
Unless the courses have been added this year in other colleges, the only major universities teaching Portuguese are Texas, Harvard, California and Wisconsin.

Ranger V-Mail Is In New Guinea In Just Two Weeks

Mrs. H. L. Quinn of Ranger, mother of Sgt. Roten F. Quinn, who is now stationed in New Guinea, has found out that the new V-mail service is really fast. She has received a letter from her son in answer to one written Sept. 12 and which was received in New Guinea on Oct. 1.

The letter from Sgt. Quinn, which contains many interesting side lights on life and conditions in the far-away country, reads as follows:

"Dear Mother:

"Received your V-mail letter today. That was fast service. You mailed it Sept. 13 and I received it Oct. 1st. How about writing me a V-mail letter about once a week and also send me an ordinary letter once or twice a week."

"No, I have not met the Lt. Herring (Lt. Robert Ray Herring of Ranger) that you were speaking about. I have been to AFQ 923 though. As a matter of fact I have traveled as much in Australia as I have in the United States. I have been in most all the large cities in Australia.

"By the way I am now in British New Guinea. This is not much of a country up here. A lot of jungles and mountains. There are no white people living here.

All busy-headed black natives. The natives don't wear much clothes. They wear nothing above the waist. That includes women too. When I was going to school I used to see pictures of black natives in history and geography but didn't realize I would some day see them in person. The natives don't speak English very well. They are fond of the American soldiers. There are a lot of bananas and coconuts growing here."

1-A Men May Still Join Navy Recruiter Says

D. L. Fenter of the U. S. Navy Recruiting station in Eastland explains that the Navy is accepting men who have already received their 1-A classification and their final orders for induction.

Fenter states that this is a point that should be made clear because there are men going in under the draft who would prefer the Navy to other branches of service but are under the false impression that after induction orders are received they must accept the army route.

The U. S. Navy receives its men only as volunteers and we all know that a man makes a better record and is better satisfied if he is allowed to pick his branch of service.

Enlistments are still open in the construction regiment as well as general service with the fleet for those who wish to take advantage of them. It is hoped that men in this area between the ages of 17 and 30 will give this serious consideration as the time approaches to enter the armed services.

The Eastland Navy Recruiting Station is open six days each week from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. for volunteers.

NITRO GLYCERIN FOR BRAZIL TO BE MADE HERE BY H. A. RAPP

Texas Will Lead In Air After The War Expert Says

J. A. Rapp, owner of the Lone Star Torpedo Company of Ranger, has closed a contract with Brazil to manufacture fifty tons of high-explosive to be used in the Brazilian National Defense effort.

Rapp, has been a manufacturer of high-explosives for the past 20 years. He is a pioneer oil well shooter and has shot thousands of wells throughout the oil country.

Until Pearl Harbor he made explosives to be used in shooting oil and gas wells, but after the outbreak of hostilities he began negotiating with the Brazilian Embassy to make high explosives for the Brazilian Government, and after several months of negotiations, the deal has been closed. The amount of the consideration was not announced, but it is understood that it will run well into five figures.

Rapp will manufacture the explosives in his nitro-glycerin factory located near Leroy on the Eastland-Stephens County line. The explosives will be shipped to a Gulf Port, either Houston or New Orleans and will go from there by boat to Rio de Janeiro.

Rapp stated that work would begin immediately on manufacturing these explosives, which is probably the first war order for material to be filled in Eastland County.

SOUTH AFRICAN PREIMER TELLS PARLIAMENT NOW IS TIME FOR NEW FRONT

Speech, Which Is Unique in Annals of English Parliament, Came After Consultation with Prime Minister Churchill And After Extensive Allied Air Attacks in Middle East

DRAFTING OF MANPOWER IS BEING URGED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 21 (UPI)—Chairman Paul V. McNutt of the War Manpower Commission, told the Senate Military Affairs Committee today that national service legislation is "inevitable," but "the question of timing" is up to President Roosevelt.

At a hearing on the pending manpower bills, McNutt said that each had failed to meet one or more of the basic requirements for such legislation, and that with in two weeks the management-labor policy committee would submit legislative proposals to the President.

Pointing out that 6,500 local draft boards have authority only to supply men to the armed services and that they have no control over their assignment of manpower when we are short."

WHITE COLLAR WORKERS HELP IN CANNERRIES

PORLTAND, Ore. (UP)—The call of the cannery, latest siren song of the nation's emergency effort, has lured workers from offices, stores, and banks to build up an auxiliary shirt-sleeve labor pool to help shore up next winter's food.

