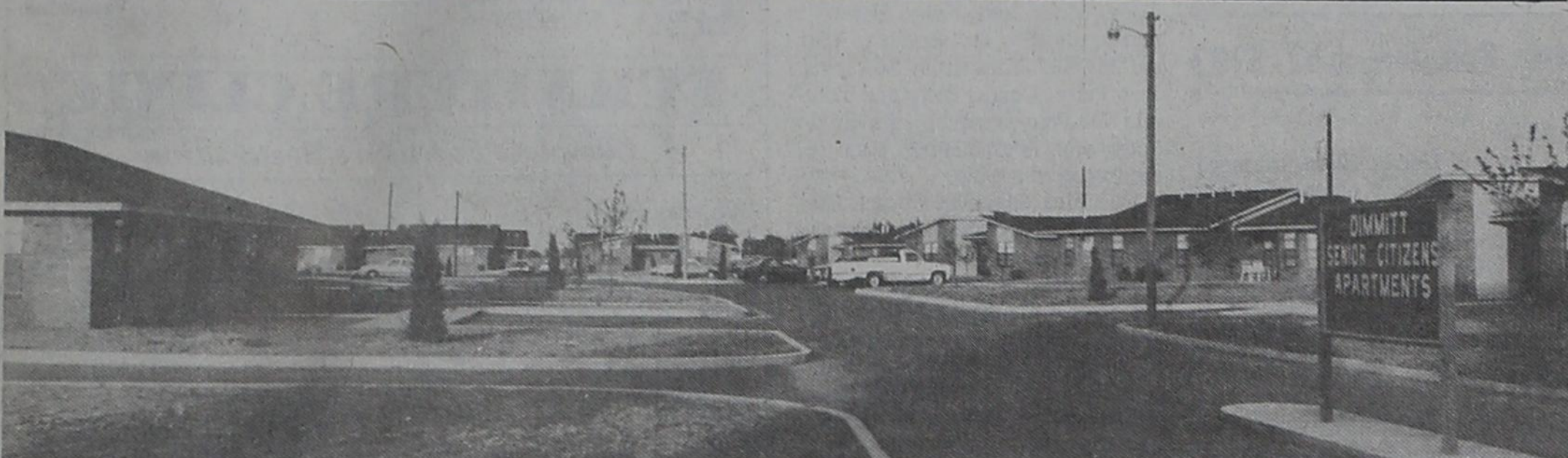

# Hasie to address DHS graduates



OPEN HOUSE will be held at the new Dimmitt Senior Citizen Apartments Saturday from 2 to 5 p.m. Located at 622 NW Fifth St., the 12-building, 24-apartment neighborhood was constructed by S&S Properties of San Marcos under the Farmers Home Administration's "515" program for rent-subsidized housing. The \$615,000 project was started Dec. 1 and completed early this month with the final

landscaping and planting of 60 trees and shrubs. Most of the residents already have moved in, but Saturday visitors will be able to view at least one apartment that is still unoccupied. Visitors are asked to register at the office, and also are invited to visit the community room. Oleta Sanders is the resident manager.

Approximately 90 Dimmitt High School seniors will receive their diplomas Friday evening.

Commencement services will begin at 8 o'clock in the high school auditorium.

Thirty-three seniors graduated from Hart High School Friday and 20 from Nazareth High School Tuesday, bringing the total number of 1989 graduates in the county to approximately 140.

Members of all three graduating classes are featured in Section B of this issue.

Dimmitt High has booked another top-ranking speaker for this year's Commencement Address—Monte Hasie, chairman of the State Board of Education. Other commencement speakers in recent years have included Texas Tech President (now Secretary of Education) Lauro Cavazos and Texas Railroad Commissioner Kent Hance.

In other highlights of the commencement program, Jennifer Hanners will sing her original song, *What a Friend*, Debbie Fuentes will read her original poem, *Class of 1989*, Wayne Schacher will give the Valedictory Address, and Brian Stewart will deliver the Salutatory Address and perform his original piano composition, *Finale*.

Other seniors taking part in the program will be Mat Bradley, invocation, and Kevin Bruton, benediction.

Pianist Elayne Patridge and the First United Methodist Church Bell Choir, directed by Jane O'Kelly, will perform the processional.

After being formally presented for graduation, the DHS seniors will receive their diplomas from School Board President David Schaeffer.

Ushers will include Justin Shultz, Barry Hill, Kristi Sims, Kara Schulte, Ben Scott, Curt Summers, Jennifer Hanners and Tish Miller.

## Wild events in store at Country Rodeo

Fifteen events — some deadly serious, some hilarious—are on tap this weekend at the 13th annual Nazareth Country Rodeo and Wild West Show.

Rodeo cowboys from throughout northern Texas, eastern New Mexico and Oklahoma are expected to compete in bareback and saddle bronc riding, bull riding, bulldogging, calf roping, team roping and single steer roping. Cowgirls will compete in barrel racing and break-away roping.

The rodeo also will have two events for novice riders—bareback and saddle bronc riding.

Wild West events will include a wild horse race, wild cow milking, kids' calf scramble and boys' steer riding.

The three-day rodeo will be staged at Marvin Schulte's Arena, five miles east of Nazareth on Highway 86. Performances are scheduled Friday and Saturday nights at 7:30 and Sunday after-

noon at 3.

Admission will be \$5 for adults and \$2 for students 12 and older, with youngsters under 12 admitted free.

The concession stand will feature German sausage sandwiches and hamburgers as well as candy, soft drinks and other refreshments.

Proceeds will benefit the Nazareth Volunteer Fire Dept.

Billed as "The Wildest Rodeo in the Texas Panhandle," the event is coordinated by Marvin Schulte, sponsored by Coors Distributors and sanctioned by the Texas Cowboys Rodeo Association. Bucking stock will be furnished by Maverick Rodeo Co. of Tulia, and timed even stock will be furnished by the Nazareth Country Rodeo.

A rodeo dance will be held in the Nazareth Community Hall after the Friday and Saturday evening performances, from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m., with music by the Rough Riders from Nazareth.

## Suit challenges election method

Stating that he wants "to get all our people working together," Larry Gonzales challenged Dimmitt's at-large election procedure in a class-action lawsuit filed last Thursday in US District Court in Amarillo.

The suit seeks a court order requiring aldermen to be elected from single-member districts rather than at-large.

Dimmitt aldermen have been elected at large ever since the city was incorporated, but Gonzales' suit claims that the at-large system now unconstitutionally cancels or minimizes the votes of Mexican-Americans.

The suit states that 40.7% of Dimmitt's population has Spanish surnames, but that no Mexican-American has ever successfully run for a city council seat.

"The at-large scheme interacts with social and historical conditions to cause an inequality in the opportunity of racial/ethnic minority voters to elect representatives of their choice as compared to white (Anglo-American) voters," the suit states.

The suit contends that creation of single-member districts would correct that inequality because "sufficient minority population exists in geographical concentrations to elect minorities' political choices if single-member districts are created."

Gonzales, who ran unsuccessfully for the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen twice, coming within 49 votes of being elected the second time, said, "I've been out of politics for four or five years, but after so many people have come to me since the last election with complaints about the way things are, I decided I'd try one more time to do something that would be progressive for this town."

In the most recent aldermen's election May 6, Miguel Velasquez, manager of the Azteca Housing Project and owner of Miguel's Texaco, ran third in a four-man field with 133 votes. Incumbent Richard Stahl was re-elected with 454 votes while Robert Jones, a banker and Dimmitt native, was elected with 441.

Mexican-American candidates also have run unsuccessfully through the years for seats on the Dimmitt School Board and the Castro County Hospital Board.

Gonzales said that, in filing the lawsuit, he is trying to resolve a rift rather than create one.

"I'm not intending to create a split here, and I don't think the suit will do that," he said. "I think that it will resolve a split. I think that

when you get people of Mexican-American and Anglo extraction to work together, in time they will begin understanding each other and will work out a lot of these problems."

He added, "Despite what some people seem to think, the real reason I filed this suit is that there are a lot of things in the town that need to be corrected, and when you have a single segment of people in positions of power, those things don't get corrected, and it creates a lot of tension and problems."

"The most important thing to me is for the community to be able to work together," he continued. "This is a community. We have Anglo, Mexican-American and Black people here. We need to quit thinking of ourselves as different races and realize that we're all together in this community."

"All the racial characterizations, the slurs and so forth, have got to stop somewhere. And when you get people to working together, it will eventually stop—maybe not in our lifetimes, but sometime."

One of the two plaintiff's attorneys listed in the court action is associated with the Southwest Voter Registration & Education Project.

