

In a Wall Street office, with 200 representatives of the TVA and the 34 cities, towns, and electrical co-operatives of Tennessee looked on, David E. Lilienthal, TVA director, passed over to Wendell Willkie, president of Commonwealth and Southern, a check for \$45,000,000. And privately owned electric utilities moved out of the state of Tennessee. Public ownership had won its first state-wide victory.

"There is no more power controversy," said Lilienthal, "The propaganda period is over. It is now the time for performance.'

And so it is. The TVA was created May 18, 1933. For six years the twin struggles have been going on-the struggle against nature in building the great dams across the Tennessee river system, and the strugle against human nature as the privately owned utilities fought to keep their place in this gigantic field. Now in Tennessee the public ownership principle has won out. The struggle is over. Now the new system is on trial.

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
