Amazing Feats Of Pearl Divers Are Related In Sidney

 SYDNEY, N. S. W.—Japanese pearl-shell divers in Torres Strait (North Australia) work at tremendous depths of 300-feet wearing only helmets and ear-sets, according to officers of the commonwealth customs launch Vigil.

Following a discovery made by Dr. Nimmo, a medical officer at Thursday Island, an Australian pearling base, there have been few recent fatalities. Dr. Nimmo noticed that the blood of many dead divers, brought up from a great depth, was an extremely bright red.
 After tests which included the sending down of rats in a diving helmet, he discovered that carbon monoxide poisoning was the real cause of death. The luggers had inlet valves to the air compressors located in the bilges, near the engine, and the divers were breathing the exhaust gases. Since this discovery the air intakes have been moved and accidents have been reduced to a minimum.

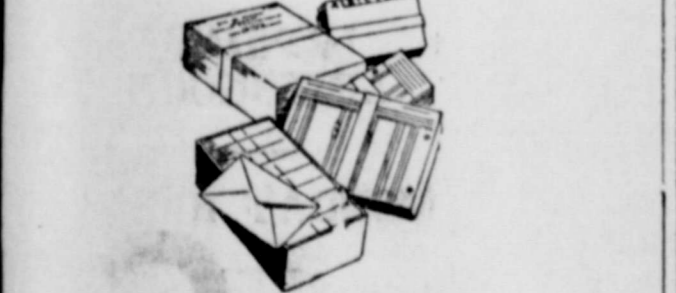

Variety in the meals is the spice for appetite.

Royal American Dishes

Americans are increasingly aware of their rich heritage of cooking, of its wide variety owing to its regional origins. The recent White House meals to which King George and Queen Elizabeth sat down were just another reminder. Probably there is not a woman between the St. Lawrence and the Gulf of Mexico who did not wonder what she herself would have served had she been in Mrs. Roosevelt's place.

There are any number of American dishes that whenever served are royal fare. Who would not give a twenty-one gun salute to chicken served southern style with a blended creamery sauce? To companion the chicken there is corn on the cob, or corn pudding, mustard-like cooked with milk and eggs.

This to be followed with some

such dessert as a strawberry ice cream or short cake.

And when the last strawberry has vanished, comes the thought of blushing ripe peaches, served chilled with whipped or single cream really makes a dish fit for a king.

- Place pineapple in bottom of greased loaf pan. Combine other ingredients and pack on pineapple. Bakes for 1 1-2 hours in Roper Range at 350 degrees. Pour off excess fat, turn out on platter, garnish with parsley.

Apple Fritters

1 1-3 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 teaspoon Carey's Salt
1-2 cup milk
1 egg
Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add milk and well-beaten egg. Core, pare and cut apples in 1-3 inch rounds. Sprinkle with a little lemon juice. Dip pieces in batter, fry in deep, hot fat until golden brown. Drain and roll in sugar.

Carrot Ring

1 1-2 cup milk
3 eggs well beaten
2 1-2 cups fine ground carrots
1 teaspoon sugar
1 teaspoon Carey's Salt
1-2 cup grated cheese
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon melted butter
Scald milk in double boiler; add ingredients. Bake in a well-greased ring mold in a pan of hot water in slow oven, unmold on platter, fill center with butter peas.

Grape Salad

1 package lemon Jello
2 cups warm water
1 pound white seedless grapes
Dissolve Jello in warm water. Place in Coolerator until it begins to thicken. Add grapes sliced in thin pieces. Return to Coolerator and chill until firm. Serve with salad dressing.

Cookie Jar Favorites

2 1-2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1-2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1-2 cloves
1 teaspoon Carey's Salt
1 cup raisins
1-2 cup nuts, chopped
1-2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 1-4 cup unsweetened apple sauce
Sift flour, measure and sift again with salt, soda and spices. Add sugar, beat until light and fluffy. Add egg, beat thoroughly. Add dry ingredients alternately

with apple sauce. Add nuts and raisins. Drop from spoon on greased cookies sheet. Bake in Roper.