"The attorneys I'm using haven't lost a voter rights case yet," Gonzales said.

## Deadline today for garage sale

The sign-up deadline for the Dimmitt City-Wide Garage Sale is today (Thursday) at 5 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce Office.

The annual event is set for June 10. Those signing up will have their name and the location of their sale listed on a map of the city, and will also be eligible for a drawing to win \$50-worth of Dimmitt Dol-

lars. A \$10 sign up fee is requested for individual home listings, \$15 for individuals or clubs having booths on the courthouse square, and \$50 for out-of-town businesses locating on the square.

To date, there are 60 locations listed, making a total of more than 100 families, clubs and businesses taking part in the special day.

June 16 is the deadline for signing up for participation in this year's Follies production, which will be presented Aug. 12 and 13.

Bill Sava will direct the Follies again this year, and notes that performers are needed, along with people to work on props, costumes, publicity and supervision.

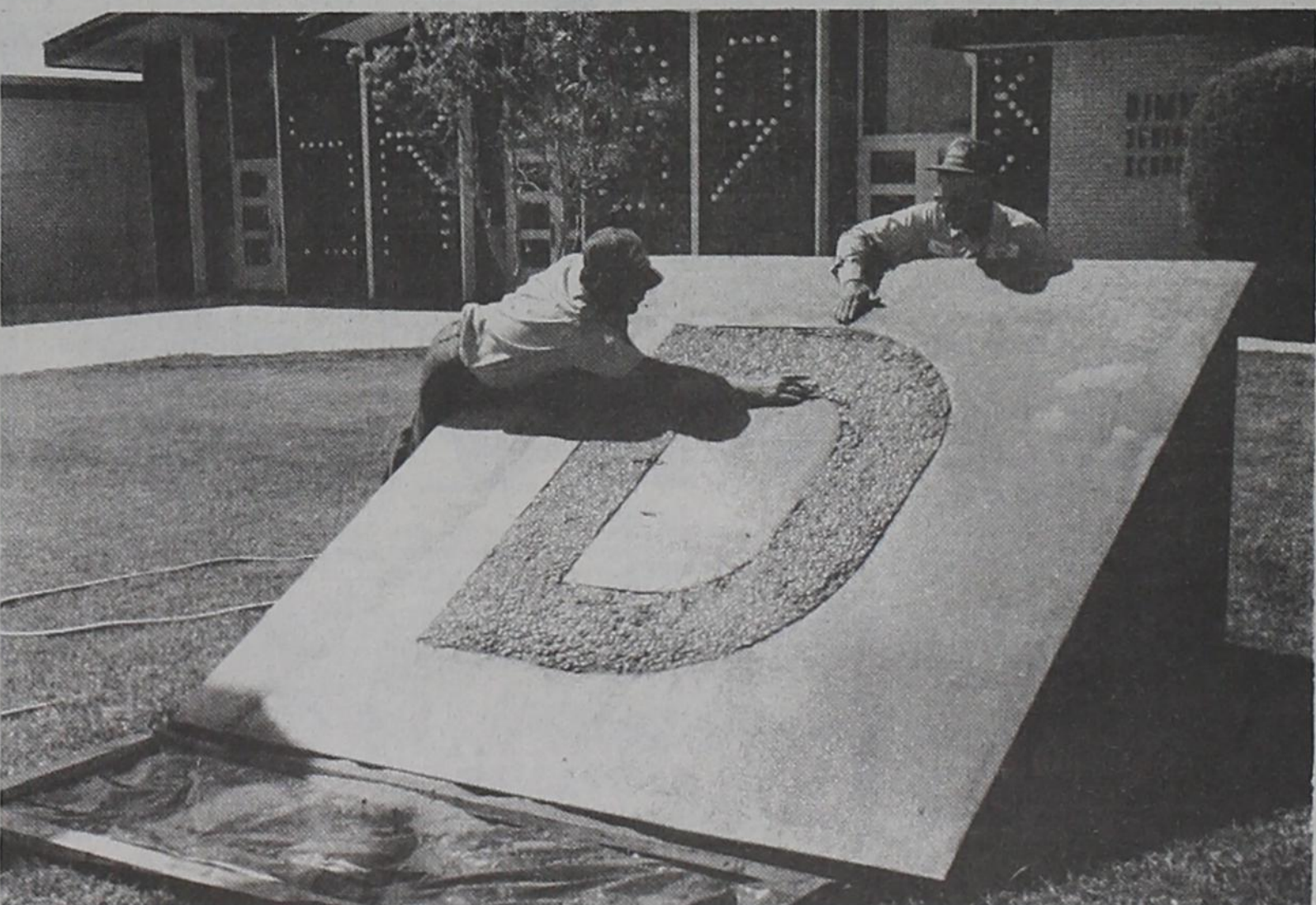

## Two chosen for seminar

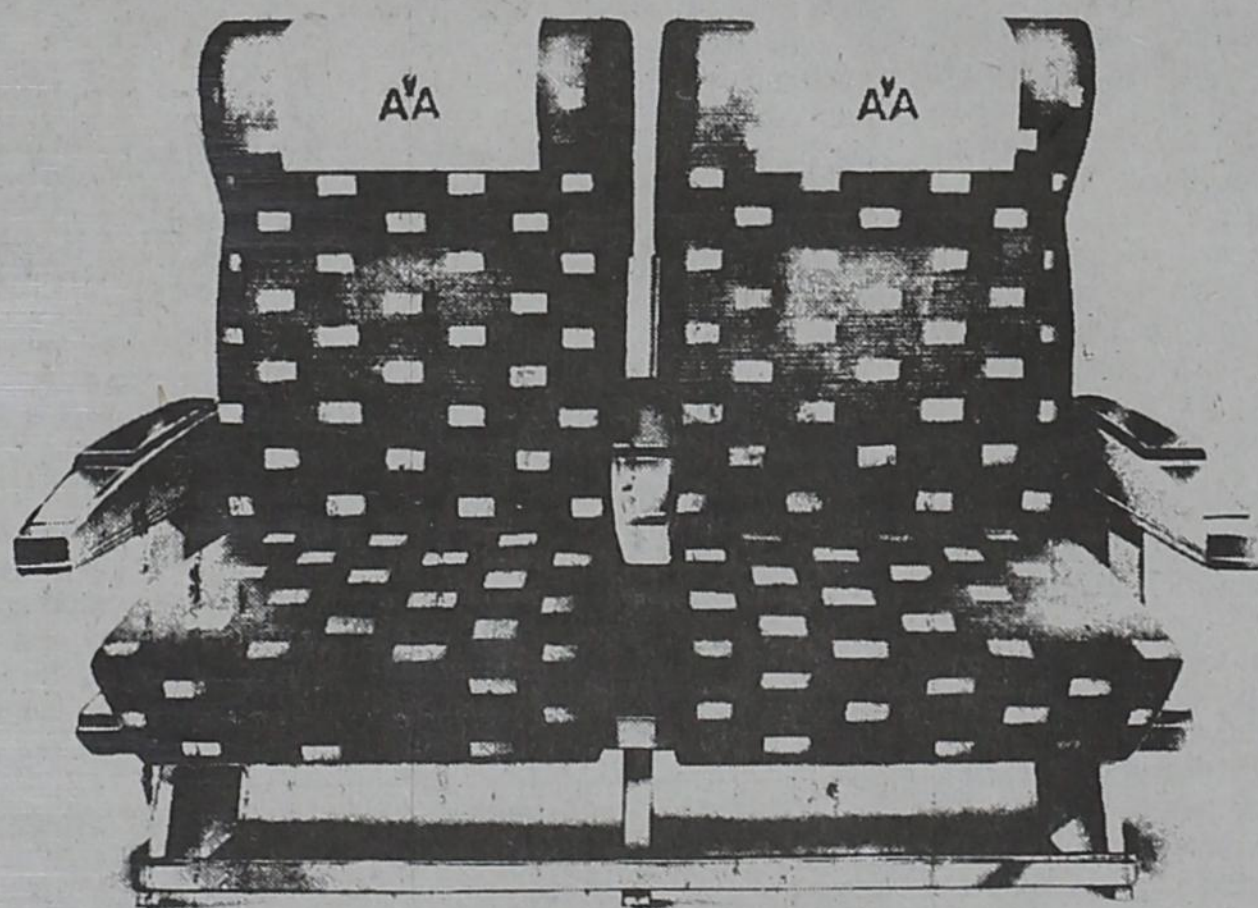
Two high school students from Castro County have been selected to attend the Crown of Texas Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Seminar this weekend at West Texas State University.

