Their decisions in 1939 were the almost automatic result of the positions into which they had gradually been driven during the past 10 years.

But there are still choices open to the United States They should be made with the longest possible vision into the future. Certain things may be foreseen. One is that the European war, no matter how terrible or how destructive, will not go on forever. Some day it will stop, whether that cessation is an armistice or a genuine peace. What then?

First, the United States does not want to find itself with an economy closely geared to supplying Europe's wartime deficiencies. That would mean an immediate and disastrous business slump, the shock of which the country is




