

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American-Made Planes

Evidence is accumulating that American-made bombers and fighters really are good, and that the violent criticism to which they were subjected for a time was erroneous.

It has been difficult to get at the truth because so many of the pertinent facts were held to be military secrets. Some of them unquestionably should not be discussed. Others were held back, apparently, through that same excess of secretivness which in other fields and on other occasions has proved unecessary, unjustifiable and harmful to the national morale.

Now, stung by criticism, American brass hats have permitted publication of data comparable to what the British never held back. In the light of that in formation, experts, are able to say that the later American planes are at least as good as their counterparts in England, Germany and Japan.

If our planes were as bad as rumor said, then we could not help wondering whether our pilots and their crews being destroyed wholesale. But the fact is that on every front our planes have taken toll of the enemy two, three

American pilots are good. None are better. We can be excused if we feel that none are quite so good. But man for man. American flyers are not three are four times as good as German and Japanese flyers. They are not enough better to inflict the damage they have unless their planes were supstantially as good as the enemy's.

time cut down on the effi-iency of the home front. Injured nembers of the family slow down war work and threaten morale. Let's prevent all accidents in the citchen. Study the following theck list and apply it where you

Keep windows closed or shielded so as not to cause draft that cause falls. Be particularly careful when cooking to prevent hot at and boiling water from falling on you. In washing dishes, watch out for chipped plates, knives and sharp forks. Always dry hands before touching electrical equipnent to prevent possibility of

lectric shock.
Use gloves when polishing silver and using cleaners to prevent any harm to skin. Hold bread-knives carefully to avoid cutting

Carefully check all electrical connections to make sure plugs and wires are in good condition. Check on electric refrigerators, toasters, mixers and other appli-ances to be sure they are in first-

ances to be sure they are in first-class working condition.

Do not store rags, mops and brooms in closets containing in-flammable materials, such as cleaning fluids, benzine, wax and polishes. This will prevent spon-taneous combustion.

Use firm stepladders, not chairs, in taking foods from high closets. Keep matches away from reach of children. Keep kitchen floors

free from grease.

In other words, run the Seventh Column out of your kitchen. Prevent all possible accidents by intelligent planning and care as you cook the family meals. The question then resolves itself into whether the Army goals have been set too high.