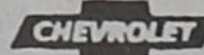
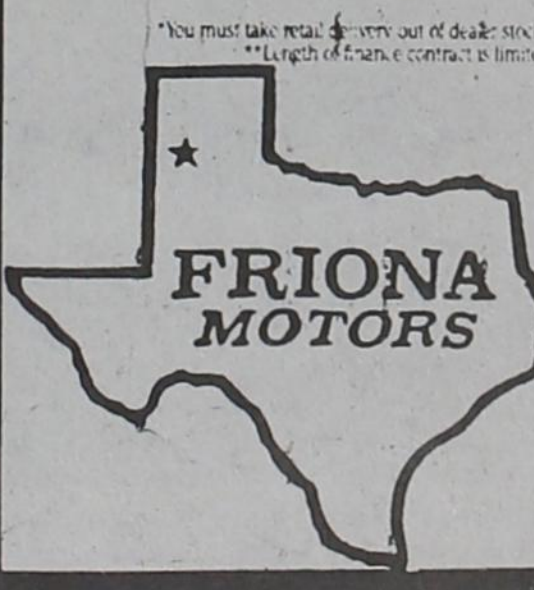

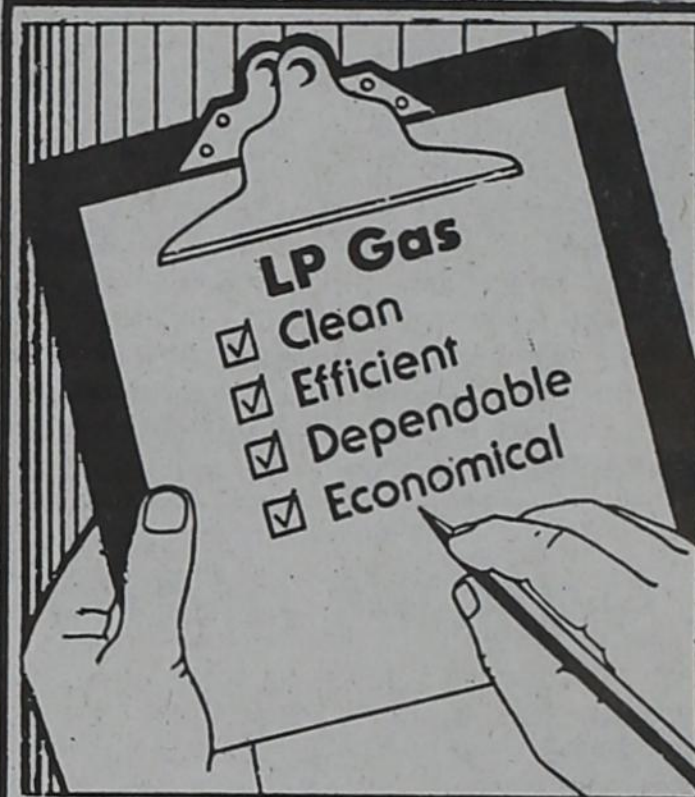

So, please: starting today, continue your education—every day of your life, from here on.

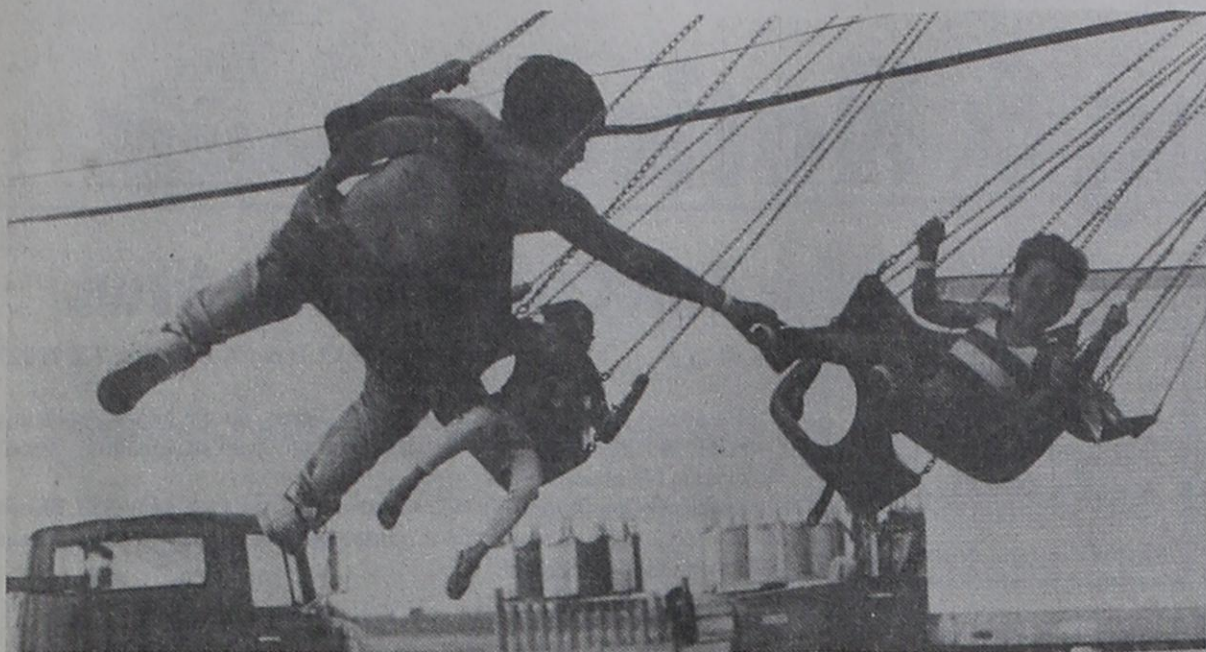

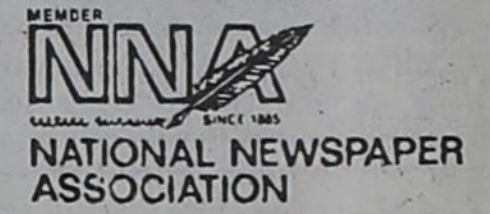

## Hunger is growing problem for Texans

At a time when the abundance of food has created an entire industry aimed at helping overeaters lose unwanted pounds, it's ironic that a growing number of people in Texas are actually going hungry.

But according to a 1988 survey by the Texas Dept. of Health, increasingly more women and children—even those receiving public assistance—are forced to eat less than they need, or to skip meals altogether.

The survey, compiled from 4,194 voluntary responses by public health clinic clients, confirmed results of similar surveys in 1984 and 1986—that hunger in Texas has risen sharply in this decade.

"Since the cause of hunger, more often than not, is insufficient income or a lack of other resources, the rise in the number of people going hungry is tied to the growing number of people in poverty," said Nancy Robinett, director of the TDH Public Health Nutrition Program.

Since 1980, Robinett said, the number of Texans living in poverty has increased by about 50%, from two million recorded in the 1980 census to three million estimated in 1987.

The survey reveals that: —In nearly one-third (27.9%) of the 4,194 reporting families from 83 counties, the mother had skipped one or more meals, or had eaten less, in the previous month because the family lacked food. In 12.3% of those families, the children also had gone hungry.

(The survey did not include Castro County, but did have three respondents from Swisher, three from Parmer and one from Deaf Smith.)

—The incidence of skipping meals and eating less increased as the families' income decreased. Some 32.5% of mothers and 15.3% of children in families with annual incomes less than \$5,000 suffered hunger during the previous month.

—While the 1988 federal poverty index was \$11,650 a year for a family of four, some 58.8% of respondents to the TDH survey had family incomes less than \$10,000, including 42.7% of the respondents with incomes less than \$5,000 for the family of four.

—Participation in food assistance programs, such as the federal Food Stamp program or the TDH's Supplement Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) did not eliminate the problems of hunger. Families in these programs include those with incomes too low to pay for needed food not provided by the governments.

"This survey confirms not only that the less money you have, the more likely you are to go hungry—it shows that even with current government assistance, some people still have to go without food," Robinett said.

"Ultimately, these conditions all but guarantee future health problems for some of these low-income families," she added.

## Social Security in Castro County

Sometimes a person receiving Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments does not have the mental or physical ability to manage the money. When this happens, arrangements can be made to send the payments to a relative or other person. We call that person a representative payee, and this column explains the responsibilities of a representative payee.

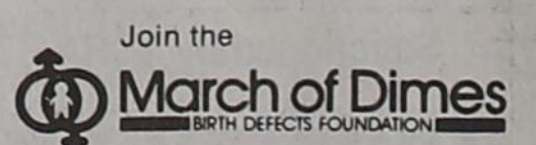
Representative payees must use the social security or SSI payments received for the sole benefit of the beneficiary. They should first be sure that the beneficiary's day-to-day basic needs for food and shelter are met. Then, benefits may be used for any personal needs the beneficiary has, such as clothing, medical and dental care, education, recreational items, and miscellaneous items like entertainment or grooming aids.

