Troubled youth takes his life in dorm room

Jeremy Warren will no longer have to live with the memory of the accident that took his girlfriend's life last April, or stand trial this month for her death.

The troubled youth meted out his own sentence when he took his life Monday evening in his dormitory room at West Texas State University.

Funeral services will be held today (Thursday) in the First Baptist Church of Dimmitt.


Warren's body reportedly was discovered by his roommate about 7:45 p.m. Monday in his room at WTSU's Jarrett Hall.

University police were notified at 7:55, according to WTSU's Communications Services. City of Canyon paramedics also responded to the call, but

were unable to resuscitate the 19-year-old Dimmitt youth, WTSU officials said. Randall County Justice of the Peace E. Jay Hail pro-

nounced Warren dead at 8:22 p.m. and ordered an autopsy, which was performed in Amarillo Tuesday by Dr. Ralph Erdmann. After the autopsy, Hail ruled the death a suicide by

Boys perish in mobile home fire

Two young boys burned to death last Thursday morning when their mobile home was destroyed by fire.

Two passersby helped the boys' mother and her baby daughter get out of a window, and another woman occupant escaped through another window as the fire raged through the three-bedroom mobile home at 311 E. Lee St.

Killed were Brad Allin Folk, 4, and his 3-year-old brother, Keith Thomas Lee Folk. Volunteer firemen found their bodies in their bedroom closet, where they apparently had tried to hide from the spreading fire.

Their mother, Rachel Knight, and her 1-year-old daughter, Asia Spencer, were in a bedroom at the opposite end of the mobile home when the fire started.

Robert Green and Ricardo Puente, electricians who were driving to a job at the Expo Building complex across the street, saw smoke coming from the mobile home and ran to the window on the east end, where Knight was trying

to escape with her baby. After helping her and her infant girl out and learning that two more children were inside, the two men climbed into the window and crawled along the floor as far as they could before the intensity of the heat and smoke forced them to retreat. They reportedly got back out of the same window just before the blaze engulfed the center portion of the mobile home.

Meanwhile, another occupant of the home, Rachel Fuentes, escaped through the window of her bedroom, which was near the boys' bedroom.

"I was in my bedroom when I smelled the smoke," Fuentes said. "I tried to get through the bedroom

door, but the fire was already in the hall, so I had to climb out a window."

Frigid front freezes faces An icy Artic cold front carrying busted water pipes and repairing

sub - zero low temperatures and highs in the teens blasted the area last Thursday and is still lingering

KDHN Radio, the National Weather Service Observer for Dimmitt, recorded low temperatures below zero Friday through Sunday, and reported highs in the teens Friday through Monday.

The cold weather played havoc with water lines in the county, causing plumbers and water departments to remain busy.

"We've had lots of busted water pipes and frozen water meters reported," said Karen Hutson with the City of Dimmitt Public Works Dept. "We've had two pickup reported to Bryant's by the Dept. of crews going out constantly repairing meters and lines. The plumbers have really been backed up. We've had lots of calls from people who want their water turned off until the plumber can get their problems

"If people do have water problems, they can call us here at the water department (647-4492) and we'll check it out. A lot of the problems are in the meters-they are freezing up. If the lid is off the water meter, then the wind blows down into it and can cause it to

freeze," Hutson said. "We've been busy repairing heaters," said Jan Hargrove with

Bryant's Sales and Service. Crews from Bryant's Sales and Service spent 12 hours in Hart repairing a two-inch water line that was broken in several places.

"Hart school officials first noticed the water leak in the typing room and said water was 'falling like rain.' Our guys had to chisel through cinderblock walls to repair

the line," Hargrove said. Bryant's crew was also called out to Hill Feed Yard, where they spent a half day in the cold trying to fix the water line going to the cattle watering tanks.

To prevent water lines from freezing up and breaking, people can leave a faucet dripping or open cabinet doors inside the house so heat can get to the pipes. If a water line is on an outside wall or exposed to the weather it should be wrapped with a heat tape and the pipes should be insulated to help prevent freezing.

While frozen and broken water lines were a major problem, heaters also decided it was time to take a

Dairy Queen was open for business Monday and Tuesday, but it was without heat. The building's heater gave out early Monday morning and crews from Newton Electric worked all day, but couldn't get the heater repaired until they ordered new parts. Electric space heaters provided a little relief Tuesday until the heating unit was repaired that afternoon.

Electric and kerosene heater sales, heat tapes, pipe insulation, weatherstripping and other insulation and heating supplies sold like wildfire throughout Dimmitt.

Ethridge was working with the smoke and he was working with her when I got there," Lt. Aleman said. "We had lost her-she wasn't breathing. I gave her CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and she started coming around. She spit up a lot of black mucous that had accumulated in her lungs, then she

started breathing again." Firemen provided a portable oxygen unit for the baby when they arrived. Officers and volunteers continued to work with her until the arrival of an ambulance with emergency medical technicians.

