#### Overplaying the Hand

It has been galling to have to sit back and watch Germany insinuate itself into American countries by means which the United States dislikes to adopt and for which it has small talent.

But there is good hope today that the Germans have badly overplayed their hand. The very arrogance and effrontery which served them so well up to a point is now beginning to trip them up.

Bolivia stood for a lot. But when letters were found from their own military attache in Berlin to the German ambassador at La Paz detailing plans for a military coup, the Bolivians called a halt, and called it in words of one sylible

Next piece of Nazi effrontery was a circular letter to all Latin American governments demanding that they protest against the action of the United States in stopping shipment of American goods to Nazi agents in Latin countries. Such cool crust has seldom been seen in diplomatic circles at least not since Berlin was promising Mexico most of the American Southwest in return for support in the World War.

But the Mexicans, who are a proud people, know how to answer a request that Berlin dictate its foreign policy. With the smooth and delightful language which has distinguished Mexican diplomatic correspondence in late years, Mexico replied to the Germans that she alone "is competent, in absolute fashion, to note on what occasions! the liberty of commerce and the sovereignty of Mexico are

Further, continued this little gem of diplomatic wordage: "I can assure your excellency that the road Mexico will take will be that which it esteems most appropriate. without the need of receiving or carrying out instructions of other authorities conveyed by any of the accredited diplomats in this capital."


