## LABOR PEACE NEGOTIATIONS WILL CONTINUE

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Labor's peace negotiators indicated today that the American Federation of Labor has modified its conditional rejection of a proposal by the Congress of Industrial Organizations to unify all labor under one organization.

The indication came as negotiators for the two organizations arranged to transfer their peace conference to New York. They announced, jointly, that they would resume conferences there Friday night to consider the CIO plan to unite all American labor in a new "American Congress of Labor."

Harry C. Bates, chairman of the AF of L's negotiating committee, read the joint announcement which said that the New York meeting also would consider any other objectives that may be laid before it.

Shortly after the CIO negotiators presented the proposal at the initial white house conference yesterday, the federation representatives rejected it and asserted it was unworthy of consideration.

Today's meeting was held at the labor department.

## College Youths Are In Favor of Less Federal Spending

AUSTIN, Texas—American college youth would bridle Federal spending for relief, the current poll of Student Opinion Surveys, intercollegiate cross-section, disclosed here today.

Students in 82 colleges were two to one in favor of the recent \$150,000,000 slash in relief appropriations congressionally administered to the \$875,000,000 WPA budget bill. The poll is released from The University of Texas campus.

The surveys believed the college viewpoint might "point to future trends in the American problem of work relief."

The relief slash was least resisted in the Middle Atlantic section, where only 58.7 per cent approved Congress' action. Southern and Far Western states most heavily endorsed the budget reduction.

The surveys noted that President Roosevelt's popularity with college students dropped during February from 85.5 per cent to 63.2 per cent of supporters.

A Kentucky student summarized the view of the relief situation, stating: "Congress has already given out so much money that it has made people lazy, and they don't want to work."

Taking the opposite view, a Nebraska student thought relief spending should continue "as long as the need exists."

## HOUSE PASSES SECURITY ACT TO AID JOBLESS

AUSTIN, Texas, March 8.—The Texas House of Representatives today passed and sent to the governor a senate bill to improve operation of the state unemployment compensation act. Final vote in the house was 121 to 15.

The principal change in the bill is to provide for bi-weekly instead of weekly payments to recipients of employment compensation. Sponsors said it would save \$150,000 a year in administration by cutting in half the amount of clerical work needed to pay the claims.

Rep. E. H. Thompson, Jr., of Galveston, who explained the measure, said he was opposed to government unemployment compensation as "un-American" but that Texas would pay \$45,000,000 to the federal government in unemployment contributions without receiving any benefit if the state did not have its enabling laws.

## Words Stumbling Blocks For Texas Tech Freshmen

LUBBOCK, Texas—Only tyranny Texas Tech freshmen find in words is as a means of torturing profs by original definitions.

One English instructor lectured a week in class to write appropriate sentences illustrating correct use of certain words.

"Gaunt", "pretent", "gingerly", "marvel", "nutriment", "decorous", "lucrative", "vaunt", were to be written into example sentences.

"The boy held the girl very close and gaunt, in fact he held her so tight she could hardly breathe," wrote one young hopeful.

"The pretent of his sermon was 'Thou shalt not kill,'" a biblical scholar noted. But another, recalling some friend no doubt, conjured up this one: "He was the same all the time and never did pre-lect."

"She smiled gingerly as she went to meet her death," said a future pulp writer.

"To marvel his clothes was the height of her ambition."

"The nutriment of his speech was fowl," wrote a mystic.

"The decorous bodor came from the kitchen," said one, listening anxiously for the noon gong.

Play on Shakespeare's "All that glitters is not gold" this may have been: "He stumbled in the lucrative ditch and drowned."

"The negro vaunted the fence and ran away," was a desperate try. But one humorist knew his own limitations: "I vaunted to pass this test but I didn't."

## Poland Organizes An Anti-German Move On Frontier

WARSAW, Poland, Mar. 8.—The powerful opposition national party has started a fierce anti-German campaign throughout the Polish-German frontier area, it was disclosed today, by demanding that Poland prepare to oppose with all its might alleged aggressive German intentions.

The party is generally regarded as the organizer of the recent student opposition to Germany. It is the strongest opposition party, though it is not recognized in parliament as it boycotted the last election.

In recent municipal elections in Western Poland the party polled between 70 and 80 per cent of the votes.

## False Reports May Result In Penalty

AUSTIN, March 8.—It would be against the law for anyone to give false information to a newspaper regarding a wedding birth or death under a bill being considered in the house.

It was introduced by Rep. Arthur Holland of Belton.

Any person knowingly making a false report could be fined up to \$500 or sent to jail up to six months, or be punished by both fine and jail sentence.

## 13 HOTELS IN CAPITOL ARE NOW PICKETED

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Service employees of 13 hotels struck today and established picket lines around the buildings where many government officials live.

Officers of the striking American Federation of Labor unions said that more than 2,200 service employees walked out when the strike order became effective at 5 a. m.

Hotel operators, who asserted that the walkout was ordered because of their refusal to grant a closed shop, said that service was continuing, although it was curtailed.

Government and labor officials, always sensitive to strike situations, were faced with the question of whether to cross picket lines.

