DHS to graduate 58 Friday

Dimmitt High School will graduate 58 seniors during commencement ceremonies Friday at 8 p.m. at the high school auditorium.

Miss Texas 1989, Leah Kay Lyle, will be the commencement speaker for the graduation ceremonies.

Admission for the event will be by tickets only, with tickets distributed to each graduate for a set number of family and guests.

The Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce Dimmitt Dynamos is planning a reception in honor of Lyle from 6 to 7 p.m. at the Senior Citizens Center with the public invited to attend. Autographs and photo opportunities will be offered also.

"Please come by and make her feel how proud we are to have her in Dimmitt," said a chamber spokesperson.

Commencement ceremonies will begin at 8 p.m. with a processional played by Avie Lewis and the Methodist Bell Choir, directed by Jane O'Kelly. Kay Gleghorn will give the invocation.

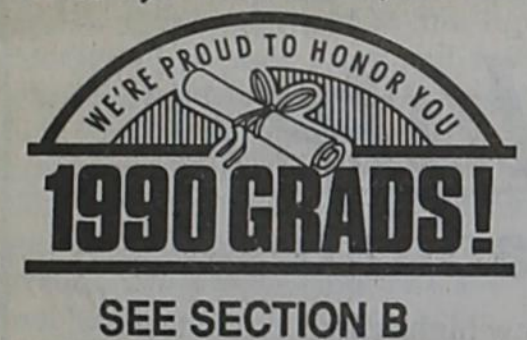
The salutatory address will be given by Jennifer Hanners, followed by the valedictory address by Danna Ralston.

Big Dreams in a Small Town will be presented by Bill Sava, and DISD Superintendent Robert Ryan will introduce Lyle, who will give the commencement address.

Ryan will then present the Class of 1990, and School Board President David Schaeffer will present the diplomas.

Jennifer Hanners will sing her original composition, *Remember*, followed by the benediction, given by Kristi Sims.

Lewis will play the recessional. Lyle is the daughter of Paul and Linda Lyle of Plainview, and is a



1988 graduate of Baylor University with a degree in communications.

A student of piano, Lyle was named Best Musician of the 1989 Miss Texas Pageant and preliminary talent winner prior to being named Miss Texas 1989.

She represented Texas at the 1989 Miss America Pageant and was named a semi-finalist, appearing on the national telecast of the pageant Sept. 16.

Her duties as Miss Texas include appearing as spokesperson for the Texas Department of Commerce, and she also speaks to student groups in schools, churches and youth organizations.

"They kidded me when I bought a new set of Michelins for it about 50,000 miles back," he says.

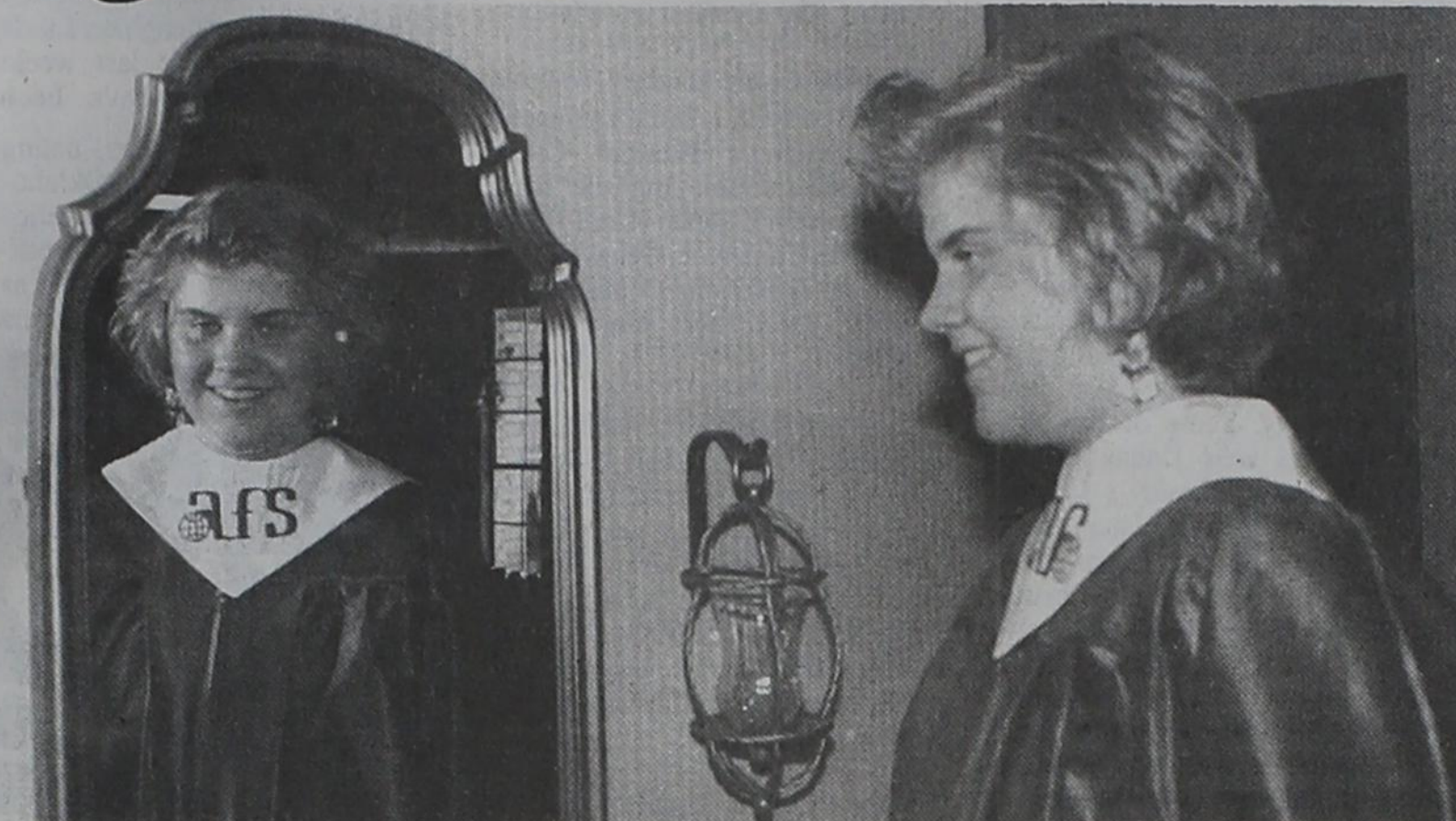
Shorty and I are both members of the brotherhood of El Camino owners (I'm on my third one now).

