James R. (Jim) Ray, 30, a widely known Hale County farmer stockman and businessman, has announced his candidacy for State Senator from the recenity formed 30th District.

The District included 21 coun- THIRTY NINTH YEAR ties ranging from Wichita on the East to the New Mexico state line on the West.

Resulting from the Legislative Redistricting Bill, it combines portions of District 30 represented by Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress and District 23 represented by Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon. Ray is a former Administrative Assistant to Congressman George Mahon, serving in the post for over 6 years. He is a graduate of Abernathy public schools.

He was graduated from Texas Tech with a degree in Government and attended Georgetown University Law School while he was with Congressman Mahon in Washington, D. C. Ray has served as a part-time Government instructor at Texas Tech.

In announcing his candidacy in the Democratic Party Primary, Ray said "I intend personally to visit every town in the new 30th District and want to meet and visit with as many persons as possible."






Scout Council Annual Banquet To Be Held February 15, 1966





It is known here in Washington that North Vietnam never made any move toward acceptance of our peace offers. Even though we walked the extra mile, turned the other cheek and bent over backwards to achieve an end to the war North Vietnam's communist regime continued her terrorism and aggression. Even worse the Reds took advantage of the bombing lull to prepare for an even greater war effort against us and our Allies.

Before the bombing pause began, North Vietnam had built some 50 surface-to-air missile sites. During the lull she added some 10 more. These will complicate our bombing efforts and further endanger the lives of our pilots.

In addition, during the "grace" period we allowed them, the communists worked night and day to reopen Communitcations lines roads and railways, to improve bypass routes around downed bridges, to infiltrate men and arms into South Vietnam, and to increase training of their limited air force.

We could not continue these advantages to an enemy. We could not so endanger the lives of the American men committed to battle there.

We must now do what is necessary militarily to bring a speedy end to the war. There is not substitute for victory.

The table will enable the stud-ents with calves to take it home behind a pickup and trim them without having to throw them. There is little struggle from the.


