


# Bobcats, Swifts advance to regional tourneys

Dimmitt's Bobcats and Nazareth's Swifts will go into the regional playoffs Friday following back-to-back victories in area championship games Tuesday night at Levelland.

The Bobcats will face Canutillo at 4:30 p.m. Friday in the first round of the Region I AA-AAA Tournament in the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

The Swifts will play Follett at 7 p.m. Friday in the opening round of the eight-team Region I-A Tournament at the Texan Dome in Levelland.

Here are the tournament details:

## Bobcats

The final four in Region I-AAA are Dimmitt, Canutillo, Ballinger and the Bobcats' District 1 stablemate, Abernathy. The Antelopes earned a berth in the regionals with a 20-point victory over District 1 champion Perryton Friday and a 69-39 win over Idalou in an area title game Tuesday night.

Abernathy will meet Ballinger at 3 p.m. in the other Class AAA first-round game Friday.

Canutillo is another district runner-up, having played bridesmaid to state-ranked Kermit in District 5. Ballinger knocked Kermit out of the playoffs. Canutillo defeated Crane in bi-district and Stamford in area.

Dimmitt is the only state-ranked team in the Region I-AAA final four. The Bobcats, with four starters and two other regulars back from last year's state championship team, have been ranked No. 1 in Texas ever since the season tipped off, and will carry a perfect 34-0 record into the tourney.

The Region I-AA boys' tournament will run side-by-side with the Class AAA tourney Friday and Saturday in Lubbock. In the first round of Class AA action Friday, Lorenzo will play Clint at 12 noon and Memphis will meet Morton at 1:30. Lorenzo is coached by two former Dimmitt players, Larry Birdwell and Jeff Bell.

Saturday's championship games will be at 3 p.m. for Class AA and at 4:30 p.m. for Class AAA. Prior to the two high school title bouts, Texas Tech will meet Texas A&M at noon in a regionally televised Southwest Conference game.

## Swifts

The Region I-A Tournament in the Texan Dome at South Plains College will be an endurance test, with eight teams shooting for the title. Nazareth will meet District 2 champion Follett at 7 p.m. Friday. Other first-round games will put Vega against Valley at 2:30 p.m., Anton against Buena at 4, and Highland against Wink at 8:30.

Saturday morning, the Vega-Valley winner will play the Anton-Buena victor at 9:30 a.m. The Nazareth-Follett winner will meet the Highland-Wink winner at 11 a.m. in the other semifinal game.

The regional championship game will be played at 7 p.m.

## County accepts motor grader bid

Monday, Castro County Precinct 4 Commissioner Vincent Guggemos accepted a \$75,350 bid as the purchase price of a new motor grader to be used in his precinct.

Although it was the highest bid received, the Commissioners Court decided to go along with Guggemos's personal preference.

The accepted bid was for a Caterpillar grader from West Texas Equipment Co., and was \$12,590 above the low bid of \$62,760 received from Deckard Equipment Co. of Amarillo for purchase of a John Deere grader. The middle bid was for \$63,380 from Plains Machinery of Lubbock for a Galion grader.

"Twelve thousand dollars is a lot of difference, but I know it will be worth it later on," Guggemos said, referring to the West Texas Equipment contract provision of a guaranteed repurchase at the end of the machine's warranty period.

Commissioners also mentioned the benefit of having all the same brand to facilitate interchanging some parts. Other graders used in Precinct 4 are also Caterpillars. "They're a good, tough machine, and I'll just stick with them," Guggemos said.

County Attorney Jimmy Davis reported to the court on questions concerning two of the accounts administered by the county — the permanent school fund and the county available school fund.

Davis told the court that the county available fund is to be distributed annually to the school districts in the county on a percentage basis according to each school's average daily attendance.


He added that the permanent school fund may be reduced with the amount withdrawn to be distributed on the same basis, but the funds must be used by the schools to reduce bonded indebtedness or to make permanent improvements.

## Sudan snaps Swiftettes' string

# Sure, it had to happen, but ...

It had to happen sometime. When the state's top-ranked team has to play the second-ranked team three times in a season, there's always the danger that it can happen.

And Saturday night it did happen. For the first time — and, for the Swiftettes, at the worst possible time — the Sudan Hornettes won.

The victory gave the Hornettes the Region I championship and snapped a historic Nazareth string that included six state championships, seven straight Region I championships and 40 straight playoff victories dating back to 1977.