Dimmitt's exchange student shares year's experiences

Ida Skaaret feels lucky to have been chosen as an American Field Service student to America.

When she returns to Norway July 6, she will take with her the memories of friends and experiences that have affected her life.

When Ida first got her application that would bring her to Dimmitt, she looked up the town in the atlas, and found out that she would be in the north of Texas. "The atlas showed hills here, but on the plane from Dallas I wondered where I was going," she said.

Now she has gotten used to the area and is glad she came to Dimmitt. She has enjoyed her stay with her American family, Johnny and Loretta Hucks. They have all learned and shared a lot during her year in Dimmitt.

"My biggest adjustment has been getting to know and understand people. In Norway I knew what the people were like, but over here I had to get used to a different culture and language," Ida said.

In Norway, English is the second language, but for Ida the slang terms were hard to follow.

"Expressions that we might say everyday would confuse her," said Loretta Hucks.

Ida pointed out some differences in the cultures. In Norway, she said, couples go out in groups or on double dates; there are very few one-on-one dates in high school. So her first date over here was a bit

awkward.

Another difference is in the school systems. In Norway, athletics are not organized within the school. Athletics as well as other extracurricular activities are organized in private clubs.

Ida, 19, was one of the 135 out of 400 applicants from Norway chosen as an AFS student.

"Everyone in Norway wants to be an exchange student," she said.

"AFS is doing a great job, it shows they care. With other organizations, you are left on your own. With AFS you know someone's around, and this helps my family relax. AFS helps families make sure they are happy with each other and they work out any problems," she said.

AFS gives the foreign exchange students an opportunity to see other parts of Texas. One memorable experience was a visit to San Antonio, where Ida met other AFS stu-

dents.

When Ida returns, she will have one more year of school. Although she will not get credit for her year as an exchange student, she hopes that this year will help her get into a university and find a better job. She plans to attend veterinary school at a university after she graduates.

Ida will be happy to see her family again, but she is not ready to go back. When she returns, her family—consisting of Ida and her father, mother and younger brother—will be moving. Right now they live in Hommelvik, near Trondheim, and Ida and her family are excited about the move.

Loretta describes Ida as "very Americanized" and thinks that her family will be surprised at the change.

Ida will miss everyone with whom she has become acquainted here in America. But she plans to visit as soon as possible.

Castro Memorial Cemetery Association celebrated its 100th anniversary Monday with a short program at Castro Memorial Gardens in Dimmitt—the oldest cemetery in the county.

Fifty-three people were registered for the meeting and commemorative ceremony on Memorial Day, but the crowd grew to 65 as the ceremony progressed.

D.C. Taylor, president of the Castro Memorial Cemetery Association, emceed the program and Ann Gollehon Rodgers of Paducah, formerly of Dimmitt, sang *America the Beautiful, Faith of Our Fathers* and closed with *Now the Day Is Over*. Rev. Paul Kenley of Dimmitt's First Baptist Church and Rev. Vernon O'Kelley of the First United Methodist Church in Dimmitt offered the opening and closing prayers.

Castro Memorial Gardens is one of five cemeteries in the county, including community cemeteries at Easter and Flagg, and it includes more than 1,130 marked graves.

The cemetery still has 40 to 50 graves of infants and unknown individuals whose graves aren't marked, and Taylor asks that anyone with any information about any of the unmarked graves should contact the cemetery association. Most of the graves are in the southwest part of the cemetery.

In addition to Taylor, present board members include Billy Hackleman, vice president; Louise Mears, treasurer; Helen Richardson, secretary; Jerry Lilley, bookkeeper; and Bill Birdwell, Melvin Summers and J.B. Moore, members. Summers' and Mears' terms on the board were both up this year, but both were re-elected.

"I just can't tell you how much I think of them for the work they've done," Taylor said of the board.

