Dimmitt's exchange student shares year's experiences

Ida Skaaret feels lucky to have
been chosen as an American Field Service student to America. July 6 , she will take with her the memories of friends and experiences that have affected her life.
When Ida first got her applica-

Now she has gotten used to the

year in Dimmitt. "My biggest adjustment has been
getting to know and getting to know and understand
people. In Norway I knew people were like, but over here

everyday would confuse her," said Loretta Hucks.
Ida pointed out some differences in the cultures. In Norway, she
said, couples go out in groups or on said, couples go out in groups or on
double dates; there are very few one-on-one dates in high school. So
her first date over here was a bit awkward.
Another difference is in the
school systems. In Norway, athle-
tics are not organized within the
school. Athletics as well as other
extracurricular activities are orga-
nized in private clubs.
Ida, 19 was one of the 135 out
of 400 applicants from Norway
chosen as an AFS student.
"Everyone in Norway wants to
be an exchange student," she said.
"AFS is doing a great job, it
shows they care. With other organi-
zations, you are left on your own.
With AFS you know someone's
around, and this helps my family
relax. AFS helps families make
sure they are happy with each other
and they work out any problems,"
she said.
AFS gives the foreign exchange
students an opportunity to see other
parts of Texas. One memorable
experience was a visit to San Anto-
nio, where Ida met oher AFS stu-
dents.
When Ida returns, she will have one more year of school. Although
she will not get credit for her year as an exchange student, she hopes as an exchange student, she hopes a university and find a better job. She plans to attend veterinary

County's oldest cemetery had very unique beginning

## Castro Memorial Garden, <br> has a very unique beginning.

In 1890, a cowboy named Joe Franks was riding across the prairie hen his horse threw him and drug him to his death. He was buried Later the place where the horse stopped and his body was found. Later that year, an orphan who worked for J.W. Carter, the first permanent settler in what would become Castro County, died and he was buried near the grave of Joe Franks. His name was Paskil Brakefield.
In 1894,
In 1894, William Johnston, a brother of Mack and Tom Johnston
who lived out their lives in the county, died and he was also buried near the other two.
According to Mrs. J.C. (Pearl) Mapes who wrote the history of this According to Mrs. J.C. (Pearl) Mapes who wrote the history of this
cemetery in 1961, these three graves were marked with wooden cemetery in 1961, these three graves
stakes with the names and death dates.
When a sheepherder met his death by freezing, he became the fourth man to be buried in this cemetery. Driving rain and snow soon
obliterated the penciled name and death date on his marker obiterated the penciled name and death date on his marker. Had
interested citizens not placed cement markers with plates on these early graves, they would have passed out of sight and mind as had the sheepherder, and the entombed would have been anonymous forever. Somewhere in the cemetery a small unmarked grave is the fina
resting place for a five-year-old boy who was nun over by a wagon in resting place for a five-year-old boy who was run over by a wagon in
a caravan bound for New Mexico. For many years his grief-stricken mother returned to visit his grave. Mrs. Mapes and others remember her sad vigil.
According to Mrs. Mapes, burials in those days were simple, but
meaningful. Black material meaningful. Black material covered the hand-made caskets. Friends
sometimes spent the entire night digging a grave in earth, only to have to cover it in the morning to wait out a driving
ent rain storm.
Undertakers were yet to come, and friends gently dressed the deceased in their burial blacks. The hearse was a horse-drawn wagon and the best hand-made quilt usually encased the coffin. Carriages, buggies, sometimes people afoot, and finally a rear guard of
horseback riders moved out in a slow procession toward the
cemetery.
For the immediate survivors, cane-bottomed chairs were placed in a circle around the open grave. No floral offerings graced the raw earth.
After the casket was lowered into place, every man took his turn
with the shovel until the grave was mounded and man, woman and

announced the termination of the federal marketing order for potatoes grown in the High Plains area of Texas and New

vored the order represented $30 \%$ of the volume of potatoes grown by those voting, Haley said. The order provides that USDA may terminate the order when it is not approved by producers in a referendum. The order authorizes grade, size

of Texas and New Mexico as well as specifications for containers and their marketings.