As firemen arrived and hooked up their hoses, the young motherwho reportedly was recovering from surgery and who had escaped into the freezing weather wearing only a short red nightgown shouted, "Where are my babies?

Get them out! They're in the bed-

Firemen attacked the west end of the mobile home first, where the boys' bedroom was, but it was several minutes before they could fight back the inferno inside, which was melting through the metal skin of the home. The first several firemen who went inside were almost overcome by the smoke, heat and fumes as they searched vainly for the two boys.

Finally, a fireman emerged with the body of one of the boys and gently laid him nearby while others covered the body with a sheet. Moments later, the body of the second boy was brought out and laid alongside his brother as other firemen emerged from the home

Stock show coming up

The deadline for entering barrows, steers or lambs in the Castro County Junior Livestock Show is Friday at 5 p.m.

The annual show begins Wednesday and continues through Saturday, Feb. 18. The Feb. 17 judging schedule features lambs at 8 a.m., steers at 12 noon and barrows at 2 p.m. The sale begins Saturday, Feb.

18, at 1 p.m. Entry fees, which will be used for bedding, show expenses, etc., are \$10 per animal entered in the show. All entries must be sent to the Dimmitt Young Farmers, Box 99, Dimmitt, Texas 79027 by 5 p.m. Friday. Any incomplete or unsigned entry will be fined \$25.

All livestock must be in place by 12 noon Wednesday. Weighing will begin at 4:30 and all animals must be weighed by 8 p.m. All

animals must be weighed at the time of entry by official weighers. Only one weigh back will be allowed if the animal does not make the limits set. This weigh back must be within one hour of the first weighing or at the discretion of the show's superintendent.

All animals must be ear-tagged or numbered by the county agent or ag teacher before they are weighed. Each exhibitor will not be al-

lowed to show more than two calves, two barrows and two lambs. Exhibitors will be allowed to sell no more than three animals and no more than two animals in any division. If an individual shows more than three animals, he must notify the superintendent immediately after judging which three animals he will place in the sale.







Irene Keating, former Castro County Extension Agent, helped with registration and refreshment breaks at the meeting.


Shot clinic set



crete underground pipelines for possible mortar joint leaks prior to the 1989 irrigation season, according to the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

"Mortar - jointed underground pipeline is still used across the Texas High Plains. In most cases, the pipelines were installed prior to the early 1970s and need to be checked for leakage caused by age deterioration," said Ken Carver,

Mud puddles forming on the land surface usually indicate large underground pipeline leaks. In some instances, smaller leaks may occur on the underside of a pipeline. If the pipe was placed in a trench cut into a caliche layer, the porous caliche absorbs the water and a tell-tale mud puddle may never appear on the land surface.

Water losses equivalent to 50% of the well yield can occur when several small leaks are added together. Irrigators should check their underground pipelines during the winter so they can make any necessary repairs before the summer irrigation season.

"A flow meter is probably the best and easiest way to find out if your underground pipeline is leaking and to what extent the leaks affect crop water application," said

Flow meters are usually installed on the well discharge pipe and on

Irrigators should check their con- the discharge from the underground pipeline. The difference in readings from the two flow meters will give irrigators an indication of the underground pipeline water loss.

Water District field staff now use electronic transit - flow meters to check pipeline leaks. This service is free of charge and requests are handled on a first - come, first served basis.

"With new meters, all we have to do to obtain a flow reading is High Plains Water District assistant connect the sensors to the exterior of the discharge pipe on the pump and to the discharge pipe from the hydrant valve on the line. The wells do not have to be stopped," said

For those who wish to check their own pipelines, the older-style flow meters are available on a freeloan basis to irrigators within the Water District's service area.

Water escaping from the underground pipeline eventually returns to the Ogallala Aquifer, but does not benefit the irrigator. With pipeline repairs, irrgators will obtain an increase in their water supply equivalent to the water loss, a reduced fuel cost-per-unit of water applied to their crops, reduced labor costs and increased production.

Assuming that an irrigator had a fuel cost of \$3 per acre-inch of water pumped and a loss of 100 gallons per minute for a 120-day irrigation pumping season, the fuel cost to pump the lost water would be \$1,909.

If the same irrigator replaced 500 feet of leaking underground pipeline for \$2.75 per foot, he would have an expense of \$1,375. Given the \$1,909 wasted fuel expense, the irrigator can easily recover the repair expense in just over a year's

The Texas Wheat Producers Board, which is engaged in wheat reasearch, market development and services designed to add to the value of the crop, will hold its ninth biennial mail election Monday, Feb. 20, through March 7.

the Panhandle - North Texas area and expanded state-wide by a producer referendum in 1985. The terms of five of the current 15 board members expiring now include Cagle Kendrick of Stratford, District I; Otis Harman of Tulia, District II; Keith Spears of Vernon, District III; Jack Norman, Howe and Billy Vinson of Abilene, District IV. The eighth CRP Program sign-up began Monday and will continue through Feb. 24.

