How Our Laws Are Made

Johnnie B. Linn lo become law, a bill must be resident. There are several steps the process of a bill's becoming

a law.

The bill may be introduced in either the House or the Senate. After the bill has been filed with a clerk, it is sent to the appropriate committee in the house in which it was filed. This is usually the House of Representatives. Most bills are "killed" by committee before they even get a chance to get to the floor of the House. Sometimes they recommend changes, and sometimes they "pigeonhole" a bill, that is, lay it aside. Sometimes hearings are held on a bill, at which citizens who are experts on the subject of the bill are asked for advice. If the bill is approved by the committee, it goes on a calendar, to be discussed on a cer-

the President.

A bill must be signed by the President to become law. If he does not sign it in the ten-day period after he receives it, it automatically becomes law without the President's signature. However, if Congress adjourns in this period, the bill does not become law. If a bill is killed in this manner, it is known as pocket veto. If the President vetos a bill, it must pass through both houses of Congress with a two-thirds majority vote to become law.

Sometimes a questionable law is brought before the Supreme Court for consideration. The Supreme Court can repeal a law if it con-
