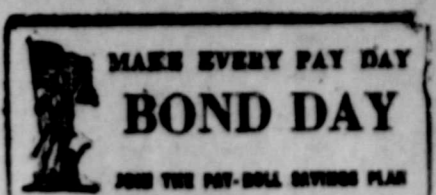

## 2000 WEATHERFORD FANS TO FOLLOW TEAM HERE FOR GRID GAME TODAY

Today is not just Thanksgiving Day, or turkey day, in Ranger game books as one that may afford Ranger football game the game everyone in Ranger, and in Weatherford, too, has been waiting for the past year.

It probably won't be a day of Thanksgiving for at least one coach, and at least one football team, by the end of the day, because the losers, though they may be thankful for many things, probably won't be so happy over the outcome of the game.

All indications are that there want be enough people left in Weatherford by game time to celebrate even a Thanksgiving Day, and many a turkey dinner will be held over until the evening meal. For Weatherford has sent word that 2,000 fans will follow the team to Ranger for the newly-generated team rivalry, that has all the earmarks of equaling, if not surpassing, the ancient Cisco-Ranger rivalry.

Already Breckenridge has taken all the glamour out of the Breckenridge-Ranger games, that once were the classics of the Oil Belt, and the traditional Thanksgiving game has been a thing of the past for several years. But now the Weatherford-Ranger game looms as one that may even in time, outstrip those other hotly-contested games of the past.

There is no doubt in either of the two towns that both teams have been "pointing" toward this game, not only for the past week, but for the entire season. It promises to be a game fought so hard that breaks may play an important part in the outcome, since the teams are fairly evenly matched, with Weatherford having a slight edge. On paper it appears that Weatherford should win by one or two touchdowns, but the determination of the Bulldogs to avenge the 18 to 0 loss at Weatherford last year will have a marked bearing on the outcome of the game.

Coach H. E. Wishard, coach of Weatherford High School, will have five lettermen in his lineup. They are Calvin Wren, 135 pound back; 145 pound back who is not expected to start; Roy Turner, 165 pound guard; E. Layman, 143 pound back and Hubert Grafft, 167 pound center and captain of the team.

The Weatherford line will average 158 pounds, while the back field average is 141 pounds. The Bulldogs will put a heavier team on the field than will the visitors, and will likely have more lettermen.

Although Coach Scruggs has not announced his starting lineup it is likely to consist of Mitchell, 185 and Harbin, 152 ends; C. Dabbs, 202 and Hagar, 174 or Oyler, 200, at tackles; Johnson, 165 and Williams, 162 guards; Edwards, 148, center; Houghton, 145; Gray, 175, N. Dabbs, 165 and Elder, 185, backs.

Coach Wishard has announced that he will likely start Roberts, 155 and Hensley, 135 at ends; Dee Layman, 160 and Lee Layman, 150 at tackles; Turner, 165 and West, 165 at the guard positions; Grafft, 167, at center; Wren, 135; Grogan, 145; E. Layman, 143 and Jackson, 145 in the backfield.

## Sues To Recover Engagement Ring

TOPEKA, Kansas, Nov. —(UP)—R. C. Lienbach brought suit against the estate of his late fiancée, Miss Anna Belle Sage, to recover a diamond ring he had given her during a 28-year courtship. He said they became engaged in 1914, and he gave her the ring in 1922. They hadn't married when Miss Sage died last June.

Germany's grip on South Russia and the Nazi foothold in the Caucasus appeared to be threatened today by big Soviet offensives that were splintering the whole web of German defense post, and the communications from Stalingrad to the great bend of the Don River, 100 miles to the west of Stalingrad.

Three separate Red Army columns were knitting through the highway connections between the Don River and the Nazi siege force before Stalingrad. German casualties were estimated at more than 100,000 men and the entire army of 250,000 men on the Stalingrad siege lines are threatened with encirclement.

Two Russian columns were converging on the Don River bend west of Stalingrad. From this position they could strike southwest toward Rostov in an effort to isolate the entire German army in the Caucasus.

The beleaguered defenders of Stalingrad were reported to be storming from their barricades in buildings and shattered streets, thrusting the Nazis back at several points, while from the north a Russian column broke through the German lines on the west bank of the Volga River and contacted the city defenders.

