Mrs. Fern believes that if married women who have "perfectly good men" to support them would stay home there would be plenty of good jobs for youngsters just getting out of high school.

Mrs. Fern's idea might bring forth a few added cheers if it were not for some facts brought out by two recent surveys on the subject of women who work.
