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The Realist as Blunderer

The starry-eyed idealist can get into a good deal of trouble, what with his habit of stepping out into traffic with his eyes on the heavens. But there are times when it does seem that the coldly practical realist can get into more of a tangle than a dozen idealists put together.

What ails the international set-up in Europe these days, if not a dose of super-realism, applied cold-bloodedly by practical men whose boast it is that they have tossed idealism overboard as a delusion and a snare?

We are witnessing right now the final death-rattle of the League of Nations. When Britain and France inform the League, as they are to do within a few days, that they are giving formal recognition to Italy's conquest of Ethiopia, the League will be just about ready for the undertaker. And when they follow that by requesting the League to abandon the Stimson policy of refusing to recognize territories acquired by force, as they are expected to do, the work of nailing down the coffin lid will have begun.

All of which has a direct bearing on this question of idealism versus realism.

With all its faults, the League was the work of idealists. That is, it did represent an effort to substitute international law for the law of the jungle. The effort may have been weak, and half-hearted, but it was a step toward a more enlightened and civilized world order for all that.

What is replacing it, is, very clearly, nothing less than a return to the ancient balance-of-power system. Europe once more divides into armed camps, whose inmates arm to the teeth and remain at peace only so long as neither side can see any percentage in starting a fight. That is a system which makes peace expensive and war inevitable. It could be followed, one would think, only by people who had completely blinded themselves to the painful lesson of 1914.

Yet it is precisely this system which is being revived by the clear-eyed realists.

Prime Minister Chamberlain of England has openly said that he is following a policy of realism. His French allies have said the same. On the opposite side of the fence, Dictators Hitler and Mussolini have long boasted of the utter absence from their scheme of things of any taint of idealism.

Yet this vaunted realism can give the world nothing better than a return to the road to war!

The idealist may stumble and fall often enough, with his eyes on the stars. But can he ever get the world into a worse mess than this which the realists are cooking up?

HAILSTORM IS DAMAGING TO CISCO LANDS

CISCO, May 28.—The desolation of mid-winter reigns over a strip about a mile wide and four miles long northwest of Cisco where Thursday night the worst hailstorm in a generation denuded trees of every shred leaf, beat bountiful wheat and oat crops into the ground and destroyed thousands of acres of heavy grass range. Damage will run into many thousands of dollars for the farmers and ranchers in the narrow strip affected.

Shingle roofs were beaten off buildings, windows were smashed and even iron clad roofs were rumbled up by the terrific force of the hail. Possibility exists that some cattle and other livestock may have perished in the storm.

The hail appeared to follow the course of Battle creek on the east side. The worst part of the strip extended from the Lone Star Gasoline company's plant northwest of Cisco 13 miles on Highway 23 to the creek. Within that area limbs were broken from trees, bark stripped from their trunks and even saplings beaten to the earth. Grass and other vegetation was pounded into pulpy masses on the ground.

The greatest fury of the hail seemed to have expended itself on the Dyer and Qualls ranches, owned by G. P. Mitcham, where 700 acres of wheat and oats were completely ruined, without a stalk left upright. The fields appeared as if they had been cut. Windows in the Mitcham show barns were smashed, shingle roofs on buildings beaten away, and tin roofs rumbled by the volleys of icy missiles, some of which were as large as a man's hand.

Van Farmer, whose farm lies on the edge of the affected strip, said that wheat and oats which he was preparing to harvest were not worth the effort, although his fields were less damaged than those farther west. The Pence and Agnew ranches suffered damage similar to that of the Mitcham properties. The McClelland farms

likewise sustained heavy damage. Many farm homes throughout the area were practically without roofs today. The Cottonwood school house had holes knocked in the roof large enough to put an arm through.

The storm broke shortly before 8 o'clock Thursday night and continued for about 30 minutes. Mr. Palmer said. Drifts of hailstones a foot or more in height piled up, and melted into masses of rotterice, which soaked the desolated soil with water.

Appearance of the denuded strip cutting across the rich green country like a dark, wintry scar, was almost unbelievable. Many of the farmers and ranchers have been left in almost hairless condition so far as revenue this year are concerned. Total damage cannot be estimated, but an idea of its extent may be gained from Mr. Mitcham's estimate of his own loss, which he placed at not less than \$10,000. Although the wheat and oat crop loss is heavy, ranchers regarded damage to their pastures as the most serious item. The finest grass cover in years was ruined and considerable time will be required before it puts out again in sufficient amount to carry the stock.

Fortunately, the strip did not extend very far and only a small proportion of the grain crops and the range will be affected. But that which was in the path of the hail is now a total loss.

The most serious Baptist threat came in the ninth, when the local church club put two on base with only one out. Littlefield, who had the first hit of the night off Johnson, got a hit when his grounder was just out of Blackwell's reach, and went to third when Jack Blackwell's fly to short center fell safe. Rains, swinging for Anderson, struck out and Pittman's fast throw to Delmasso caught Littlefield off third for the second out.