Any money remaining should be saved or invested for the beneficiary. Preferred investments include US Savings Bonds and deposits in insured interest or dividend paying account in a bank, trust company, savings and loan association or credit union. Benefits may not be invested in any company,

corporation or association when such an investment will involve the representative payee in a conflict of interest. Any money may not be kept at home or mingled with the representative payee's own money or with other funds.

Representative payees also are responsible for reporting certain events to social security, such as a change in their address or if they are no longer responsible for the beneficiary. They should also report if the beneficiary changes address or enters or leaves an institution, if the beneficiary plans to go outside the US for 30 days or more, if the beneficiary starts or stops working, a change in income or resources for someone getting SSI payments, a beneficiary's death, marriage or adoption, custody of a child change or if a disabled person's conditions improves.

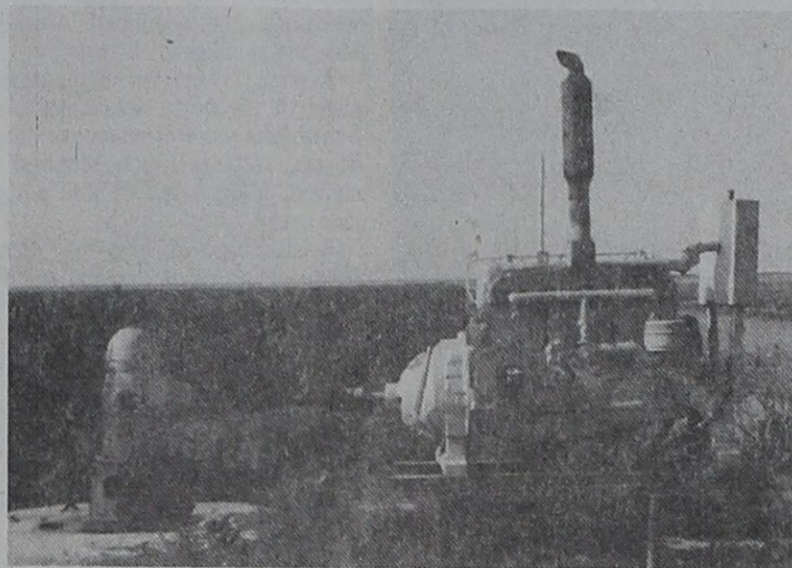


### Conservation Reserve Program

The Conservation Reserve Program completed its eighth sign-up period this past February. In Castro County there were an additional 13 contracts for 3,259 acres which were accepted, bringing the county total to 158 approved contracts for a total of 45,510.8 acres. The county is eligible for 114,894 acres to be enrolled into the CRP. We have a total of 69,383 acres which could go into the program. The next scheduled CRP sign-up will be July 17 through August 4. For those farmers who may be considering putting land in the Conservation Reserve Program, the staff at the Soil Conservation Service in Dimmitt would be glad to answer any questions you may have concerning the program.

### Don't Be Late

December 31, 1989 is an important date for those farmers who are farming highly erodible land. It is the deadline for having a conservation plan on those fields determined to be highly erodible. Failure to do so will result in the loss of USDA farm program benefits. Castro County farmers who are farming highly erodible land and do not have a plan developed on that land should contact the Soil Conservation Service in Dimmitt in the near future. If you are not sure as to the status of the land you are farming, please take time to contact the SCS office.



### Range and Wildlife Management Field Day

Texas Tech University Department of Range and Wildlife Management will be hosting a field day on June 13, 1989. The event will take place at the Texas Tech Experimental Ranch located two miles southeast of Justiceburg on Texas Highway 84. Lunch will be provided. ### Moisture Blocks

A common tool used to check soil moisture is the moisture block. It is used in conjunction with a conductance meter. The moisture blocks are installed after crop emergence and are buried in the root zone soil profile. The wires from the buried blocks are then connected to a stake at the ground surface which is marked to indicate the depth at which the block is buried. These wires can then be connected to a small, hand-held resistance meter for readings. The meter measures electrical resistance and shows it as a percent of field capacity. The electrical resistance will vary with the amount of soil moisture with "0" being dry and "10" being wet. The key is to make frequent readings to indicate crop root development and soil moisture conditions at each foot of depth. The use of moisture blocks will enable a farmer to determine what is occurring in the root zone soil moisture profile and see what depth the crop is extracting moisture along with how much moisture is being used. Special care should also be taken to determine the effect of rainfall on soil moisture conditions. For additional information on the use of moisture blocks, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Dimmitt or the High Plains Underground Water District in Lubbock, Texas.

### What Is It Costing You

For the past couple of years area farmers have been blessed with above average rainfall which provided some relief to their pocketbooks in the form of reduced irrigation costs. This year is shaping up to be a horse of a different color, due to the lack of winter moisture and spring rainfall. As a result, farmers will be looking pretty close at their cost of pumping water and doing everything possible to get the full effect of every drop they put out. A high percentage of the wells in the country are natural gas units. Just knowing a few simple facts along with a few simple formulas, a farmer will be able to calculate such items as:

- 1) The water application rate of the well
- 2) The cost per acre inch of water
- 3) The fuel cost per acre irrigated
- 4) Inches applied per acre

For additional information and a brochure entitled "How To Calculate The Cost Of Pumping Water With A Natural Gas Power Unit", contact the Soil Conservation Service in Dimmitt. Additional information and assistance is available through the High Plains Underground Water District.

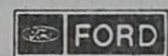

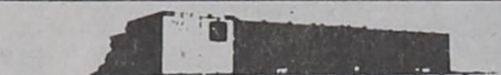

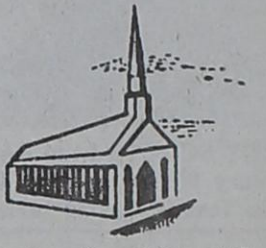

## Roller Coaster Spirit

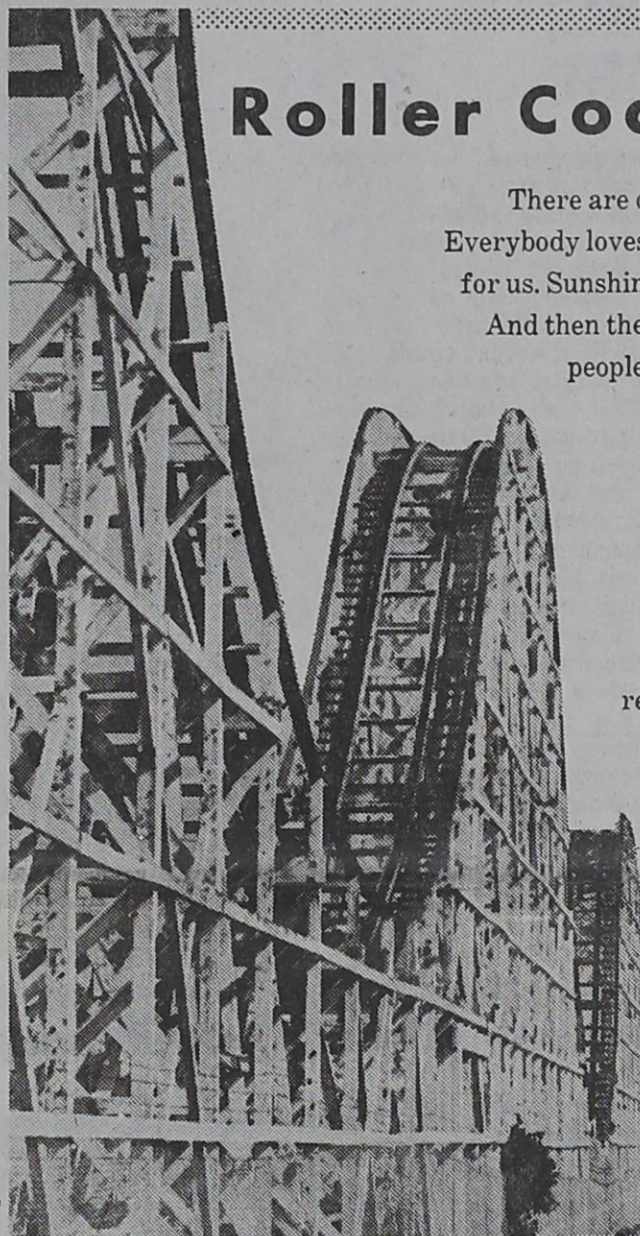

## Trailer goes astray, crashes into office

You can't possibly know how teenager Barry Hill felt, unless you've ever had your trailer pass you on the highway.

