Home Rule passes; commission named

City reorganizes PD

It appears that Dimmitt will soon adopt "Home Rule," since a 58% majority of those voting Tuesday favored the proposition, and voters in the county generally followed state-wide trends on the referendum balloting, with four significant variations.

The official tally on Dimmitt's local election, with 339 ballots cast, showed 198 in favor of establishing a new charter for the city's operation, while 42% of those voting, or 141, were against the measure.

Tabulations on the charter commission candidates were incomplete at press time, but the top 15 who will make up the charter commission were announced, with their totals.

Don Sheffy topped the list with 256 votes, followed by Delores Heller at 252. Garland Coleman reaped 249, Wayne Collins, 246, Carole Dyer 218, Don Nelson 216, Richard Stahl 212, Robert Ryan 201, Roger Malone 199, Robert Jones 193, Ann Armstrong and Wayne Proffitt both with 182, David Hays 172, H.E. Wallace 162 and Garner Ball with 148.

With only an 18% turnout of the more than 4,000 registered voters, Castro County bucked the state trend on Amendments 6, 12, 18 and 19.

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In the interest of greater efficiency, the Dimmitt Aldermen Monday night approved the reorganization of the Dimmitt Police Dept., including the elimination of ranks among the patrolmen.

Veterans' Day observances set Saturday

Three celebrations are scheduled in Castro County in observance of Veterans' Day Saturday.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars Post #8056 in Dimmitt is planning a breakfast and flag raising ceremony at the Post Home, with the breakfast starting at 7 a.m., and the flag raising, performed by local Boy Scouts, set for day break. The VFW Auxiliary will cook the breakfast, and everyone is invited.

It's breakfast and a flag raising for the American Legion Post #311 in Hart, too. The breakfast will be at 7 a.m. at Janie's Cafe in Hart for members only. The flag raising will follow at the Post building.

Nazareth's American Legion Post #528 and its Ladies' Auxiliary is planning a steak supper, which will start at 7 p.m. at the Post Home. Members and guests only are invited, and there will be a charge. The meal will be followed by games and socializing.

The new "chain of command" will include Police Chief Gary Thurman, with Ray Aleman being named assistant chief. The remaining five officers will be ranked as patrolmen.

"These changes will not in any way affect salaries," City Manager Reeford Burrous told the aldermen. "As small as our force is, I just don't think we need so many in charge. We need more 'Indians" and fewer 'chiefs'," Burrous said.


Alderman Don Sheffy asked how Thurman reacted to the changes, and Burrous replied, "He's all for it. I talked it over with him, and he feels this is the best way to go."

Burrous said the new system will allow the chief and assistant more opportunities to have 'hands on' in all operations of the department, and would allow the department to be more responsive to public needs. The aldermen also approved an

ordinance establishing a reserve police force for the city.

The ordinance limits the number of reserve officers to five, and states that such officers must have their basic certificate in law enforcement training. The reserve officers will be appointed by the police chief, with the approval of the aldermen.

Reservists may carry a weapon only when authorized by the chief, and only when performing official duties. They may not assume fulltime duties of regular police officers, and are not eligible for any



In other business, the aldermen gave the franchise with Energas a second reading, with the vote for approval or rejection to come at the Nov. 20 meeting of the board. City Attorney Jack Edwards told the board that the franchise ordinance, proposed by Energas, appears to be in order, but recommended that a clause be added to provide for the payment of attoney's fees in the event either party were forced to employ an attorney to enforce the provisions of the ordinance.

Burrous told the aldermen that an inspector from the Texas Aeronautics Commission was expected to be at the airport in Dimmitt Wednesday morning. He asked that the aldermen be present to confer with the inspector about applying for a portion of \$3 million in grant funds that have recently become available in the state.

Burrous noted that he has been told that it would be better for the main runway at the local airport to be extended past its present length of 4,000 feet on up to 5,280 feet.

Amendment 12 proposed using the permanent school fund and its income to guarantee bonds issued by the state for aiding school districts. State-wide, voters were in favor by 55%, while locally only 44% of voters favored it.

Amendment 18 broke even in state-wide trends, registering 50-50,

Bobbies, Swiftettes return to state cross country meet

Bobbies and Swiftettes.

The girls' cross country teams from Dimmitt and Nazareth will make a return appearance in the state meet at Southwestern State University in Georgetown Saturday. The Swiftettes will run at 10 a.m. and the Bobbies' race begins at 10:40 a.m.