Nazareth's rodeo kicks off Friday

Cowboys and cowgirls from across the region will be dragged, bucked and bronced across Marvin Schulte's rodeo arena Friday through Sunday during the 14th annual Nazareth Country Rodeo and Wild West Show.

Rodeo events scheduled include bareback, saddle bronc, bull riding, bull dogging, girls' break-a-way roping, calf roping, barrel racing, single steer roping and team roping; and Wild West events planned include the wild horse race, wild cow milking contest, kids' steer riding, kids' calf scramble and Saturday night bath race.

Schulte's arena is located five miles east of Nazareth on Highway 86, just behind Elmer's Package Store.

Performances are slated to begin at 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday, with Sunday's matinee performance scheduled to start at 3 p.m.

Admission to the rodeo, which is sanctioned by the Texas Cowboys Rodeo Association, is \$5 for high school age youth and adults, \$2 for students 12 years old to high school age, and free for kids under 12 years of age. All proceeds from the rodeo go to benefit the Nazareth Fire Dept.

The bucking stock will be furnished by Maverick Rodeo Co. of Tulia and the timed event stock will be furnished by the Nazareth Country Rodeo.

Trophy buckles will be awarded to the winners in all events.

A rodeo dance will be held Friday and Saturday nights from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. at the Nazareth Community Hall. Music will be provided by the Rough Riders Band from Nazareth and everyone is invited to attend.

City-wide garage sale slated June 9

If you are planning to have a garage sale on June 9 in conjunction with Dimmitt's third annual city-wide garage sale and want your sale publicized and listed on a map distributed to bargain-seekers that day, you've got to let the Chamber of Commerce know by Friday.

The Chamber of Commerce has established a goal of having 100 family garage sales planned as well as a flea market and sidewalk sales in Dimmitt.

Map listings will be given out at Dimmitt businesses displaying a red bow on their front door on the day of the sale.

Businesses, individuals and organizations may hold sales. Each participant pays a \$10 fee which goes directly toward publicity of the event. Spaces are available on the courthouse square for \$15 to individuals or groups. Businesses may buy a "business card" size ad

on the map for \$15.

"We have had great success with this event the last two years and we are planning on large crowds again," said Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Delores Heller.

KDHN-Radio will conduct on-the-spot interviews with individuals throughout the day. A Salvation Army truck will be parked on the square at 4 p.m. to pick up items that did not sell. In addition to the annual "courthouse square sales," sidewalk sales and individual garage sales, the Chamber will conduct a "large item auction" at 3 p.m. on the east parking lot of the courthouse. Items to be sold at the auction must be worth \$10 or more, and a 10% fee will be charged to have the item sold there. The seller will be allowed to place a minimum price on their item. This auction is designed to help sell large items that were not sold at individual garage sales.

Commissioners

Material approved

Castro County Commissioner of Precinct 1 Harold Smith finally got his wish — the Commissioners' Court passed an order allowing use

of improved road building material on county roads—but Smith voted against the measure, saying he didn't approve of all its provisions.

The motion for adoption of the order was made by Precinct 2 Commissioner Dale Winders and seconded by Precinct 4 Commissioner Vincent Guggemos, with Precinct 3 Commissioner Jeff Robertson also voting in favor.

Smith agreed with the provisions requiring the material to be obtained from pits in Castro County with prior written agreement between the landowner and the Commissioners' Court and stipulating its use on county roads in Castro County.

Provisions Smith objected to included the stipulation that the material be hauled and spread with county equipment by full-time county employees during normal working hours, with the work to be performed within the guidelines of the county budget and all county policies and personnel policies.

The order further stated that volunteers are not to be used unless they have met all requirements of the county's insurance carrier, with all fuel and repairs to any vehicle not owned by the county to be the responsibility of the volunteer. Current insurance requirements include provision of a certificate of insurance in the amounts of \$500,000 commercial auto liability coverage, \$500,000 general liability, and the statutory limit for workers' compensation coverage.

It was further provided that a list of all volunteers be furnished to the insurance carrier and to the Commissioners' Court prior to any work being performed by them.

In other business, Johnny Ethridge, representative of Contel of Texas, asked the commissioners to use extra caution in laying culverts on county roads, noting that the majority of phone cable breakages reported in the county are usually the result of such work.

"I'm not here to complain, I'm asking for your help," Ethridge said.

County's oldest cemetery had very unique beginning

Castro Memorial Gardens, the oldest cemetery in Castro County, has a very unique beginning.

In 1890, a cowboy named Joe Franks was riding across the prairie when his horse threw him and drug him to his death. He was buried close to the place where the horse stopped and his body was found.

Later that year, an orphan who worked for J.W. Carter, the first permanent settler in what would become Castro County, died and he was buried near the grave of Joe Franks. His name was Paskil Brakefield.

In 1894, William Johnston, a brother of Mack and Tom Johnston who lived out their lives in the county, died and he was also buried near the other two.

According to Mrs. J.C. (Pearl) Mapes who wrote the history of this cemetery in 1961, these three graves were marked with wooden stakes with the names and death dates.