That's what happened as a tandem-axle flatbed trailer popped loose when Hill's pickup hit the drainage dip near Paxton Tire & Service on South Highway 385 recently.

Despite Hill's attempts to stop the runaway trailer, it rolled down the highway, veered off the south side, jumped a curb or two and crashed into the east office of the Killingsworth Building.

The trailer's tongue stopped just a foot or two short of Jim Killingsworth's desk.

Killingsworth wasn't in his office at the time.

"And it's lucky I wasn't there," Killingsworth said. "I always park my pickup right outside the office, and the trailer would have wiped it out."

Hill, a Dimmitt High School junior, and classmate Justin Shultz were hauling some volleyball poles with concrete bases for the First Baptist Church, and were en route to pick up decorations for the Junior-Senior Prom when the accident happened.

"We hit the dip, I looked out the window and the trailer was rolling

along right there beside me," Hill said. "I got in front of it and hit it with the back of my pickup a couple of times to try to stop it, but it was too heavy. Those volleyball poles were real heavy, and their main weight was right on top of the wheels. They balanced the trailer perfectly and it wouldn't nose down or drag—it just kept going."

"It got out from behind me and was traveling down the wrong lane of the highway."

"I was real worried about it hitting another car. I was hanging out the window and waving, in case there was another car coming along."

Justin said, "It's going to hit that door," and I said, "Naw, it'll never get there." There were so many curbs and stuff, I thought sure it would hit one of them. But it just jumped all those obstacles and kept going on a straight path."

Barely missing a pole-mounted sign just outside the office, the trailer rammed "right into the office door," Hill said.

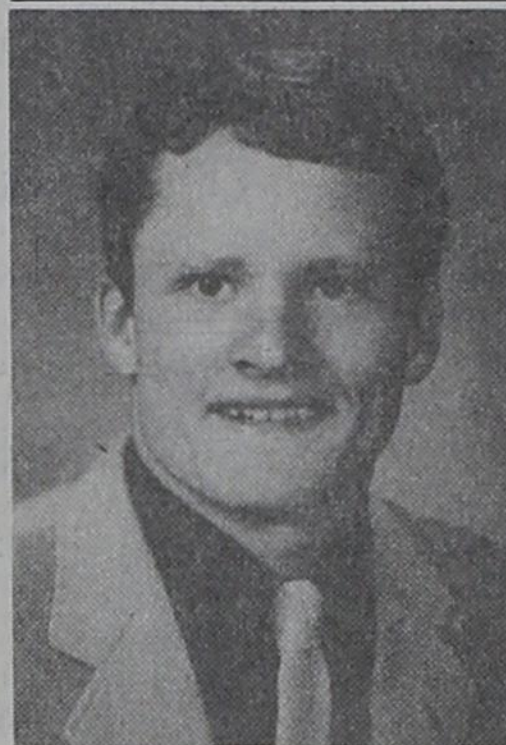
"The amazing thing is that it didn't even break the glass door—it just knocked it out, frame and all," Killingsworth said.

The runaway trailer also broke a nearby window, knocked the brick wall out of kilter and broke some of the brick.

"After the trailer went inside the building, since there was no door there anymore, I just went inside and called Mr. Killingsworth with his phone," Hill said.

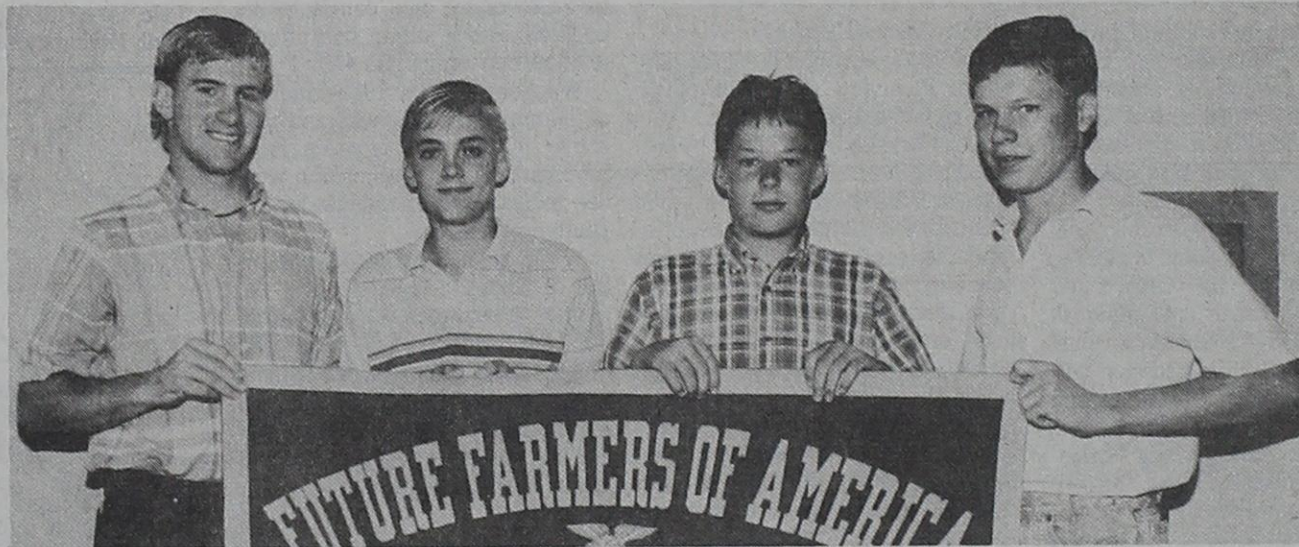

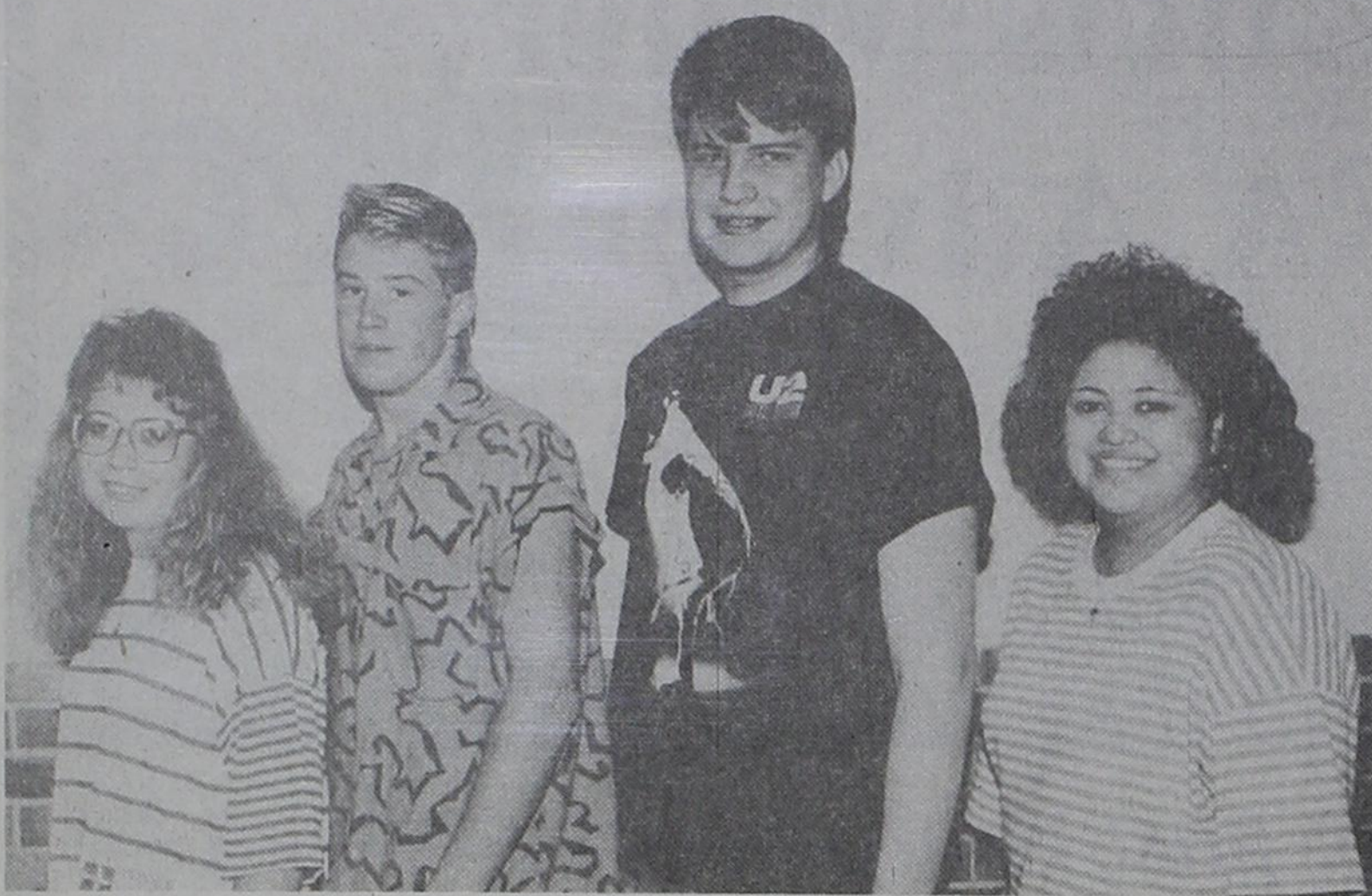

## Producers asked to provide statistics

Beginning today (Thursday), representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1989 planted acreage estimates and mid-year livestock inventories.

"Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their production and marketing plans for 1989," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"The continued dry weather this spring and the changes in the national farm program may have altered producers' plans for 1989, and this survey will be the first accurate measure of midyear lives-

tock inventories and acreage estimates," Findley added.

Individual reports will be combined with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1989 acreage forecast will be released July 12, and the midyear cattle inventory will be released July 28.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since your one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley added.

## Insect scouting workshops set

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in the Panhandle and South Plains are invited to attend the annual High Plains Insect Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The first of two workshop sessions will be held Friday, beginning at 8:30 a.m., at the Ollie Liner Agricultural Center in Plainview, located on US 87 Business Route south of the city. This session will focus on early and mid-season pests, and will feature presentations from Dr. Jim Leser, Craig Forbis, Dr. James Supak, Mark Brown, Greg Cronholm, Mike Blanton, Dr. Pat Morrison, Dr. Harold Kaufman

and Dr. Michael Hickey.

The second session is set for July 10 in Plainview, and will cover mid- to late-season crop pests.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs it conducts. In subsequent years, the training has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields.

The workshop focuses on identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions. It will conclude at noon with a hands-on session in which participants will learn how to determine the percent square set, and will identify specimens. Handouts will be available.

## Sorghum yield contest is set

The National Grain Sorghum Producers Association (NGSPA) is sponsoring the 1989 Grain Sorghum Yield and Management Contest, with top producers receiving trophies and cash awards of \$1,000 in two divisions, irrigated and non-irrigated.

The deadline for entering the contest is 30 days prior to the harvest of the contest field. Harvest report forms must be mailed by Dec. 1, 1989 and received by NGSPA by Dec. 11.

A qualified supervisor must be present during harvest of the contest field. Supervisors can be vo ag instructors, county extension agents, senior soil conservation staff persons or ASCS office managers.

The contestant's score will be the amount by which his yield exceeds his county's five-year-average yield. County averages are supplied by National Agricultural Statistics Service.

Contest entry forms and rules are available from NGSPA, P.O. Box 530, Abernathy, 79311, Phone (806)298-2543.

Winners will be named at the county, state and national levels, with top winners recognized at the NGSPA's winter meeting in 1990.

A student must maintain a minimum 3.5 grade point average for inclusion on the Dean's Honor Roll.

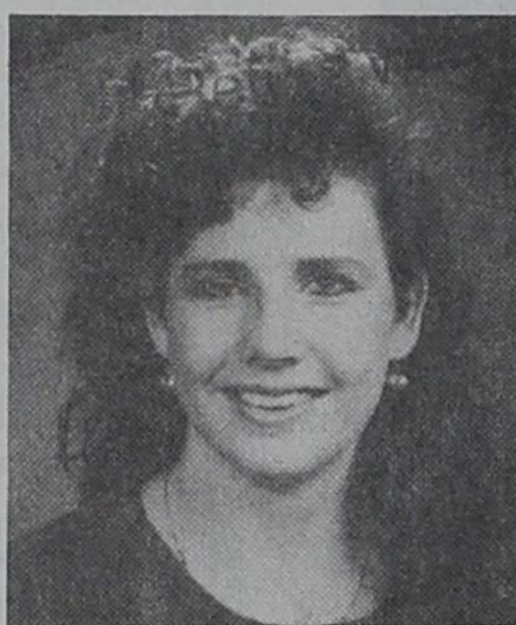

"We will also gladly accept any items left from other garage sales for use for the needy or to be sold," Stump said, adding that arrangements can be made for picking up large items such as furniture. She noted that tax deductible receipts can be issued for donations if donors so choose.

"In the past, the Hereford chapter has assisted Castro County residents, but having the needed items stored locally will speed the response time when there is a critical need," local Chairperson Simpson said.

Volunteers will be needed June 12 to help sort through donated items.

## SPS announces credit request

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) customers may find another credit applied to their accounts in the August billing if the Public Utility Commission of Texas approves the distribution of \$13 million in credits to SPS's Texas retail customers.

This amount primarily represents these customers' share of proceeds from SPS's sales of electricity to other utilities.

A residential customer who uses 1,000 kilowatt hours a month would receive a credit of \$10.21.

These new credits are separate from and in addition to previously announced credits related to recent SPS rate reductions.

As a participant in an experimental market program, SPS has been able to sell electricity to western utilities as far away as California on a competitive basis, said Jerry Diller, SPS's group manager of rates and regulation. Under the program, 75% of the difference between the cost of production and the sales price is to go to customers in the SPS service area, Diller said.

"Previously, these sales required time-consuming approvals of individual transactions and a rigid price formula established by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission," Diller said. "Under the experimental program, utilities are able to buy and sell electricity in what amounts to a daily auction."

The credit also represents proceeds from SPS sales to other utilities made in the traditional regulated manner.

SPS has been successful in the bulk-power market because it is a low-cost producer, Diller said.

"Demand has been high because several power plants in the western United States have been out of

service for various reasons," Diller said. "Also, hydro-electric power from the Pacific Northwest was limited due to relatively dry conditions."

These circumstances will change, Diller said, so it is difficult to predict if SPS sales at past levels will continue.

"We are requesting that the PUCT establish a procedure whereby we can pass on any future credits from such sales on a periodic basis as they accumulate," Diller said. "Under present PUCT procedures this is not possible."

The proceeds from these bulk-power sales to other utilities are treated as a fuel-cost credit. The

\$13 million credit requested by SPS includes approximately \$2 million in traditional fuel savings resulting from lower costs for coal and natural gas. The credit also includes interest at 11.7%.

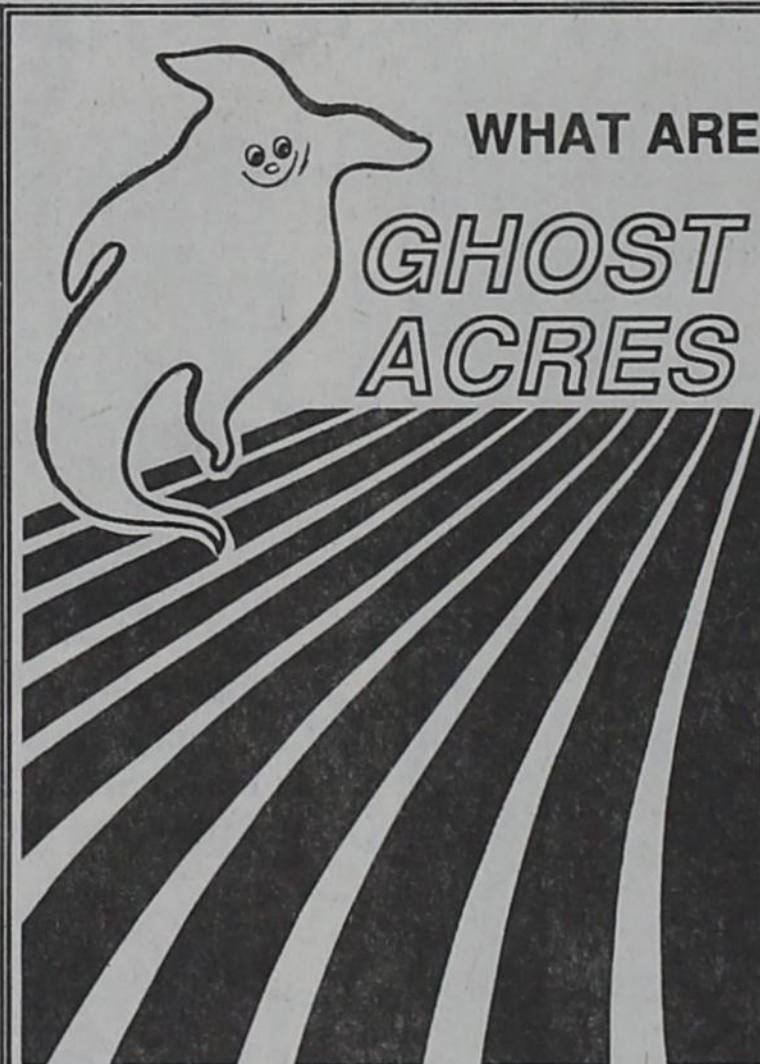

### Farmer applauds Smith's work

Dear Editor:

I have always heard that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, and that a minute spent at the right time saves nine.

