# **ALLIES TAKE** OF AXIS SHIPS

American and British armed forces struck punishing new blows at the Axis in the Pacific, At-lantic and Mediterranean today, but the Japanese rolled forward in their Burma and Java offen-

Land, sea and air fighters of the United States took a leading ro in the new attacks that in flicted what Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson described as "appalling loss" of life on the Japanese in addition to sinking or lamaging seven submarines in the

Latest dispatches from the fightng fronts showed:

In Java the American Flying Fortresses battered he newly-arrived Japanese invasion fleet, ineluding cruisers and destroyers, off the southeast coast of enemy held Bali, only one mile from Java. A United States submarine torpedoed two enemy transports, an auxiliary ship, a freighter and probably a warship in two days of attacks upon the invaders.

In the Philippines Gen. Douglas MacArthur's forces on Bataan Peninsule, in a surprise counter attack, drove back the Japanese and captured enemy positions in an advance of several miles. The fighting in the Bataan Sector still continues, a War Department communique states.

In London First Lord of the Admiralty A. V. Alexander disclosed that the 10,000-ton Nazi cruiser of the Prinz Eugen class was heavily damaged by a British submarine attack off the Norwegian Coast while photographs taken by the Koyal Air Force indicate that the battle cruisers Scharnhorst and Gneisenau had been knocked out for some time and were laid up at Kiel and Wilhelshaven.

The Admiralty also reported that three Italian convoy ships had been sunk in naval engagements in the Mediterranean




