### Taking Stock of the Child Labor Problem

Child labor has been an issue in the United States for so long that it is helpful once in a while to pause and take stock of the situation.

The child labor amendment to the constitution has been pending before the states for 14 years. Thus far, 28 state legislatures have ratfied it-eight less than the threefourths majority needed to place the amendment in the

Meanwhile, hundreds of hills have been introduced in Congress proposing other amendments or seeking to remedy child labor faults through straight legislation. The latest of these is the Wheeler-Johnson bill, which would prohibit shipment across state lines of goods produced by child labor. The measure has passed the Senate, but not

The most recent survey of the child labor situation was made by the National Child Labor Committee. The study was based partly on information gathered by the committee, partly on government records and census figures.

Whether you believe in child labor or not, the survey showed, among other things:

That almost 700,000 children between 10 and 15 years of age (inclusive) were engaged in child labor in 1930. That the number increased between 1930 and 1933,

then decreased markedly during the NRA period. That child employment increased as much as 100 per Terracing Work



ard in Eastland county is result ing in more requests than usual for terrace lines on orchard sites Realizing that land with a slope is more suitable than level land for an orchard but that such land holds little water unless it is terraced, L. F. Miears of Gorman and P. M. Rhyne of Carbon have recently had terrace lines run or such land by the County Agent.

Farmers who cannot terrace should have contour lines run and should then follow these with their rows the County Agent advises. Although contoured rows will not take the place of terraces, they are much better than straight rows in lessing loss of water and soil both from rain and

wind erosion. Those who plan to terrace is the winter when field land is idle nearly always find that winter rains force them to put the job off year after year. Cook suggests that such farmers ron terrace line before planting then plant their earliest maturing crops in strips about 35 feet wide on the terrace lines, with later maturing crops such as peanuts and cotton be tween the lines. As soon as the crop is off the terrace strips terraces can be built without inter fering with the later crops be-

It has been estimated that more terraces were constructed in Eastland county in 1937 than during any previous five year period. This was because of the increasing general interest in soil im-




