## TRIAL OF SABOTEURS TO **GO INTO NEXT WEEK SECRECY IS MAINTAINED**

WASHINGTON, July 11, (UP)-The trial of eight German saboteurs still highly secret de spite three "communiques" from the presiding seven-general milltary commission - entered its fourth day today and there were indications that it would continue at least another week.

Maj. Gen. Frank McCoy, head of the commission, emphasized injuries, a spokesman said today. that the preceedings will require considerably more time becaus of the mass evidence being prepared by both sides.

Like his previous communiques McCoy's announcements was terse leaving the public to guess at the dramatic story unfolding behind locked doors of the trial room in the closely-guarded justice de-

Nothing could be learned of evidence presented, evidence which is expected to send the eight men to their deaths.

The unyielding secrecy imposed by the commission drew a sharp friend, vs W. M. Farbce, damag-D., Okla, who charged that refusal to disclose anything beyond skeleton outlines of the proceed "violates the democratic principles for which America is

"The stiff and inadequate army communiques that suppress all news under the guise of 'withold ing military information' strains our credulity," he said. "The American people don't need to be spoon-fed to prosecute this war".
