FINLAND PAYS HER WAR DEBT RIGHT ON TIME

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Finland, despite its war with Soviet Russia, today paid the regular semi-annual installment of \$254,693 on its debt to the United States.

As usual Finland was the only one of 17 nations indebted to the United States to meet its obligations. The check for the Finnish payment, drawn on a New York bank, was presented to Morgenthau by Hjalmar Procope, Finnish minister. The payment left Finland owing this country \$8,142,890.

Morgenthau accepted the payment "with gratitude" and noted that Finland, during dark days or fair, has never failed to honor its obligation.

"As you know," Morgenthau said, "the president has asked me to hold this payment until he can recommend to congress that the money be used to benefit the Finnish people."

Wyatt Takes Stand In Own Defense In Bombing Case

DALLAS, Dec. 15.—Ross Wyatt, 36, pictured by the state as an ardent lover who tried to bomb his sweetheart, went on the witness stand today and described himself as a man who "just couldn't resist ladies advances."

He is accused of throwing dynamite into the room of Miss Mary Jo Miller. She escaped from the room before it was demolished.

Wyatt said it was Miss Miller, and not he, who insisted on their love affair. He denied he was in Dallas the day of the bombing, that he ever purchased dynamite or ever had any intention of harming Miss Miller.

New Allowable In January Is Urged

AUSTIN, Dec. 15.—The Railroad Commission was asked today to fix January's oil production exactly equal to the U. S. Bureau of Mines estimate of market demands and distribute production over 31 days.

The request was made by Sen. Clint Small of Amarillo, for the Independent Oil Producers Equity Association. Small also said the practice of withholding 55,000 barrels daily allowable for special allowables, is like "holding a red apple up to a group of children."

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Dec. 15.—President Roosevelt said today he was too old to fall for such a question as to whether he agreed with Secretary Leves that Paul McNutt was unsatisfactory as a candidate for the 1940 democratic presidential nomination.

Christmas Cheer Fund Is Off To Splendid Start

With only a few of the committees reporting, a total of \$159.25 in cash was turned in Thursday afternoon for the Christmas Basket Fund. It was expected that as soon as the other committees have an opportunity to work this amount will be increased considerably, as only a part of the business section of the town has been solicited.

Lee Dockery, general chairman of the drive, today expressed appreciation for the way the citizens of Ranger are responding to the call to aid the needy, and especially the needy children, at Christmas time, and urged everyone who is called upon to donate as much as he can toward the fund.

The money secured for the Christmas Baskets will be used to purchase groceries for a Christmas dinner for the needy families of Ranger. The baskets will be packed at the fire station, under the supervision of Fire Chief G. A. Murphy.

Dockery stated today that a committee would be named soon to look into the needs of those on the lists to receive baskets and to determine which were the most needy. This committee will work in cooperation with the local relief office, which has records on most of the needy families.

It was hoped, today, that no family in Ranger which was actually in need would be overlooked this Christmas, and it is toward this goal that the committees are working.

The drive will likely be completed this week, or early next week, and purchase of groceries will be started as soon thereafter as practical. The baskets will be distributed Saturday, Dec. 23.

"We have proceeded on the assumption Mr. Roosevelt will not be a candidate," Germany said last night. "Mr. Garner is not running against anybody, but will be in the race."

Fluctuations Of Cotton Prices Are Now Being Probed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The Commodity Exchange Administration, pushing investigations into fluctuations of the cotton market, called today for reports from New York and New Orleans traders.

Traders were asked for records of their activities in December futures. These reports will be studied to determine if the market was manipulated.

The CEA has power to bar traders found guilty of price manipulations. Officials said the nucleus of the wheat and corn markets, which also took part in the general commodity price rise are being "watched."

Less Than Half Of Gasoline Taxes Is Used On Highway

AUSTIN, Tex.—Recent news articles show that the gasoline taxes collected by the State Comptroller in the fiscal year ended August 31, 1939, amounted to \$51,574,914.00, representing 1,289,372 gallons of gasoline taxed at 4 cents per gallon. This is a lot of money, and the average citizen wonders why, with all this money available, a particular road or bridge is not built by the Highway Department.

The average citizen probably does not realize that the Highway Department does not get all the gasoline tax money. The Available-School Fund and the County and Road District Indebtedness Fund each receive the proceeds of 1 cent tax. The Highway Fund received the proceeds of 2 cents tax, all allocations being made after the cost of collection and refund claims amounting to 15.36 per cent had been deducted from the total amount collected. The Highway Fund received 41.96 per cent of the total, or \$21,708,416.15, which was used for construction and maintenance of the 22,845 miles of State highways now being maintained.

