I-B Men Get Limited Service

CHICAGO, May 30—(UP)—Brig. Gen. Lewis Hershey, selective service director, predicted last night that lowering of the army's physical standards would result in reclassification for many I-B men although many men with physical defects will be taken for limited service.

"Why many I-B's will be taken as limited service," he said. "The army's physical standards for I-A men will be lowered as the need for more men grows."

He said the army so far has only 1,600 I-B men in its ranks and predicted that approximately 2,000,000 men would be classified as

RAF RAIDS DO DAMAGE TO FACTORIES

VICHY, May 30—A series of heavy RAF raids, the third starting shortly before midnight and lasting three hours, battered the whole industrial region northwest of Paris, killing 40 persons and gravely injuring 100 others, an official statement said today.

The British planes, flying over the French factory region in successive waves, blasted the important Gennivillers power station and "destroyed" the Goodrich rubber works, the statement said.

The bombers dropped most of their explosives in the suburban factory areas around Paris, but damage was understood to be heavy elsewhere.

It was said officially that the RAF bombed numerous factory suburbs northwest of the city, and that some of the raids were believed to have been shot down.

The planes, sweeping over the channel, roared into the Paris region and dived on lighted targets shattering the complete calm which had existed in Paris for three weeks.

The official Vichy statement, possibly attempting to stir up indignation over the attacks, pointed out that many civilians were deprived of their homes.

The government announcement went on to say the raids had provoked serious indignation among the factory workers, and that several planes were brought down.

The raids were described as the heaviest the RAF ever carried out over France.

The Gennivillers power plant, six miles northwest of Paris, supplies factories throughout the entire industrial area. The Goodrich Rubber plant is not far away.

Germany Claims Kharkov Battle Has Been Ended

BERLIN, May 30—(German broadcast recorded by United Press at London)—A special communique issued at Adolf Hitler's Fuehrer headquarters said today that the "great" battle of Kharkov had been finished.

It hailed a "proud and destructive victory—a brilliant victory of annihilation in which the 6th, 9th and 57th Soviet armies were annihilated in the Kharkov area."

It said that the "annihilated" armies consisted of 20 infantry divisions, seven cavalry divisions and 14 tank brigades.

It said that 240,000 Russians had been made prisoner, 1,249 tanks, 2,025 guns and 538 planes destroyed or captured and that other war materials had been taken.

450 Get Canning Sugar Permits In Ranger This Week

Through Thursday evening the local sugar rationing board, which is issuing sugar certificates for canning sugar, had issued 456 such permits to buy sugar in Ranger.

This represents 450 family units, composed of 1,460 individuals, and calls for purchase of 7,300 pounds of sugar for canning purposes.

Fathers, mothers, teachers, friends, and members of the class of 1942:

THIS IS OUR WORLD. Each of us is concerned not just for today, not alone for the generations to come, but for OURSELVES, for OUR future. This is OUR world, and as soon as the war ends, we shall return to live again in a safer world, even safer than the one we left when America entered the war.

YOU our fathers and mothers, have thought of the world your children must live in; you our teachers, the most earnest workers of our hitherto known world, have thought of the prospects of the generation among whom you work; YOU parents and teachers, desire to give us a country of promise and hope.

We of the class of 1942 do not know just what is ahead of us, but we, every one of us, will take up the task of making OUR world a better, brighter place even as you, our parents, teachers, and friends, have striven to make it a better, brighter place. We want to help the destiny of the world for ALL men.

True, a few of us of the class of 1942 may bemoan our fate or offer excuses for OUR world, but most of us will adjust ourselves satisfactorily to new conditions. The ability we have to adapt ourselves to change will determine how successful or how miserable we may become in our world. We cannot as yet center our minds on the good old days when a new car was a yearly occurrence and we never counted the spoonfuls of sugar in our coffee; we must concentrate on the problems of

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JAPS START A NEW OFFENSE AT NANCHANG

CHUNGKING, May 30—The Chinese Central News Agency said today that the Japanese had started a new offensive eastward from Nanchang, capital of Kiangsi Province, as the American Volunteer Group revealed that it had blasted enemy positions again.