When a shepherd met his death by freezing, he became the fourth man to be buried in this cemetery. Driving rain and snow soon obliterated the penciled name and death date on his marker. Had interested citizens not placed cement markers with plates on these early graves, they would have passed out of sight and mind as had the shepherd, and the entombed would have been anonymous forever.

Somewhere in the cemetery a small unmarked grave is the final resting place for a five-year-old boy who was run over by a wagon in a caravan bound for New Mexico. For many years his grief-stricken mother returned to visit his grave. Mrs. Mapes and others remember her sad vigil.

According to Mrs. Mapes, burials in those days were simple, but meaningful. Black material covered the hand-made caskets. Friends sometimes spent the entire night digging a grave in the unyielding earth, only to have to cover it in the morning to wait out a driving rain storm.

Undertakers were yet to come, and friends gently dressed the deceased in their burial blacks. The hearse was a horse-drawn wagon and the best hand-made quilt usually encased the coffin. Carriages, buggies, sometimes people afoot, and finally a rear guard of horseback riders moved out in a slow procession toward the cemetery.

For the immediate survivors, cane-bottomed chairs were placed in a circle around the open grave. No floral offerings graced the raw earth.

After the casket was lowered into place, every man took his turn with the shovel until the grave was mounded and man, woman and

Family stories needed for centennial project

The final deadline for submitting family histories for inclusion in *Vol. II Castro County, Texas 1891-1991*, is Friday, but organizers say there's still a little time to get stories in and the stories are desperately needed.

"Since our county will be 100 years old when the book is released, we feel this is a worthy project," said Teeny Bowden, project chairman. "We just need more cooperation than we have gotten so far if we are going to succeed in getting the book out by Christmas to launch the new year of the county's centennial celebration."

Bowden said the project's organizers are behind on processing the stories they do have, and as long as work continues on the submitted stories, additional ones can be accepted. She added that she's not sure how long it will be before they are finished with the processing.

"Our goal for family stories was 800, and we have less than 300 now," Bowden said. "Since we have fallen very short on stories, we must make it up by selling books and special pages. It is time to get your special pages in whether it is a memorial, tribute or a business page. It's also time to update your club, church, community and other histories."

The limit on space is 500 words for churches and communities. Clubs must purchase their space. One page can contain up to 1,000 words, a half-page is limited to 500 words and one-fourth of a page is limited to 250 words. Cost is \$300 for a full page, \$175 for a half-page and \$90 for one-quarter of a page.

If you have been asked to assume a certain assignment in connection with the project, the organizers ask that you complete it as soon as possible. They are also in need of volunteers who can help in any way.

Bowden and Emma Jean King, field representative manager, have talked with Helen Lance of Taylor Publishing Co. about the shortage of family stories.

"Since we have fallen short on stories, she (Lance) will base her decision on whether we should go on or give up on the number of books we have sold by Friday," Bowden said. "Please buy your book this week if you plan to buy one. There won't be any extra printed unless we get some financial backing. The book is the centennial project of the Castro County Historical Commission. We have a lot of good new material for the general history section, none of which was included in Vol. I," she added.