The teams earned the state berths by finishing among the top three teams in their respective races Saturday at Mae Simmons park in Lubbock. The Bobbies finished second in the Region 1-AAA race and the Swiftettes were third in the Region 1-A race.

Dimmitt Coach Richard Wood said he isn't sure what the competition will be like at state, but he does know one team that will be tough to beat-Canyon.

Canyon beat out the Bobbies in the regional meet by 30 points. The Lady Eagles had just 30 points while the Bobbies finished with 60. Lubbock Cooper also qualified for state with a third place, 121-point performance at regional.

Munday, the defending state champion in Class A, ran away with the regional race Saturday with just 35 points. Gruver was second with 82 and the Swiftettes finished third with 93.

"Our region is always on top at state," said Nazareth Coach Sandy Heiman. Munday is definitely going to be the team to beat. They are just super. If you can stay with them you'll do well. Munday is just so much stronger than other teams."

It's back to Georgetown for the al champion Lorrie Lovell of Sanford-Fritch until the final 400 yards of the race, but when she kicked on the afterburners, the race was all hers.

> "Halley surpised me a little," said Wood. "She told me she felt like she could run with Lovell. I asked her if she could sprint with her and she said she could. Then I told Halley to just stay on Lovell and outsprint her at the end and she did it-bad!

"I was really pleased with the way the girls ran. I think it was the best they've done all year. They all ran in a group," Wood said.

The Bobbies all finished in the top 25 with Bradley leading the pack. Renea Harman finished ninth with a time of 12:57.23 and Beatrice Ramos was 16th in 13:25.12. The Bobbies next four finishers came in 20th through 23rd. They were Rosie Enriquez, 13:33.76; Monica Garcia, 13:34.06; Becky Rodriguez, 13:34.32; and Christina Velasquez, 13:34.74.

"Christy didn't run as well as usual, but some of our other kids really picked up the slack. Jill ran a really good race and Stephanie came through for us.


"Overall I don't think we ran as well as we could have, but we did okay. We can run better as a team -we've just got to keep everybody healthy," she said.



The School Committee

Forty-two residents of the Dimmitt Independent School District are now taking a hard look at the buildings, equipment and facilities of all the schools in the district.

Known as the "District-Wide Long-Range Planning Committee," they are attempting to find out what the schools need in the way of renovations, facilities, equipment and financing to carry our public education system into the 21st Century.

It's good to know that all our school facilities are paid for, that the DISD is out of debt, and that we can now afford to take stock and see what we will need to keep our children's education up to par with the rapidly changing demands of new technologies.

When the DISD paid off the last of its bonded indebtedness, the school board wisely realized that it would be foolish to "rest on our laurels" and wait until a more expensive or more critical time to seek out shortcomings and do something about them.

That's why this long-range planning committee was formed-to try to determine what needs to be fixed, or built, or added onto, or expanded, or upgraded, and to draw up a list of priorities and projected costs.

Committee members have made walk-through inspections of all three schools, and are getting opinions from teachers and administrators about the schools' present and future needs.

They'd like to have your opinion, too, because they're trying to represent you and your children in this process.

A'Llan Bradley and Chuck Braafladt are the general cochairpersons of the long-range planning committee.







Mysterious tank puzzles fliers

An article in the October/-November issue of Country magazine featured aerial farm photographers Harlan and Conrad Accola of Wisconsin, and showed a photo they had taken "some time back" while flying their plane southwest of Dimmitt.

The photo showed a runaway stock-watering tank, up-ended, rolling along on its side through a field.

The brothers recalled the incident, saying, "... We saw this large stock tank rolling slowly along. Somehow it had gotten up on its side, and 45 mph gusts were blowing it across these fenceless fields. We swooped down low to take a picture of it, and when we came back a half-hour or so later it had rolled over two miles. We shot another photo, and when we came back an hour later, it had rolled nearly four miles! It was still rolling when we left the area." In the article, the two stated, "If any readers . . . can tell us how that

tank got started and where it ended up, it would answer at least one of the many questions that we've had while flying."

photograph and said that the tank was on Buddy Adrian's farm along the Dodd road, approximately five miles or so south of Flagg. He estimated that the picture was taken several years ago, evidenced by the fact that a sprinkler system has been installed since then.





Vol. I of the history book is priced at \$47.25, and copies are still available.







Nazareth finally overcame a four-game losing streak, sidelining the Kress Kangaroos 21-14 at Swift Stadium last Friday.

Offensively, the Swifts were led by Rusty Schacher, who ran the ball into the endzone twice for the Swifts in the second quarter. Lupe Huerta scored Kress' only two touchdowns.

