## There Is Imperialism— and Imperialism

The grant to the Standard Oil Co., of California of an oil concession covering the whole kingdom of Saudi Arabia is a very significant event.

Twenty years ago a great cry of "imperialism" would probably have gone up at any such announcement. But the very fact that this concession was obtained by Americans at all shows that today there is imperialism—and imperialism.

There is the technical imperialism which is a matter of capital in Country A obtaining economic control of certain resources in Country B. But there is another imperialism afoot today, in which such a concession would be nothing but a stepping-stone toward a greater imperialism, one which would mean actual, tangible, physical and political control.

It is said to be because he mistrusted their motives that King Ibn Saud rejected frantic offers for his oil concession on the part of Germany, Italy, and Japan, as well as Britain and France. He felt that none of them would be content merely to exploit the oil and have done with it, for each has political ambitions and plans which might affect Saudi Arabia. The United States has none, as King Ibn Saud well knows.

So, although the American offer was not up to the glittering marks set by special envoys from the German, Italian and Japanese governments, the king accepted it, knowing it to be a plain, simple business proposition without political stings, from a people who could have no conceivable designs on his country.

So if this be American imperialism—and a few years ago it would certainly have been so called—make the most of it. For it is plain that this Arabian king found it infinitely preferable to the other kinds of imperialism with which he was confronted.

There might be the germ of a thought here for some of the South American countries who have been afraid of American "imperialism," at various times in the past perhaps not as ungrounded fear. But for 10 years the United States has made it quite clear that such business as it does with foreign countries is without political strings. And some of these countries may well start asking themselves, is this true of all other countries with whom we may be dealing?

It is to be hoped that this new concession will be operated in accordance with the best modern principles of such arrangements, namely, that both parties shall benefit in proportion to what each contributes to the enterprise. For when such an arrangement is worked out, much of the curse is off what we have learned to hate as "imperialism."

Filling, 1 No. 1 can crushed pineapple, 2-3 cup sugar mixed with 3 tablespoons flour, few grains salt. Cook until thick. Add 1 tablespoon butter. Dust top with sugar.

### Baked Fluffy Mashed Potatoes

Cook 4 medium size potatoes in water until tender, drain and season with Carey's and 3 tablespoons butter. Beat until light. Beat 2 egg whites stiff, reserving a small portion and fold in remainder into mashed potatoes. Pipe lightly into shallow casserole, brush with reserve egg and bake until delicately brown.

### Tomatoes Stuffed With Cabbage Salad

Buy tomatoes one for each serving. Peel and core, when ready to serve place on lettuce leaf and cut in six sections almost but not quite through. Open like flower petals. Fill with cabbage slaw made with 2 cups finely shredded cabbage, 1 teaspoon Carey's salt, 2 hard cooked eggs, mayonnaise. Slice eggs, reserve enough of center slices to garnish salad. Chop rest and add to cabbage. Add mayonnaise, fill tomatoes with mixture, garnish with one slice of egg on top.

## Junior Placement Officers Help 1,246 Youths Get Work

AUSTIN, Texas—Junior placement officers operated jointly by the Texas State Employment Service and the National Youth Administration placed 1,246 young people between 16 and 24 years of age in private jobs during July, according to State Youth Administrator J. C. Kellam.

Monthly reports of junior placement offices in Texas' four major cities, Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth and San Antonio, show that of the total number placed in private jobs during the month had less than a high school education. The reports also revealed that 2,446 new applicants registered for employment during July.

Object of the junior placement service, Kellam said, is to provide a counseling and placement program for unemployed young men and women.

Variety in the meals is the spice for appetite.

This change in foods is important and may be discussed from two angles.  
First, digestion is aided by variety in foods. Second, it is an aid to the one planning or preparing the number of meals for a week or for fifty-two weeks in the year.  
Half of lazy appetites is boredom. Let's shift the scene. Vary the menu.  
Real zest is given to plain fruits by pouring ginger over the cocktail just at the last moment, and a new sauce makes your most loaf satisfying, new and different. Many a home maker runs a different frosting on her Saturday cake for several successive weeks though the foundation cake is identical. The plan I find most helpful in putting variety into the menu on Saturday taking advantage of special food prices offered in stores on that day. My market list will contain foods for the week's menu. There are those who argue that such a plan takes too much time, but one half an hour spent in this way each week will provide an easy way in planning variety.

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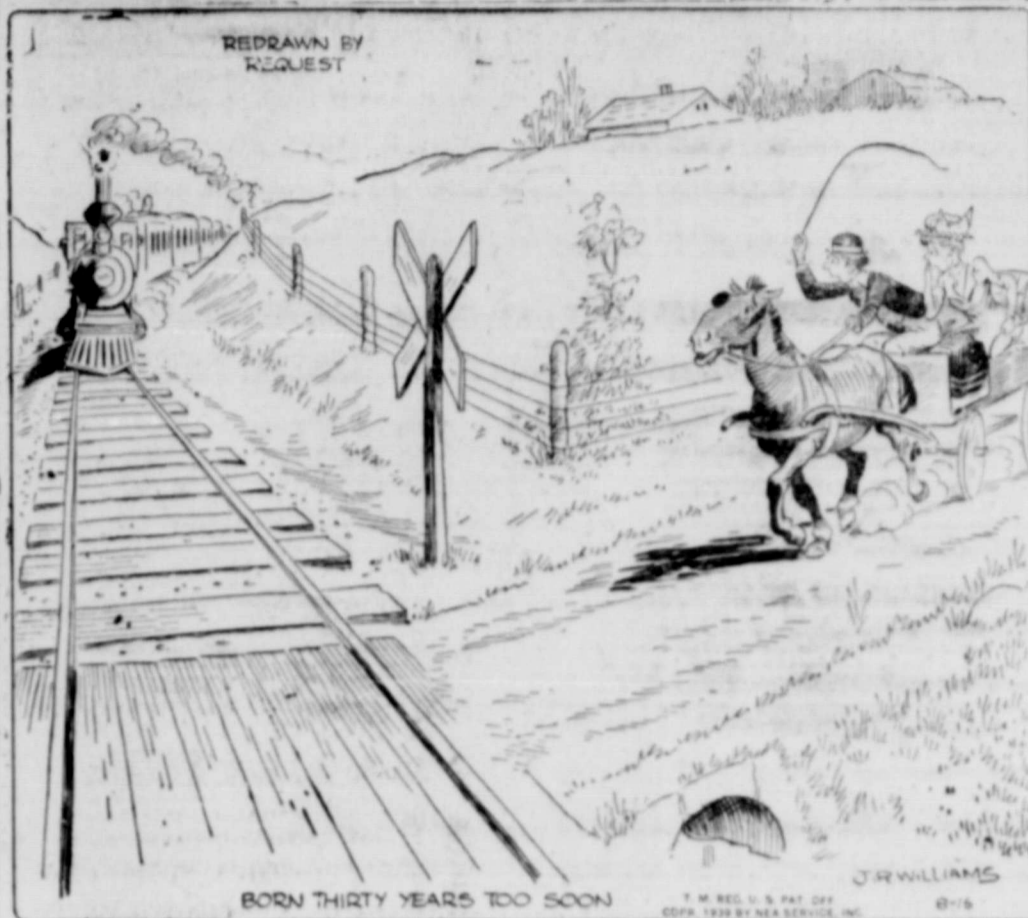