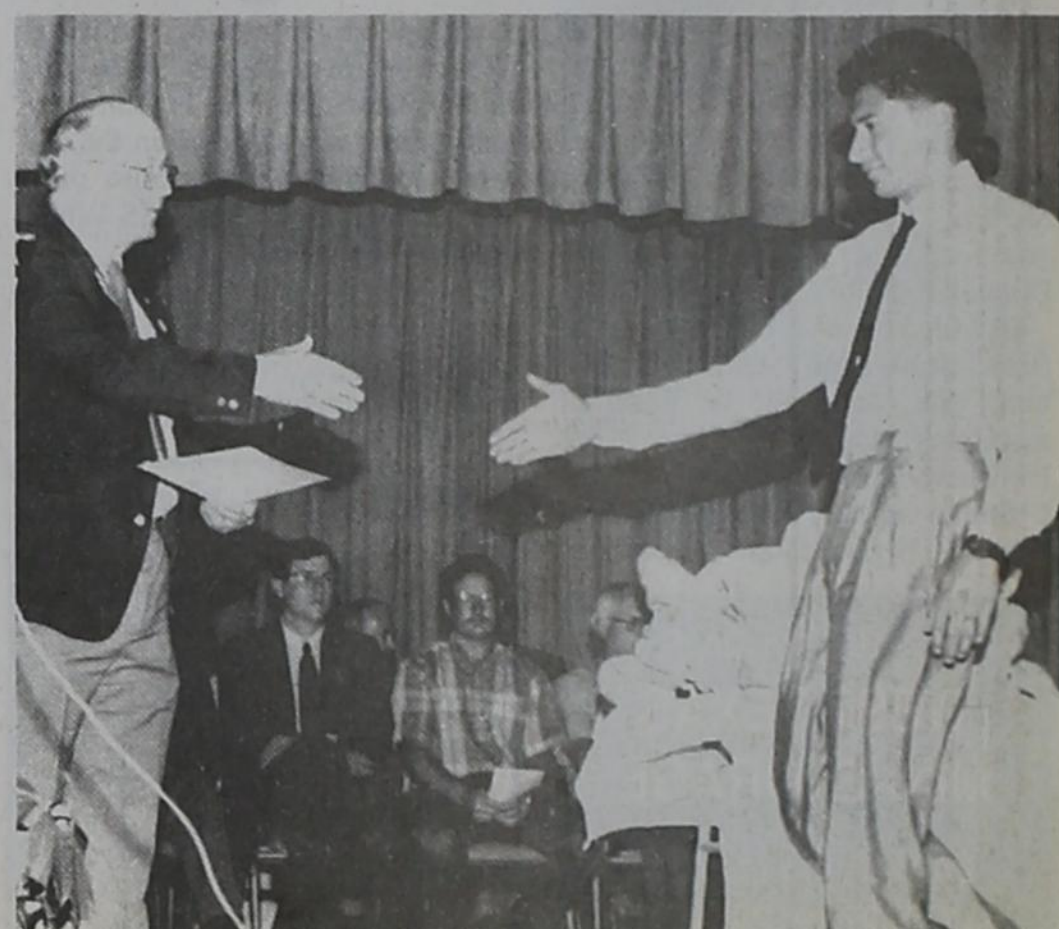

County farm, ranch statistic update set

Farmers and ranchers in Castro County will receive a visit from a field enumerator who counts livestock and collects data on crop acres for the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service.

Although some of us may have trouble getting from "here" to "there," Delores Gover of Earth has no problem finding her way as she travels the back country roads with only a stock tank or a windmill as a landmark. In fact, the less traveled highways and byways of Texas provide many of the short cuts she needs as part of her job as a field enumerator.

Beginning Friday, Gover will log many travel miles as she interviews farmers and ranchers in Castro County for a national agricultural survey.

Information gathered on this confidential survey will be used to make state and national estimates of crop acres, livestock inventories and grain stocks, information that is vitally important to the producers in Castro County, Gover said.

"These estimates are a working tool farmers and ranchers can use in their production, marketing and investment decisions and are the only unbiased information source available," said Dennis Findley, state statistician.

Survey information will be extremely important this year in measuring crop and livestock losses from the severe flooding across north and east Texas.

Field enumerators provide a basic link in the data collection service of the Texas office, since they are the primary personal contact Texas producers have with the agency. Currently, there are over 100 field enumerators working on farm and ranch surveys across the state.

Most of the enumerators have an agricultural background and are familiar with the many day-to-day problems facing Texas producers.

"Like the farmers and ranchers they are interviewing, our enumerators

also deal with low prices and severe weather conditions at harvest and mother cows that wait until 3 a.m. to calve," Findley added.

The June Agricultural Survey is the largest in a series of surveys conducted throughout the year by the Texas office. The random sample of producers selected for this survey represent other operators of similar size and type.

"Our field enumerators will be putting in some long hours during the next two weeks," Findley reported, "but their hard work is the only way to provide Texas producers with accurate, reliable agricultural information."

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Pohlmeier wins trip to Washington, D.C.

Kalina Pohlmeier of Nazareth and Amanda Tucker of Kress won a free trip to Washington, D.C. by competing in a speech contest sponsored annually by Swisher Electric Cooperative in Tulia. On May 17th, Kalina and Amanda were among five contestants vying for the trip. Kalina, a freshman at Nazareth High School, is the fifteen year old daughter of Walt and Lucy Pohlmeier of Nazareth. Amanda, also fifteen years old, is the daughter of Bobby and Sherry Adams of

Kress. Amanda is a freshman at Kress High School.

Kalina's speech dealt with how electricity has shaped our world and how the Rural Electrification Act of 1935 and Texas congressman Lyndon B. Johnson helped bring the Texas Hill Country and other rural Texans into the twentieth century. Kalina said in her speech "close your eyes and try to imagine a color you have never seen before...That was difficult, wasn't it?...Trying to imagine our

world without electricity is just as difficult as trying to imagine a color you have never seen before." Kalina then explained that this was what rural Texas was like before 1935—a life with no electricity, where hard physical work made rural people old before their time.

Kalina and Amanda leave on their trip June 7th and return home June 19th. The trip departs from Lewisville, where youth from all over the state will gather, having won similar contests sponsored by their local rural electric cooperative. Amanda and Kalina will be part of a group of about 70 Texas youth taking the bus trip to Washington. In Washington, the Texas group will be among 800-900 other youth from all over the country, also sponsored by local rural electric cooperatives.

In Washington, the youth will visit all of the favorite memorials, the White House, see the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives in action, and get a personal visit with their congressman. Other highlights will include visiting George Washington's Mount Vernon home, the Kennedy Center, touring the Smithsonian Institute, and visiting Arlington National Cemetery.

USDA terminates order for High Plains potatoes

The US Dept. of Agriculture has announced the termination of the federal marketing order for potatoes grown in the High Plains area of Texas and New Mexico, effective today (Thursday).

Daniel D. Haley, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, said on 42% of the growers who voted in a November 1989 referendum favored continuing the order.

High Plains growers who favored the order represented 30% of the volume of potatoes grown by those voting, Haley said. The order provides that USDA may terminate the order when it is not approved by producers in a referendum.

The order authorizes grade, size and maturity regulations for potatoes grown in the High Plains area of Texas and New Mexico as well as specifications for containers and their marketings.