This is what I think of the work Harold Smith has done for the people of Castro County. Harold and I made a tour Saturday to evaluate the projects he has undertaken. I found it very impressive and I am sure it will save the county money in the long run.

The terraces he has constructed

are very good to keep the water and sand out of the county ditches. I did this same thing on my farm two south and four east of Sunnyside 25 years ago. The county built up the end of my field on the southeast corner level and I planted Bermuda grass in the ditches to help hold the silt on my land. This has proved to be a good conservation practice and it has helped Precinct 1 to keep the road open, with less maintenance and safer traffic.

He has installed new culverts and cleaned out the ditches so the

silt will wash out of the culverts. It has been a practice to get permission to go onto private land in the county for 35 years to do projects that will help improve the roads.

Harold and I drove through the Hacker Addition and checked the improved caliche road, and I am sure if he doesn't grade out there for five years it will be better than it was.

The dead end west of Hart, south of the Glenn Wilson farm, is a very good idea. If it saves one life, it will be money well spent. I ran through a dead end like that when I was 14 years old; if there had been a deep ditch I could have been killed.

I have been told that the caliche in this county isn't fit to be used on the roads. That is not so. I have driven on this caliche around Danny Smith's farm when it rains! You might go 5 mph on the county road, compared with 30 to 40 on this caliche.

I have also been told it costs the same amount of time and money to maintain roads in a dryland area as it does in irrigated-land area. That can't be possible. A lot of these accusations are best not said if they cannot be backed up. Let's put out traffic counters, and divide the money according to the traffic per mile. (Grasshoppers do not pay taxes.)

These projects, such as in front of my house, where Harold pulled out the trees and has tried to divert some of the water so they can maintain the roads, are a step in the right direction.

There are two precincts in Lamb County that are putting caliche at every intersection, turn row, and lake crossings. This is what can be done with voluntary help and the county government.

I think that any employee that is in public office should investigate each completed project before making a decision, and then make it with sound judgment and the help of God. This county needs to pull together to make it a better place to live, for country people as well as city people, because if we don't, all the new pavement will be put near the big cities and not in Castro County.

Mr. George C. Wall, former highway superintendent, told me years ago that the county that squeaks the most gets the grease.

# Five plead guilty to felony charges

Two persons were assessed penitentiary sentences and three were placed on felony probation after pleading guilty in Judge Jack Miller's 64th District Court Friday.

Alfredo Rodriguez, 23, of Garden City, Kan., was sentenced to

serve 12 years and pay a \$5,000 fine for his part in the Nov. 17 burglary of the Rogelio Rodriguez home in west Dimmitt. His co-defendant, Tommy Torres Jr., had been assessed a prison sentence the previous week by a 64th District Court jury.

According to District Attorney Jimmy Davis, Rodriguez never admitted any participation in the offense until Friday, although trial testimony in Torres' case indicated that Rodriguez had sold a pistol stolen in the burglary. Testifying in the Torres trial, Rodriguez had claimed he purchased the pistol from an unknown man behind a local liquor store.

Rodriguez previously had been convicted of forgery in Kansas.

Jerry Lee Green, 39, of Tulia, was sentenced to serve four years in prison and pay a \$750 fine and court costs of \$133 following his plea of guilty to defrauding four area liquor stores by issuing worthless checks totaling nearly \$875. Court records indicated that Green was subsequently arrested for driving while intoxicated in Swisher County and had been sentenced to another prison term as a result of that offense.

18-year-old Danny Oltivero of Dimmitt was sentenced to six years in the penitentiary, but probation was granted for a period of three years after he pleaded guilty to aggravated assault.

Oltivero pleaded guilty to a charge that resulted from late-night

fight in the city park in Dimmitt last Nov. 27. Two youths reportedly were stabbed during the fight.

Oltivero was ordered to pay a \$700 fine, \$133 in court costs, \$1,440 in probation fees, and almost \$1,000 in medical restitution.

Juan Domingo Rosales, 17, of Dimmitt, was assessed an eight-year penitentiary sentence, probated for the next four years, after admitting his guilt in the Feb. 27 burglary of Joe's Liquor Store on East Bedford Street. Rosales is to repay the \$212.26 lost to the business, a fine of \$1,000, court costs of \$133, probation reporting fees of \$1,920, and a \$50 contribution for the Castro County Crime Line.

Juanita Estrada, 25, of Hart, pleaded guilty to tampering with government records and defrauding the Texas Dept. of Human Services of almost \$1,500 by not reporting her employment while receiving food stamp and welfare benefits. Judge Miller assessed an eight-year felony probation, during which Estrada is ordered to repay the loss to the state, plus a \$500 fine, court costs, and \$3,840 in reporting fees. She also was ordered to repay Castro County for her court-appointed attorney.

# AFS needs hosts

The Dimmitt American Field Service Chapter is looking for a host family for a foreign exchange student for the upcoming school year.

"We have papers for reverse placement on a very outstanding girl from Norway," Marty Benton, area AFS representative said this week.

"If we don't find a host family, it will be the first time in at least 15 years for Dimmitt not to have an exchange student," Benton said. "If we sent off for papers on another student, we just couldn't find any stronger or better prospect than this girl."

Local chapter member Patricia Braafladt said that a host family does not have to be a family with

children in high school. Families with younger children, older children, or no children are also eligible to host an AFS student.

"We have been looking for quite a while and have asked several local families, but we haven't had a definite yes from anyone, and time is growing short," Benton said.

She noted that a new US immigration policy requires that exchange students have a definite assignment before they can be admitted into the country.

"The main placement factor on this girl is that she must be allowed to participate in athletics. She's strong in track and field, and aspires to be a national runner for Norway," Benton reported.

