## BRITISH EIGHTH ARMY ENGAGES ROMMEL IN A MAJOR TANK CONFLICT

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Memory of America's war dead in the first World War will be honored here on Saturday Nov. 21, when everyone will be asked to wear a memorial poppy in tribute to their service and sacrifice.

Plans for the observance of Poppy Day are being completed by the Carl Barnes Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary under the leadership of Mrs. Lea Duckery, Poppy Day chairman. The memorial flowers, made by disabled war veterans, will be offered on the streets throughout the day by the Auxiliary women.

"This year, with the shadow of a New World War falling on America, the memorial poppy has new significance," said Mrs. Duckery. "It shows that America still remembers and honors those who fell in its defense twenty-three years ago; that America's still believe that America's free way of life is worth any sacrifice, and that the spirit of patriotism still burns strongly in American hearts."

"The poppies grew on the battle front in France where young men of America defeated the military might of autocracy in a gallant display of the strength of a roused democracy. When we wear them on Poppy Day, their bright red blooms will remind us that our democracy has the strength to repel any dangers if we will serve as they served. There is inspiration for us all in the poppy of great memories."

"The poppies which the Auxiliary will distribute here have been made by disabled veterans at Legion Hospital at Legion, Texas. All Poppy Day workers will serve as volunteers and all the money contributed to them for the flowers will go into the welfare fund of the Auxiliary to carry forward the Auxiliary's work for the disabled, their families and the families of the dead during the year ahead."

The Imperial 8th Army today engaged a large force of Marshal Erwin Rommel's tanks in a big battle which may determine whether the Allied effort to oust the Axis from North Africa will develop according to schedule.

Reports from the African battlefronts and the Axis radio left little doubt that the battle now raging is the largest scale encounter of armored forces since the start of Lt. Gen. Bernard Montgomery's offensive 11 days back.

Both tanks and infantry were thrown into the battle by both sides. Scene of the engagement was an irregular area extending south from the Mediterranean toward the Rewalut ridge in an area somewhat west of the original Alamein line positions.

Thus far the desert battle has been fought almost entirely in the Alamein area without the customary wide-ranging maneuvers of African desert warfare.

It was believed this conformed to the British plan of battles designed to force Rommel to fight at the end of his long communications line while the British fight only a few miles forward from their big Egyptian bases of supply.

The British objectives, it is known, is primarily the destruction of Rommel's army, particularly the armored elements. Annihilation of the Axis forces would enable the Imperials to sweep forward along the North African coast in an effort to carry out the long frustrated objective of mopping-up Libya and all the Axis bases on the African coast.

The outcome of the present combat was not yet indicated. Axis reports admitted that the Afrika Korps had suffered substantial losses and that the British were attacking in great force.

## Jap Ship Losses In Solomons Is Reported Large

WASHINGTON, D. C. (UP)—Latest information brought to Washington personally by Vice Admiral Robert L. Ghormley indicated the Japanese lost three cruisers and five destroyers in the engagement between the Japanese and American fleets on the night of Oct. 11-12 near Savo Island in the Solomons. Secretary of Navy Frank Knox disclosed at his press conference today.

## Stolen Clothing Is Recovered As Youth Is Jailed

Chief of Police Lee Ames of Ranger reported today that a youth who was formerly employed in the Ranger-NYA Work Training Shops and had been arrested and missing clothing and a suit case, previously reported stolen, had been recovered.

The youth was from Winters, Chief Ames stated, and after leaving the NYA in Ranger, was sought at his home there. Later he was found in Ranger and placed under arrest.

He readily admitted taking a suitcase and some khaki clothing belonging to one of the NYA youths, Chief Ames stated. All the stolen articles were reported recovered.

No charges had been filed against the youth, Chief Ames stated.

## CONSTRUCTION OF A LONE STAR PLANT IS TO START HERE SOON

Officials of the Gasoline Plant Construction Corporation are now in Ranger, doing preliminary work toward construction of a fractionating unit for the Lone Star which is to be built here.

Actual construction work is expected to start by the first of next week, with most of the labor being hired locally, representatives of the company stated today.

The unit, when completed, will take natural gasoline from Breckenridge and other Lone Star plants in the West Texas area and process it into isobutane, normal butane, isopentane, normal and heavier hydrocarbons.

