## FIGURES REPORTED BY ASSOCIATION

Report compiled by the Texas Petroleum and Gas Association of Dallas, released Saturday, shows that average daily production of each Eastland county is 5.3 barrels.

That in the county there are 1,200 pumping wells and total production is 2,464 barrels daily. The average daily production gathered by the association shows that in West Central Texas that a deep drilling is evident. It stated that the 1929 average depth of this area was 1,850 feet. The 1931 average depth of wells in Central Texas was 1,200 feet through 1931 average was 1,700 feet and from the average depth was 3,000 feet.

## 1,000 LAWS ARE BEFORE SOLONS FOR PASSAGE

AUSTIN, Feb. 25.—More than 1,000 new laws were started toward the state's statutes books, as the 46th Texas Legislature ended the week's work.

Of 796 bills offered in the house, and 242 in the senate, approximately one fourth are duplications. Few other than bills of local application have been passed finally.

The house has passed and sent to the senate several controversial topics and the lobbies for and against will swing across the capitol with their next week.

## Poultry and Egg Profits Scrambled

AUSTIN, Tex.—Poultry and egg men of Texas experienced scrambled profits last month, according to University of Texas compilations issued today.

Shipments of poultry from Texas to interstate points during January dropped drastically, as only 9 cars of turkeys moved against 13 in January last year and only 50 cars of chickens as compared with 88 cars last year. In percentages, turkeys fell 80.8 per cent and chickens 48.2 per cent.

Egg shipments, on the other hand, gained one car over last January, to total sixteen carloads. No eggs were imported from other states last month.

## POLAND AGAIN IS SCENE OF NAZI RIOTING

WARSAW, Poland, Feb. 25.—More than 1,000 students broke through a police line today and stoned the German Embassy, smashing all the ground floor windows.

The outbreak coincided with the arrival of Count Galeazzo Ciano, foreign minister of Italy, Berlin axis, and with anti-German demonstrations by students at all Polish universities.

Soon after Ciano and his party arrived to visit Col. Josef Beck, Polish foreign minister, reports began to arrive of a repetition of yesterday's protest demonstrations against alleged anti-Polish activities by authorities of Danzig, which has a Nazi demonstration.

At Warsaw, Cracow, Vilna and Pozna, university students called Nazi meetings and speakers protested against the situation at Danzig. They claimed that Germany was responsible on the ground that the Nazis in Danzig were under German influence.

Newspapers today ignored yesterday's anti-German demonstrations. It was understood that the newspapers were advised that any edition containing reports of the demonstrations would be confiscated.

## FRANCO WILL TAKE OVER ALL SPAIN MONDAY

PARIS, Feb. 25.—President Manuel Azana of Republican Spain, ready to abandon his office and end the official existence of the republic, left his refuge at the Spanish Embassy today and departed for an undisclosed destination.

Azana was expected to announce before Monday that he had given up his mandate in view of the imminent recognition by Great Britain and France of the nationalist regime, headed by Generalissimo Francisco Franco.

Britain and France will announce recognition on Monday. With that and the resignation of Azana, the Franco regime will become the recognized government of Spain. Azana cannot resign constitutionally while on French soil, but he does not intend to return to Spain and will proclaim that he is no longer president, but a refugee on French soil.

## ROOSEVELT IS URGING PEACE AMONG UNIONS

MIMAMI, Fla., Feb. 25.—President Roosevelt, in urgent terms, today asked the heads of the American Federation of Labor and the Congress of Industrial Organization to appoint committees to negotiate a peace agreement in labor's three-year-old civil war.

The temporary white house offices here made public letters to A. F. of L. President William Green and C. I. O. President John L. Lewis, in which Mr. Roosevelt gave four major reasons for asking for settlement of the dispute.

His reasons were, "first, because it is right; second, because the responsible officers from both groups seem to me to be ready and capable of making a negotiated and just peace; third, because your membership ardently desires peace and unity, and fourth, because the government of the United States and the people of America believe it to be a wise and almost necessary step for the further development of the cooperation between free men in a democratic country, such as ours."

The president's appeal, dated Feb. 23, was made public while he was on the high seas with the fleet. The proposal was conveyed in virtually identical letters to Lewis and Green, delivered to the labor leaders of Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins.

The Farther Back, the More Belligerent

The man in the grandstand is always the one who hollers loudest for the team to give a leg for Old Siwash. The man in the back row is always the one loudest in demand that the wrestler break his opponent's leg off and throw it in his face.

War talk is a little like that, too. The vehemence of the demand that somebody get in there and stop Germany last fall was almost in inverse ratio to the distance from Berlin.

That is why it is so interesting to find Eduard Benes, the former president of Czechoslovakia during all the tenseness of the Munich settlement, talking quite quietly and calmly on his arrival in the United States to teach some university courses. At no time since his arrival have Dr. Benes' replies matched in fervor the almost hysterical questions that have been put to him.

Is war absolutely inevitable, as some insist? Not at all, says the calm Dr. Benes. There is great danger of war, of course, but it is not in the least inevitable. It all depends on the leaders and governments involved. "In my opinion, war can always be avoided," said the indomitable little Czechoslovakian leader.

Really, here is something to make ashamed the doubters of democracy, the pessimists who give up on peace and decency simply because they have had a series of setbacks. Listen to the man who, perhaps more than any other individual, has suffered from the misfortunes of a Europe in which orderly procedure has broken down:

"The United States—as state and nation, and your citizens as individuals—represented for me always that perfect fighter who knows that life is sometimes difficult, but who knows also that in human life there should be no room for despair or pessimism. Man, as long as he is alive, must never give up optimistic idealism; he must never, even if he sees the real situation in rather dark colors, cease to hope for better times, and he must, most of all, never cease to work for them, and never be discouraged on his way by ill success."

Brave Benes! Here is the fighter, back from the thick of the fight, bloody, but unbowed! And yet some how who have never yet felt a blow! Faint-hearted ones who cringe before an "inevitable" collapse, an "inevitable" war, take renewed courage from such as Benes! The very air is better to breathe because courage like that has come to our shores!