As required by the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act of 1937, USDA has notified house and senate agricultural committees of congress of its intention to terminate the order.

Notice of the termination appears in the May 24 Federal Register.

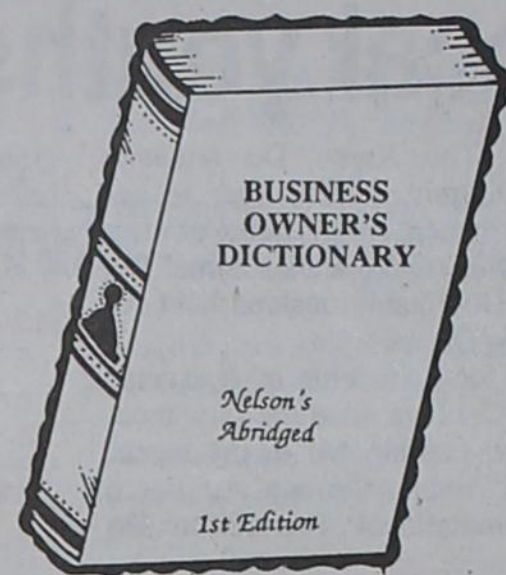

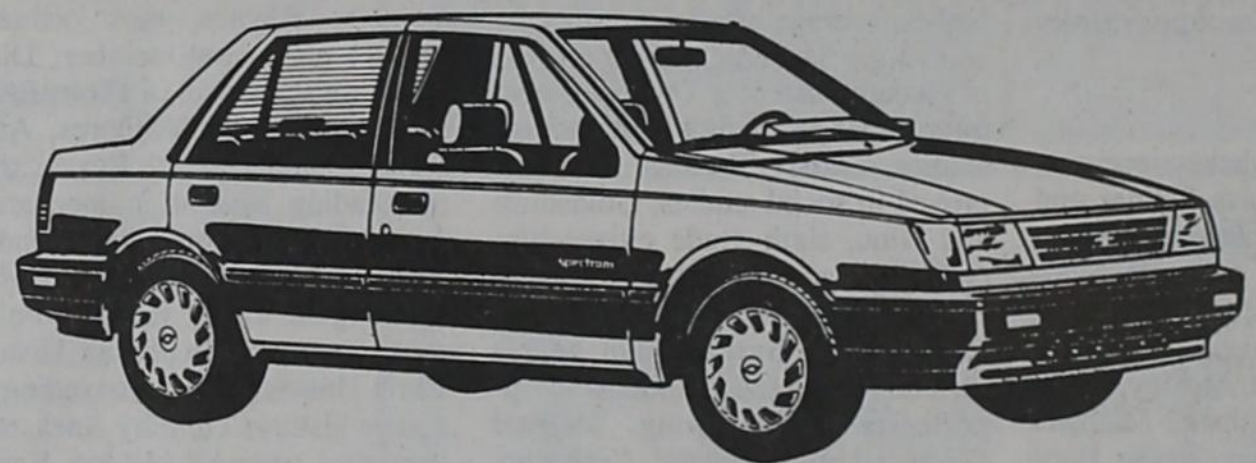

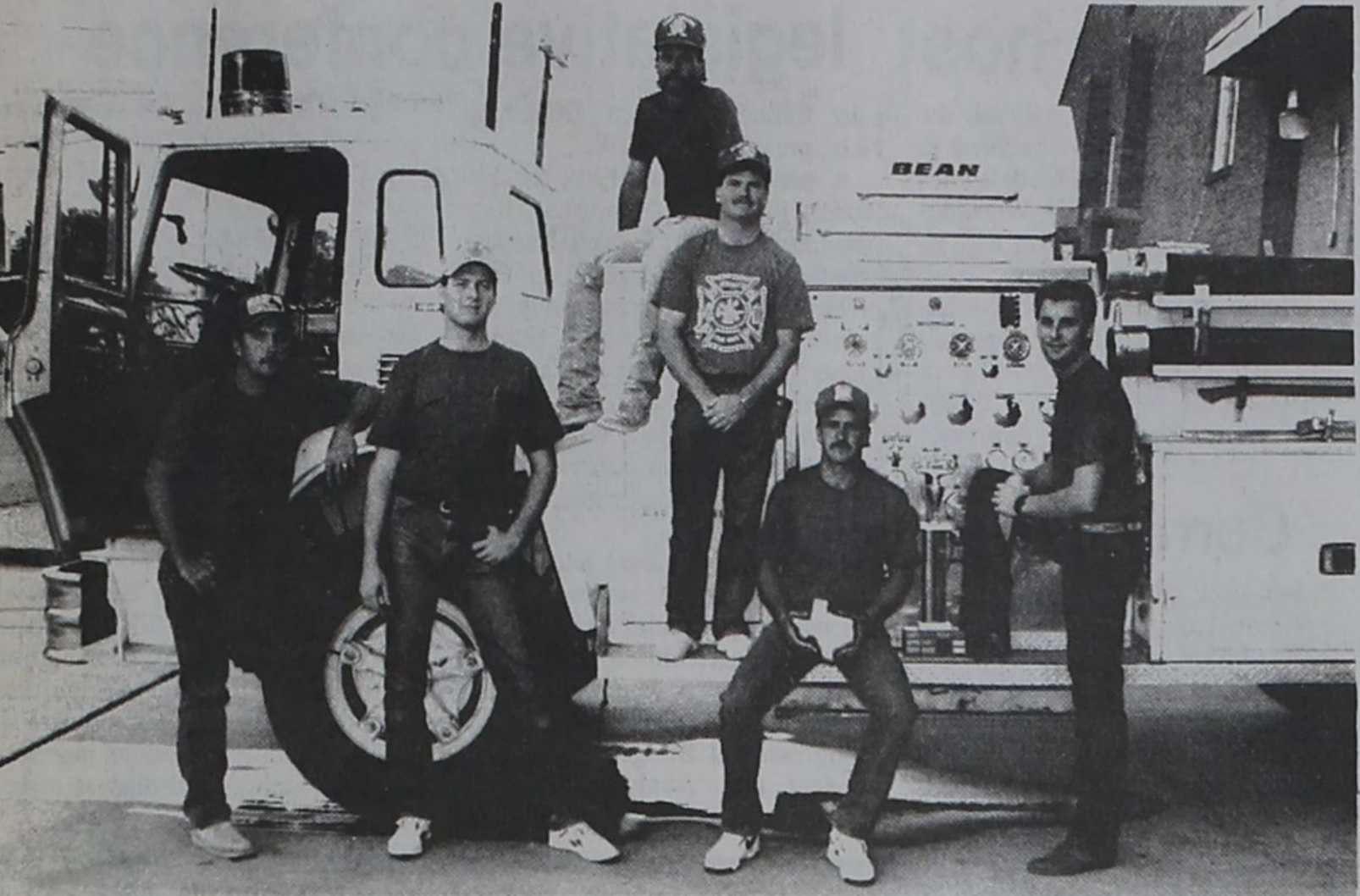

begin sending bills for cable damage if negligence is found and no notification was given to the company before digging was started. He added that some damage is attributable to the phone company not burying the cable deep enough, in which case no billing would be

sent. He also asked for prompt notification if any pedestal damage is noticed.

Approval was given for a gas line to cross the county right of way near the Charlie Wales Farm in Precinct 3, and soil erosion work was approved for the property of Alvin Kleman in Precinct 4, at the established rate of \$75 per hour.

The commissioners approved an order appointing Mitch McDonough as a Sheriff's Deputy, replacing Salvador Rivera, who went to work for the City of Dimmitt.

The commissioners voted to table action on seal coating for two roads in Precinct 1—First Street in Hart and Rodeo Road on the east edge of Dimmitt. Smith proposed the delay so that more information could be obtained on specifications for letting bids on the work.

Several motions Smith proposed died for lack of a second, including a suggestion for adopting a variable work week for his employees, and

a proposal for dividing the county road funds "judiciously and equitably."

Robertson also made a motion that all county road funds be divided into four equal portions for the four precincts, but his motion also died for lack of a second.

County Attorney Jimmy Davis told Smith that state law does not spell out specifically what "judiciously and equitably" means, but has been interpreted in the past to include consideration of such things as number of road miles, amount of traffic, number of water crossings, the age of the equipment in each precinct, and property valuations.

Smith said he felt a judicious division would take into account the amount of traffic borne by each precinct's roads.

Davis told Smith that the only remedy, if he feels the division is not currently judicious and equitable, would be that Smith could file suit in district court.