The CRP program is a 10-year program. To be eligible to bid, you must have owned the land at least three years before the close of the sign-up period. Persons signing in the CRP must be able to furnish a signed statement from the operator that he or she was not removed from the land in order to place the land in CRP.

making a 1989 or 1990 bid. Those who bid for 1989 will not be permitted to harvest any crop off of Texas. the CRP acreage this year. The 1990 bid will begin the later of Oct. 1 or when the upcoming crop is harvested.

All persons having an interest in the farm must sign the necessary bid form by no later than Feb. 24 and have it back to the local ASCS office.

The US Dept. of Agriculture has announced that eligible upland cotton producers will receive final deficiency payments of \$725 million for the 1988 crop in February.

"Payments will be based on a rate of 19.40 cents per pound. Producers that participated in the 1988 Upland Cotton Program may have received an advance payment of 6.4 cents per pound, leaving a balance of 13 cents per pound to be paid in cash. Producers who did not receive an advance will receive the entire payment at this time," according to Terry Harman, Texas State Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The 1988 deficiency payment rate is the difference between the national established target price of 75.9 cents per pound and the higher of the national average market price received by producers of upland cotton during the 1988 calendar year, or the loan rate for Strict Low Middling 1-1/16-inch cotton, micronaire 3.5-4.9, at aver-

age US locations.


The 1988 calendar year national average market price is 56.50 cents per pound. Since this is above the loan rate of 51.80 cents per pound, the deficiency payment rate is the difference between the target price and the 1988 calendar year national average market price.

Haying of 1989 ACR and CU for payment acreage has been authorized during the consecutive sevenmonth grazing period for all counties in Texas.

> Terry Harman, state executive director of the ASCS state office said, "The authorization was received to hay 1989 crop year ACR and CU for payment acreages. This includes the 8% also. In order to allow benefactors to have a say in the decision, many farm, commodity and livestock organizations were asked to comment on the issue. All county ASC Committees were requested to make a recommendation. Of the 136 comments received, 133 encouraged haying. Most comments indicated that NOT having these acres would cause an adverse economic impact in Texas."

> Harman also stated that "haying or grazing of ACR and CU for payment acreage, including the 8%, is not permitted during the consecutive five-month non-grazing period. This non-grazing period is established by the local county ASC committees and could be different in all counties. Inquiries should be made to the local ASCS office to determine what the nongrazing period is for that county.

Here are the county stock show rules

RULES AND REGULATIONS

I. General

1. All entries must be sent to the Young Farmers, Box 99, by 5:00 p.m., February, 10, 1989. Any incomplete or unsigned entry will be fined \$25.00.

2. Entry fee - To be used for bedding, show expense, etc. Calves.....\$10.00

3. All livestock must be in place by 12:00 p.m., Wednesday, February 15, 1989. Weighing will begin at 4:30 p.m., must be weighed by 8:00 P.M.

4. All animals must be weighed at the time of entry by the official weighers. Only one weigh back will be allowed if the animal does not make the limits set. This weigh back must be within one hour of the first weighing or at the discretion of the Superintendent.

5. All animals will be ear-tagged or numbered by the County Agent or Ag Teacher before they are weighed.

6. Each exhibitor will not be allowed to show more than two calves, two barrows, and two lambs. Exhibitor will be allowed to sell no more than three animals and only two animals in any division. If individual shows more than three animals, he must notify the Superintendent immediately after judging which three animals he will place in the sale.

7. The number of animals that will be sold through the auction will be as follows: 125 Barrows, 125 lambs, 40 steers, or 75% of the total animals that are weighed in. Whichever is the smaller number:

8. The percent of the animals to be sold will be figured on each class. If animal eligible to sell is pulled, the next animal in line from that class will sell. This will be at the discretion of the Superintendent.

9. Animals that make the show but do not make the sale will be sold with the floor animals, unless exhibitor pulls the animals by one hour after showing.

10. All livestock will be sifted by weight. Sifted animals will be the responsibility of the owner and must be removed from the barns by 10:00 p.m. on Wednesday.

11. A division showmanship trophy will be awarded for Beef, Swine, and Sheep. The animals must have been owned, fitted, and groomed by the exhibitor for the exhibitor to be eligible for a showmanship trophy.

12. No calf will be allowed in the show that has not been owned as of September 1st. Barrows and lambs must have been owned as of December 1st.

