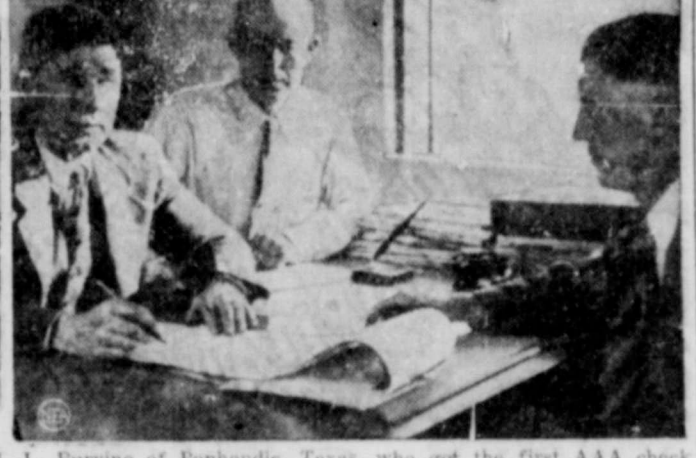

NAZI ANGER, CZECH TROOPS CAUSE UNREST

Nazi anger against the Czechs—dangerous as sparks along the inflammable frontier—today menaced efforts to Central Europe's quarrel at the council table instead of on the battlefield.

The most important developments on the tense Central European front was a decision by Germany to protest to the Prague government against alleged Czech attacks on Nazis and on the concentration of Czech troops in the Sudeten border area.

Definite danger exists that 60,000,000 will starve in devastated China before September, 1938, unless help reaches them. It is impossible to plant crops. Untold millions of homes have been destroyed. Enough camps to care for refugees, even in large cities, cannot be constructed and maintained because of lack of funds.

Medical authorities in China say that, with hot weather approaching, devastating epidemics will be inevitable. Many refugees are now dying of typhoid fever, starvation, pneumonia. It is impossible to give medical attention to all wounded because of lack of personnel and supplies.

Civilian refugees exceed sufferers from war-fare wounds eight to one. Estimates of observers on the scene say refugees are increasing at an average rate of 500,000 per day.

While reports of warfare fill the newspapers, the fact that 5,000,000 are homeless in the Yellow River valley in North China from record floods has gone unnoticed in the foreign press. Practically nothing can be done for them.

Foreigners in China are impressed by the great desire of the Chinese people to help themselves. Overseas Chinese have sent \$7,000,000 to China for relief work during recent months. Many wealthy Chinese have given large percentages of their personal fortunes for relief of their countrymen.

Freedom's Defense Is Truth's

Thomas Mann, exiled German author, has been saying a great many sensible things on his current tour of America; but nothing that he has said is much more worthy of our serious consideration than his recent remark in New York that freedom must learn the art of self-defense.

Freedom as it exists in America is a priceless thing. We who have always lived in it take it for granted, perhaps even fail to realize that it can conceivably be in danger. Mann, who saw freedom snuffed out in Germany, has a clearer appraisal of it; and his warning is something to ponder over.

That the ideal of freedom must eventually prevail in this world is, to Dr. Mann, something that goes almost without saying. But before it can prevail the race is apt to live through some dark and painful times, and those who know and love freedom must learn the art of defending it against its mortal enemies.

Now it is very easy to say that we must "defend freedom"; the trick is to learn just how the job is to be done. For freedom cannot defend itself by taking up the weapons of suppression. Those weapons cut both ways. Any free society which tries to use them will end by finding that it has somehow ceased to be free.

It would be better, perhaps, to begin by understanding clearly just what a devotion to freedom implies.

Such a devotion—when carried into practice through such instruments as democracy—implies, primarily, a belief that the great mass of human beings have in them the good will, the good sense and the common decency to handle any problem that can face them. In other words, it implies a broad, sustaining faith in the human race.

