Copies of this poster are available from Grain Sorghum Producers Association, 322 Petroleum Bldg., Amarillo or see Wes Anthony, Assisting Secretary with distribution of posters Tuesday at Nolan Chandler, executive assistant of GSPA, Amarillo.

Parts of the poster are quoted in following paragraphs:

"Application of certain insecticides may cause moderate to severe leaf discoloration or burn on some varieties and hybrids. A grower may consult with his seed dealer as to the phytotoxicity of insecticides to certain grain sorghum varieties. If there is any doubt in an established crop, spray a few rows a week or so before booting with the intended insecticide at the recommended rate. No data are available relative to economic loss of grain yields due to the phytotoxic effects."

"Insecticides Recommended: 1-9 Carbaryl (Sevin), Carbofenthiol (Trithion), Diazinon, Endrin, Parathion and Toxaphene. The 1963 report has been updated to include carbofenthiol, Diazinon and Parathion."

The Auxiliary plans to have a rummage sale every Saturday at 1 p.m. in the Wilson Building on Bedford.

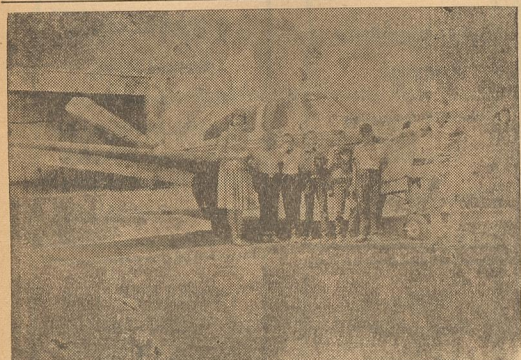

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AMMO NOTES



by Wm. F. (Bill) Bennett, Agronomist, Western Ammonia Corporation

A review of research recently released by TVA provides additional insight into losses of nitrogen by way of volatilization in the ammonia form into the atmosphere. The report was primarily a summary of the research work done on topdressing the various forms of dry nitrogen fertilizer such as ammonium sulphate, ammonium nitrate and urea.

The summary pointed out that nitrogen losses can occur on alkaline, calcareous soils which contain free calcium carbonate (calcite). The ammonium sulphate, ammonium nitrate or urea can apparently react with calcium carbonate to form ammonium carbonate. This compound is unstable and will break down and release nitrogen as a gaseous ammonia. First, soils with a pH or soil reaction of 7.8 to 7.9 or less will contain little or no free calcium carbonate, hence, very little loss would be expected on these soils.

If the government does not help us help ourselves, who is going to do it?

Certainly the grain exporters are not going to do so.

once-famed grasslands now have less than half of the better forage plants that once made its livestock industry so profitable.

State Conservationist Smith pointed out that a consequence of the invasion of the grasslands by brush is lower production and higher production-unit costs. Brushy plants are usually water hogs and, although some have a degree of grazing value, they use three and four times as much water to produce a pound of dry matter as the better grasses.

About 14,000,000 acres of brush have been treated in the last 10 years with control methods, Smith continued. Treatment was applied to 2,000,000 acres last year. However, most control methods are relatively short-lived, although experience shows such efforts to be generally profitable. Treatment in most cases has either only reduced the stand of the woody plants or it has opened the way to other undesirable species. The treatment in such cases must be applied again.

Although much has been learned through efforts to effect control of the problem, the situation calls for intensified research, Smith declared. Root-plowing, dozing, serial spraying, chaining, and basal application are methods now used but each of these methods has proved only partially effective.

Brush Problem Discussed

A re-survey by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service of Texas' vast and growing brush problem shows that 88,500,000 acres of the state's grazing lands—82 per cent—are now infested with various kinds of undesirable or low value shrubs or trees.

State Conservationist H. N. Smith of SCS declares that on half of the infested area—54,000,000 acres—the better forage plants on which the livestock industry relies are unable to make satisfactory yields.

On 24,000,000 acres there is so much brush of medium density—with 10 to 20 percent of the range shaded by the brush canopy—it soon will crowd out the better grasses and forage plants, Smith said the new survey showed.

Soil Conservation Service technicians found that, in the 17-year period since an earlier survey, brush has moved onto nearly 5,000,000 acres not previously infested. Existing stands have grown thicker in that time. This is in spite of the efforts of many ranch operators to control the brush, Smith said.

The survey showed an increase in mesquite of 1,250,000 acres to a new total of 56,000,000 acres of

this doggedly stubborn plant. Ran Rangelands occupied by cedar now total 21,500,000 acres, an increase of 3,500,000 acres since the 1947 survey. Whitebrush, a fast-spreading, defiant plant, has fastened its grip on 6,000,000 acres, and post and blackjack oak, with associated species, have so thickened on another 6,000,000 acres that grass production has been sharply reduced.

Other control-resisting plants include huisache, cactus, coyotillo, saltcedar, yaupon, persimmon, ship oak, lecheguilla and blackbrush. All have made significant increase, according to the survey report.

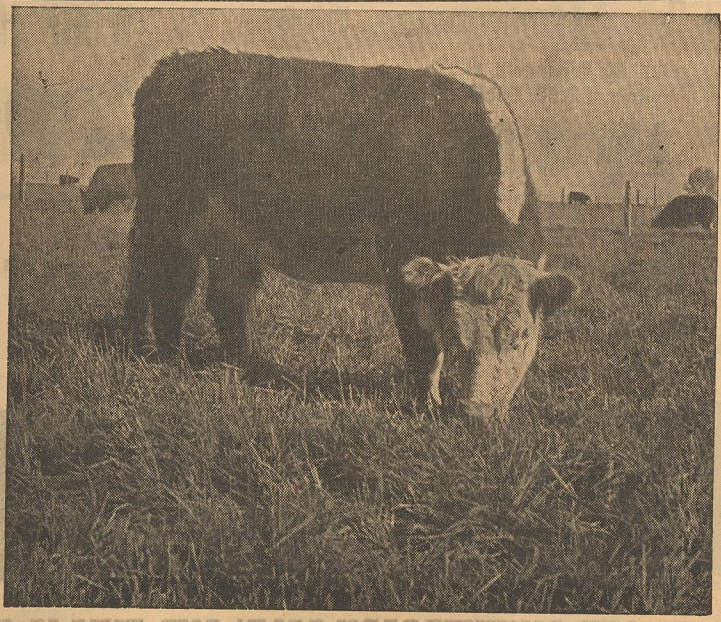

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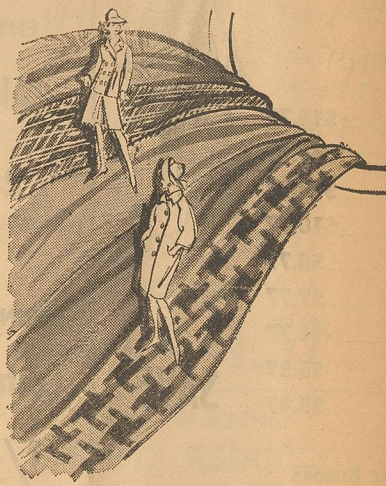
