Colorful Oilman Buried at Cisco

CISCO, Oct. 27.—Funeral services for Charles B. McBride, one of the most colorful figures in the oil industry in this part of the state, who died Tuesday at a Brownwood hospital, were held at Holy Rosary Catholic church here Thursday. Burial was in Oakwood cemetery.

Mr. McBride's death occurred at 4:30 Tuesday afternoon. He had been ill of heart trouble and complications since last Christmas and had been under intermittent treatment at Brownwood since that time.

Survivors include his wife, the former Miss Elizabeth McGuigan, of Robinson, Ill., member of a prominent oil family, whom he married at Oklahoma City in 1919, and three children, Paul L. McBride, of Fort Worth and Raymond B. and Bette Rose McBride of Cisco.

"A rugged individualist" of the oil industry if there was ever one, Charlie McBride was a typical independent oil operator of a period that has about gone, giving way to a streamlined era, whose efficiency and organization could not contain the experiences that went through.

hard work, and his vicissitudes carried him from the lowest to the highest degrees of hardship and success. He began as a boy of 14 in the oil fields on November 3, 1875, and from that moment his passion was the production of oil. He devoted his prodigious capacity of work to that subject with a devotion that earned him the reputation of having run more strings of tools than any man in the industry. From Pennsylvania to West Virginia, where he was a partner of his double cousin, W. C. McBride, one-time largest independent operator in the world, to Illinois, to Oklahoma and to Texas he followed the lure of his profession everlastingly sinking holes, everlastingly on the march to find the flowing gold that greases the wheels of this motorized civilization. From the thickly settled towns and fields of Pennsylvania to the wide open spaces and near wilderness of Texas, Charlie McBride carried his unceasing devotion to an industry which repaid his efforts in checkered coin, but has won him the sincere devotion of hundreds of men who said of him that his chief fault was his love of his friends.

He came to Cisco in 1919 and maintained his home here for the greatest part of the time since.

### Physical Check-Up Urged For Children

WASHINGTON—Failure to detect the physical defects of children not only will re-

sult in poor health, but may prove to be the underlying factor of an inferior career or a failing report card, according to Dr. William DeKleins, assistant director of the American Red Cross, who urges parents to have their children physically examined early in the school term.

The medical profession has long recognized that good studies are usually dependent on the student's health. Dr. DeKleins said. A child suffering from poor eyesight, defective hearing, infected tonsils or other physical defects cannot meet present-day standards in the school room, he pointed out.

"Communities where the school system has its students examined annually show records of greater academic efficiency," the Red Cross official stated. "Case stories of children whose ailments have been corrected show an immediate improvement in studies and their ability to work and play with other children."

Dr. DeKleins cited one case recently called to his attention in which a grammar school child was troubled with poor eyesight. Teachers, ignorant of his handicap had seated him in the rear of the classroom with the result that he could see little of what was going on.

During the course of a systematic check-up at the school the child's poor eyesight was called to the attention of the parents with the result that he was fitted with glasses. Within a semester, the boy had skipped a grade on a basis of greatly improved studies

and had shaken off an inferiority complex brought on by nervousness. "Proper nourishment and other health habits also are important factors in giving the young student every chance for advancement," Dr. DeKleins said. "Have

the child cannot progress mentally and physically. Experiments among underprivileged children in which one group was given milk each day at school and another group was deprived, have borne out this theory."

### When the Value of Citizenship Is Appreciated

We Americans take our citizenship pretty casually. To most of us it is a commonplace. It came to us through no effort of our own but was ours merely by the accident of birth. We sacrificed nothing to gain what the men of Valley Forge fought and froze and starved to gain—the right to be Americans.

Thus accepting as a matter of course the boon of citizenship, we have too often taken just as casually the duties that go with it—the duty to take an active, intelligent interest in public affairs; the duty to vote with the public welfare in mind; the duty to give freely a reasonable measure of co-operation in social matters.

Since 1929 there has been a change. Conditions have been such as to show even the indifferent that public affairs really do matter. Circumstances have placed the national government on every man's doorstep, and interest in public affairs has mounted. The same thing has become doubly true since Europe's long mismanagement has finally brought that continent once again to war. Now as never before, public affairs matter.

It is inspiring, therefore, to see new citizens flocking to the courts to take the oath of allegiance to the government of the United States. Anyone who has had the least touch with the process of naturalization, and seen the glowing eyes and upraised heads of those who take that oath for the first time, knows how valuable the great majority of these new citizens are to the Republic. For the time has passed when passive acquiescence to the law is enough. The Republic needs active, loyal work in its behalf as it has not needed it for many years. It needs the firm, intelligent guidance, that can come only from an alert, informed, loyal and determined citizenship. It needs not blind and unthinking cannon-fodder citizens, but free men and women who will gladly and voluntarily play their part as citizens of a free Republic.

How long has it been since you, native-born American, have repeated the oath that is being taken every day by new citizens? It would not hurt every one of us to read it through and accept, mentally but consciously, the responsibilities it implies. Here is that oath.

"I do solemnly declare, on oath, that I will absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state, or sovereignty; that I will support and defend the Constitution and Laws of the United States of America against all enemies, foreign and domestic, and that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same. So help me God!"