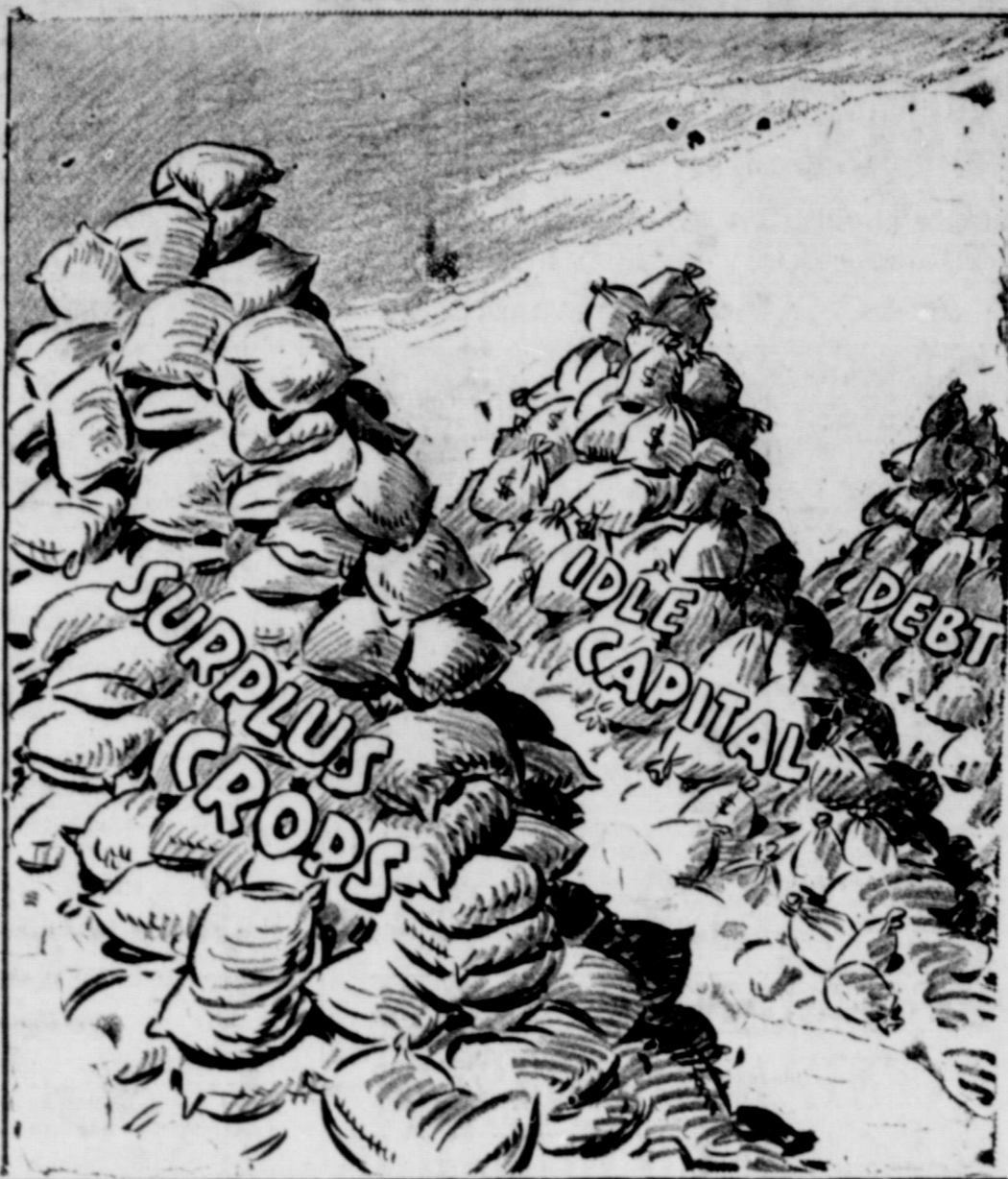
This, of course, is only a starter. For to hold such a faith, and to live by it, means that one can have no use for any form of obscurantism. It means that the quest for knowledge must go on endlessly, that the exact truth about any and every phase of life must be given to the people at all times, that the people must—as a great democrat once said—have the right to make their own mistakes.

All of this is the exact opposite of the faith that prevails in the authoritarian governments.

It is, as a matter of fact, a broader faith than many of us actually live up to in America. And yet it is the only faith that can make freedom and democracy work. And to defend freedom and democracy, one must begin by defending that faith in season and out of season.

