The thing wasn't practical, people wouldn't want it, you couldn't make it cheaply enough, a dozen and one excuses instantly came to the minds of the reluctant friends who were too careful of their money, to throw any of it into "wildcat" schemes.

The invention? Just a silly thing called the "hookless fastener" which Colonel Walker had seen at the World's Fair in Chicago in 1893. 

U.S. Has Oldest **National Cemetery** Near Mexico City

MEXICO CITY. - In a quiet spot along Calzado Melchor Coampo, on Mexican soil, is the oldest national cemetery owned and maintained by the U. S. Government-older even than Washington's great Arlington.

Sleeping in the sun, marked by many rows of neat white stones, is the community of silent people. Few Americans, even those who live in Mexico City, know that it is the oldest national cemetery. Surrounded by a high wall, its stone-dotted greensward studded with great trees, it is an impres sive and peaceful place, but one spot is more impressive than any other. That spot is around a stone shaft which is inscribed with the following words:

"To the memory of the American soldiers who perished in this valley in 1847, whose bones, collected by their country's order, are buried here."

It is just another striking illustration that an owner and breeder of thoroughbreds cannot be successful forever, no matter how racing wise and well fixed financially.

expected to give the wily kunnel his finest season since Blue Larkspur was a 3-year-old in 1929. Brooklyn was regarded by all as an outstanding candidate for the Kentucky Derby.

Billionaire, a stake-winning 2-year-old of a half dozen races and \$12,650, was a full brother of Brokers Tip. He was well liked. diologist had been a stake-winning juvenile.
