#### The New Deal of Mang Wang

The nice thing about history is that so much of it has gone over the dam in the past few thousand years that a man can find a historical basis for almost any argument he wants to make, if he only looks in the right place.

Of course, his opponent may have just as many bases for his own contentions, but the outcome of these things depends on one man boning up on a period the other man doesn't know anything about, or else boning up just a little more on the same period.

All this is inspired by reports of some scholarly papers read at the Chicago meeting of the American Oriental Society. China, it turns out, had itself a New Deal some 2000 years ago. What happened to China's New Deal should make dandy ammunition for the present anti-New Dealers, but really, there's ammunition enough to go around for everybody.

A gent named Mang Wang announced his emperorship and proceeded to introduce a program of social experimentation that included, among other things, government regulation of basic industries, government control of natural resources, price-control over crops, and easy-term loans to businesses he wished to encourage. Work relief had already been tried and abandoned because the WPA boys of the time fooled around too much. Anyway, the whole thing fell through before Wang joined his ancestors.

"You see?" says Republican.


