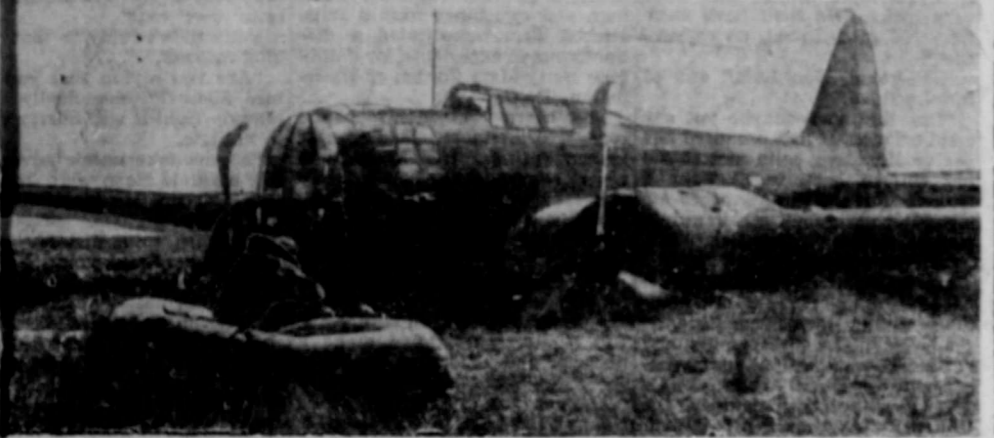

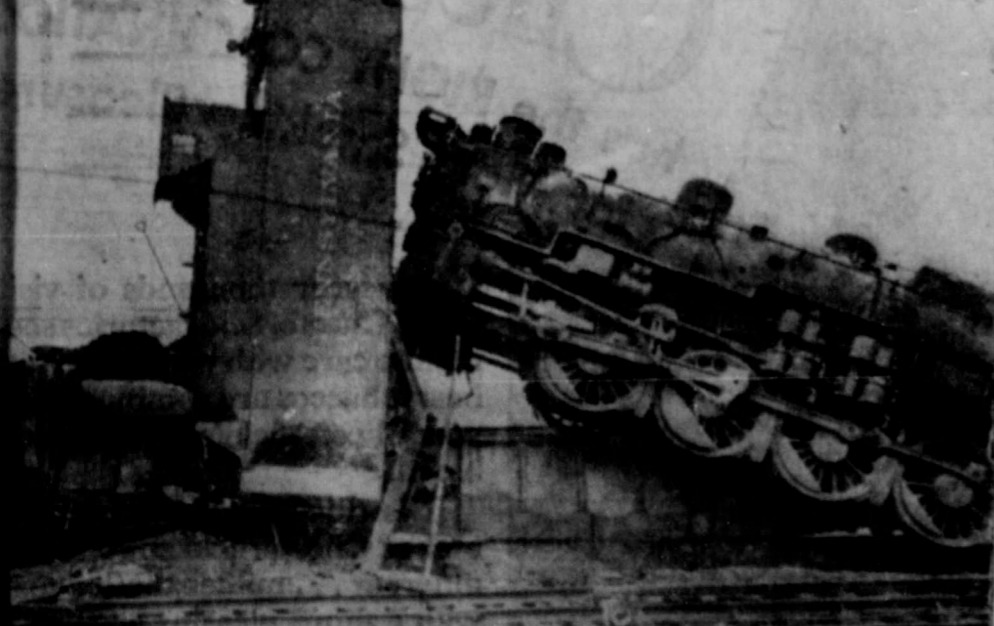

## Tokyo Seeks New Shanghai Regime

TOKYO, Japan, May 3.—Japan tonight informed Great Britain and the United States that she demands "a thorough going reorganization of the International Settlement at Shanghai. The Japanese demands were given to Joseph Grew, United States Ambassador, and Sir Robert Craigie, British Ambassador, by Renzo Sawada, vice minister for foreign affairs. The vice minister demanded "a revamping" of the Shanghai land regulations, a step which might lead to the abolition of the settlement in which the British have investments running into hundreds of millions of dollars.

## RANGER NATIONAL GUARD UNIT PRAISED BY OFFICERS AFTER AN INSPECTION ON WEDNESDAY

Capt. J. E. Fletcher, commanding officer, and Company I, 142nd Infantry, Texas National Guard, of Ranger, were given high praise at an inspection Tuesday night to which Col. M.H. Quisenberry; Col. Joseph A. Atkins; Col. J. Watt Paige; Maj. E. V. Hardwick and Capt. Dobbs participated.

