edward Must Fill

The Duke of Windsor, rusticating in Austria since his departure from the throne of England, is somewhat hard up. He has not yet been reduced to hunger or thirst, but he is counting the pennies rather carefully, objecting to the price of haircuts at his Vienna hotel and cutting down on the fees of his ski-teacher in the mountains. When his sister, the Princess Royal, visited him recently, he told her:

"If the worst comes to the worst, I'll always pick up a living showing people around Schoenbrunn: I know it so well."

Schoenbrunn, of course, is the old Hapsburg palace in Vienna, haven of tourists innumerable; and the duke's plaintive remark is a reminder that the world has not as yet found any accepted way for the ex-owner of a crown to pick up a decent living.

Ever since Edward scandalized his loving subjects by proposing to marry the woman he loved rather than make her his mistress, his future has been a minor but genuine source of embarrassment to the rest of the royal family.

Parliament refuses to support him. His salary from the British people ended when he stepped on the destroyer that ferried him across the channel. He could, of course, make an enormous sum by writing his memoirs—yet that would hardly fit the dignity of a former king. He could make even bigger sums by listening to the siren song of Hollywood, but that would rowel the empire to its very vitals, and be highly unpleasant to boot.

So what is the man to do? He has to live, and, being a former king, he can't live in a garret and work as a department store doorman. He must keep up appearances, and that takes money; but all the accepted avenues to wealth are closed to him.

In the end, the British royal family probably will come to the rescue. Edward still owns divers properties in England. Royalty, it is reported, will club together and buy them, thereby providing him with enough money to live as befits a one-time king, and sparing the empire the mortification of seeing him work for a living.

And when you stop to think about it—what an impossible situation the poor man has to occupy! A king is enough of an anachronism, these days; an ex-king, who has no fires of revolution to cast a romantic glow down his path, but who got out from under his crown at the behest of Mrs. Grundy, is ten times as anachronistic.

By the oddest quirk of fate in recent centuries, Edward has been condemned to exile among the shadows. All his life he was a symbol; now, turned into a man, he must fill the most tragic of roles.

Unreality clings to him. The crown he gave up still puts its weight on him. In all this mad and ill-starred post-war world, is there one human being with a stranger path to follow?

