

After the Munich settlement it was commonly said that France had sunk to the level of a second-class power. Then when the wave of strikes greeted Daladier's "security" program, it was remarked that French democracy was tottering and that the needed unity was impossible to attain

So the Italians seem to have decided that if all this was true the time was ripe for getting on the muscle with respect to Tunisia and other points.

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
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