A delegation from Swisher County's Industrial Board explained the intricacies of Tulia's new minimum security prison at the East of Hart Neighborhood Crime Watch meeting last Thursday night at the American Legion Post in Hart.

Swisher County residents speaking to the Hart group included Bill Daniel, Tulia Chamber of Commerce manager; V.H. Harman Jr., member of the Swisher County Industrial Board; Ed Harris, president of the Swisher County Industrial Board; and Paul Scarborough, Swisher County Sheriff.

N-Group Securities developed the Tulia unit, will work out the indebtedness and arrange for some-

one to operate it.

The prison will be operated by Prigor, a private prison firm.

Construction on the minimum to medium security unit is expected to be completed by mid-November to December 1. Once the prison is completed, a three-day open house will be held for the general public before prisoners arrive.

69 correctional guards will be employed, with an addition 20 individuals hired in administrative and clerical positions. The warden hasn't been named yet.

The Tulia men said that Prigor will hold a meeting in Tulia Tuesday to explain about the prison and what jobs will be available. The time and location of the meeting were unknown at press time.

The table of contents for Part Two of the book includes "Animals of the South Plains," "Cowboys Lived a Long Time Ago," "Indians Lived a Long Time Ago," "Pioneer Children," "Palo Duro Canyon," and a poem about "Palo Duro Canyon."

In January of 1990, the Dimmitt Independent School District received a grant from the Texas Education Agency to develop programs aimed at enriching the reading and language skills of all stu-

dents. As a result, Project TEACH (Teaming Environment Achievement and Children) was created. The book is a culmination of that effort.

Jan Bryan's, Ann Salinas' and Donna Underwood's first grade classes chose their area of interest to study and wrote stories for the book. Learning and content were emphasized and phonetic spelling was encouraged. This project has helped the students learn about their home and community.

child stayed until the last bit of earth was firmly in place. Afterward, it was the custom to visit the other graves, and the ones needing attention were cared for on the spot.

