## FRANCE TO AID FINLAND IN A MATERIAL WAY

HELSINKI, Dec. 22.—All Finland was cheered today by news from Paris that the French Chamber of Deputies had voted sweeping aid for Finland in her war with Russia. The extent of the aid was not known, but it was hinted that it might even go so far as to send soldiers to Finland.

The news came at a time, however, when Finland's own forces were doing well in their war with the Soviet. In the north sector the Red army is in disorderly retreat, with very little left with which to fight except rifles, since their mechanized forces have bogged down in the snow.

Morale of the Russian soldiers is reported completely broken. There are no shelters for the men. Many have even thrown away their rifles, as they do not want to be burdened with them in the bitter cold. Losses in the northern sector have run into thousands.

A Soviet bombing raid on Helsinki did little damage today, with only a few bombs being dropped. Many pamphlets, however, were dropped by the fliers.

The Moscow radio continues to broadcast reports that only "petty skirmishes" have been conducted in the Finnish war.

## U.S.-Japanese Are Talking New Trade Agreement Treaty

TOKYO, Dec. 22.—The United States Ambassador talked with the Japanese Foreign Minister today concerning Japanese-American relations, which have been strained since abrogation of the 1911 trade agreement between the two countries. The trade agreement expires in January, 1940.

It will be up to the next congress, which meets in January, to decide upon the Finnish application for the big loan.

## Old Theatre Is In Abandoned Brewery

According to records, the theater was first known as the Philadelphia Music Hall, later as the Concordia. The date of its construction is unknown, but the brewery was built in 1867.

Sections of the proscenium arch, the balcony and the "peanut gallery," were still intact. According to old newspaper clippings pasted on the walls, such stars as John Drew and Maude Adams appeared on the Concordia's stage.

## Two Thanksgivings Don't Help Sales of Turkeys In State

AUSTIN, Tex.—Despite two Thanksgiving dinners, Texas turkey growers shipped 56 cars fewer dressed turkeys to the nation's tables last month than in November, 1938, the University of Texas business research bureau reports.

November movement of the Thanksgiving fowl totaled 548 cars. Shipments of chickens also slumped, from 39 to 7 cars, and egg shipments dropped from 44 cars to only 15.