The Hornettes out-shot (50% to 34%), out-rebounded (23-18) and out-defensed the Swiftettes in Saturday's Region I final in Levelland's Texan Dome to win, 39-26. The Swiftettes had beaten

the Hornettes in their two 6-A District meetings, 37-35 and 45-40. Sudan had never beaten Nazareth prior to the Saturday game. The Hornettes, now 32-3, have lost only nine games in the last three years, and seven of those were to Nazareth.

Saturday's game was the first playoff loss for the Swiftettes since 1976, when Neches edged Nazareth 50-46 in overtime in the state semifinals at Austin.

It was Joe Lombard's first playoff loss in his fifth season as head coach at Nazareth. The Swiftettes and Claude are the only teams in the 33-year history of UIL girls' basketball to win six state titles. And the Swiftettes are the only team to win six consecutive state championships.

This year's team was going for No. 7, and the agony of defeat was written on the

faces of Nazareth's coaches, players and fans after the loss, which was especially painful for the three senior members of the Nazareth team.

"It's hard to accept that we beat them two of three times and they are going to state," said senior forward Rhonda Hoelting.

"I thought we were ready to play," she said. "It seemed like we were playing as if we were waiting for something to happen, rather than making something happen."

"It was like we were playing to keep from losing rather than trying to play to win."

"They just outplayed us," said Coach Lombard. "We have no excuses. I don't know why we had a bad game, we had played so well in the other playoff games. We even felt we had im-

proved since the last time we played Sudan."

Nazareth won its playoff games by 69, 89, 28 and 42 points. They shot better than 50% in each game, and the intimidating Swiftette defense kept playoff opponents struggling to get off a good shot.

Against Sudan Saturday, Nazareth's defense looked flat and the shots wouldn't fall. The Swiftettes shot no free throws in the game, while the Hornettes hit 11 of 18 charity shots, eight of 13 in the final and deciding quarter.

Sudan held a narrow 23-22 lead going into the final stanza. Nazareth's Shari Schilling hit a short jumper with 7:10 remaining in the game to put

the Swiftettes ahead, 24-23.

But that was the last thing to go right for the Swiftettes, as they scored only once more for 2-of-11 accuracy in the final stanza. Sudan scored 16 points in the final quarter. Eight of those points came from the free throw line, as Nazareth committed several desperation fouls near the end of the game, trying to get control of the ball.

"We just had a team breakdown," Lombard said. "Once the game started we didn't seem intense on defense, and we didn't have that usual spark with the kids coming off the bench."

"Playing them a third time, after beating them twice could have made a difference subconsciously," he said. "They finally beat us and it came at a bad time for us."

"I felt this team was as good as any others I've ever coached. The seniors did a tremendous job this year, I'm just sorry for them because they didn't get to play on a state championship team their senior year."

"We really appreciate the support of our fans," Lombard said. "It was tremendous and we're really sorry we let the fans down. We have always seemed to be able to win the big games, and you just can't win those games forever."

## Police solve vandalism case

Daniel Salinas, 23, of Dimmitt, along with two juveniles, is facing charges in connection with the Dec. 18 incident of auto vandalism and burglary at the Dimmitt High School parking lot.

Ten cars belonging to members of the boys basketball team suffered slashed tires, broken windows and various missing items while the team was away at the Reese AFB Christmas Classic.

Items reported missing included eight-track and cassette tapes and a tape case. Some of these were found in Salinas's possession late last Wednesday after the Dimmitt Police Department executed a permission to search at his residence.

Salinas admitted knowing the approximately 50 tapes and the tape case in his possession were stolen property, according to Police Chief Don Franklin. Salinas also implicated the 15-year-old juvenile who had sold him the items for \$60.

During questioning, the juvenile implicated a 16-year-old, who had aided him in the incident.

The two youths confessed

and will be required to pay restitution for the \$4,870-worth of damage and theft combined that resulted from their actions, according to Franklin.

"It looks like we will recover all of the stolen property," Franklin said, noting that some of the items are in the possession of the youths' relatives living in the Valley, and should be returned soon by authorities there.

Franklin related that the department's solving of the case had been hampered before by the movement of the stolen property by Salinas.

"We had trouble getting him and the tapes in the same place at the same time, so that we could execute the search warrant," he said.

Salinas is still in custody and charges are pending against him. The juveniles were turned over to juvenile authorities.

The items recovered from Salinas were positively identified by theft victim Kevin Cleveland, Franklin said. He added that the knife used to slash the tires of some of the cars has also been recovered and positively identified by tests at the Lubbock DPS Lab.

He said the local plant's employees "have a sense of pride and a level of performance that's better than any I've ever dealt with, and I think you've got a right to be

Plant Manager George Lamberth traced the growth of the Amstar operation here during the past 10 years. Narrating a slide presentation, he pointed out the expansion projects at the plant in 1974, 1977 and 1981, and the growth of its product lines from basic starch and syrups to the highly refined fructose liquid sweeteners that are now a staple in the American food industry.