Apricot Sherbet

1 3-4 cups sugar
2 tablespoon flour
4 cups boiling water
1 large can apricots
1 lemon
1-8 teaspoon Carey's Salt
1 cup whipping cream
Boil sugar, flour and water together five minutes. Rub apricots through sieve using apricot juice. Add lemon juice. Cool and freeze in freezer. Remove lid and add whipping cream. Freeze until firm. Let stand one hour before serving.

Ginger Bread With Peaches and Whipped Cream

Sift 1 1-4 cups flour with 1-4 teaspoon of Carey's Salt
1-8 teaspoon cinnamon and 3-4 teaspoon ginger. Melt 4 table-spoons shortening in deep round pan or iron frying pan. Brush sides with the fat. Break one egg in mixing bowl and beat until light. Add 1-3 cup sugar and 1-2 cup molasses, sift in 1 teaspoon soda and 1-2 teaspoon baking powder and add the melted short-

ening. Mix and last add 1-2 cup boiling water. Mix quickly and turn into greased pan. Bake at 400 degrees in Roper Range for 15 minutes. While it is baking, peel 3 medium sized peaches, cut in halves, discard stones and cut each half in about six slices. Without removing it from the oven arrange peaches on top of the gingerbread, radiating from the center like petals of a flower. Sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon and finish baking or until toothpick inserted comes out clean. Serve with whipped cream.

Egg Club Sandwich

For each sandwich, spread 1 slice of toast with creamed butter, cover with a lettuce leaf spread with mayonnaise and on top of that lay 1 hard cooked egg cut in slices. Cover with thin slices of tomatoes and then lay on 3 strips of bacon cooked until crisp, cover with another slice of buttered toast. Garnish each sandwich with lettuce-cup holding Russian dressing and cucumber pickle sliced thin. Russian dressing is as follows: 4 tablespoons mayonnaise, 2 tablespoons celery cut fine.