What Has Happened To Asylum Guard Is Still A Puzzle

EL PASO, Dec. 15.—What has happened to the man the state of Arizona sent to pick up Bruno Hanks, 27 year old escaped Arizona lunatic, was worrying El Paso officials today.

While the county paid out 75 cents a day to keep Hanks, they wondered what had become of an asylum attendant, due Tuesday night to get Hanks.

URUGUAY STILL PONDER'S FATE OF GRAF SPEE

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Dec. 15.—Preparations for repairing the German pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee were started today, apparently for a dash to sea through a cordon of British cruisers.

German sailors hauled steel plates aboard the battleship to patch the holes made by shells from the British cruisers day before yesterday.

In London the battle was called a victory for the three cruisers and the belief was held the Graf Spee was out of action for the duration of the war.

While the Germans buried their 36 dead in a common grave Uruguay considered whether to intern the ship. The British concentrated forces outside the harbor, with the battle cruiser Renown to join in the "death watch."

Local FFA Youths At Terrace School All Day Thursday

A group of 35 members of the Ranger Chapter of the Future Farmers of America attended the terrace school near Nimrod Thursday afternoon and were among the 200 or more who were present for the demonstrations on terrace and pasture contours.

Terraces of all kinds were constructed with all kinds of equipment, from the heavy tractor owned by the county drawing large graders to the smaller horse-drawn equipment.

German Cruiser Is Being Escorted To A German Harbor

LONDON, Dec. 15.—A German submarine torpedoed by the British submarine which sighted the Bremen at sea this week is being conveyed to German waters by naval warships after having sent out an SOS, it was disclosed today.

British Royal Air Force planes which last night battled German airplanes and a German naval squadron in the North sea, searching for the cruiser.

Library Is Project Of School Official

A project receiving the personal attention of County Superintendent T. C. Williams recently has been the county school library.

More than 1,000 volumes have been catalogued already and will be arranged as soon as shelving can be placed in the library.

Space in the office adjoining the superintendent's offices, formerly occupied by the old age assistance organization, is being used for the library.

Dr. Welch's Bail Is Set By A Judge

BEAUMONT, Dec. 15.—District Judge R. A. Shivers set bail totaling \$20,000 for Dr. William Welch, 52, Port Arthur chiropractor, charged with kidnaping and armed robbery.

Judge Shivers set trial for Jan. 2 on a charge of kidnaping Irwin Mingle, 12, son of Fred Mingle, Port Arthur automobile dealer for \$15,000 ransom and robbing the boy's parents of \$200.

Patrol Activity On Front Is Repulsed

PARIS, Dec. 15.—German patrol activity in the Blies sector of the Western Front have been repulsed with heavy losses to the Germans, the military dispatches reported today.

War Is Too Quiet For Hemingway

SUN VALLEY, Inds.—Ernest Hemingway, novelist, war correspondent and outdoor enthusiast, is resting up between wars in Sun Valley, Inds., writing a new novel and indulging in his love for hunting and fishing.

Hemingway took time out from his piscatorial efforts to announce he would cover the European war as soon as it became interesting—and not any sooner. Meanwhile he has a novel to finish and a lot of fishing to do, not to mention taking pot shots at pheasants and ducks.

"This war hasn't really started yet," Hemingway said. "England is using her traditional policy of attempting to blockade her enemy and sending only a small land force to the Continent. The same blockade brought the Spanish war to an end and it may well be the means of defeating Germany."

"It is hard to believe we will become involved, out here in peaceful Sun Valley," the author said. "I feel President Roosevelt is determined to keep us out of it. Only organized propaganda might conceivably whip up war hysteria in this country sufficient to pull us into the conflict."

Hemingway said he thought Europe's leaders were having a twinge of conscience and didn't want the world to know what they were doing, hence the strict censorship of war news.

But the noted novelist was more inclined to talk of his fly-fishing, trap shooting and hunting than of wars and politics. He said he rises at an early hour, devotes the morning to writing and spends his time bird hunting, or at other sports in the afternoon. He refuses night engagements which, he says, would interfere with his work.

Shortages Reported In Skilled Labor

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The United States Chamber of Commerce reported today that there were growing shortages of skilled labor in many parts of the country.

The report was based on a survey by the chamber's committee on employment.

"In the east and middle west and to lesser extent to the Pacific Coast, are reports of unskilled workers," the report said.

Ship Casualties For Day Number Six More Steamers

Ship casualties in the war today were:

The Ross, 1,103 ton Belgian steamer, sunk off the Northeast coast of England, after an explosion, one killed.

