Returning to the Soil Is Not Simple

Concerned over the growing seriousness of the relief problem, the New York State Taxpayers Federation listened recently to William E. Robertson, president of the United Taxpayers League of Buffalo, who advocated a general back-to-the-soil movement. On the land, at least, he said, men can feed their families. It is true that the United States is gradually becoming less of an agrarian nation and more an industrial one. Ever since 1820, when the rural population comprised about 95 per cent of the total, the proportion of farm dwellers to city residents has been gradually slipping off. In 1880 it had dropped down to 77.4 per cent and in 1926 it was down to 56.2. These figures included persons residing in small towns and presumably living off the farmers who make their purchases in these towns. The actual farm population in 1910 was 34.7 per cent of the total. In 1929 it had fallen to 29.5 per cent, and the last farm census in 1935 set the proportion at less than 25 per cent.

Unfortunately, today a man can't merely file a claim for his farming career with nothing more than a shotgun and an ax. Agricultural problems are a lot more complex than simply sowing seeds in the spring and harvesting the crops in the fall.

The farmer today is up against a lot of problems he never had to face 30 years ago. There are acreage allotments, supervised rotation of crops, marketing agencies and market control boards. He must be more than a farmer today; he must be a passable economist as well.

Any back-to-the-land movement, therefore, would have to be arranged with elaborate care, even if the western lands were still open to homesteading. A city worker can't simply quit his job and take title to a piece of land. At least it can't be done on a widespread scale without disastrous results to the whole balance of agricultural economy.

In some communities, county and city governments have set aside plots of land on the outskirts of the city for development by men and women on relief. The relief clients have been permitted to raise any kind of table vegetable the soil would yield. Many unemployed managed to supplement their relief fare to a considerable extent in this way. As a shock-absorber to sudden loss of a job, this system might be advisable. Many people could benefit from a small tract of land on which they could cultivate truck gardens and use the produce themselves. But even such a plan requires land—a great deal more land than most cities can spare.

Answer Is Found To Lower Stock Of Game Animals

EL PASO, Tex.—Hudspeth county ranchers and farmers hope they've found an answer to the steady decrease in game, especially quail and deer, on their land. They have formed a game protective association under sponsorship of the extension service of Hudspeth county and Texas A. & M. College. Thirty-five ranchers and farmers signed to participate in the game preserve demonstration which places hunting restrictions on 70 per cent of Hudspeth county land. They hope the steps will enable game birds and animals to increase in number.

Under the plan, written permission from owner or lessee of the land must be obtained before hunting is allowed—and participants hope to keep down the number of permits. Persons hunting or trespassing on land within the game preserve demonstration without permits are subject to prosecution. A decrease in the number of quail and fawns in the area reportedly made imperative the curtailment in hunting.

Seven Residents Of County Join In Medical Suit

DALLAS, Tex.—Seven residents of Eastland County are plaintiffs in one of the most unusual suits in Texas medical annals which was filed Tuesday in the Dallas district court before Judge W. L. Thornton. They join with more than 100 others from all parts of the state in seeking to restrain Dr. T. J. Crow, secretary of the State Medical Board, from interfering with the work of the Bryan and Peak Cancer Clinic in Dallas. Each plaintiff declares that either himself or some close member of his family has been cured of cancer through the services of the Dallas clinic. They join with Dr. Carsie M. Hartzog, medical director of the clinic, and Harry M. Hoxsey, technician and business manager, to prevent interference, through Dr. Crow, of the Dallas County Medical Society, the Texas State Medical Society and the American Medical Association with their treatments of cancer. Over 100 men and women who declare they have been cured of cancer or have had some relative cured through the clinic's operations will be present as witnesses, according to Attorney Harold H. Young who represents them.

Joining the suit from Eastland County are Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Barnett, Mrs. S. P. Boon, Mrs. T. E. Bott, Mrs. J. F. Jones, Mrs. May Ohr, all of Ranger, and Mrs. G. K. Stephenson, of Rising Star. The group of plaintiffs allege that Dr. T. J. Crow and his agents have interfered with the conduct of the clinic and have threatened and harassed those in charge for many months past. The suit formally asks damages of \$2,500 from Dr. Crow.