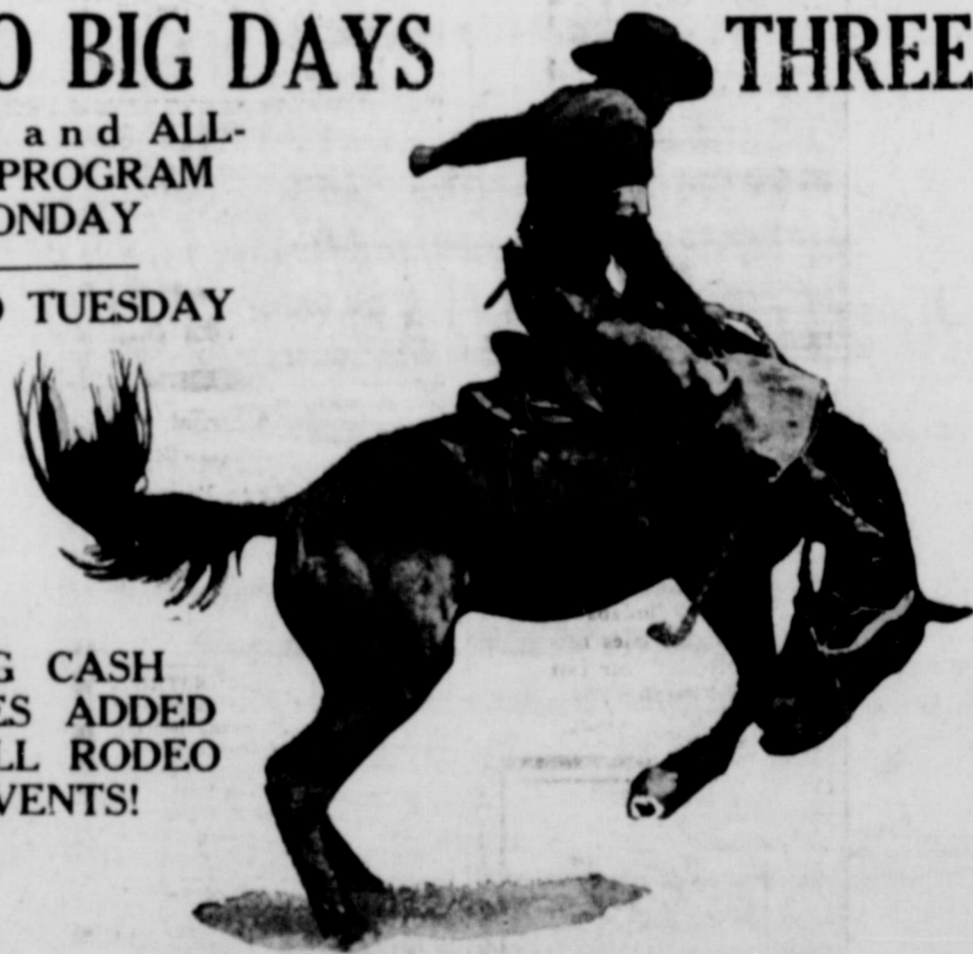

Rain Isn't Rain All the Way Down Meteorologists Find After Tests

By United Press EL PASO, Tex.—Rain isn't rain all the way down, meteorologists have learned through use of the radio telemeter, an instrument recently adopted by the U. S. Weather Bureau to make weather recordings. Attaching to a small helium-filled balloon, the instrument ascends to the stratosphere, and through temperature and pressure changes broadcasts radio signals to receiving sets on the ground. The telemeters gradually are replacing weather bureau pilots who

INDIANS FEAR CRACK OF DOOM

ORAIB, Ariz.—Hopi Indians living in this vicinity have been given a sign that the end of the world is near. A 9-year-old white mule gave birth recently to a colt. For such a hybrid to have offspring is rare, and for the Indian traditions it spells the end of the earth. The Indians took one look at what they termed the "unnatural phenomenon" and shuffled off to their prayers.

Richard T. Fox, junior meteorologist in charge of the bureau at the municipal airport here, said information obtained through use of the telemeter had disproved weather theories held in the past.

"No considerable precipitation ever starts as rain," he said. "There must be ice or snow somewhere up above. When that comes through water clouds, more moisture is added, and what was originally ice or snow then falls as rain."

The sets are carried into the stratosphere by balloons which burst when their maximum altitude has been reached. The sets then parachute to earth. Temperatures of 91 degrees below zero, and altitudes of 73,000 feet—almost 14 miles—have been recorded. Changes in temperature, humidity and altitude cause variations in frequency, pitch and tone of radio signals sent out by the telemeter and received by ground sets.

Oddly, though the majority of sets are lost through failure to find them after they have settled to the earth, the federal government began use of the telemeter to save money. Cost of the sets is less than that of sending an airplane aloft daily. At present there are seventeen radio telemeter stations in operation in the United States, with an additional thirteen scheduled to be in service by the middle of September.

Amazing Feats Of Pearl Divers Are Related In Sidney

By United Press

SYDNEY, N. S. W.--Japanese pearl-shell divers in Torres Strait (North Australia) work at the tremendous depth of 300 feet wearing only helmets and corselets, according to officers of the commonwealth customs launch Vigilant, which recently returned to Cairns (North Queensland) after a cruise of the Cape York Peninsula and Gulf of Carpentaria waters.

This depth is in excess of that regarded as possible by naval divers wearing full diving dress, and represents pressure of about 120 pounds to the square inch on the diver's naked body. The Japanese are said to be able to descend to greater depths than 300 feet, but the compressors on their luggers are not powerful enough to supply air.

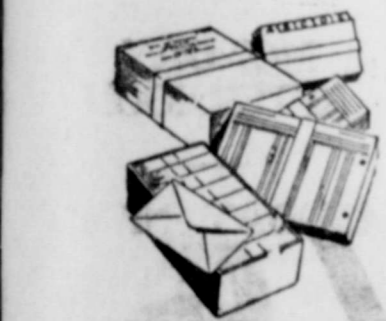

After tests which included the sending down of rats in a diving helmet, he discovered that carbon monoxide poisoning was the real cause of death. The luggers had inlet valves to the air compressors located in the bilges, near the engine, and the divers were breathing the exhaust gases. Since this discovery the air intakes have been moved and accidents have been reduced to a minimum.