### • BRUCE CATTON IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—The Russian gentleman who was born Samuel Ginsburg and now calls himself Walter J. Krivitsky has had an uneasy time of it during the months preceding his appearance here as a witness before the Dies committee on un-American activities.

On the one hand, he has been afraid of violence at the hands of Russian agents. For that reason he has kept in strict seclusion, remaining under cover in cities in New York and New England.

On the other hand, he has been afraid of the United States government, which has been trying to deport him. Only the intervention of Congressman Dies kept the government from shipping Krivitsky back to France last spring.

The true story of Krivitsky's stay in this country is only now coming out.

He entered the country on Nov. 16, 1938, carrying a French certificate of identity, French travel papers and a permit allowing him to live in France until December, 1940. His papers permitted a four-month stay in America.

At the same time the Labor Department (of which the Immigration Service is a branch) received a communication from William Bullitt, U. S. ambassador to France, saying that Leon Blum, ex-premier of France, had asked that all legitimate courtesies be extended to Krivitsky and had stated that he, Blum, was ready to vouch for him. Bullitt, who was in Washington at the time, passed this on without recommendation.

Krivitsky had lost his Russian citizenship—by his own account he was a former chief of Soviet military intelligence for western Europe, now in very bad with Dictator Stalin—and was what the State Department calls a

stateless person, or a man without a country.

He joined forces with a literary collaborator to prepare some special articles and begin work on a book, and vanished from sight.

Nothing more was heard of him until March 21, when he applied for a renewal of his permit, due to expire March 23. On March 24 he was formally notified that his application had been received and that he would be informed of the decision in due course.

On April 18 appeared the first of his articles—an "expose" of conditions in Soviet Russia, printed in the Saturday Evening Post. Chairman Dies immediately decided that Krivitsky ought to testify before the un-American committee.

Early in May a friend of Krivitsky went to the immigration service and complained that Krivitsky hadn't yet had any word about his application. He was told that the application would be denied and that Krivitsky would presently be notified.

Dies heard of this, and promptly served Krivitsky with a subpoena, to prevent his deportation until after his appearance as a witness.

Krivitsky lived uneventfully thereafter until June 29, when three things happened.

Newspaper stories announced that he was about to be deported to the company which had put up the \$500 bond under which he had been admitted to the country; was notified that if he did not surrender within five days his bond would be forfeited; and Immigration Commissioner James I. Houghtell telephoned the Dies committee and asked if Krivitsky was under subpoena.

Told that he was, Houghtell said no action would be taken to interfere with his appearance before the committee.

There the matter rested until Krivitsky was finally put on a witness stand just the other da-

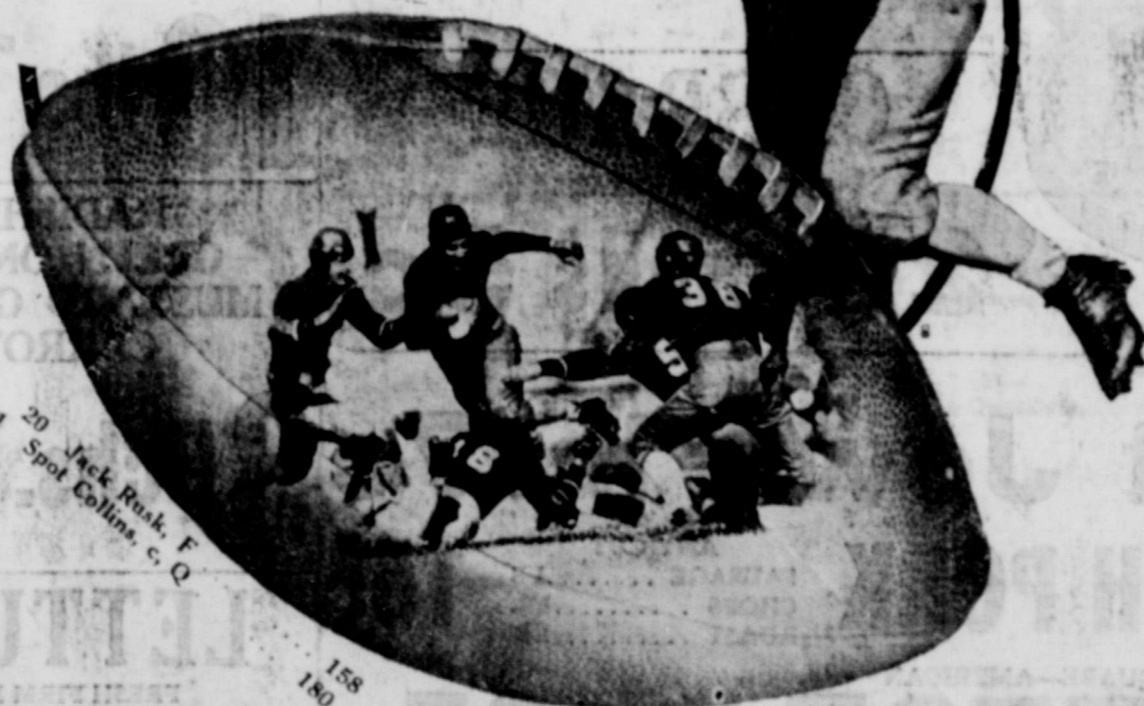