Col. Atkins is officer in charge of National Guard affairs of the Eighth Corps Area, from San Antonio; Col. Paige is regimental commander of the 142nd Infantry; Maj. Hardwick is commander of the Third Battalion, 142nd Infantry, and Capt. Dobbs is adjutant of the 142nd Infantry. The officers were high in their praise, both of the company, and the army. They all pronounced the army to be one of the best in the state and in excellent condition.

## GERMANY HAS SOUGHT PACT WITH NATIONS

BERLIN, May 3.—Germany today approached the Scandinavian and Baltic countries with peace proposals designed to neutralize the Reich's entire northern flank in event of war. Reliable sources said that Germany had offered mutual non-aggression pacts to Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, Estonia and Latvia, guaranteeing them against attack by Germany and assuring their neutrality if Germany is engaged in war in Europe.

This move coincided with a decided turn for the worse in Germany's relations with Poland, in which the controlled German press strongly warned Warsaw against rejecting Adolf Hitler's demands for the return of Danzig and a road across the Polish Corridor to East Prussia. WARSAW, Poland, May 3.—Poland today celebrated a national holiday while the government speeded up its defense measures by doubling the number of army officers in command of the country's 1,300,000 soldiers. There were only small detachments of troops for parades in various towns, because most of them were on the western and southern fronts, facing Germany.

## Religious Drama Players Called To Meet Next Monday

A meeting of the religious drama players has been called for Monday evening at 8:00 o'clock in the Booster Room of the Methodist Church. A. C. Simmons, president, has emphasized that this is not a closed group but a recently-organized department of the church, the purpose of which is to present religious messages through the medium of the drama.

## Roosevelt Plans No Answer to Hitler

WASHINGTON, May 3.—President Roosevelt feels that the foreign situation has quieted down considerably and he plans no further direct action regarding it at this time, associates said today. They set forth that view when pressed about reports the president might follow up his rejected peace appeal to Chancellor Hitler with a speech or some new diplomatic move.

## Raymond Doyle Dies in Ranger; Service First Baptist

Funeral services for Raymond Doyle, 42, for eight years a resident of Ranger, and who died late Tuesday, were to be conducted from the First Baptist Church of Ranger this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Dr. L. R. Gray, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Ranger, was to conduct the services, assisted by Rev. H. B. Johnson, pastor of the First Christian Church of Ranger and Rev. K. C. Edmonds.

After the services in Ranger the body is to be shipped by Killingsworth's to Patrick, near Waco, in McLennan county, for burial in the Patrick cemetery. Doyle was a member of the Rock Creek Baptist church of Patrick, and of the Midland Masonic Lodge, No. 623. Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Johnnie Roberts Doyle, one son, Louis Raymond, and one daughter, Anna Ross, all of Ranger; two sisters, Mrs. J. L. Garrett and Mrs. L. E. Osteen, both of Patrick; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Doyle, of Rock Creek.

## BRITAIN PLANS AN AGREEMENT WITH HITLER

LONDON, May 3.—Great Britain today tentatively offered Germany a mutual pledge against aggression and at the same time made counter-proposals to Russia, designed to bring the Soviets into a European non-aggression pact, with Britain and France.

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told a questioner in the House of Commons that the government would be ready to consider giving Germany reciprocal assurances against aggression. Chamberlain declared that Britain has not adopted a policy of encircling Germany and said the government would gladly consider proposals for British guarantees against aggression. His statement was, in effect, an informal acceptance of Adolf Hitler's offer in his Reichstag speech last Friday to consider overtures from any of the nations President Roosevelt implied were in danger of German aggression.

## W. F. Bailey Dies In Ranger; Funeral Conducted Today

W. F. Bailey, 76, of Ranger, who died in a Ranger hospital after an illness of several weeks, was to be buried in Evergreen cemetery, Ranger, this afternoon, after services at 4 o'clock in the Church of the Nazarene, Rev. A. G. Pool, pastor of the Church, was to conduct the services, assisted by Rev. H. B. Johnson and Killingsworth's was in charge of burial arrangements. The decedent had been a resident of Ranger for the past 22 years. He was born in Washington county, Arkansas, and was a member of the First Christian Church of Waco.