In 1903, J.W. Alexander purchased the five-acre plot for use as a cemetery. A barbed wire fence was erected and stood until 1945. In 1931 an additional half-acre was purchased from the W.A. Murphys and was deeded to the Dimmitt Cemetery Association in the name of Bruce McLean, Mark Cowser and J.C. Tate as trustees.

The purchase of an additional and adjoining five acres by H.T. Bartlett in 1945 was a fortunate step forward. Ultimately, his foresight and generosity was responsible for this valuable land being deeded to the cemetery association.

In 1945, lot owners in the original Dimmitt Cemetery and those in the Bartlett Addition, met in a joint session and by a majority vote decided to incorporate it. The first board of directors included Bob McLean, Wes Anthony, Noel Gollehon, Allan Webb, Jim Elder, G.L. Willis Jr. and Swain Burkett. From a list of suggested names, "Castro Memorial Gardens" was chosen as the new name. It was suggested by Dovie (Mrs. R.C.) Lay.

Memorial Day, May 30, 1958, marked the first Memorial Day service for the military dead in the new cemetery. This service was held on the east side of the cemetery near a flag pole erected by Percy Estes and his son, Bob, in memory of another son, Greer, who was killed in action during World War II.

Mr. and Mrs. W.E. Kirkpatrick donated the flag used in memorial services for their son-in-law, Joe Bailes, a Korean war casualty. This flag continued to be used for many years with the services conducted by the Greer Estes Post of the American Legion.

Due to the lowered water table after irrigation began, the windmill at the old cemetery became inoperative. Friends from local and afar contributed funds in an amount sufficient to justify the board of directors to enter into a contract for laying a four-inch water line from Dimmitt to the cemetery. This source of water is still used today.

The perpetual care fund started in 1955 has continued to grow through the years because of the efforts of many people. It is now in excess of \$70,000 and the interest is used for continuous care.

Today, the cemetery is located 1-1/2 miles south of West Highway 86 on Front Street.

Many have served on the board through the years, but the present board includes D.C. Taylor, president; Billy Hackleman, vice president; Louise Mears, treasurer; Helen Richardson, secretary; Jerry Lilley, bookkeeper; Bill Birdwell, Melvin Summers and J.B. Moore, members.

"Being involved in policy-making is vital to the future of agriculture and our country. Grassroot organizations can make a difference in the legislative process,"

said Elaine Stuhr of Bradshaw, Neb., president of WIFE.

A panel composed of Senator Robert Kerrey (D-Nebraska), Representative Pat Roberts (R-Kansas), Jonathan Kislak, deputy undersecretary for small community and rural development, and Eugene Gantz, executive vice president of the American Association of Crop Insurers, will debate farm bill issues including crop insurance, rural development, animal rights and the environment.

The budget process and how it affects legislative issues will be discussed by a panel including Susan Offutt, agricultural branch chief of the Office of Management and Budget; Eileen Manfredi, of the Congressional Budget Office's Ag Budget and Analysis Division; Kathleen Merrigan, Senate Ag

Committee professional staff member; and William O'Conner, House Ag Committee deputy staff director.

The eighth annual legislative issues breakfast on June 12 will be co-hosted by Senator Patrick Leahy (D-Vermont), chairman of the Senate Ag Committee; and Representative Kika De La Garza (D-Texas), chairman of the House Agriculture Committee; and WIFE. Following the breakfast, WIFE delegates will visit with legislators from their individual states to discuss issues.

During the four-day Government Affairs Seminar, WIFE members will hear a food safety presentation coordinated by the Agriculture Council of America. George Roloffson, government relations manager for Ciba-Geigy, will discuss effective lobbying issues.

Army offers loan solution to students

Students who have attended college on a federally-funded student loan made after October 1, 1975, can get help repaying their loans in exchange for Army service.

The Loan Repayment program, open to nearly all Army skills, can be applied to a National Direct Student Loan, Guaranteed Student Loan or any federally-insured student loan approved by the Dept. of Education. For each year a student serves on active duty, his or her indebtedness is reduced by one-third or \$1,500, whichever is greater. A three-year enlistment, then, would eliminate the entire debt. A student who takes advantage of the Army's exclusive two-year enlistment could return to civilian life

with two-thirds or \$3,000 of his or her college debt paid off.

"The Army Reserve also offers a loan repayment program. Every year a student serves in the Reserve eliminates 15% of his or her indebtedness or \$500, whichever is greater. During the standard eight-year Reserve enlistment, much of the student's college debt can be eliminated, up to \$10,000 for most skills," said Capt. Timothy Jolly, recruiting company commander for this area.

"A \$20,000 loan repayment program can be applied toward qualified student loans in return for enlistment in critical skills in the high-tech and medical career fields. This program eliminates 15% of the applicant's indebtedness or \$3,000, whichever is greater, up to a \$20,000 limit, each year the applicant serves.

"This Army Reserve program offers a unique opportunity to eliminate most or even all of an individual's college debt by serving a standard Army Reserve enlistment in a unit near home," Jolly said.
