#### No Loafers Listed

Eventually every man registered for selective service will get a questionnaire asking him what he can do. As every one knows the battle of production must be won before the Battles of Bataan, of the Atlantic, of Australia can be marked down as victories. Therefore, the government must know what we can do.

This four-page questionnaire carries many queries and a list of occupations from airplane fabric workers to wire drawer. Then there are such relatively unknown jobs as armorer, babbitter, core maker, dynamic balancer, and tube bender. It takes all these and many more kinds of workers to win the war, but nowhere in the list will you find leafer, orator, drugstore cowboy or curbstone colonel. But there is one square reading "do not have a job and am not looking for work."

This data will fill the files of the United States Employment Service and the National Roster of Scientific and Specialized Personnel so that we know just where we stand in regard to skilled workers and professional people. The government now has no power to shift workers to jobs where they might be more useful although some members of Congress are beginning to mention the word "compulsion."

Naturally most of the people and most of Congress shy away from any sort of compulsory work service and if persuasion and patriotism can do the job, there will be no commands for a Paducah plumber to leave home and hearth and pull up stakes for San Diego.







Families are taking better care of their electric appliances. They know that a "stitch in time" may save money later on, or may even save an appliance difficult to replace.

Keeping your present electric cleaner in good repair will help to conserve vital metals needed for war production. Use a little oil on your cleaner according to the manufacturer's directions, and handle it carefully so that it will last longer.

Your cleaner will work better and you can finish cleaning more quickly if the dust bag is emptied regularly.
