Recognizing that such suits are, in most cases, merely a polite form of blackmail, and that money is no balm for a genuinely wounded heart, they ruled that failure to go through with a promise of marriage is not a valid cause of action.

So far, so good. But a magazine writer pointed out the other day that only half of the job has been done.

In most states, for instance, it is still a criminal offense for a gentleman to beguile a lady into submission with false promises of marriage. If she cares to go into court and plead tearfully that she surrendered her virtue under the impression that she was about to become a bride, a deceived lady can have a man sent to prison.

And so, since one threat is about as good as another for gold-digging purposes, the old shakedown goes on under another guise.

Now the shakedown part of it is not really so very important, since the man who sets up as a Don Juan is just asking for trouble, anyway. But, when you stop to think about it, a law of this kind bespeaks about as odd and insulting an idea of American womanhood as could possibly be devised.

For when we provide prison terms for men who accomplish seduction with promises of marriage, we simply say that the average woman is a weak and witless creature who cannot look out for herself. We assume, in the most uncomplimentary fashion possible, that she loses her grip the moment a soft-spoken and plausible chap cares to talk glibly about engagement rings and orange blossoms. We write into law the theory that she can say anything but





Since 1936 the wholesale price of food in Britain has risen 12 per cent. The pound is now worth to the housewife only 17 shillings and sixpence, by the standards of a year ago. Here are the percentage increase in retail prices in two years only, of some of the staple commedities of life: flour, 16, bread 21, tea 9, suger 7, milk 1-2, butter 5, cheese 9, margarine 19, eggs 28, potatoes 36.

As a result of the arms demand n metals, aluminum wear-pots, pant and kettles — has already been increased in price to the public by 10 per cent. Tinned and iron wares are up by 33 per cent, and enamel by 20 per cent. Fur-ther increases in the prices of these articles will soon be made.

For a few woolen articles, such as sports shirts, prices to the pub-lic are up by 5 per cent, but the real increase admittedly is yet to come. Whilesalers are now asking 10 to 12 per cent more for dyed cotton goods, and 5 per cent more for rough cotton goods, such as mops. The increased price will be passed on to the public next

month.

Cutlery is 5 per cent dearer owing to the shortage of raw materiale. Even pins have gone up in price; brass by 10 per cent, and steel by 5. Laundries, dressmakers and tailors, who use enormous quantities each year, and eventually the public, will be affected.