With 8:08 left in the opening stanza, Nazareth punted to a waiting Huerta who juggled the ball on the five-yard line. When he gained control of the ball, he broke several tackles and raced down the right side for a 95-yard touchdown. Casey Reese's extra point kick was good and the Kangaroos jumped out to an early 7-0 lead.

In the second quarter Rusty Schacher capped off a 66 - yard drive with a 25-yard sprint into the end zone.

The long drive featured a variety

of ball carriers, including Harold Verkamp, T.J. Garza, Lynn Nelson and Schacher, who took turns moving the ball down the field to set up the Swifts' first score. Schacher took the hand off and turned upfield, broke a couple of tackles and out ran everybody for the score. Bob Kern's PAT was good and the score was knotted at 7.

The Swifts moment of glory didn't last long.

Reese took the kickoff on the Kangaroo 35 and Kress started battling back. Huerta took the hand off with 6:02 left in the half and raced 65 yards for another Kress touchdown. Reese's PAT was good and Kress held a 14-7 lead, but not for long.

Schacher returned the Kress kickoff to the Swift 38 to start off Nazareth's next scoring drive.

Quarterback Michael Schmucker threw a spiral to Zac Hatla to advance the Swifts to the 37-yard line. On second-and-ten Schacher got the call and found the end zone again. He raced for another two points to give the Swifts a 15-14 lead at halftime.

At the beginning of the third quarter, the Swifts downed the kickoff on their own seven and slowly worked their way upfield.

Verkamp was the workhorse on the seven minute, 15-play scoring drive, which culminated in a twoyard touchdown by Garza with 4:05 left in the third quarter. Schmucker attempted a pass to Kern for a two-point conversion, but the pass fell short and the Swifts had to settle for a 21-14 lead, the eventual final score.

Nazareth's victory brought its overall record to 5-4. They stand at 1-3 in district.

Nazareth travels to Sudan Friday to take on the state-ranked Hornets in its last game of the season. Kickoff is slated for 7:30 p.m.

Whoever wins, goes

Who would have thought those young Bobcats, with just one starter back from last year, would go into their final district game with a shot at the playoffs?

The scenario for Friday night's Dimmitt-Tulia game at Tulia will be similar to last year's: the winner gets the district's second playoff berth. And if the game ends in a tie (as it did last year), the Hornets will go (as they did last year).

The Bobcats are 2-1-1 in District 2-AAA play, while the Hornets are 3-1. A Dimmitt victory would give the Bobcats the district runner-up spot by a half-game edge. Tulia could earn second place by a fullgame advantage with a win, or by a half-game margin with a tie.

Both teams have lost only to Floydada in district play. The Hornets have lost also to Canyon Randall (42-14) and to West Texas High (24-9) and sport a 6-3 overall record from a bruising schedule. The Bobcats own a 5-3-1 season mark, with non-conference losses to Slaton (21-19) and Abernathy (21-17).

The Hornets have 13 seniors, seven juniors and two sophomores on their roster. The Bobcats list only five seniors, with 14 juniors and five sophomores. However, Coach Army Salinas has brought up two junior varsity players to fill in for the walking wounded.

Bobcat quarterback Freddy Martinez is still a question mark for Friday night's game, Salinas said. Martinez suffered stretched knee ligaments in the Friona game two weeks ago.

"Freddy will suit up with a special knee brace, but whether he'll

The Hornets have shown a high- play depends on how the knee responds to the brace," Salinas said.

"He's probably the fastest kid in the district," Assistant Coach George Rasor said.

Another major talent anchors the Tulia line-190-lb. senior General Echols (No. 77), a three-year starter who plays right guard on offense and tackle on defense.

"He's regarded to be the best offensive lineman in the district," Rasor said.

On offense, the two teams will look almost identical with their wing-T attacks.

Winner of Friday night's game will face the potent Childress Bobcats, District 1-AAA champions, in bi - district the following week, while Floydada will meet the northern district's runner-up team probably Canyon.

This may be the final season for the dean of District 2-AAA's football coaches-L. G. Wilson, who made Floydada a powerhouse for many years before taking the helm at Tulia several years ago. Wilson, a 40-year veteran of the football wars, has said he will probably retire after this season.


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



Monty Moore scored for Dimmitt on a one-yard run in the second to cut Floydada's lead to 14-12, but the JV Whirlwinds


added another touchdown for a 20-12 halftime lead, then scored the game's final TD in the fourth.

The two teams were almost even in total offense, with Dimmitt gaining 242 yards in 51 plays and Floydada gaining 243 yards in 49 plays.