The Agency said Chinese troops were bitterly resisting the new Japanese advance. Nanchang is 450 miles northwest of Foochow, where the Japanese had suffered heavy losses trying to land from warships.

"All bombs released were seen to fall within the target area, while anti-aircraft fire was successfully silenced," the communique said.

(Lieut. Col. Chih Wang, Chinese army liaison officer who was on Bataan and is now in Australia with Gen. Douglas MacArthur, said he was confident Japanese thrusts into Chekiang and Fukien Provinces for the purposes of mopping up Allied air bases wouldn't help the Japanese position in China.

(Wang, interviewed in Australia, was graduated from West Point in 1932, and fought the Japanese with the Chinese Eighth Army four years before joining MacArthur in the Philippines, and subsequently escaping to Australia from Corregidor.

"Fighting in China is somewhat different from what it was in Malaya, Burma and the Philippines," he said.

"The Japanese control points and lines, some broken, some unbroken. They don't control areas."

"When they speak of front lines, it's misleading. You read that the Japanese occupied a certain town. They've maybe sent troops into that city, but the Chinese are still fighting at their heels."

"Sometimes the Chinese wish the Japanese would push on and give them a chance to annihilate them. Less than 100,000,000 persons out of China's 400,000,000 are under Japanese domination. Of this 100,000,000, the vast majority are loyal Chinese."

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BRITISH - AMERICAN TANKS ARE MASSES UPON SOVIET FRONT FOR NEW ACTION

Sub Captain LAUGHS, THEN FIRES TORPEDO

NEW ORLEANS, La. (UP)—Survivors told today of a Nazi U-boat commander who laughed and fired a torpedo which killed 22 crew members as they were pulling away in a life boat from their ship on unburned medium sized merchantman.

Eighteen survivors were brought to New Orleans. The attack occurred without warning just before dawn May 25, in the Gulf of Mexico.

Firing rapidly, the submarine sent 75 to 90 shells at the cargo ship, including high explosives, star shells and shrapnel.

Within 25 minutes all of the crew of 40, except radio operator Paul Platt, had abandoned the vessel. Fifteen of the crew were so shaken in good english: "Is every one off the ship?"

or getting away in the second lifeboat something like an "okay" and so.

The men in the lifeboat heard reported, then pulled toward the "No" he was told.

The surfaced U-boat approached ship and fired a torpedo. The second lifeboat was just getting away—a few feet from the vessel—when the torpedo struck, the explosion shattering the boat and hurling bodies high into the air. Only two men survived the hit, 2nd mate Frank A. Santina, of Montclair, N. J., and Kurth Gonaka, Severn, Md. Both are in the Marine hospital here. Santina, recovering from head and chest injuries, told of his brush with death.

"We were trying to push the life boat away from the ship when a torpedo passed beneath the life boat admiral," he said. "Gonaka and I were in the bow. It was terrible. The explosion was terrific and everything turned into a ball of fire. I don't know how far we were blown into the air, but it seemed that I would never come down."

"When I did come down I went under like a rock. Everything was black when I came to the surface and found a piece of wreckage and hung on."

Santina said when he heard Gonaka calling for help he swam to him and pulled him to the wreckage.

Gonaka's right arm was shattered and required amputation.

After picking up Gonaka and Santina the remaining lifeboat took aboard radio operator Platt who had finally dived a verboard, unable to send a SOS because of shell fire damage to the equipment.

The lifeboat drifted until 7 a. m. the next day when the survivors were picked up.

British Believe They Can Win Libyan Battle

Cairo, May 30—(UP)—A big and critical battle is in progress in the Libyan Desert south of Tobruk but the British forces remain confident of the outcome, Maj. Gen. Neil M. Ritchie, commander of the Eighth Army, said today as a counter-attack was launched against the Axis.

The importance of the conflict was emphasized for the first time since the enemy columns under Col. Gen. Erwin Rommel struck eastward to the British positions only 15 or 20 miles from Tobruk and were engaged on a wide front.

We'll Keep The Faith

This is Memorial Day. For the seventy-fifth successive year we have set aside the 30th of May in memorial to those Americans who offered their lives, in one way after another, to establish and maintain in this world a sanctuary for democracy.

Up to the bombing of Pearl Harbor, more than seven million men had fought in American uniforms, first in order to form a more perfect union and later to secure the blessings of liberty to themselves and their posterity.

Almost another million went through hell in the Confederate butternut, fighting for what seemed to them the essence of true democracy. They lost, but out of their sacrifices the integrity, the sincerity and the vigor of our federal union were strengthened.

Now another two to three millions are in uniform. Three times as many more may yet be called from their homes and sent onto the world's battlefields, once more to preserve the blessings of liberty for us who stay at home.

All that we have today, and all that we are as Americans, we owe to the gallant millions who, from 1775 through 1918, held liberty to be dearer than life or creature comforts.

But for them we should not have acquired our many blessings, tangible and intangible.

Our industrial, commercial, and material supremacy, which have made even our poor seem prosperous by other nations' standards, did not spring full blown from the magic soil of America.

True, that soil was rich and generous. But so is Russia's. The abundance which we achieved was a product of democracy, of a way of life which gave to every man privileges and opportunities and incentives which long have been the world's envy.

We say this not to boast, but rather to emphasize that our democracy, the cornerstone of everything we hold dear, was bought with blood, guarded with blood, and preserved with blood down through the generations.

Again we are required to offer supreme sacrifices to assure that those peoples who could not create their own working democracy shall not, by force of arms, deprive us of ours.

To the millions of soldier heroes of past wars whose graves we decorate today, and to those other millions who still survive to march to the cemeteries where their comrades lie, let us offer vocally a pledge that they should not and do not really need.

We, too, are ready to keep the faith of our fathers, whatever the cost.

All people are entitled to their own opinions — but they do so seldom keep them.

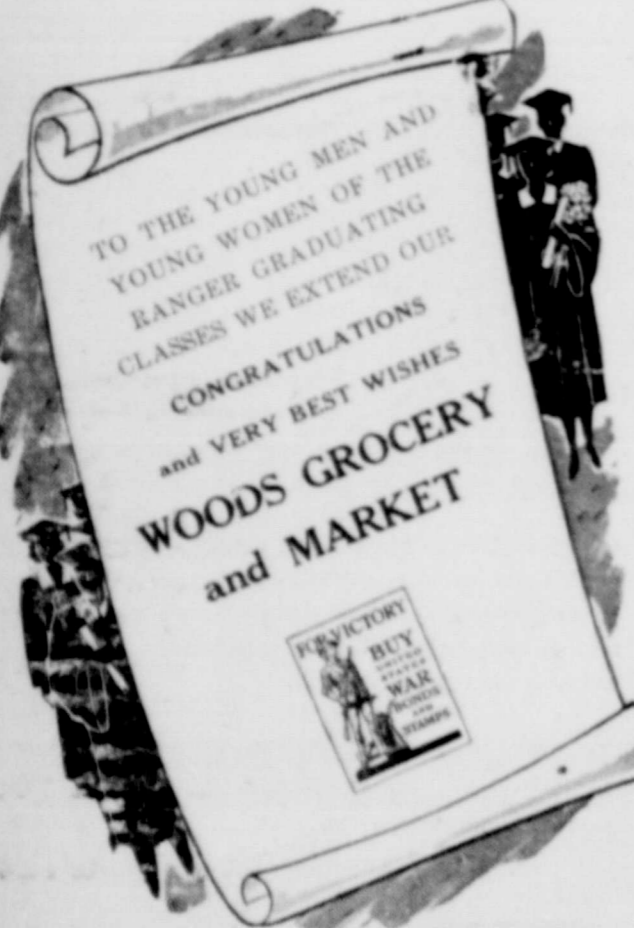

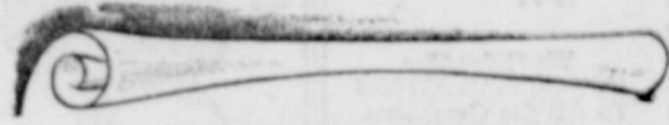