The vice presidents of the Congress of Industrial Organization, Phillip Murray and Sidney Hillman, who are negotiating with the American Federation of Labor for labor peace, checked out of the Carlton within two hours after picket lines were established.

## McCarty, Woodward Are Confirmed By Vote of Senators

AUSTIN, Texas, March 8.—The Texas Senate today confirmed Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel's appointment of former senator Walter Woodward of Coleman as state life insurance commissioner.

Woodward said that he expected to take office Saturday.

The senate also confirmed the governor's appointment of Milburn McCarty of Eastland to be a member of the board of directors of Texas Technological College at Lubbock and the re-appointment of directors Joe T. Sneed of Amarillo and Charles C. Thompson of Colorado City.

The senate also granted formal permission for the governor to withdraw the appointment of J. C. Hunter of Abilene to be chairman of the State Highway Commission.

## Britain Gains New Diplomatic Point

LONDON, March 8.—Great Britain, in what was regarded as an important diplomatic victory over the totalitarian governments, agreed today to the appointment of the Duke of Alba as the first ambassador to London of the Spanish Nationalists.

Both Germany and Italy, it was reported in diplomatic quarters here, had opposed the appointment of the duke on the ground it might bring Spain into closer influences by Great Britain.

## Del Rio Students End Short Strike

DEL RIO, Texas, March 8.—Del Rio High school students today ended a one-day strike, caused by a controversy over "responsibility" of the school newspaper.

The argument between strikers and school officials apparently ended in a draw. Earl McChesney and Harold Holdeman, editors of the paper, who had been suspended, were re-instated as the strikers demanded.

School trustees announced, however, that further publication of the paper would not be permitted.

## COMMUNIST'S MADRID RIOT IS SUPPRESSED

MADRID, Spain, March 8.—Republican troops under command of Gen. Jose Miaja today crushed a communist army rebellion in Madrid and took drastic measures elsewhere against mutineers, opposing the "peace with honor" program of the new republican defense council.

On the fourth day of the rebellion and counter-rebellion, within the hard-pressed republican regime, the government announced that communist army units, which rebelled in the Madrid sector, had surrendered in the face of an ultimatum by Miaja.

Members of the defense council credited his quick action with having saved the city from the communists.

Communist-led units, opposing the defense council's program for peace negotiations with national Generalissimo Francisco Franco, continued to defy the authority of the defense council in some sectors, however.

The counter-rebellion was disclosed to have spread into many other sectors when it was announced that uprising had been crushed at Valencia, Guadalajara, Albacete and several other cities.

Republican authorities in all these cities said order had been restored and that council representatives dominated the situation.

## Now Spain Can Begin to Count the Cost

The Spanish Tragedy now staggers to its final act. Amid the dust and blood and tears, Spain may now stumble to her feet and try to set her face forward again.

Nearly two million men in arms must somehow be returned to civilian life in a country whose population is only 22,000,000.

Between 7,000,000 and a million men are dead on the field of battle. No one knows, no one will ever know, how many were assassinated by factions during the early days of the revolt, how many have been executed by both sides, how many men, women and children have been killed by bombs and shells. No one will ever know how many thousands have died of privation and shock, but these casualties surely are in the scores of thousands.

Hundreds of thousands are wounded and maimed, and scores of thousands will never again have decent physical or mental health because of what they have felt, and seen, and done.

Last of all, the cost in money. Again, no one knows what it is, but certainly any new Spanish government must start out as a bankrupt.

This is a cost perhaps higher in proportion to population than any other country paid during the World War. It is a foretaste of what future wars will be if they come.

Now that the extremists of both sides, the right and the left, have had their say at the point of the bayonet, the reasonable people must be heard at last, the middle-of-the-road people whom it is now the fashion to decry as wishy-washy and futile.

Such a one, Salvador de Madariaga, spoke words a year and a half ago which all can see now were true. But a year and a half ago, none would listen. Madariaga, first ambassador of the Spanish republic to the United States, and president of the League of Nations Council, spoke from Switzerland:

"Both sides fight for an ideal . . . but while fighting for an ideal Spain are they not destroying that real Spain without which their ideal nation cannot materialize? . . . Moral victory—the one that matters—will not be theirs, whoever wins, since military victory will be due to a preponderance of foreign war weapons. . . . Thus the real Spain will not be committed to a victory which—whatever wins—will be a foreign victory. And so—whatever wins—Spain is defeated.

"Whoever wins must govern with the good-will of all Spaniards, and that goodwill cannot be enforced."

Wise, prophetic words, to which bleeding Spain must return, now that the extremists of both sides have done their worst.

The kind of words to which people of any country would do well to listen before they allow uncompromising extremists to plunge them into the hell of civil or foreign wars.

## Legislature Seeks A Definition Of Word "Newspaper"

AUSTIN, Tex.—The Texas Legislature is attempting to define a newspaper.

The definition was called for in connection with a pending bill to require publication in a newspaper of financial reports of political subdivisions.

Sen. Manley Head of Stephenville, author of the publication bill, offered this definition: "The term 'newspaper' shall be held to mean a publication bearing a title or name, published at a fixed place of business, regularly issued at fixed intervals as frequently as once a week and having second-class mailing privileges, being not less than four pages of five columns or more each."