13. Only active 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show. All livestock entered in the show must have been fed under the supervision of the Castro County Agent or a Vocational Agriculture Teacher of Dimmitt, Hart or Nazareth High School and must be so certified by one of the above on the entry card.

14. To be eligible to show, all 4-H club members must be enrolled in a Castro County 4-H club under the supervision of the Castro County Agent. All FFA members must be enrolled in a Castro County school. All exhibitors must reside in Castro County, be at least nine (9) years of age, or in the third grade, be enrolled in a public or private Elementary or Secondary school located within the county.

15. All animals must be reasonably dry and clean before weighing. Any animal not so, may be declared ineligible to show by the committee in charge of the

16. Animals are the responsibility of the exhibitor until they are loaded on the truck. Any animal left in the barn after trucks are loaded are the responsibility of the seller.

17. The Dimmitt Young Farmers shall reserve the right to disqualify any exhibitor or animal for any reason that is deemed necessary. Also the Young Farmers will not be responsible for any injury, loss, or damage to persons or property arising from the Castro County Junior Livestock

18. Exhibitors and show officials will be the only persons allowed in the show ring.

19. Any animal sold on floor must have been entered in

20. Any exhibitor found violating the rules may be subject to a fine up to \$200 and suspension from the County show for a period of 1 year. The person signing the entry card may also be fined up to \$200. Entry cards will not be accepted from the offending organization until the fine is paid.

21. All protests must be in writing and be accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be delivered to the livestock show management immediately after occasion for such protest. The protest committee will consist of the Young Farmer officers and the various Division Superintendents.

22. No animal may leave the stock show premises from the time of weigh-in until after the show without the approval of the Superintendent. All take home animals must be checked out of barns by noon on Saturday.

23. Each club will be responsible for cleaning their pen. If pens are not cleaned a fine of \$200 will be levied. Check will be held until fine is paid. All pens must be cleaned by 6:00 p.m. Sunday.

24. No change in the pattern or highlighting of any animal in all 3 barns by painting or dyeing will be allowed. 25. No adults in show ring during show or classification. 26. Exhibitors ineligible to participate at the Castro County Jr. Livestock Show due to the NO PASS AND NO PLAY rule cannot have another or others exhibit the

animal or animals in question.

Lambs will be weighed and classified at 4:30 P.M. on Wednesday in the show ring. Calves will be weighed upon arrival at the show and classed by height and weight. Steer classes will be determined by the Superintendent. At least five animals are needed to make a class. Any animal not classified at proper time must wait until last to be classified.

Lambs - 8:00 a.m., Friday, February 17 Steers - 12:00 noon, Friday, February 17 Barrows - 2:00 p.m., Friday, February 17

III. STEER DEPARTMENT

1. Only steers are eligible to show.

2. All calves in the show must weigh at least 900 pounds, however, 1350 pounds is the top pay weight.

3. The first and second place winners in each of the classes will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the Show.

5. If there is not enough of any one class to be placed in a separate class, they will be classed with another class.

IV. LAMB DEPARTMENT

I. Both wethers and Ewe lambs are eligible to show.

2. There will be 4 breeds of lambs as follows:

a. Fine wool - This class shall include only purebred of grade Rambouillet or Delaine or a cross between these two breeds.

b. Fine Wool Cross - This class will include lambs sired by Suffolk, Hampshire, Corriedale, or Col-umbia rams and out of fine wool ewes. Lambs that carry more than 50% medium wool breeding will go into the medium wool class.

c. Medium Wool Class - This class shall include only purebred or grade Hampshire, Suffolk, Corriedale, and Columbia or other medium wool

d. Southdowns - This class is only for purebred Southdowns or lambs that exhibit predominant Southdown characteristics.

3. Weight Classes:

Breeds of lambs will be divided into light - medium heavy classes if there is as many as 30 animals in a breed class, otherwise a light and heavy class. The minimum weight will be 80 lbs. There will not be a top weight, but the maximum pay weight will be 130 lbs.

4. Lambs will be classified in show ring according to breed before weigh-in. A classifying committee will assist the Superintendent in placing the animals in the proper class. Classifier's decision will be final.

If there are more than 50 in one breed, the Superintendent will break the breed into four classes: Light, Medium, Medium Heavy and Heavy.

5. Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show.

6. Lambs wool should be uniform length no more than 1/4 inch in length. Top knots are permitted.

7. Where 5 animals are not available to make weight classes, then lightweights and heavyweights will be grouped into a single breed class.

V. SWINE DEPARTMENT

1. Only Barrows are eligible to show.

2. Barrows weighing less than 210 pounds or more than 260 pounds will be sifted from the show. There will be 5 pounds variance up or down one weigh back.

All feed will be dumped outside, on south side of barn.

4. There will be 7 breeds of barrows as follows:






