

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

Quietus Put on Cultural Frills as U. S. Gives Latin-America More Real Assistance

WASHINGTON.-Not much fuss has been made about it, but the Office of Co-Ordinator of Inter-American Affairs, otherwise known as Nelson Rockefeller's outfit, has soft-pedalled almost to the point of completely silencing the "cultural" phases of its activities, and that marks a milestone.