Both the Russian and British sources credited the Allied offensive in North Africa with opening the way for the sudden Soviet blow.

London reports said that heavy transfers of Nazi planes from Russia to the threatened Mediterranean was underway, and that this was aiding the Russian air force in protecting the advancing ground troops.

Reports from North Africa were scant again today.

However it was apparent that major efforts were underway by both sides to bring in air reinforcements preliminary to an Allied attack to drive the Germans from Bizerte and Tunis.

Some reports suggested that the Nazis had put sufficient troops ashore to reinforce their positions on the Tunisia east coast.

Growing Italian strain was emphasized by a broadcast from the Nazi radio in Paris, which reported that the remaining 19-year olds had been called for military service. Reports from dip lomats reaching Turkey said that rumors were circulating in North Africa concerning a possible military coup and a separate peace.

## SCRAP HUNT ON FARMS IS BEING URGED

A telegram received today from Donald M. Nelson, head of the War Production Board, urged all farmers to dedicate the remaining weeks of 1942 to an intensified scrap hunt.

The urgent need for scrap to go into war materials is the reason for the plea to farmers to aid in this war effort.

Nelson's telegram reads as follows:

"The government is making the American farmer to dedicate the remaining weeks of 1942 to an intensified scrap hunt.

"Steel mills need far more of the best sources of this type of metal. We need your further help. Use farm drive, and in aiding our salvage committees to continue this effort throughout the next few weeks.

"All salvage committees are being instructed to continue to make available to the farmer all their transportation facilities and manpower, and to cooperate in every way possible.

"The nation is looking to the American Farmer. I am sure he will come through. (signed) "Donald M. Nelson."

What this country needs right now is day clubs full night work.

Judge Has Idea For Keeping Men 'Down On Farm'

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP) — H. T. Brown, the Cherokee county judge, has made a suggestion to the State Highway Department which may help "keep 'em down on the farm," at least between crop seasons during the war.

from the Neches river to a point west of Alto. Work has not started because labor and materials are scarce.

Judge Brown then suggested that the road be built this winter, after crops are harvested, by men who live in the vicinity. It would, he said, eliminate the off season for farm workers and take away their yearning for a salaried job in some city or town.

When spring planting time comes around, said the Judge, the road work could be suspended until the crops are laid by again.

FRENCH possessions in the Western Hemisphere are again in the limelight as a result of the North African occupation by U. S. troops. The strategic possessions are St. Pierre and Miquelon, islands just south of Newfoundland, Martinique and Guadeloupe in the eastern Caribbean, and French Guiana on the northern coast of South America.

Most valuable of the possessions is Martinique. In the harbor of its capital, Fort de France, are a French naval aircraft carrier, 100 American-made planes, two cruisers and 140,000 tons of merchant ships.

The planes, hot stuff in 1940, are now probably obsolete. The battleships have been immobilized and their ammunition removed. The ships have only enough crews, fuel and equipment to keep them from deteriorating. Their escape is impossible, but there has been considerable pressure on the United States to move in on the island and seize it. The Free French in particular would like to see the island stocks turned over to them.

THE United States, however, has been content to make sure that the island was not used by the Vichy French or indirectly by the Germans.

In spite of a constant watch, there have been charges that the island were being used by the Nazis. One U. S. destroyer, the Blakeley, was twice torpedoed near Martinique, though it escaped sinking. That was last May 20 and 28. On May 30 a U. S. naval patrol plane was credited with sinking a submarine off Martinique.

Most sensational event in the island's war record followed the sinking of a tanker off Martinique on Feb. 20. Next day a Nazi submarine in the harbor at Fort de France to send ashore an officer who had developed a gangrenous leg. The sub was in the harbor only half an hour, but out of that incident grew charges that the T-boat had taken on fresh water supplies.

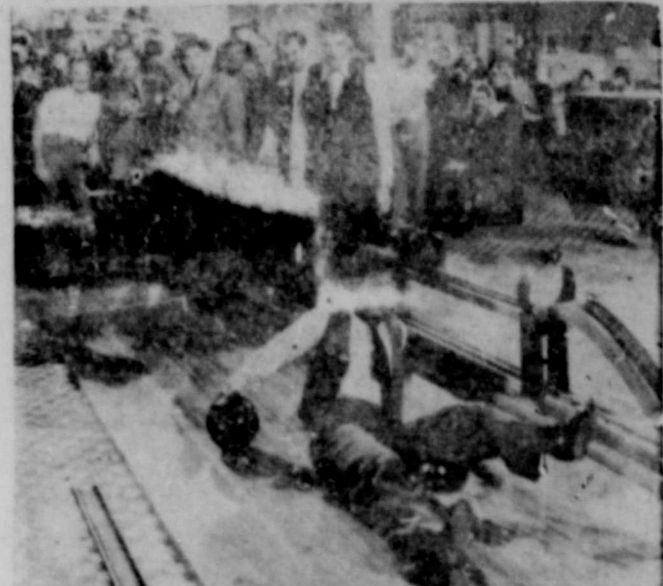

### Major Tells How Jeep Ran Through Occupied Area

By Walter Loran, United Press Staff Correspondent, FORT LYAUTEY, Moduco, (UP) Delayed—Major Pierpoint M. Hamilton of New York told today how he and the late Col.

John (Nick) Crow of Charlottesville, Va., rode a jeep through French lines in a 1914 effort to prevent a breakthrough.

Hamilton and Crow were cited by Maj. Gen. George S. Patton, for their bravery.

The jeep was driven by Pvt. Orris Correy of Ewart, Mich., and carried American and French white flags. They decided to try the heavily fortified river mouth in the hope of meeting the French commander immediately.

They reached the jetty at dawn under fire, and as soon as the shelling and strafing slackened somewhat, started driving through the French lines, literally under the guns of a factory.

Stopping by a battery, they asked a French lieutenant for a guide, but he said he already was short of men and could not spare one.

With their flags flying they went on for several miles. Then a machine gun 30 yards away opened up with a prolonged burst, killing Crow. Hamilton leaped out, picked up his body, put it in the jeep and demanded to be taken to the commander. His anger was such that French officers quickly obeyed.

The French commander was most sympathetic when he learned that Crow had been killed, but said he couldn't stop the firing because he was under orders from above.

### Legal Service Is Offered Free For Aviation Cadets

SAN ANTONIO AVIATION CADET CENTER, Tex. (UP)—Young aviation cadets stationed here worry little over their troubles—that is to say—their legal troubles.

Free service by the Legal Aid Clinic is given the cadets once a week by members of the San Antonio Bar Association, who take time at making the weekly visits to the center.

These legal minds make wills, arrange divorces, assist Cupid at times and answer all manner of questions, legal and otherwise. Nothing is too trivial for them to handle, for the matter might be all-important to the "client" who probably is a thousand more miles from home.

Sometimes as many as 50 cadets and enlisted men seek aid in a single afternoon.

One would expect to find a lawyer here. His "wife" had told him that her husband, a sergeant in a foreign port, was dead. Legal aid checked with war office authorities and found the sergeant had not been listed on any casualty reports. In due time the soldier's wife was told.

They worked out one problem by mail. A cadet here wanted to marry his sweetheart in Panama. It was worked out by using a proxy and the sailing was just as legal as if both of them had

stood before one of the chaplains and signed the papers.

Another had left his car with a dealer at home. The dealer was to sell it, keep the \$150 payment due, and pay the balance to the soldier's mother. The mother had called the dealer nine times without result. A busy investigation showed the dealer had sold the car sometime before. The soldier's mother got her money promptly.

...was vigorously echoed yesterday at the San Angelo Army Air Field bombardier school. "On the extermination of Japanese military government and its vicious treachery can assure in any measure the winning of this war and the permanence of any peace in the Pacific," Capt. Frank M. Tobin, sub-depot commander at the bombardier school and for years an American commercial representative in Japan, declares. Years of experience as Japanese sales manager of a large commercial organization of the United States brought Capt. Tobin face to face with the ruthless methods of Japanese business combines and their hard-glove militarist cliques. "No effect is ever too great for a Japanese," the captain said, "to guard a Japanese commercial or military innovation. No treachery is dishonorable if it promotes Japanese interests at the expense of American, British or other foreign investors and businessmen."