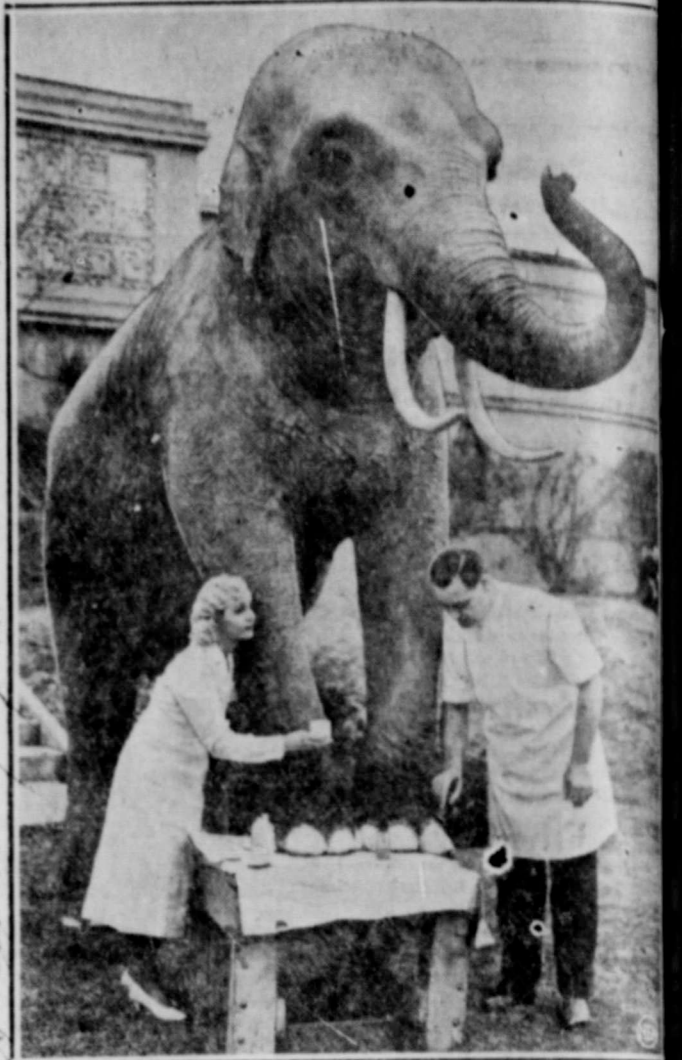

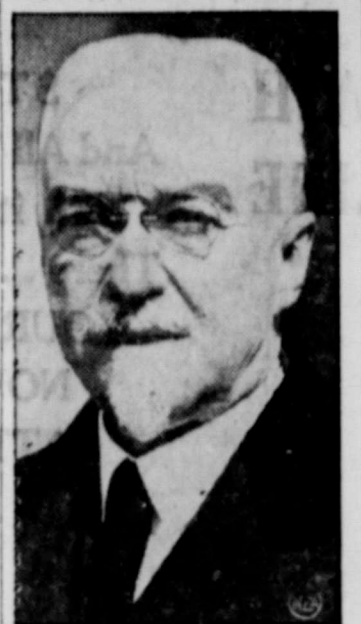

Everything went along smoothly said Deputy Howard Allen but "if somebody accidentally had set off a firecracker in this part of town, there would have been hell to pay."

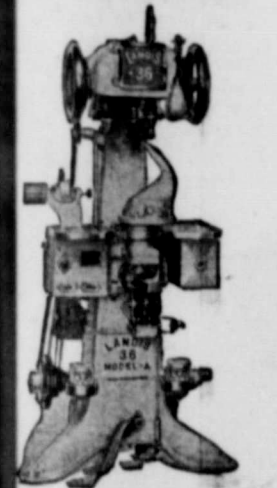

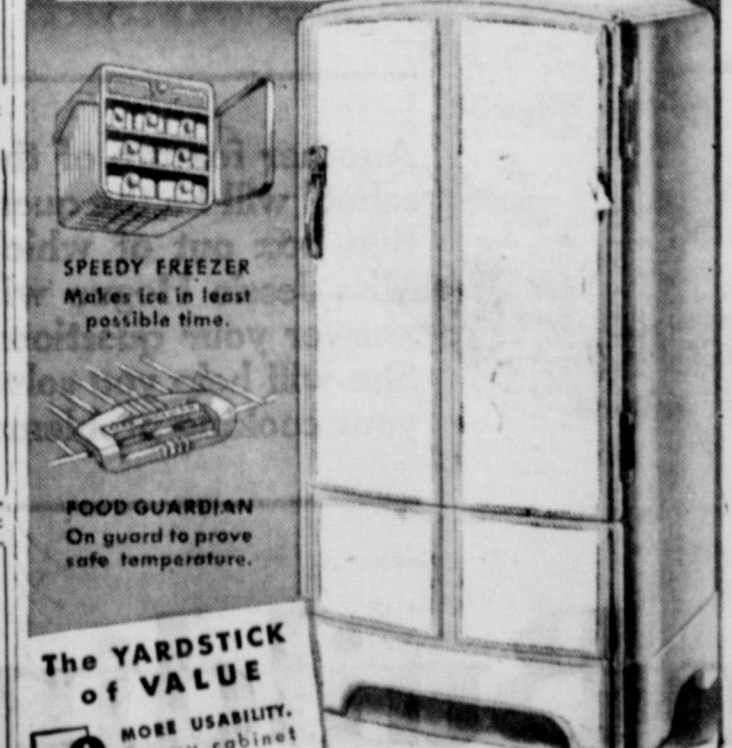

## Half of the Adult Class Members Are Getting Assistance

SAN ANTONIO—Approximately half the more than 87,000 students attending Works Progress Administration adult classes in Texas are receiving assistance from the government in the form of work relief, a recently-completed survey of WPA classes discloses.

"This indicates to us that thousands of persons forced by circumstances to accept work relief assignments are attempting to better their earning capacity by taking advantage of WPA educational opportunities for adults," declared Works Progress Administrator H. P. Drought. "It is interesting also to note that eighteen per cent of the adult students come from the ranks of the unemployed."

One-fourth of the students have passed the age of 41. About forty per cent of those studying under WPA teachers are less than 25 years of age. Classes are open to any person above the age of 16 who is not a regular attendant of a public educational institution.

Thirty-five per cent of those now attending WPA classes were illiterate at the time of enrollment. The remainder are studying courses ranging from grammar school level to early college work. WPA's educational curriculum includes literacy classes, general adult education, vocational adjustment courses, parent education, and nursery schools, the latter for underprivileged children, 2 to 4 years of age.

Approximately half of the students are of Anglo-Saxon lineage, 29 per cent are Negroes, 19 per cent are Mexicans, and the remainder are classified in twenty different racial categories.

Now conducting WPA classes are 1400 formerly unemployed teachers. Cumulative records show that more than 110,000 Texans have been enrolled in the various WPA classes since this agency took over the operation of the Federal education program in 1935.

Now, it seems, workers start at the bottom of the ladder and sit down.