During these 10 years, Lamberth noted, the number of employees at the Dimmitt plant has increased from 83 to 190, with an annual payroll today of more than \$5 million. Lamberth estimated that the Amstar Corp. pays 10% of all county taxes, 15% of the Dimmitt Independent School District taxes and more than 30% of the city's taxes.

### Tractor test results told

"John Deere's new 50 Series 100- to 190-hp tractors really rang the bell in official tests," said Goldman Dyer of C&S Equipment Co.

"One or another of these tractors set records for PTO fuel efficiency, drawbar pull and low sound level," Dyer noted.

As a John Deere dealer, C&S has just received a set of official test results performed at the University of Nebraska Test Station in Lincoln. The five new tractors were announced in August, but test results were only recently made public.

Comparison of test results shows that the 190-hp 4850 is the most fuel-efficient tractor available in the over-100-hp category. "In fact, it's the most fuel-efficient tractor over 65 hp," Dyer said, referring to PTO fuel consumption tests performed at rated engine speed. In official test language, the 4850 produced 17.47 horsepower hours per gallon of fuel.

Both the 4850 and the 165-hp 4650 broke all existing records for drawbar pull measured on a 2-wheel-drive tractor. The 4650 pulled 18,794 pounds and the 4850 pulled 20,810 pounds. "I never expected to see any 2-wheel-drive pull over 20,000 pounds at Nebraska," Dyer said.

"All of these tractors were really quiet," Dyer said. "At full load the 4250 was only 74.5 dB(A), the 4450 was 74.0 dB(A), the 4650 was 76.5 dB(A) and the 4850 only 75.5 dB(A). Everybody knows that Sound-Gard® body is quiet, but these numbers are really impressive."

Dyer said he has the complete tests on all five tractors. He invites all interested farmers to stop in and see the results.

There is no charge to the customer for the neighborhood box units.







## JV Bobcats capture title

Dimmitt High School's junior varsity boys captured the district JV championship with a perfect 10-0 league mark.

The JV Bobcats, coached by Alan Steinle, ended their season with a 20-5 overall mark. Two of their losses were to varsity teams in the Kress Tournament — to Valley (ranked 10th in the state in Class A) by 12 points, and to Silverton by two points in overtime. The only JV team that bested them were Morton (two out or three, including an 82-80 game) and Canyon.

Their biggest victories included an 80-57 win over the Lubbock Roosevelt varsity, an overtime victory over the Lovelland JV and a home victory over Morton.

The squad was made up of eight juniors and nine sophomores, whom Steinle rotated regularly.

"The scoring was usually balanced no matter what combination was on the floor at any one time," Steinle commented. "The team had good

chemistry." The JV Bobcats scored 1,609 points to their opponents' 1,189 for an average score of 64-48. They scored 80 points or more in four games, including a 93-point output against the Tulia JV.

Individual scoring leaders were Brad Holcomb with 303, Robbie Hottel with 229 and Nick Martinez with 221. Rebounding leaders were Holcomb with an average of nine per game, Hottel with a 7.7 average and Nathan Nelson with an average of seven.

Floor leaders posting the most credits (steals, assists, etc.) during the season were Holcomb with an average of 7.2 per game, Robert Nelson with a 6.1 average and Nathan Nelson with a 5.7 average. Playing the most error-free ball among those logging the most playing time, Steinle said, were Nathan Nelson with an average of 1.4 miscues per game and Hottel with a 1.7 average.

Hottel posted the highest

field-goal percentage during the season, hitting 95 of 200 for 48%. Best free-throw shooters were Michael Love (41 of 61 for 67%), Danny Martinez (22 of 31 for 71%) and Nick Martinez (21 of 34, 62%).

As a team, the JV Bobcats averaged hitting 40% of their field shots and 53% of their free throws while garnering 47 rebounds, 42 credits and 19 miscues per game.

Steinle said these statistics indicate that the team was strong on rebounding and team play, a bit below par on field goals and "way below average" on free throws.

"As much as we ran with the ball, 19 mistakes per game isn't out of line," the coach explained. "The high number of credits per game can be attributed to the constant press defense that the team played, and playing good team ball by getting the ball to the open man."

He noted that the team won its last 12 games and 17 of its last 18.

"We're definitely proud of these kids for the enthusiasm and effort they've shown all year," Steinle said.




Dimmitt had beaten Slaton by sizeable margins twice this season, prior to the Tuesday game.





Any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Corn Producers Board by application to the above organization, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election. 