Isobutane and isopentane are used for blending with other refinery stocks to make aviation gasoline of the 90 and 100 octane grade.

Directing the Lone Star Gasoline Company operations on the project will be Harry Wheelon, assistant superintendent and John Kinley, superintendent of the Lone Star Gasoline Company's Ranger district.

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"The Welfare Department has no control over its income. Old Age Assistance financing provisions are set by law. State law provides an appropriation of \$1,750,000 monthly in the Old Age Assistance Fund. All money now being disbursed in excess of this amount comes from federal grants to the state."

Since the state waived consideration of the ability of relatives to support aged applicants, the rolls have made a net gain from 122,959 in January, 1941, to the estimated 182,000 now eligible. A small percentage of these were not being supported by relatives when eligibility was established.

This group has added approximately \$1,200,000 per month to the cost of Old Age Assistance in Texas. The rolls and costs have mounted steadily each month since legalization of the law by the 47th legislature and applicants continue to come in.

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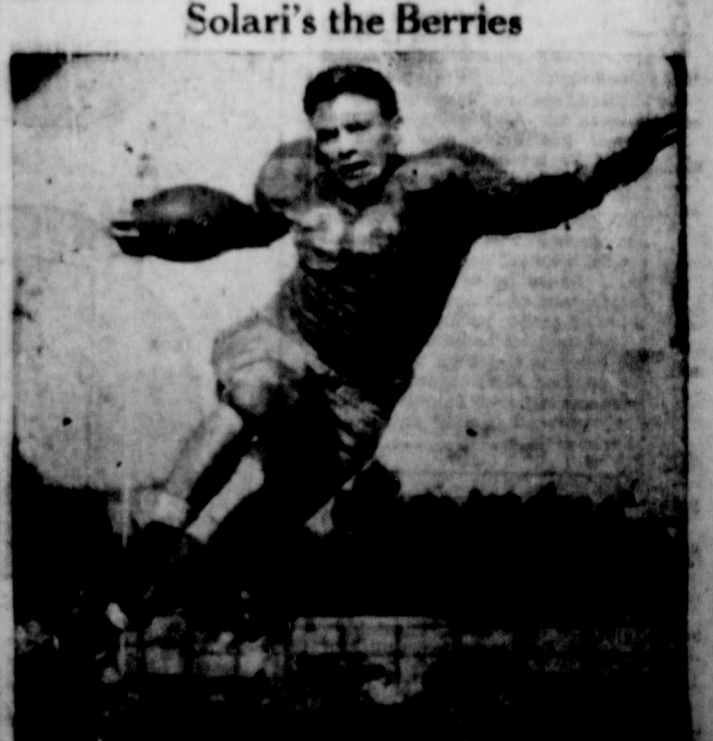

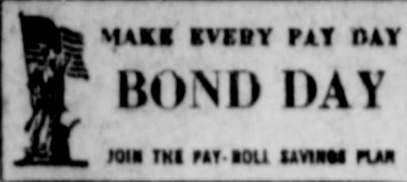

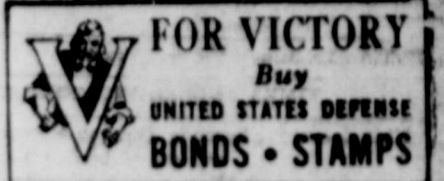

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## Former Resident Of County Dies At San Benito

J. H. Davis, 85, former Eastland county resident, died at his home at San Benito on Oct. 29.

Born April 22, 1857, at Blue Ridge, Georgia, the son of William H. and Kate Davis, came to Texas with his parents in 1884, settling in Eastland.

On Dec. 14, 1902, Davis was married to Miss Ella Work at Eastland to which union three children, all of whom survive, born. These are Howard and Maurice Davis and Mrs. Loretta Kingmire.

Davis was made a master Mason by Judge D. K. Scott, who now resides at Cisco, and Will Calhoun (deceased) and others in 1890 in the old courthouse in Eastland. He moved his membership to San Benito in 1925, where he received his 50 year service pin about two years ago.

From 1884 to the latter part of 1886 when the 1886-7 drought struck Eastland county, Davis had farmed. At that time he entered the employment of the Texas & Pacific railroad on the Fort Worth and El Paso division serving there until he married and moved to his farm near Ranger. He later moved to Ranger and in 1917 moved to Plainview. After his wife's death in Eastland county he gave up active work and spent his time looking after his interests in the County. In 1925 he moved to San Benito.