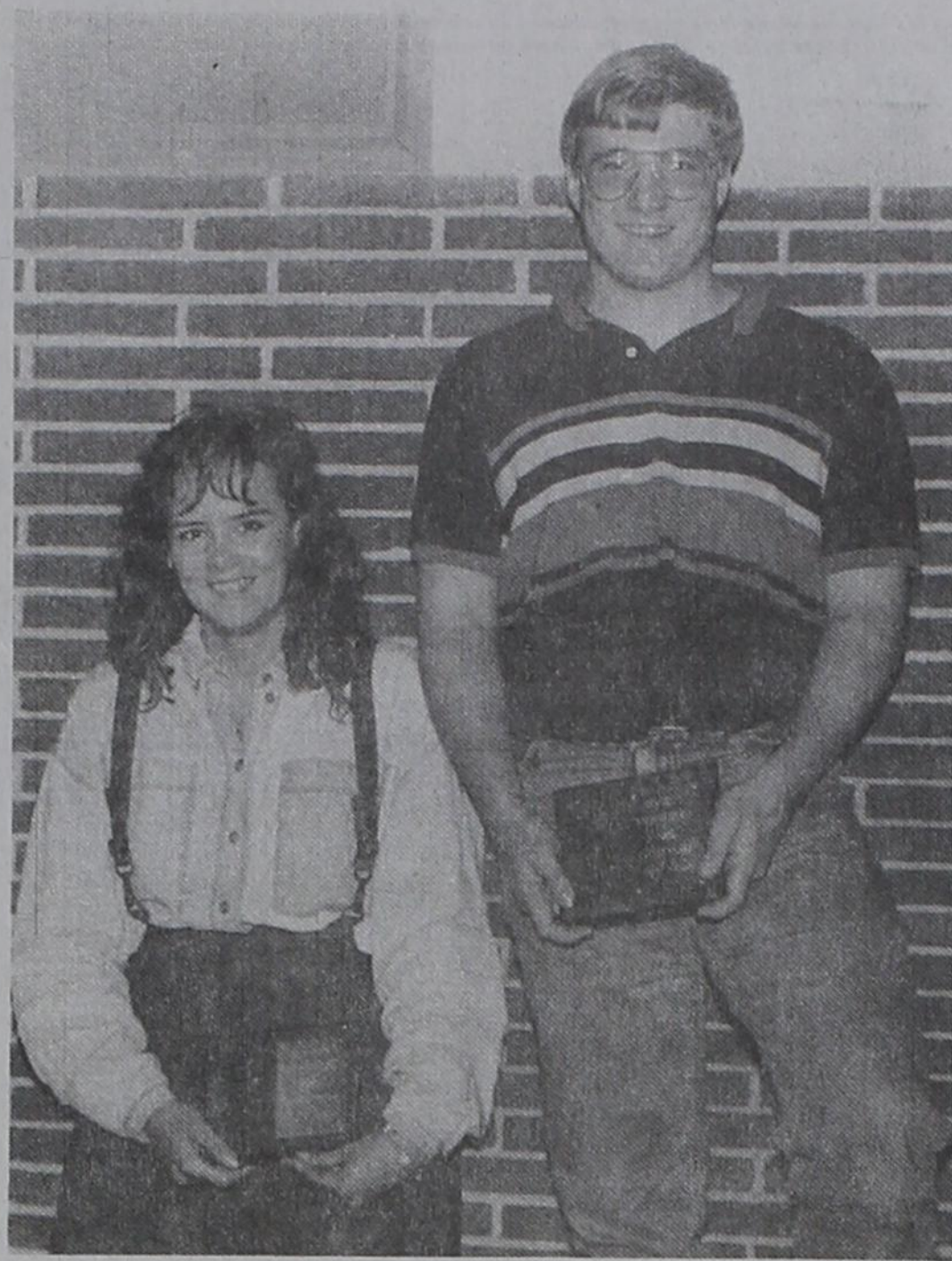

## Dimmitt seniors plan for higher education

Of Dimmitt's 91 seniors in the Class of 1989, 83% plan to go on to some form of higher education, while another 7% plan to enter the military and 10% will enter employment or have other plans.

Of those seeking higher education, 53 students, or 58% of the class, plan to attend a four-year college, while 20% will attend two-year colleges and five want to go to vocational schools.

Nearby West Texas State University has drawn the interest of the greatest number of graduates, with 17 planning to attend there. That number is closely followed by the 16 who plan to attend Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

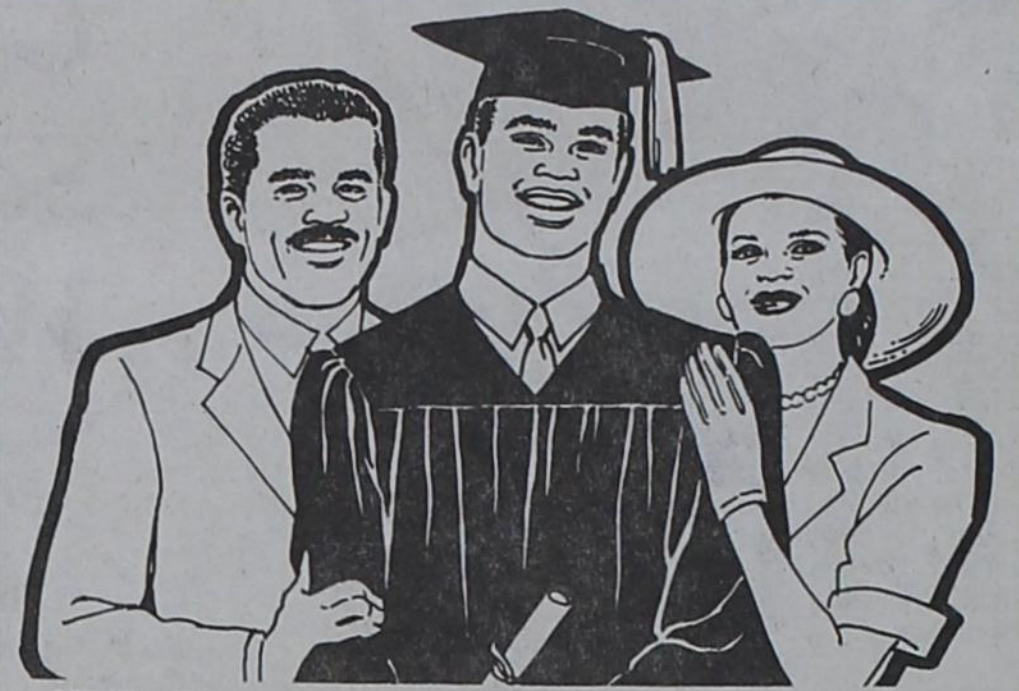
Other four-year colleges who have drawn two hopefuls each are Mesa College in Colorado, Panhandle State University in Oklahoma, and Texas A&M University. Colleges drawing one each are Angelo State University, Colorado School of Mines, Eastern New Mexico University, Lubbock Christian University, McMurry College, Midwestern State University, Our Lady of the Lake College, Southwestern Oklahoma State University, Texas Woman's University, University of Colorado, University of Dallas, University of Texas at Arlington, University of Texas at Austin and Wayland Baptist University.

South Plains College is the most popular among the two-year colleges, with 15 planning to attend. Three plan to attend Amarillo College.

Among vocational schools, three graduates plan to attend Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo, and two want to attend Universal Technical Institute in Houston.

Of those planning to enter the military, five will join the Army and one is entering the Air Force.

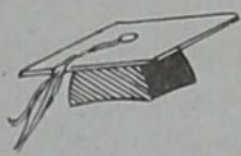

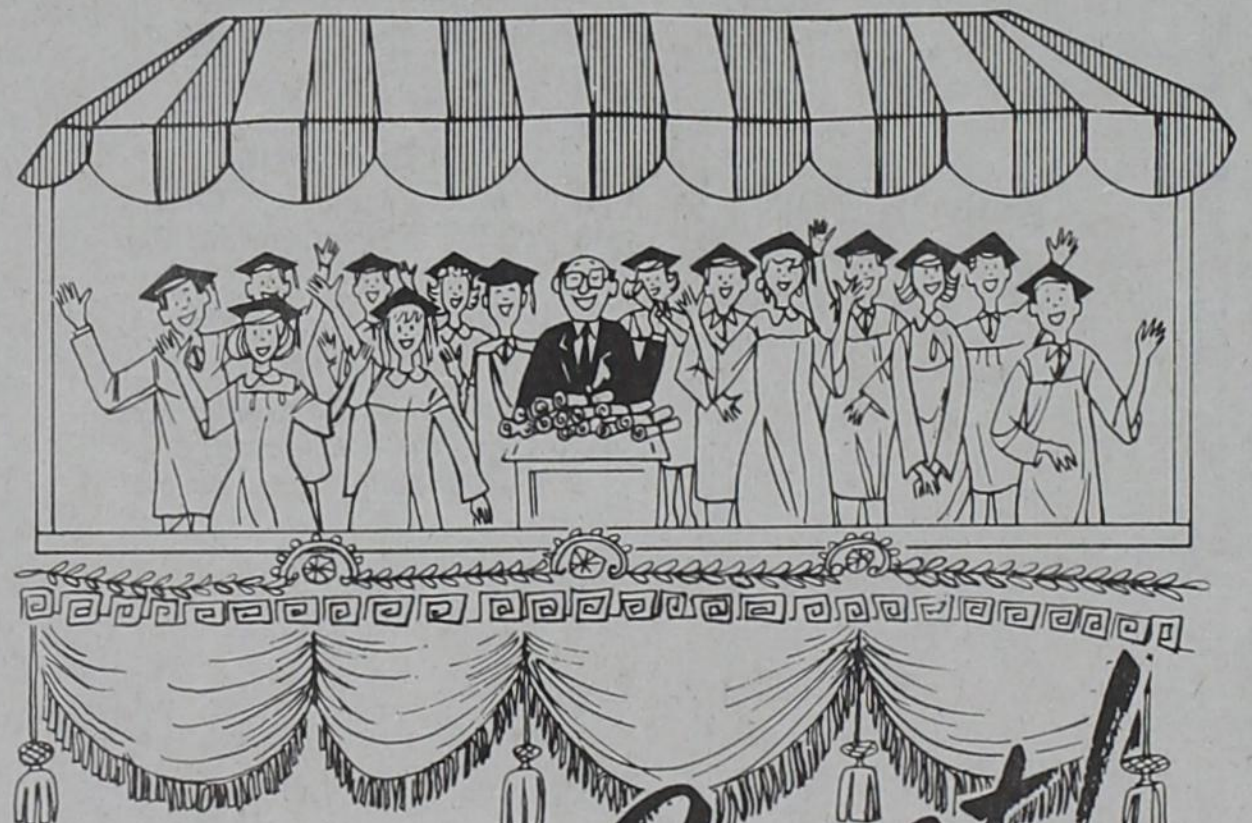
