





Bullock was renamed 118th District representative without opposition, and a brief summary of his legislative record follows:





NEA Service Staff Writer ERY scrap of food is impor tant. Waste nothing. A few pieces of cheese, some snips of lam, sections of fruit, are all valiable foods. Refrigerate them well and use not as leftovers, but is "food on hand." That's the way to keep your family well fed despite rationing and high costs and earcity due to transportation and abor shortage. abor shortage.

These simple gelatine salacuse leftovers deliciously.

Ham Cheesettes (Serves 4 to 6)

Che quarter cup cold water, 1-2 can condensed tomato soup, 1 en-relope plain gelatine, 1-2 package

relope plain gelatine, 1-2 package ream cheese 1-4 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, 1 tablespoon iemon juice, 1 cup ground leftover boiled or baked ham.

Combine soup with 1-2 cup water and heat. Soften gelatine in cold water and dissolve in hot soup. Mash is seand blend in mustard and remon juice. Add soup to cheese mixture, slowly, stirring constantly. Cool; when mixture begins to thicken, fold in mayonnaise or salad dressing and ground ham. Turn into individual molds that have first been rivsed in cold water. Chill Unmold on crisp salad greens and 'erve with extra dressing.

Small pieces of canned or frest fruit, leftovers from other meals can be used in this salad.

Cottage Cheese Mold With Fruit

Cottage Cheese Mold With Fruit (Serves 6 to 8)

One envelope plain gelatine, 1-4 cup cold water, 2 cups cottage cheese, 3-4 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon paprika, 1 tablespoon lemor juice, 1-2 cup cream or whole milk, 2 cups diced fruits.

Soften gelatine in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Mast cheese very fine or put through sieve. Add seasonings, cream of milk, and dissolved gelatine. Turk milk, and dissolved gelatine. Turn into individual ring molds (or one larger one) that have been rinsed in cold water. Chill. Unmold or salad and fill centers with dice