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Officials of the hospital were notified and three guards arrived Sunday morning to take the man back to Fort Worth. While the three guards were eating the man set fire to the bedding in his cell and again put up a struggle when the guards attempted to remove him and put out the fire. The struggle ended, Chief Ames stated today, when the man struck his head against a cell door after four men had struggled for some time to get the handcuffs on him. He was taken to a Ranger hospital for treatment before being returned to Fort Worth.

Although Chief Ames described the man as being of slight build and weighing about 130 pounds, the three guards and Chief Ames had difficulty in putting handcuffs on him so he could be removed from the jail cell.

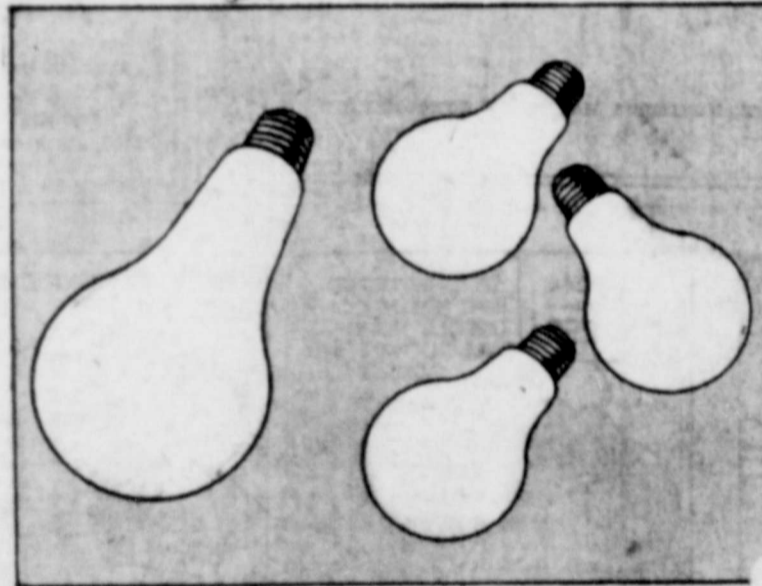

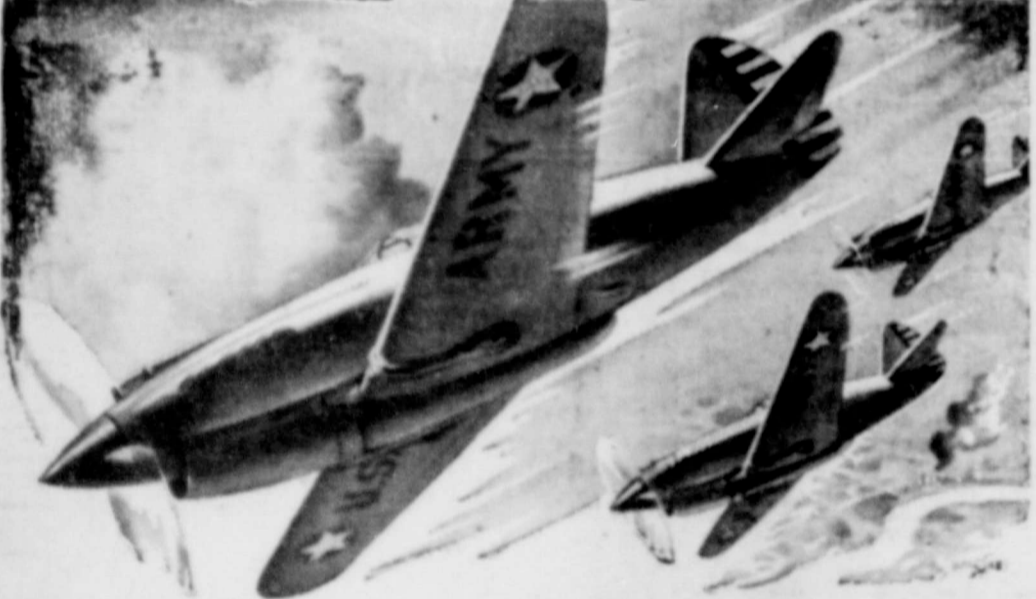