To be classed as a newspaper of general publication, it would be required further by the Texas bill that there must have been publication at regular intervals continuously for at least 24 months. The paper must also have been distributed to readers generally of all classes in the county or counties where it is circulated. A definite price must be fixed for each copy or for annual subscription and the circulation must be at least 50 per cent paid for by regular subscribers or through newsdealers.

The paper must publish at least 25 per cent news matter "which has sufficient merit to have created a following of paid readers."

P. B. Bittle, superintendent of Eastland schools reported Wednesday that four members of the schools' teaching staff are ill. Most were ill because of colds and influenza.

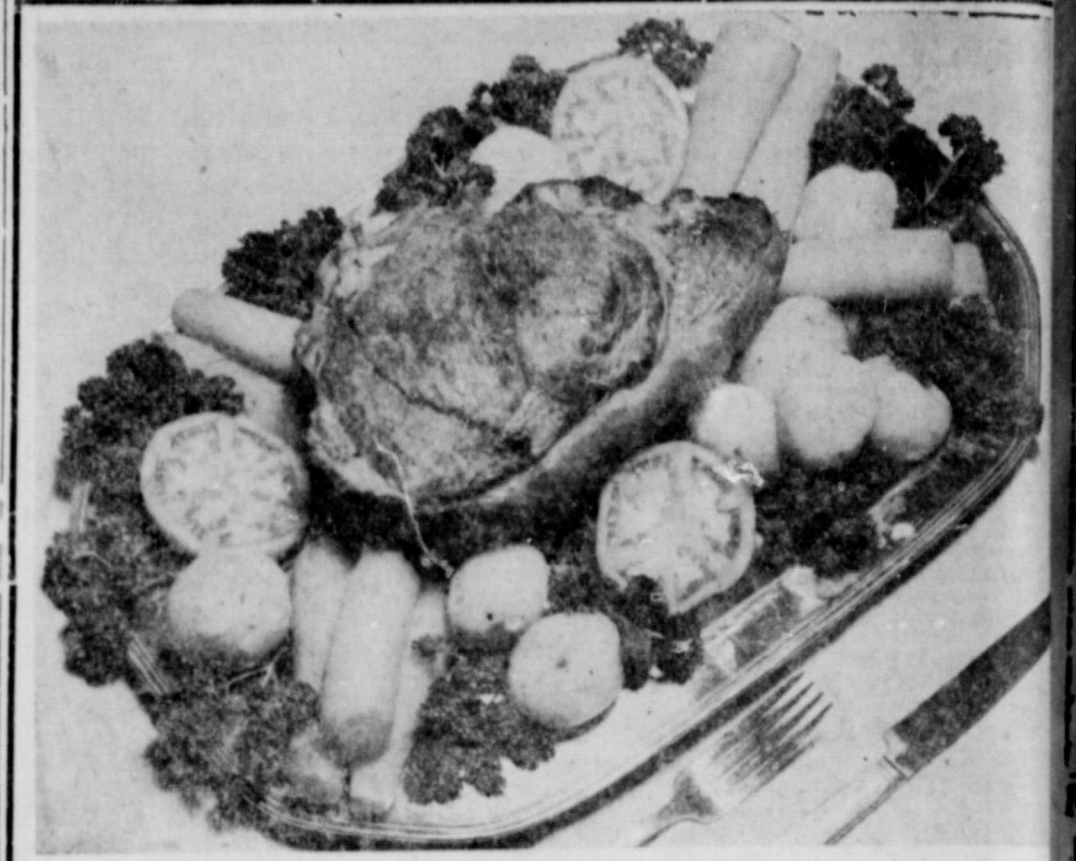

### College Graduates Take Up Farming

LUBBOCK, Texas.—Of the 301 graduates of the Division of Agriculture at Texas Technological College, 267 or 88.7 per cent are engaged in agriculture, a recent survey discloses.

Thirty-two engaged in farming, ranching, and productive agriculture; 41 in commercial agriculture; 106 in professional agriculture; 16 are teaching in colleges and universities, or are engaged in agricultural research; 61 are teaching vocational agriculture in high schools; and 11 are doing advanced agricultural work in colleges and universities. The 106 engaged in professional agriculture are divided as follows: 70 men in U. S. civil service and similar work; 29 in agricultural extension work in Texas and New Mexico; 7 in city and state employment. Of the 34 graduates not engaged in agriculture, 15 are teaching, 12 engaged in commercial industry, 2 are doing church or ministerial work, 1 is a housewife, 3 are bankers, and 1 unknown.

### Appropriation For Interior Approved

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8.—The house appropriations committee today reported a \$160,578,995 appropriation bill to finance the activities of the Interior Department during the 1940 fiscal year.

Continuing its effort to economize, the committee reduced the bill \$6,254,188 below President Roosevelt's budget request. It was the seventh consecutive appropriation which was trimmed below budget figures by the committee, although none of the reductions have been large.

Today's measure still carried \$14,851,991 more than was provided for Interior Department operations in the current fiscal year.
