DEFENSE BOND SALES HERE SHOW A BIG JUMP AFTER JAP ATTACK UPON PEARL HARBOR

Defense bond and stamp sales in Ranger have been unusually heavy. A. E. Crawley, Ranger post master, has reported, with stamps being in such demand that he has been having some trouble in keeping enough on hand.

At the outset of the year and bond sales the Ranger post office was given a credit of \$500, but this was soon found to be inadequate and the credit was increased to \$1,000, Crawley stated.

A new series of bonds was issued at the first of the year and the Ranger office was sent 50 of the new \$18.75 bonds, worth \$25 at maturity. These were soon sold out.

Stamp sales are also very heavy with the supply being exhausted from time to time and some difficulty being met in keeping a supply on hand, because the Dallas office cannot always ship the stamps in the amounts wanted by the smaller offices.

Crawley stated that stamps are purchased, to a large extent, by people of small income, and that many have a new accumulated enough stamps to have them traded for the \$18.75 bonds.

Average daily sale of stamps are approximately \$200 with the last two weeks in December showing bond and stamp sales of \$7,600.

Of course many bonds are sold at the Commercial State Bank, and Crawley estimated that the bond sales there were much higher than at the post office, because checks could be accepted by the bank, where the post office required cash.

At the Commercial State Bank it was reported that since Dec. 7, the date Pearl Harbor was attacked by the Japanese, bond sales had shown a decided jump, with the average for a 30-day period now being approximately \$8,000.

The bank has been selling bonds since May, and during that period the total sales have amounted to between \$40,000 and \$50,000, J. L. Haney, assistant cashier, reported.

Although the bank handles a few of the defense stamps, the majority of the bank's defense sales are in bonds, with the \$18.75 denomination being in the greatest demand.