With their white collars laid aside for the duration, the first emergency crew reported to the Libby McNeil & Libby Co. plant here along with three United States employment service officials who said they "wouldn't recommend for Portland anything we wouldn't do ourselves."

But the "white collars" and the housewives are doing fine, according to K. C. Hardwick of San Francisco, who joined other cannery officials in inspection of the new cannery.

"Office workers seem to adapt themselves quickly to this type of job," Hardwick declared, adding that housewives are exceedingly welcome too."

Women's jobs include belt work, operation of peeling machines, trimming by hand and canning while men on short-shift work with hand trucks, unload cans, operate can sealers and do general warehouse work.





Q. What are the principal trades, or ratings in the U. S. Navy and what are the general duties required of men with these ratings?

A. BOATSWAIN'S MATE and COXSWAIN: Leading deck petty officers. Seamanship. GUNNER'S MATE: Operating and upkeep of all types of guns and

The care and operation of torpedoes which are the principal weapons of the destroyer and submarine. QUARTERMASTER: An assistant to the Navigator who

pilots the ship. SIGNALMAN: Specialists with flags, semaphore, flaking light. FIRE CONTROL MAN: The operation and upkeep of the mechanisms that control gun fire. ELECTRICIAN'S MATE: All types of electrical work. RADIONAUT: Wireless telegraphy. CARPENTER'S MATE: All types of woodworking. PATTERNMAKER: Carpentry and pattern-making—some knowledge of molding. SHIPFITTER: Metal working—plumbing. PRINTER: Operation of printing shops; PAINTER: Painting, staining, varnishing, etc. MACHINIST'S MATE: Operation of ship's propelling machinery, and machine shop work. WATER TENDER: Operation of boilers. BOILERMAKER: Upkeep and repair of boilers aboard ship. MOLDER: Foundry

practice. METALSMITH: The working of iron, steel, copper, brass and similar metals. YEOMAN: Typing, stenography and clerical.

STOREKEEPER: Care and accounting of issue of stores. PHARMACIST'S MATE: Assistant to medical and dental officers. MUSICIAN: Member of band. COMMISSARY STEWARD AND SHIP'S COOK: Preparation of menus and cooking of food. AVIATION RATINGS: There are ratings in the aviation branch of the Navy for some of the specialists enumerated above.

It is understood, of course, that these special duties are additional and subordinate to the general Naval duties which require that all men in the U. S. Navy be good men-of-war men.

Q. How did "Rear" Admiral come to be a rank in the U. S. Navy?

A. The title of Rear Admiral was first given to divisional commanders of reserve fleets. Hence the inference of Reserve, or "In

the Rear."

Q. Does a U. S. Naval Reserve receive any kind of recommendation from the Navy when his period of service has ended?

A. Upon satisfactory completion of any period of active service other than training duty, a member of the Naval Reserve is furnished a certificate to that effect, over the signature of his commanding officer. This certificate includes a record of any special proficiency or merit attained by him. Enlisted men who are eligible for an honorable and good discharge are entitled to a certificate of satisfactory service.

Q. Are men in the U. S. Navy given medical attention at sea?

A. Yes. Slight injuries and sickness are taken care of aboard fighting ships. More serious cases can be handled aboard the U. S. S. Relief, specially built hospital ship. More than four hundred and eighty-one major operations were

performed aboard the U. S. S. Relief in a single year and nearly fourteen thousand laboratory examinations were made in addition

to thousands of physiotherapy treatments and X-ray examinations. The equipment aboard this ship parallels that of the most up-to-date hospital on land.

Q. How did the Sailor's Horn-Pipe get its name?

Flax Acreage To Hit A New High

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—Despite a shortage of seed, flax acreage will hit a new high in Texas this year, Bob Miller of the state Agriculture department believes.

Planting, just started, is expected to last until the last bit of Rio and Golden variety seed is exhausted.

The linseed oil from flax, needed in paints, has made this crop one of the vital war-production materials. This, and a high price for the product, makes it one of the best winter crops in the state.

Miller estimated that approximately 11,000 acres were planted last year.

Disease wiped out practically the entire flax crop in 1940 and farmers since have changed over from the Bison variety to the Rio

variety. The Rio is expected to cause many farmers to plant much of their usual cotton acreage in flax this year. Normal harvest of the crop is in April and March.

Many other states are experiencing the plight Texas faced two years ago and are changing over from the Bison and other flax varieties to Rio and Golden. California recently purchased 180,000 pounds of this type seed in Texas.
