Zip Your Lip

The lives of relatives, friends, neighbors — even of stranger Americans one never has met—make up too high a price to pay for the pleasure of gossiping.

Loose talk may continue for weeks without the slightest concrete damage. Then a bit of gossip, no more important seeming and just as innocently meant, may give the Germans or the Japs a tipoff that can result in the sinking of a ship, the death of brave men, the defeat of an important military or naval venture.

All of us know this. We intend to be discreet. But we love, most of us, to seem important. We dote on knowing inside stuff, and proving that we know, by telling it. Usually we stop to consider who it is to whom we are telling our supposed war secrets. But often we haven't the slightest idea who may be listening in.

In California, whose citizenry has been more danger conscious from the beginning than are the residents of most areas, the Monterey Peninsula folk have done an outstandingly good job at controlling this sort of dangerous gossip.

Their slogan, apt if not genteel, is Zip Your Lip. An NEA Service article told how the campaign, brain child of the Fort Ord public relations officer, was inspired because soldiers in their casual gossiping downtown were keeping the entire peninsula informed about everything that happened at the fort.

Newspapers, civic groups, radio stations, chambers of commerce, the mayors of Monterey and Salinas, telephone and telegraph companies co-operated.

As a result of this co-ordinated community effort, a complete stranger no longer can drop into Monterey or Salinas, keep his ears open, perhaps buy a drink and ask a comradely question and go away with all the information he wants about troop movements into and out of Fort Ord.

"Spilling inside dope" has ceased to be the mark of a "big shot." Instead of creating admiration for the talker's "pipelines," gossip on the Monterey Peninsula has become very bad form, an indication of ignorance or dangerous exhibitionism.

There is an idea in this Zip Your Lip campaign for Ranger. What the Monterey Peninsula did, we could do just as well.

How about an organized effort right here to silence our local chatterbugs (the Australian term—gossip is an international vice) and make sure that we shall not contribute to any axis triumphs, however small, through loose talk?

Records Show Big Change In People Because Of War

HOUSTON, Tex. — County clerk records in Harris County reflect the following changes, attributed to the war, during the first six months of 1942:

Twice as many persons are losing their minds. Fourteen times as many persons are getting birth certificates.

Only one-third as many people are buying merchandise on the installment plan.

Twenty-five per cent more estates are going into probate courts.

County Judge Roy Hofheinz gives the war full credit for the 100 per cent increase in the number of persons declared insane.

Hardly a week goes by that we do not have either a boy whose mental health could not stand the shock of being shifted from civil life into the army, or a mother, father, or wife whose mind gave way under the strain of worrying about a loved one in the armed services.

The increase in estates probated, Judge Hofheinz attributes to death of sailors from this port city and to boom-time wages that result in bequests of money from persons who normally might not leave enough money to justify a probate.

The increased demand for birth certificates results from the requirement that defense workers and persons going into other war time occupations furnish such certificates.

Birth records also are required of fishermen who go into the Gulf of Mexico on permits from the Coast Guard.

Credit restrictions caused the decline in buying "on time".

Share Cropper Is Not So Lazy A Report Indicates

AUSTIN, Tex. —Blame the plight of the Texas share-cropper on geology, not on natural shiftlessness, a University of Texas geologist advises.

"The share cropper isn't just lazy, he simply has nothing to work with," declares Dr. Hal F. Bybee, University professor of geology, who is making a study of the relationship between the economy of the state and its geology.

The productivity of Texas farm lands and the location of the state's major population centers were determined millions of years ago by geological shifts in the earth's surface, he believes. Some formations present good farming land, others do not. The share-cropper" section of the state, for example, is in a region of very poor land, which will produce little harvest despite intense cultivation.

Fiddle To Keep Up Morale Is Advice Of Choral Director

AUSTIN, Tex —Dust off the fiddle, guitar or other musical instrument and gather the neighbors around the front porch or in the school house if you want to keep up community morale, Noble Cain, nationally recognized choral director and composer, advised on a recent visit to the University of Texas.

Restriction on travel to concerts and music centers because of war conditions is going to result in a new development of music along community lines, with perhaps a revival of town bands and choruses, he predicted.

"Strange as it seems, war is somewhat of a blessing in disguise to religion and music," he said. "In times of material hardship, people turn to spiritual things, and music ranks next to religion in inspirational value—whether a person likes so-called popular music or the classics."

The rubber, estimated at the time as one-tenth of the nation's supply in storage "has become known as the largest single industrial loss in the history of our country," said Hall, "and most certainly this loss is now having its effect on our war effort."

The tremendous Normandie which was depended upon to carry thousands of American troops to war zones, is now lying on her side in the Hudson mud because of a spark from a welder's torch.

Britain could guess from her tanks that the war is being fought in the air.