Viewed in that light, Dr. Mann's injunction is clearer. Understand what freedom really means, and you can see how it is to be defended. Protect that broad faith which animates freedom, and freedom itself will remain alive.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON.—There is nothing that gives more delight to Washington gossips than the stirring up of a factional fight in some government department.

Not even the White House has been immune from these rows, when there have been differences of opinion among presidential advisers, and now the gossips are trying to make the most out of the case of the rest of the Supreme Court vs. Justice Black.

New Deal friends of the ex-senator from Alabama have been rushing to his defense with favorable analyses of his lone-wolf dissenting opinions, first reported in this column last February.

Black's supporters now claim that recently the Court reversed a vital 96-year-old opinion in the Tompkins case, two weeks after Black had taken the same position in a one-man dissent.

AMBASSADOR Joe Kennedy was a potent conservative influence in Washington. But he can't spread his influence across the Atlantic Ocean. As Maritime Commission chairman, Kennedy emphatically demanded compulsory arbitration in the shipping industry, clashing with Secretary of Labor Perkins. After Kennedy went to London Miss Perkins kept lobbying quietly and the result was a committee bill providing a special maritime labor board and dropping the Kennedy plan. Kennedy was more influential than any other administration adviser in dissuading the President from turning earlier to an expedient spending program.

WASHINGTON has professors of everything except philosophy and it's likely to have one of those after the November election in the person of Prof. T. V. Smith, running for congressman-at-large in Illinois. Smith is a Chicago University professor of philosophy and an author who made regular radio talks for the Democrats in the 1936 campaign. He is chummy with Roosevelt and numerous brain-trusters.

On May 21 he broadcasts on a national hook-up in an argument between a philosopher and a politician. Smith takes both parts. It ought to be pretty good or pretty awful.

THE victory of Senator Claude Pepper, 100 per cent New Dealer, in the recent Florida primaries has disturbed the mental peace of Senator Walter F. George, anti-administration Democrat. It is said to have encouraged Georgia's governor, E. D. Rivers, who had been thinking of running against George on a New Deal platform.

Although Mr. Roosevelt pointedly complimented him at Gainesville while omitting reference to George, Rivers is receiving little encouragement from Washington. Democratic National Committee Treasurer Lawrence "Chip" Robert, another Georgian, has been reported as promoting George. If that's true it's a private, personal effort on Robert's part—to date, at least.

Japs Ready to Rain Death From the Skies on China



With planes showering death and destruction unrelentingly, thousands of Chinese civilians and 200 foreign missionaries, many of them Americans, were imperiled as the Japanese swept westward along the Lung-Hai railroad in Central China after the capture of Suchow. The formidable plane shown above, spearhead of the Japanese drive, was bombing the countryside constantly and returning to their base only long enough to get new supplies of bombs. The top picture shows a Japanese machine gunner testing his weapon before one of the flights that resulted in some of the heaviest casualties of the entire conflict.

Acadians Mass For Marriages

LOCKPORT, La.—When the descendants of the Acadians in this mingled swamp and beautiful land section of Louisiana decide to get married they do it in a big way. Fifty bridesmaids are usually the correct number. But selected by the bride? No. She selects the fifty groomsmen and they choose their "best girls" for the bridesmaids. The groom? All he does is

take the traditional prenuptial bath, attire himself in a black suit and wear his black hat throughout the ceremony, which sometimes lasts three days—that is, except when he is in the church for the actual "I do." Friends and acquaintances from the whole Cajun (corruption of Acadian) countryside go to the wedding ceremony—summoned these days as a concession to progress by a loudspeaker truck which blares out the news of the approaching event. So many hundreds come for the wedding feast that it must be prepared outside in huge pots by scores of volunteer cooks. It begins early and continues indefinitely because the huge amount of food, prepared in Gargantuan manner, continues to appear on white-clothed tables under trees, until the appetite of most voracious is replete. Four in the afternoon is the favorite wedding time. First the procession to the church, dressed long, the actual wedding and then a screaming automobile ride up and down the new ways that criss-cross the country. Closing event is a dance at which whole parishes