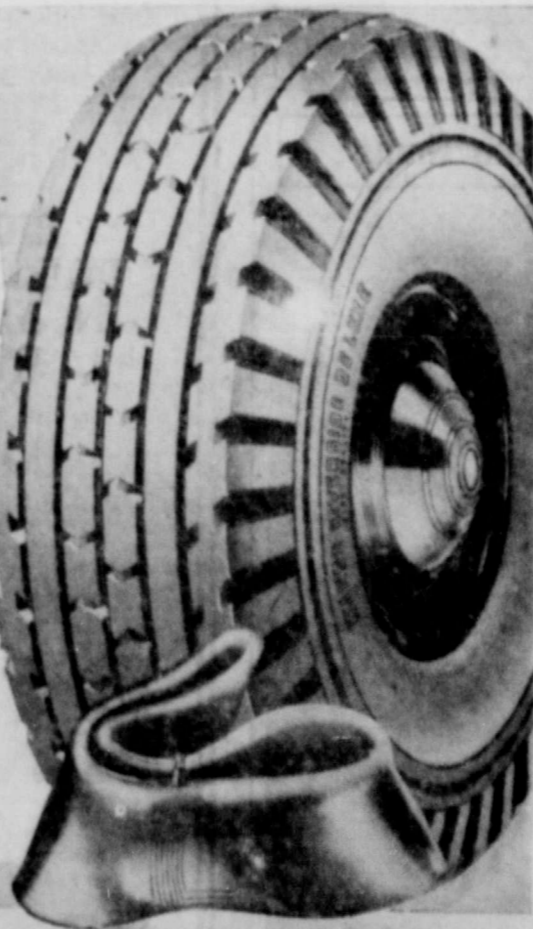

Variety in the meals is the spice for appetite.

Rain Isn't Rain All the Way Down Meteorologists Find After Tests

By United Press
EL PASO, Tex.—Rain isn't rain all the way down, meteorologists have learned through use of the radio telemeter, an instrument recently adopted by the U. S. Weather Bureau to make weather recordings.

Attaching to a small helium-filled balloon, the instrument ascends to the stratosphere, and through temperature and pressure changes broadcasts radio signals to receiving sets on the ground. The telemeters gradually are replacing weather bureau pilots who

turn of sets found after an ascension, but only six of the first 21 instruments sent aloft here have been returned. Cards are attached on which the finder fills in his name and address before dropping the telemeter into a mail box or post office slot.

Rewards are mailed to the finder and the sets sent to Washington for repair and redistribution to weather stations, for another flight.

Besides its economy, the telemeter method of making weather observations has two other advantages over pilot flights.

The balloons reach the stratosphere, which planes were unable to do, thus unfolding a vast field for meteorological research.

And, as Fox pointed out, "we do not have to wait for a plane to land before we get the information."

Weather conditions which would prevent plane flights are not as great a hindrance to the balloon ascensions.

INDIANS FEAR CRACK OF DOOM

For such a hybrid to have offspring is rare, and for the Indian traditions it spells the end of the earth. The Indians took one look at what they termed the "unnatural phenomenon" and shuffled off to their prayers.

make daily flights for weather observations.

Richard T. Fox, junior meteorologist in charge of the bureau at the municipal airport here, said information obtained through use of the telemeter had disproved weather theories held in the past.

"No considerable precipitation ever starts as rain," he said. "There must be ice or snow somewhere up above. When that comes through water clouds, more moisture is added, and what was originally ice or snow then falls as rain."

The sets are carried into the stratosphere by balloons which burst when their maximum altitude has been reached. The sets then parachute to earth.

Temperatures of 91 degrees below zero, and altitudes of 73,000 feet—almost 14 miles—have been recorded.

Changes in temperature, humidity and altitude cause variations in frequency, pitch and tone of radio signals sent out by the telemeter and received by ground sets.

Oddly, though the majority of sets are lost through failure to find them after they have settled to the earth, the federal government began use of the telemeter to save money. Cost of the sets is less than that of sending an airplane aloft daily. At present there are seventeen radio telemeter stations in operation in the United States, with an additional thirteen scheduled to be in service by the middle of September.