The Adolf Leonhardt, 2,989 ton German freighter, scuttled by its crew in the South Atlantic after being intercepted by a British warship, Crete rescued.

Atholtempair, 3,539 ton British tanker, beached off an English coast port after an explosion.

Two British ships and one Greek ship, unidentified, reported sunk "by German action" in Norwegian territorial waters.

Shipyards Hum In Tampa Again

TAMPA, Fla.—Tampa—a city that 25 years ago led the nation in shipbuilding—is making a comeback.

One new vessel already is afloat and seven more are under construction.

When the Sea Witch—a big, fast cargo ship—slid off the runway a few weeks ago it brought the actual revival of the city's greatest industrial operation.

Approximately \$16,000,000 worth of contracts for ships to be built have been signed. More are in sight after first orders are filled.

Tampa Shipbuilding & Engineering Co. won the first contract in 1938, when the maritime commission began a gigantic program of construction. Five hundred ships were to be built during the next 10 years to rebuild the American merchant marine.

During the World War, the company delivered 15 ships and held the highest rating for efficiency among all shipyards in the country.

In its first order in the current program, four vessels were requested. Before the first was finished, a second contract for four more was signed.

The company now employs more than 1,400 men, who are working on two shipways, and the number will be increased when keels are laid for two more ships. The present contracts will mean continued work until 1942.

Ships under construction are of the C-2 type, 459 feet long, with a displacement of 13,900 tons and a cruising range of 13,000 miles. Features of their construction include enlarged and modernized quarters for crews, a smoke detecting system and an "iron mill" or automatic steering device.

The first four ships have been assigned to the American Pioneer Line for service in the Far East.

NUMBERS ARE TELLING UPON FINLAND NOW

The war in Finland today entered a phase in which the weight of Russian numbers was beginning to tell against the Finns' marksmanship and familiarity with the terrain.

Although witnesses reported the defenders fought the Red war machine to a standstill in the Karelian Isthmus after eight days of furious fighting, the invaders appeared to be meeting with greater success on central and northern fronts.

Moscow reports said tonight Russian troops had broken through Finland's Mannerheim Line on the Karelian Isthmus and were operating behind the Finnish army. The reports were not verified.

Finnish foreign minister W. A. Tanner was to make a radio broadcast tonight to Soviet Premier Molotov, suggesting resumption of Russo-Finnish negotiations.

He said if Molotov's answer to the radiocast is unfavorable Finland will fight to the bitter end.

Mechanized Soviet troops sped over ice and snow within a mile of the Norwegian border, south of the destroyed nickel city of Salamaivervi. In the central sector the Russians claimed to have advanced 73 miles since the war started in their effort to cut the country in two.

In Helsinki the Finns officially claimed successes on the Karelian Isthmus and north of Lake Ladoga. Reports said 5,000 Russians had been cut off from the main army in the east.

Charles Kleiner Is Named as Leader of County Celebration

Charles J. Kleiner of Cisco has been selected as chairman for the forthcoming President's Birthday celebration including all of Eastland county, by William L. Clayton of Houston, chairman of the state committee.

Fifty per cent of all funds raised in the county through celebrations will remain here for direct assistance to infantile paralysis victims. The remaining 50 per cent will go to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to promote research and preventive measures to reduce the toll of the disease through the nation. The funds retained in the county will be administered by a local chapter organized for that purpose.

Selection of committee members will be made immediately, according to the local chairman, and a meeting will be held to draft definite plans for celebration events to be held here and throughout the county.

In announcing the appointment of the county chairman Mr. Clayton said that this year's celebrations will be held all over the nation the night of Jan. 30, Tuesday. "We are making this effort in behalf of the crippled children of our county, state and nation," said the chairman, "and I trust that every citizen in your county will join with you in this splendid movement for suffering humanity."

The local chairman said that an intensified drive will be made throughout the county for funds.

Rice Head Coach Relieved Of Duties

HOUSTON, Dec. 15.—Jimmie Kitts, head football coach at Rice Institute, has been relieved of his duties. J. T. McCants, chairman of the school's committee on outdoor sports, announced today.

Kitts, who directed Rice teams to the Southwest conference championships during his first year as coach in 1934 and again in 1937 was criticized by alumni this year because of a bad season. The live coach, Lou Hertenberger, resigned last night.

Man Is Charged In Traffic Death Case

HOUSTON, Dec. 15.—Harvey Thompson was charged today with murder by automobile and driving while intoxicated in connection with the death of Mrs. Mary McNeill in a traffic accident on Beaumont highway Wednesday.

