PHESE concessions have to be considered in the light of two things.

First that they are conditioned upon acceptance of a nine-point program which, sound and enlightened for the most part, is economically unworkable in at least one detail. The union demands both price control and wage increases. That won't work.

Second, the fact that the whole problem of overtime pay is one of cost, we can produce under the present day scales. The men will work Sundays, holidays and nights at a price. So it isn't a matter of production primarily. The trouble is that even this zich nation is going to be hardpressed by the size of the bill we are contracting in order to supply the entire anti-axis world with food and weapons. The relatively small income waived by these men whose normal shift includes Sundays, or an occasional holiday, doesn't scratch the surface of the real problem.

Give credit to the U. A. W. for a fine gesture. But let's look this gift horse in the mouth and see if he will prove worth his keep after we get him in the barn-if we do.

To satisfy President Roosevelt's war production program, we wust divert so much capacity to miltary purposes that the remaining plant and materials will not be able to make more than \$56 billions worth of civilian supplies.

BUT in the coming fiscal year, civilians will have at least \$110 billions with which to buy such goods.

Therefore we start with the picture of civilans at an auction, all anxious to buy the commodities offered for sale, and each with more money than he can spend.

If you've ever been at an auction where everybody had relatively plenty of money, and was enthusiastic about the items offered, you don't need to be told what will

Unless the stetup is modified by some type of controls, prices will skyrocket as each of us tries to outbid the others for the commodities on sale.

This tendency wil be exaggerated by the fact that much of the new money is in the hands of men and women who haven't been prosperous for so long that they have no ideas of saving.

The quantity of civilian goods available wil be just about that of 1933, at the depth of the depression. The quantity of money, seeking to pay for such goods, will be about double what was available in 1933.




