Blasting State 'Tariff' Walls

There isn't a state in the Union that hasn't tried to protect its own industries in some way by regulating the free flow of goods from its neighboring states. There are no tariffs within the United States; but some of the discriminatory measures enforced today are so close to being downright tariffs that the difference is only a technical one.

A good many of the trade walls were erected around states when the going began to get tough after 1929. A few of the states felt the least they could do for their industries was to take every possible step within the limits of the Constitution to eliminate annoying competition from outside. That started things.

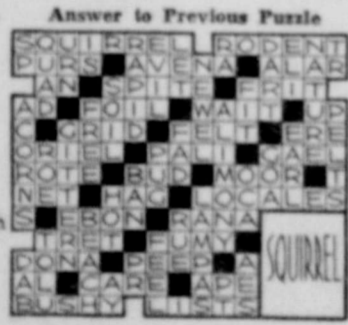
If trucks from state A couldn't get into state B without paying a mileage tax, the only thing for state B to do was to set up its own licensing or tax regulations for outside trucks. Such control measures naturally affected states C and D, also neighbors, and those states found it necessary to regulate their out-of-state influx.

An idea like that gets around. Most states now not only have fees and taxes to regulate truck shipping, but many levy taxes directly on farm and industrial products shipped in from other states. A few states have even levied taxes against the products of specific neighboring states in retaliation for restrictive measures.

If a committee under the federal departments is appointed to study this intricate situation, a painless way of easing the commercial tension may be uncovered. Much better would be action coming directly from the states involved.

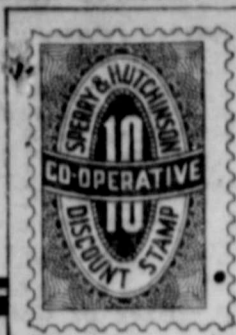

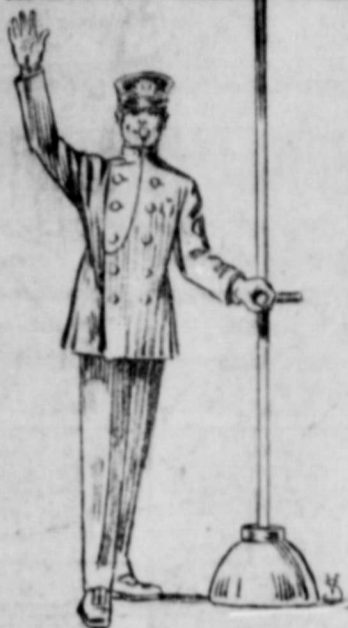

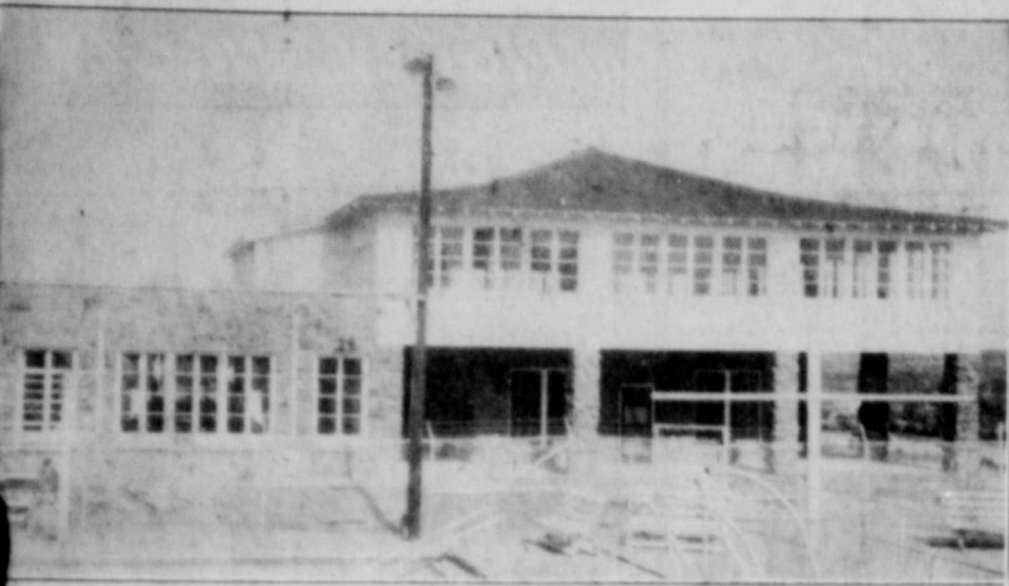

Special Variety of Cotton Sells for Price of \$180 Bale

MOBILE, Ala.—Cotton recently brought \$180 a bale in Mobile. It wasn't the ordinary variety, however. It was sea island cotton, grown in Mobile and Baldwin counties.

Agents for a Boston firm bought the cotton at the second annual sale, paying from 29 to 36 cents a pound for it. Twenty-seven bales were sold, at an average of 33 cents a pound.

Excessive rains cut down production this season, growers reported, but normally an acre of land will produce one-third of a bale.

Tarleton To Have Good Cage Team, But Records Gone

STEPHENVILLE, Tex. — If Coach W. J. Wisdom is a bit wistful, it is hard to blame him. Wisdom coached the nationally-

famous John Tarleton College basketball teams that won 86 consecutive games. That string was snapped last season and now, at the beginning of this season, Wisdom has a cage squad 40-men strong and studded with stars, but no record left to protect.

"I guess I ought to be pretty happy about my available material," Wisdom said, "and I am. But I'm just thinking that it would have been wonderful to still have that victory-string intact with this bunch of boys to use in keeping it so."

Included among the 40 John Tarleton Flawboys who have suited up for basketball are five lettermen. They will form the nucleus of Wisdom's 1939-40 team. He

also has eight returning squadmen.

The lettermen are Otis Richey, captain and center; Lavoice Stud-day and Joe White, guards, and Raymond Jarratt and Raymond Blair, forwards.

Jarratt, although a freshmen center last year, was a high scorer and has been moved to forward. White was a defensive star of the 1938-39 team. Scudday has two years' experience at guard for the Flawboys.

Tentative starting team this year has a weight average of 165 pounds and an average height of six feet. First year men reporting for the team have an average of four years high school basketball experience.

Some of the squadmen have played in other Texas colleges. These include Barney Bedford, one year at Denton State Teachers College; Charles Hall, one year at San Marcos; Charles Lockhart, one year at Texas University; Orin Soules, one year at Howard Payne; Jules Shaw, one year at Texas Tech, and Harry Stephens, one year at Abilene Christian College.

Students Believe In Bad Luck Omens

LUBBOCK, Tex.—That black cats and bad luck walk side by side is one ancient superstition which still holds sway, a check of 40 collegians at Texas Technological College shows. About 47 per-

cent of those questioned on more than 100 superstitions admitted a belief in this one. The student poll also indicated that bad luck omens dominate. Walking under ladders as a bad luck theory was second in credibility, with 92 votes, and third was the belief that breaking a mirror results in seven years trouble.

Lumber Industry Sees Good Business

AUSTIN, Tex.—Southern lumber mills nudged their production during October to a point 1.2 per cent above October a year ago and 2 per cent above September, 1939, the University of Texas business research bureau has found.

Average weekly production was 304,313 board feet last month, while weekly shipments climbed 4.3 per cent ahead of October last year to total 362,818 board feet.

Average unfilled orders per unit at the end of the month jumped 41.3 per cent above October, 1938, to total 976,202 board feet. Both shipments and unfilled orders declined from September, however, the former 2.9 per cent, the latter 16.4 per cent.