**Rotarians Hear An Address On Safety**  
C. E. May had the Rotary program today and gave an illustrated address on "Safe Driving." He pointed out that from 1927 to 1937 there had been an increase of 58 in deaths from automobile accidents while automobiles had increased only 30 per cent and the population as a whole had increased only 9%.  
As to responsibility for accidents the speaker said that federal reports show that 37% of the accidents are caused by speed; by being on the wrong side of 17 per cent by reckless driving; 11 per cent by being on the wrong side of the road; and 12 per cent are caused by not having the right-of-way. Of all the accidents of the nation 12.9 per cent are caused by the drivers being drunk and 10 per cent are caused by pedestrian being under the influence of alcohol.  
The speaker brought out four important facts in outline and showed Federal statistics to substantiate them.  
1. Automobile accidents cost more than our program of public

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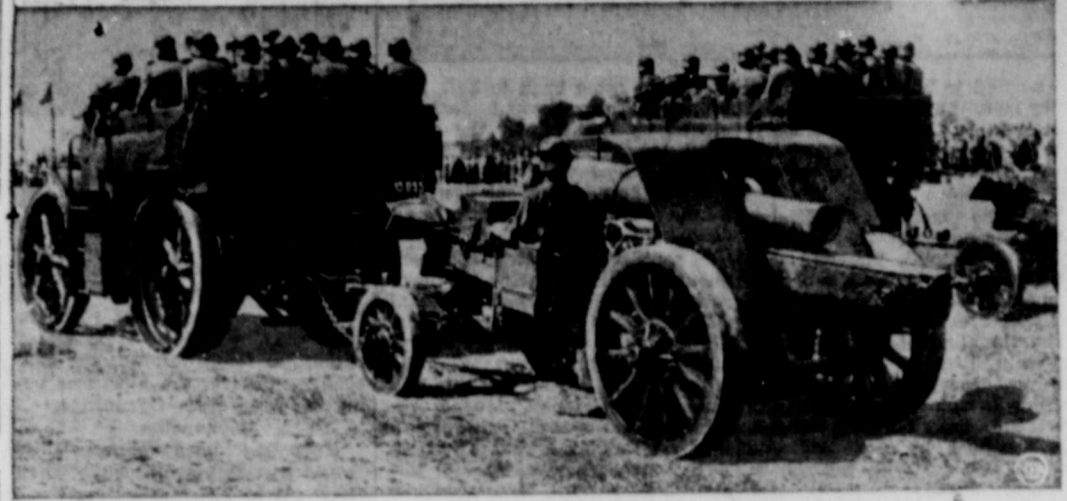

