#### Loves That Make World Go 'Round

When opposition arose to the marriage of Marshal Werner von Blomberg with his secretary, Germany's war minister remarked classically, if simply:

"Well, I love her, and I would rather give up my job than leave her."

Which automatically put Marshal von Blomberg into the same class and classification with England's former king who declined to sit on the world's greatest throne without the company of "the woman I love."

And so, for the second time in just a little over a year, Cupid's dart has been a monkey wrench in the machinery of Europe's political affairs. England rode through the "Simpson affair" and the abdication of a popular king with scarcely a tremor, actually. Germany has already felt more than a tremor from the marriage of its highest ranking army officer to Erika Gruhn, the daughter of a Berlin carpenter, and may be fortunate if it doesn't get tossed about by a terrific upheaval.

There are two schools of thought and dozens of confused impressions prevalent regarding the blow off in the Nazi Germany, but a few things stand out as apparent. The marriage of Von Blomberg was the signal for the shakeup and not the cause of it. Whether the army wanted Von Blomberg out as its leader and seized upon his "socially impossible' marriage as an excuse, or whether Hitler was afraid of Von Blomberg's power and had been waiting only an excuse to get rid of him, is debatable.

But, regardless of either of those theories, Hitler obviously has a growing fear of the army's power and the influence of Germany's old ruling class which makes up the now powerful Reichwehr. By concentrating in himeslf control over all military, political and economic policies Hitler has momentarily, at least, forestalled any coup which might lessen or usurp his power. He requested and got the resignation of the commander-in-chief of the Germany army, promoted his right-hand man Goering field marshal, recalled ambassadors from Vienna, Rome and Tokio, named a new foreigs minister.

All this leads most observers to believe some drastic changes in policies-probably international-will be announced with the called meeting of the Reichstag on Feb. 20. Hitler may come out of the shakeup with a position even more strongly consolidated than he has been occupying. Or he may be tottering with only one false step between him and a new German regime.

(2) It provides a fund out of tariff collections to be used in the building up of our foreign markets for farm products, as well as for widening the distribution of such products in the United

(3) It provides for loans on various farm commodities to prevent price collapse and to prevent

(4) It authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to apply for corrections in freight rate discriminations against farm products and to fight such applications through to a final conclusion.

(5) It makes provision for finding new uses and new outlets for farm commodities and the products thereof and for a research laboratory in each major

(6) It provides that the farmers, by a two-thirds vote may establish marketing quotas on corn, wheat, cotton and rice, to be effective only when there are surpluses above what the market will absorb both here and in foreign countries. It provides that if more than one-third of the farmers oppose any quota, it shall not put into effect.

(7) It increases the share in conservation payments to small farmers and tenants and sets a limit on the payment which large producers can receive

(8) It provides protection for tenants and prevents landlords who reduce their tenants without ustification from getting any part of the payment that would

therwise go to the tenant. I have insisted from the very first that the farm measure should contain provisions which would assure fair treatment to small farmers and tenants so that ndividual farming will be encouraged. Such provisions were included in the measure which I introduced in the House, and I am glad that we have been able to keep these safeguards in the

The provision for enlarging our foreign markets is one of major nportance. I believe that it is much better to pay a slight loss on shipments to countries which do not produce a commodity than to refrain from producing that commodity and thus lose the labor production. This philosophy has

## SISTER MARYS KITCHEN

THERE'S more to a waffle than "good morning." They show up at some of the best luncheons and go out in the evening with the greatest of ease. I's largely a matter of sauces. You must

make the waffles fresh yourself, but many of the sauces you can buy, such as chocolate sauce, strawberry preserves, pecan sauce and various lively marmalades.

> Debutante Waffles (4 four-section waffles)

Two cups sifted pastry flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 teaspoons sait, 3 egg yolks, 1-2 cup cream, 1-2 cup milk, 4 table-spoons melted butter, 3 egg whites beaten as stiff as crinoline.

Sift pastry flour and measure. Add baking powder and sait, then sift again. Combine the well-beaten egg yolks with the milk. Add the egg-milk mixture slowly to flour mixture, beating to smooth consistency. Stir in the melted butter, and then at last fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in hot waffle iron.

Two-thirds cup white of a syrup, 11-2 cups medium brown sugar, 1-3 cup water, 4 table-spoons butter, 1-4 teaspoon visuality, and table-spoons heavy crossing. Boil the first our ingredients until sauce reacnes heavy syrup consistency. Cool. Add vanifia and cream. If consistency gets a little too heavy, add more cream. Another sauce which widens the social horizon of waffles shave maple sugar and add to lightly whipped cream. It's greatesting. Be careful not to whip the cream too much.
