There is no more dangerous word in human speech than the word "tomorrow". Tomorrow is the devil's motto. It is not unusual for our lives to be strewn with the wrecks of half-finished plans and unexecuted resolutions. The sad truth is that we don't really feel it is dangerous to wait until tomorrow.

In Jesus' parable of the great supper (Luke 14:16-24) there are great lessons on tomorrow. Each invited person considered his own plans more important than the plans of the King. which you owe). A decrease in the value of what you own does not change your debts which are expressed in dollars. V. Always estimate your probable income. Gross cash farm income, minus cash farm expenses, minus cash for family living leaves the amount available for payments on principal and interest on debt. Family living costs may not be subject to much

reduction if the going gets rough. VI. Have a definite repayment schedule. If the credit is used for operating expenses, then plan to pay from the proceeds of live stock or crops for which the loan is used. Credit or funds borrowed for items with a longer life should be repaid before the items purchased with credit funds become unproductive or

VII. Be frank, fair, and businesslike with your lender at all times. He can be of most service to you if he understands your farm operation and the results you expect. Do not overestimate your balance sheet. List all your debts. Never attempt to conceal pertinent facts about your business. Pay on time, but if circumstances beyond your control prevent this, arrange in advance for further consideration and judgment.

O Christmas Tree, Thy Leaves Are Combustible

BY IKENE KEATING Many of you may already have card wires with frayed insulation, tree. purchased your Christmas tree, broken socket or loose connect-For those of you who haven't, here ions. are some helpful tips.

Most commercial Christmas from combustibles. trees must be cut well in advance to prolonged storage. They lose ble. much moisture during this time.

A TREE with its base immersed in water will remain safe from ignition from a point source (such as a match flame) for at least three weeks if installed reasonably fresh. On the other hand, trees with prior outdoor storage may become flammable to matches within three to eight days if brought indoors and left dry. Immersion also preserves the fresh greenness of the foliage.

So far, no immersion additives have been found that substantially increase the effectiveness of plain water in reducing flammability. Some "flame retarding" compounds have appeared on the market. So far, no such comcound has been tested by a naionally recognized fire-testing aboratory and found satisfactory or use on Christmas trees in the form of a spray application.

HERE ARE some "do's" for a afe Christmas.

1. Buy your tree early. This will enable you to be selective in the ourchase of a reasonably fresh ree. Check for signs of needle shedding and brittleness as a sign that the tree has become too dry. 2. Store the tree outdoors in the shade until ready for use. When it is brought indoors, immediately make a diagonal cut, removing one to two inches of the base. Stand the tree in water and keep it in water until you discard

3. Keep the tree away from all sources of heat, such as fireplaces or heating unit. 4. Check the water level to keep the tree in water. 5. KEEP YOUR lighting system

Usually, father kept his eyes open earlier in the year as he cut cordwood, and set aside that special log to be brought in on Christmas Eve.

The Yule Log had to be large, properly dry, and solid. It served a special purpose for a special holiday. It took its stand in the fireplace on Christmas Eve and burned all night, providing warmth for the family and light for St. Nicholas. Then it burned all day Christmas, symbolizing the continuous light that Christ's birth ignited in the

The Yule Log also symbolized security for the family. Wood was the only source of fuel in the winter, and a large Yule Log was proof of a still-plentiful supply nearby.







At midnight Sunday, Dec. 17, our company's Dimmitt exchange, which serves Dimmitt, Hart, Nazareth and Sunnyside, will switch over to "nationwide dialing." This means that after Sunday, our local operators will be able to dial any number in the United States for you directly,

to make your long-distance calls faster and simpler. In the past, when a customer needed to call a number outside the 806 prefix area, our operators have had to refer the call to times has caused delay in your long distance service.

But after midnight Sunday, our long-distance operators will be able to dial any number in the U.S. for you directly, without assistance from the Bell Telephone System.

(Let me point out that this new, faster service is NOT Direct Distance Dialing. You will still need to dial the local long-distance operator to place a long-distance call. Our company is now working toward the day when you will be able to dial but this innovation is still in the future.)

When placing your long-distance call, please give the operator your information in this order:

(1) Tell her the city, state and area code you are calling. She will log this information immediately.

(2) Then tell her the phone number you are calling. She will begin dialing this number immediately. (3) Then, if your call is to be person-to-person, tell her the name of the person you are calling. If it is a station-to-

(4) If it is to be a collect call, say "Collect."