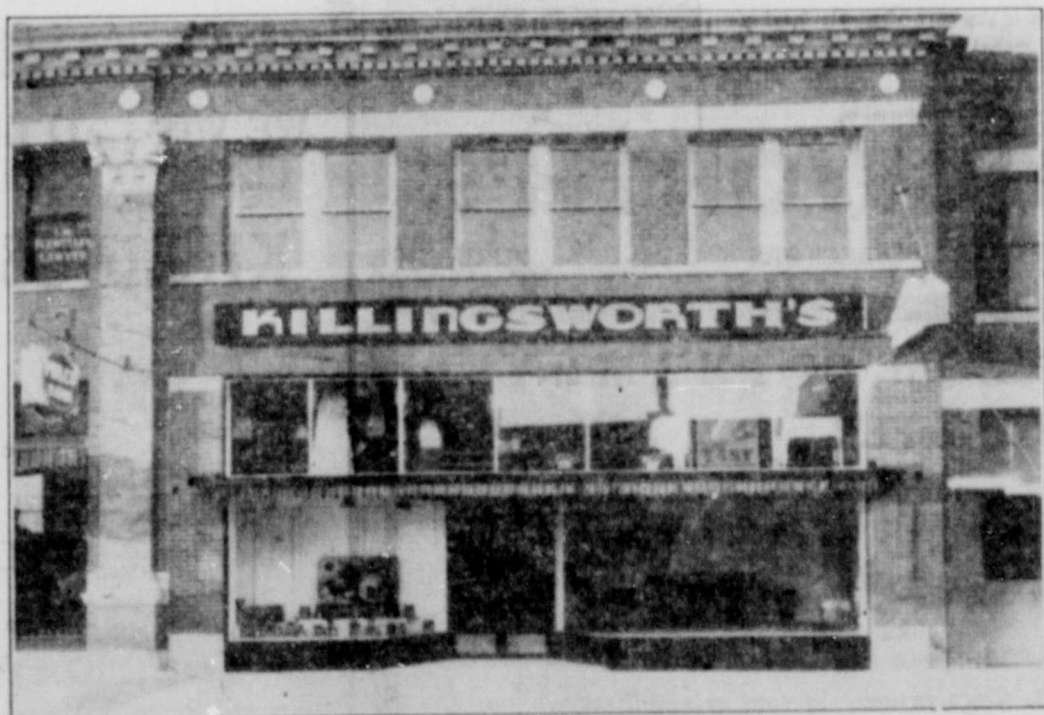

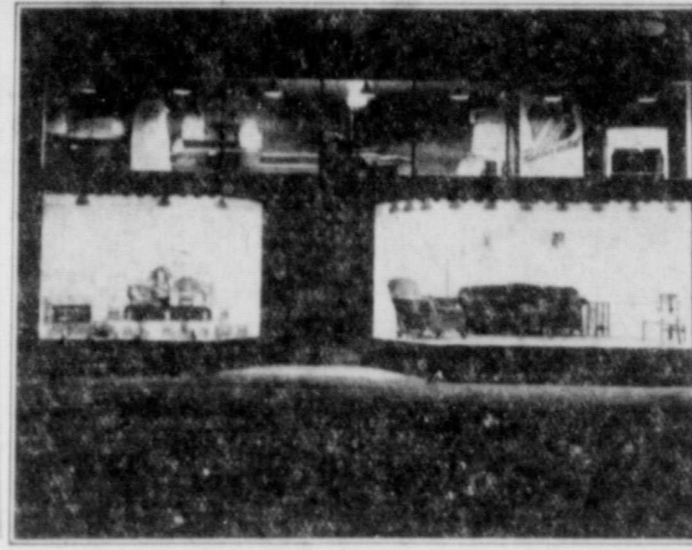

JOHNNY GOODMAN sailed with his teammates confident that he would lift the British Amateur championship at Troon, May 23-28 and that America would score its 10th consecutive victory in the Walker Cup matches at St. Andrews, June 3-4.

Goodman believes that this will be his greatest year in golf, and looked in shape to make it so. He weighed 167 pounds, or three pounds less than he scaled last fall, when he captured the National Amateur.

The personable young man of Omaha is hitting the ball longer than ever before.

"When I won the United States Open five years ago, I was hitting tee shots about 220 yards," related Goodman. "Each year since then I've hit them a bit longer until I'm now averaging close to 240.

"I'm swinging faster than formerly, and it hasn't caused me to lose control. I'm still pretty straight off the tee."

Goodman stopped off at the Medinah Country Club, Chicago, to play a round with Tommy Armour and have the gray Scot check his game. That has been his custom for several springs.

ARMOUR corrects things here and there, and, in general, reduces even an outstanding performer's margin of error.

"He gave Goodman a No. 4 wood, and Johnny called it a sweetheart. 'I've always had trouble with my lefted woods,' asserted Goodman. 'I can use a 1, 2, or 3 iron okeh, but I've always had trouble with a 3 or 4 wood. But not with this 4 that Tommy's given me I can really do things with it. With this club and Tommy's advice to close my stance somewhat, I'm all set to do my best.'

Goodman has played the St. Andrews course. Winds on the famous Scottish layout shift a lot, and are hard to judge.

"A further handicap to an American in the British Amateur is the ball," said Goodman. "The British play with a smaller ball, and I find that this ball lights harder and doesn't roll as far. You have to hit approach shots about twice as hard. On putting the ball has a tendency to follow the slightest contour on the surface of the green."