Stopping Disease Before It Begins

The children of those sinewy pioneers who chopped down trees and shot down Indians as part of their daily routine to open up a wilderness continent are growing soft. It is not the fault of Twentieth Century inhabitants if there are no more trees to be chopped down. Nor can they be blamed if they ride around the country in automobiles without fear of running into a hostile Indian tribe that has to be dusted off or else.

But the American Youth Commission, an adjunct of the American Council on Education, is worried about the general state of affairs, and is asking that something be done about it. The progress of medical science in combating disease is not enough. The nation at large, the commission believes, must be given an opportunity to prevent the ailments in the first place so that there will be no need for treating them at all.

To bring about such a program, the federal government will have to kick in, the commission frankly declares in a recent report. It is perfectly true that individual state governments are badly prepared financially to institute such a program; and if they did, the systems adopted would vary with the different states. What is proposed now is an extension of services being conducted by the federal government.

The modern way of living in America has done something to the body. It is less fit to withstand disease generally than it was when vigorous exercise was part of the daily routine. While the treatment of disease has advanced steadily, preventative measures have not quite kept pace with the simplification of our routine of life.

To prepare youngsters against susceptibility to disease later in life, steps must be taken early. Many schools are already giving their pupils regular periods of physical instruction and exercises. The Youth Commission feels these activities are not widespread enough. The boys and girls who are most in need of exercise usually pass up gymnasium classes because they are not adept in physical education.

The teaching of hygiene and preventative measures is also in need of considerable expansion, the commission contends. The results of a recent survey conducted revealed only about 10 per cent of all students received hygiene instruction in high school or college. Another recommendation is a regular system of frequent physical examinations to detect disease or potential disease at the earliest stage possible.

Whether the federal government can be persuaded to work out funds while even the President is blue-penciling the budget seems pretty uncertain just now. But the extension of outdoor recreational activities and school physical education programs can be undertaken by the schools themselves in co-operation with municipal recreational bodies.

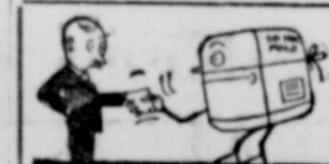

Traffic Safety Warning Issued

Stop the Christmas carnage! The local unit of the Oil Belt Safety Council made that appeal today to the drivers and pedestrians of the city and section in an effort to cut down the heavy December traffic toll.

Each year, the Council pointed out, the Christmas spirit of "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men" undergoes an ironic transformation. It is converted by the very geniality and excitement of the holiday season into suffering and sorrow through wholesale slaughter on the streets and highways.

Last year 3,450 persons died in December traffic mishaps. Experience shows that the December death rate on a mileage basis is one-third higher than the average for all months. The month when

joy and happiness should reign untouched by tragedy is more than one and a half times as hazardous as the safest month—June.

Why this Yuletide massacre? The Council blames bad weather, more hours of darkness and the Christmas holiday rush.

"Sleet, ice, snow and fog soon will make highways doubly dangerous. Darkness comes earlier. Then there is the Christmas rush and bustle, the spirit of conviviality, the fever of excitement and the natural tendency to be lenient toward traffic offenders because of the geniality of the season.

Yuletide Safety Measures Stressed
Christmas is the merriest season of the year, but it's also one of the most dangerous, the national safety council points out. December usually is the most hazardous month for motorists; falls and burns help boost December accident rates, too. Here are some things to keep in mind, the safety council says, if you want to have a merry Christmas.

Don't use lighted candles on Christmas trees; use carefully wired electric lights.

Don't use cotton, pyroxylin plastics, paper or other inflammable objects for trimming the tree; use metal tinsel, and mica or flake-

asbestos for snow.

Be sure your ladder is safe before you hang decorations.

Place tree a safe distance from stoves or fireplaces.

Make tree fire-resistant. This is how the United States forest service says to do that: Divide the weight of your tree by four and whatever the result is, buy of ammonium sulphate. Cut the end of your tree in a diagonal, put some solution in a jar and stick the diagonal butt into the solution. Add solution to the tree drinks 2 1/2 in.

Cotton whiskers or cotton trimming on his suit is very dangerous for Santa Claus. They can be made fire-resistant by dipping or spraying them with a 15 per cent solution of sulphide of ammonia.

Never leave a lighted tree unguarded at any time.

Remove tree from house before it becomes dry.

Keep candles an open lights away from window curtains, paper wreaths or bells.

Don't give children dangerous toys; supervise their operation of electric toys.

Watch out for toys left on stairs or on the floor where someone might trip over them.

Drive carefully. If the weather is icy, put plenty of salt and sand on steps and sidewalk.

Be wary of Christmas "spirits."