## New Bases For The Navy and Air Force Sought On Pacific

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Army and navy officials are studying plans to establish American air and naval bases in Mexico and the Galapagos Islands, of Ecuador, in order to fortify the Pacific approach to the Panama Canal, it was learned today. The officials may ask the state department, soon, to sound out Mexico and Ecuador on the possibility of negotiating treaties which would authorize the establishment of such bases.

## Air Research for U. S. To Be Sought By Air Committee

WASHINGTON, May 3.—The National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics has decided to ask President Roosevelt to recommend establishment of five new aeronautics research centers, it was learned today. The decision was reached after hearing Col. Charles A. Lindbergh at an executive session. As a starting point in a program Lindbergh regards as vital to national defense, the committee recommended that congress appropriate funds for an aviation research laboratory in the mid-west, probably near Chicago.

Does College Pay?

That question has been asked by more and more anxious parents in recent years. Does it pay in dollars and cents, that is.

Best and strongest light ever thrown on the question, perhaps, now comes from a study by the U. S. Office of Education, which compiled data from 31 colleges, covering 46,000 alumni graduated between 1928 and 1933.

Here are some of the more interesting things revealed:

1. Of the men, 58 per cent, and of the women, 61 per cent have never been unemployed since graduation. Ninety-eight per cent of the men and 99 per cent of the women have never been on relief. Ninety-six per cent of the men, and 93 per cent of the women reporting are today either temporarily or permanently employed, though many took a year or two to connect with the job.

2. The average typical college man one year out of school is making about \$1314 a year, and after eight years he has climbed to \$2383. For women the average salaries were, first year \$1092; eighth year \$1606.

3. Nearly two-thirds of the graduates go into the professions, and after eight years about 19 per cent are owners or part owners of their businesses. More than half graduate into cities of 100,000 population or over.

4. Of married alumni in the group surveyed, 57 per cent of the men, and 61 per cent of the women report no children. To 12,233 men graduates were born 7727 children; to 6359 women graduates were born 3463. The divorce rate among college graduates is lower than among people in general.

There's your picture. A young fellow goes to college. He graduates at about \$2. He gets a job fairly quickly at about \$25 a week. Not much, maybe, but better than the income of the average wage-earner. After eight years he's married, getting about \$43, with less than a 50-50 chance of having children to support. There is one chance in five that by that time he'll be his own boss.

That's pretty good proof that the pre-depression picture of the value of college has vanished. In those days it was: graduate, become a bond salesman, and make a million within five years.

Today the picture is less flamboyant and very much more realistic. The college degree today is no touchstone, no guarantee of monetary success. It never was.

The greatest value of the college diploma today, as always, must be sought in other places than the pocketbook, in other values than those which may be set down in a checkbook.

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House Refuses To Kill a Sales Tax In Morning Session

AUSTIN, May 3.—The Texas House of Representatives refused, today, to kill the sales and natural resource tax constitutional amendment for financing social security.

The vote against striking out the resolving clause of the substitute for the resolution passed by the senate, was 99 to 55.

A similar test yesterday showed 83 to 46 against defeating the measure. A total of 100 favorable house votes are needed to submit the proposition to the electorate.

Before the house recessed for lunch Rep. Joe Keith, of Sherman, had presented an amendment to take away the authority to vote from persons who receive old age assistance. A substitute offered by Rep. John Kerr, Jr., of La-Grange, would disfranchise any person, supported in whole, or in part, by tax money. Neither was voted upon before the noon recess.

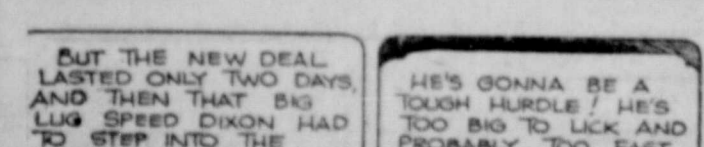

**Rayway Traffic Is Being Regulated By Control Center**

FORT WORTH, Tex.—The first ray traffic control center in the South, designed to direct traffic on all airways within 200 miles of Fort Worth, began operation Monday, May 1.

The control center, under supervision of the Civil Aeronautics Authority, uses an elaborate system of communications to keep detailed and current records of each flight under way within the prescribed area. Primary purpose of the control center, it was expected, will be to promote safety while flying.

The office here will maintain direct telephone service with operating offices of all air lines in this region. Teletype machines will connect the center with government stations and with army air posts.