YET members of the last American Walker Cup squad that went abroad used the British ball . . . found it better adapted to the winds than their own.

Goodman said that Armour told him much about courses and conditions on the other side, and promised to follow his instructions to the letter.

"Listen to your caddy, and do what he says," was Armour's tip. Caddies on the other side are, for the most part, mature men who've been at the trade for years. They know every blade of grass, every hazard, and just what club a player should use.

A player takes the caddy assigned him, with no questions asked, but Johnny Goodman promised to listen to whoever he drew.

He is counting on his caddy to help him to the British Amateur championship.

### OIL PERFORMS 'MIRACLES' FOR RURAL DWELLERS



Modern Rural Kitchen — Range and Refrigerator Burn Oil

Farmers generally are beginning to realize that for a large majority of them electrification is a long way off, and in millions of cases permanently beyond their reach, because of the prohibitive cost of line construction and service where there are not three or more homes to the mile. However, that such homes need not lack modern conveniences is indicated by this photograph showing a modern rural kitchen with oil burning equipment.

Both the range and the refrigerator use kerosene for fuel. Seeing them and hearing about their performance impresses one with the thought that petroleum is a modern "miracle" fuel, for it also supplies power for many uses, not the least of which is to bring those who live in even the most remote homes within a few minutes of town or city, by means of the modern automobile.

Because it brings the convenience of modern refrigeration to even the most isolated farm home, where the need is greatest, the oil burning refrigerator is generally regarded as one of the greatest labor-savers made available to rural homes in recent years. Strange as using heat to create refrigeration may seem, even more surprising is the fact that the burners of this refrigerator do 24 hours' work in two hours. The burners go out automatically after the required amount of oil has been burned, but refrigeration and the freezing of ice cubes goes on continuously.

Effective on the first of May this year the interest of B. Cox was assumed by J. F. Killingsworth and the firm name was once more changed.

Immediately after purchasing the entire interest of the store remodeling was started and improvements in the store were begun.

The upstairs portion of the building occupied by the firm was secured and made into a furniture department, which was moved from the corner section of the store. Partitions on the upper floor were removed and a larger, more modern and better lighted furniture display is now possible.

The front of the hardware section of the building was also remodelled, with new plate glass windows being installed and the east window being enlarged to more than twice its former size, where a full room of furniture can be displayed.

The upper portion of the building was also remodelled to provide more display space for the furniture department, making it one of the most attractive buildings in town and giving it one of the best furniture display spaces in any store in this part of the state.

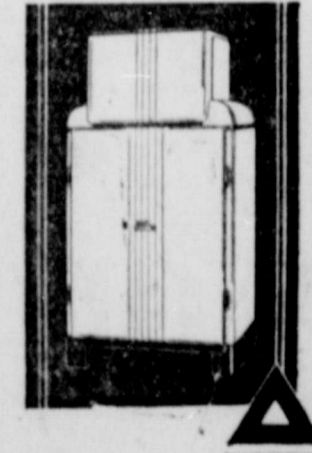

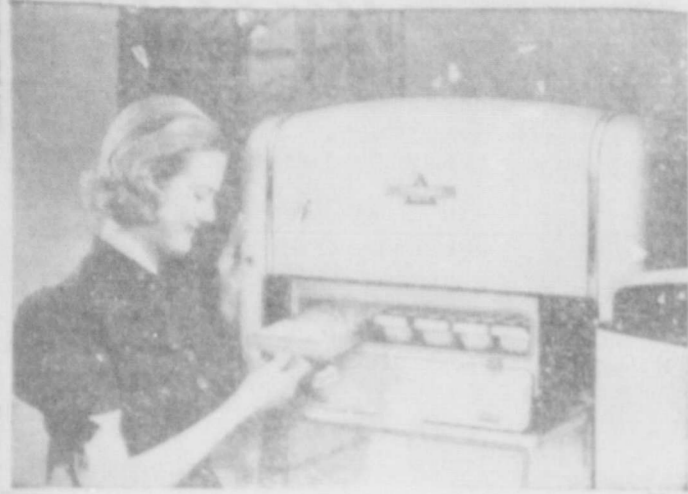