The case is a test case against the various medical associations as to their interference with treatment of cancer as administered by a properly qualified and licensed physician who may not be a member of the various medical associations. Dr. Hartzog is a graduate of Tulane and has practiced in Texas for the last 17 years. He previously practiced in Louisiana and Mississippi.

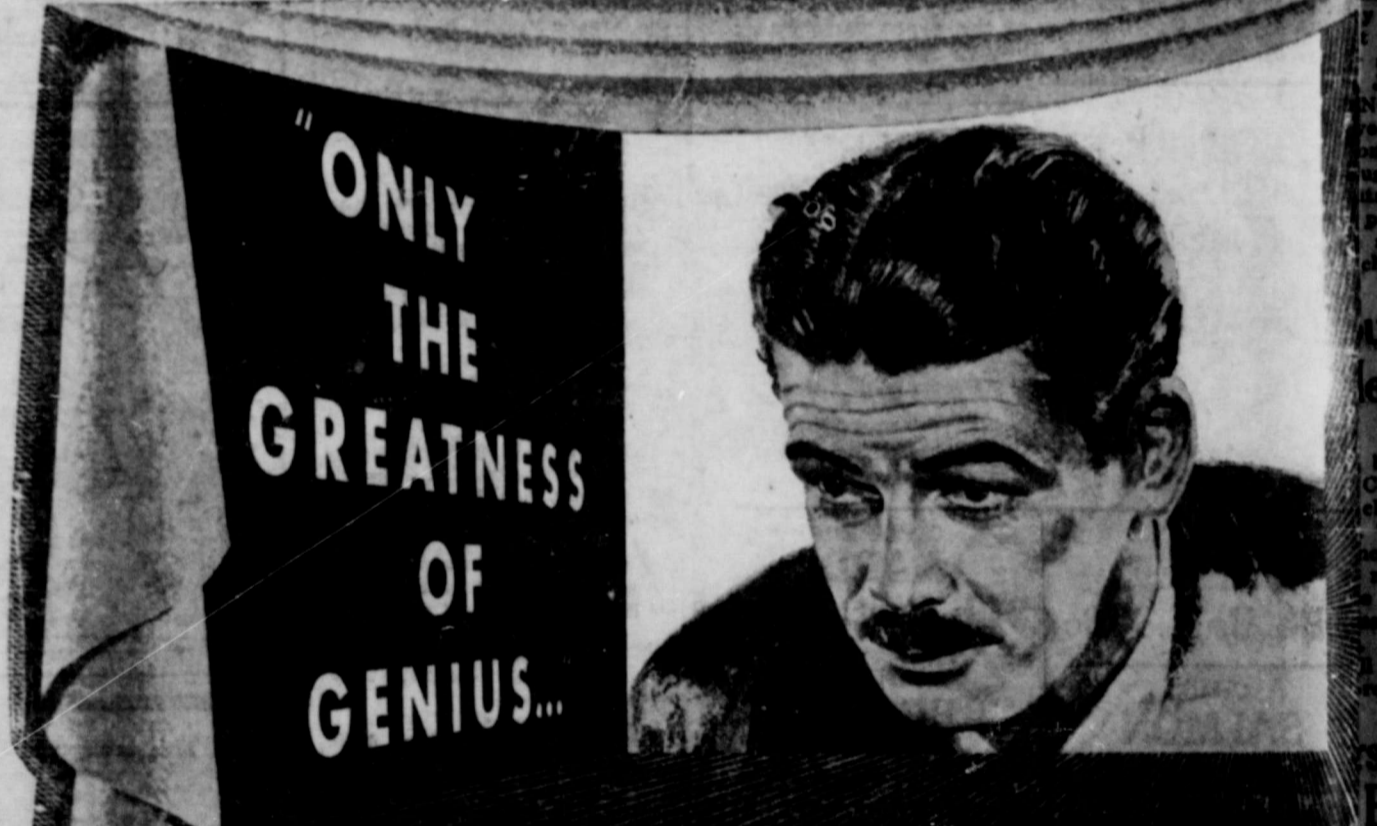
Ickes' Statement About Trucks Getting Response
