By United Press WASHINGTON, Aug. Acting Secretary of the Treasury Roswell Magill indicated today that the treasury will recommend -enactment of manufacturers' xcise taxes, commonly known as nuisance taxes", which produced \$450,000,000 annually.

The federal government is fac ing a 1939 deficit of more than \$4,000,000,000. Magill said the treasury is considering "everything" in its tax studies, including a possible broadening of the in ome tax base.
