Labor Day

Labor Day was sponsored originally by the Knights of Labor, first general trade union organization in this country, which had much more resemblance to the present-day C. I. O. than to the A. F. of L.

Quite naturally, perhaps, we have come to think of Labor Day as the particular property of those workers who are organized into trade unions—the ones of whom we speak, reverently or fearfully, as Labor with a capital "L."

But this year we are fighting a bloody war for the preservation of democracy, let's talk about democratic labor—with the small "l"—which comprises perhaps 85 or 90 per cent of those who work for a living.

Because of the shortsightedness and sometimes the selfishness of certain union officials, Labor—with the Capital "L"—has brought upon itself frequent severe denunciation.

But Labor is made up largely of laborers. And the record will show that labor—the men who actually do the work—has proven itself as actively, sacrificially patriotic as any element in our population.

Because of our geographical position, because of our vast natural resources and because of our productive capacity the anti-axis world is forced to depend on the United States for much of the material of war.

Upon the shoulders of American labor the fate of the world rests today. If labor continues to come through as it has been doing, totalitarianism can be whipped. If labor were to let down, as nobody has the right to expect that it will, then all the courage of all the soldiers and sailors of the United Nations cannot save us.

The point to be kept in mind is that democracy depends upon American Labor, not American Labor. The first, without the capital "L," includes the 85 per cent who are not unionized, plus probably 99 per cent of those who do belong to unions.

The boys in the front lines look for their weapons and munitions to the men at the machines—not to the relatively few union officials who show an inclination sometimes to forget that this is not their private war.

The men behind the machines are you and us, the folks with whom we brush shoulders on the street, in buses and trolleys and elevators.

Give them a chance to speak for themselves, and those millions are as willing to sacrifice for the preservation of democracy as any loud-voiced street-corner orator.

So on Labor Day this year let's forget that the first Monday in September used to be dedicated to Labor, and in the brief moment that we can spare from production for war, let us remember that labor should not be branded for the sins of a few of its self-proclaimed oracles.

U. S. Will Honor The Memory Of Gen Simon Bolivar

WASHINGTON (UP)—One of the most ambitious projects ever undertaken in the United States to honor the memory of General Simon Bolivar, the great South American liberator, is being worked out by various government agencies, private groups and representatives of the Bolivarian countries.

The plan include the production of a motion picture based on the life Bolivar and a series of pageants to be held in the 47 states. According to present plans, the movie will be made at one of the largest studios in Hollywood, Melvyn Douglas, who is now serving the government as art director of the Office of Civilian Defense, will direct the pageant.

Two famous authorities on Bolivar, Doctor Manuel Segundo Sanchez, one of the world's foremost authorities on Bolivarians and member of the Academy of History of Venezuela—a native of that country who lives in the United States—and Doctor John Crane, the biographer of Bolivar, will assist in the production of the motion picture as historical consultants. Dr. Crane, who also is author of the book, "Don Pedro of Brazil," is at present collaborating with the Motion Picture Office of the coordinator of Inter American Affairs, the Inter-American Affairs office is taking an active interest in the movie and other events being arranged to honor Bolivar.

The picture is expected to go into production shortly. Those who are interested in the project hope that it will be ready for distribution to the nation's thousands of motion picture houses in the winter.

Plans for the pageant to be held throughout the country already are well advanced. In addition to Bolivar, other great heroes of the Americas, like San Martin, O'Higgins and Washington will be featured.

The town of Bolivar, Missouri, named after the liberator, will be a focal point of the observances. A statue of Bolivar, presented to the town by the government of Venezuela will be unveiled, probably sometime this year or early in 1943. It is hoped that the premiere of the movie can be held simultaneously in Bolivar, Missouri, and Washington.

There are eight other United States towns named after Bolivar. Another indication of the growing interest in the life and history of Latin America is the issuance of a series of booklets to be known as the American Patriot Series, on the heroes of the sister republics. The booklets were prepared by Dr. Crane in collaboration with Dr. Curtis Wigfus, Professor of Hispanic American History at the George Washington University here. Six booklets have been published to date, including one dealing with Bolivar's life. Others are devoted to General San Martin of Argentina, General Washington of the United States, General Miranda, the forerunner of South American independence, the first president of Bolivia and the great Brazilian patriarch of independence, Jose Bonifacio.

These booklets will be translated into Spanish and Portuguese and distributed through educational and other channels in Latin America, as well as in the United States. Each booklet is sponsored by the respective embassy or legation of the American republic in the United States.

"Food For Victory" Is Theme For Show

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UP)—The national Percheron, Red Polled and Shropshire livestock shows will be held at the Minnesota State Fair. Military needs for wool and nutmeg make the Shropshire show an important feature, officials say. The theme of the fair is "Food for Victory." More than \$80,000 of the \$150,000 premiums to be awarded this year will be given to livestock and poultry entries.