Typical of the unlimited precautions the Japanese take, he related, is the conveyance of an ocean liner into any Japanese harbor. Police boats meet each ship long before it nears the port, he said. Immigration officials board the ship and immediately herd every passenger into a central saloon, away from portholes and decks. No exception is allowed; even the sick are shunted at once from their beds to the selected concentration center of the liner, he said.

"Cameras are seized on sight

unless they are properly cased, and even then a guard stands at the elbow of any traveler in possession of a camera," the captain said.

From the roof of his office building in Tokyo where the captain was watching the approach of the Graf Zeppelin on its round-the-world flight, he suddenly turned to see a full flight of Japanese pursuit planes speeding for the ship. They seemed recklessly at it in a determined effort to sweep it from its course. The Zeppelin's navigator and commander, Dr. Hugo Eckener, had made the mistake of charting his ship's course over the palace grounds of the Emperor, scared even from the heavens above.

American products, results of the ingenuity and years of effort of American producers and inventors were brought up immediately by government sanctioned commercial interests, the captain said. Copies are made even to the label, "made in Dayton" or "made in Kokomo," and sold at once on the market at a price much lower than American industry plus Japanese duties would permit the American products to be sold.

"The inviolable trade mark of a commodity, respected and honored in every other nation, is con-

sidered like a sacred thing and offered to the duplicate Japanese commodity," Capt. Tobin related.

Capt. Tobin won the winner of the RAF, was in the First World War. As a service award given by a friendly nation, the RAF wings are admitted to be worn on the uniform of an officer of the U. S. Army.

"Japanese are virtually a 'race,'" Capt. Tobin continued, "and they must be treated as such. Their habitual use of every available source of energy explains to me why they can copy and undersell foreign business men. They have respect for neither honor nor humaneness. That a scorcher, like the Japanese coolie-walker who will burden his horse or ox to the point of collapse.

"However, they will do the same thing to themselves," the captain said, "varying loads that seem beyond human strength. That is the reason they have no respect or patience for anyone who criticizes their practices."

During his years in Japan, Capt. Tobin witnessed the willingness of Japanese to sacrifice any human qualities for strict adherence to Japanese faith. "They won't drown an unwanted puppy or kill a useless bear of burden. They'll tie it to a tree to starve to death and consider their hands washed of any responsibility for the death of the animal," the captain said.

"They will kill in battle, however, for any battle is self-defense, no matter how far from Japan it may be, he said. Invasion and occupation of China was strictly in Japanese of Japan according to the Japanese.

"Such faiths and ingrained culture traits cannot be removed by 'educational methods,'" the captain emphasized. "Extirpation of the sources of these warlike and civilized customs is the only prevention of recurrence."

### Gen Donovan Says Army Has Just Begun To Fight

FORT SAM HOUSTON, Tex.—(UPI)—"In a fitting annual to all people, both civilian and military, throughout the length and breadth of the Elch's Service Command Maj. Gen. Richard Donovan, commanding officer, has declared that the 'Army has just begun to fight' in its drive to collect tons upon tons of scrap metal in the Command's five states.

School children, farmers and organizations were urged by Gen. Donovan to comb the areas for scrap, and to give more time to the campaign.

"The 10-day scrap metal campaign conducted by the National Press was a success," Donovan said, "but we must continue this collection."

He announced that officers had been detailed at all army posts and stations throughout the Eighth Service command to receive the scrap metal and to give collectors and donors receipts for the metal.

"We must not fail," he said, "to collect the 22,000,000 long tons of scrap metal which have been set as our annual requirement if the steel mills are to continue operating at capacity."

Donovan emphasized that the great proportion of iron melted in the country is processed in open hearth furnaces. The most satisfactory dimensions for this purpose is five feet long, 20 inch wide, eight inch thick pieces of metal.

"In any scrap collection program finding metal to meet these exact specifications is rare," the general observed, "however, any

iron or steel item available may be cut to the specifications by means of ax-cutting torches, shears or hammers.

"Smaller scrap is also desired," he said.

"If you have any scrap metal, or know where any can be found, take it to your nearest army post and give it to your army," Donovan urged, "because the Nation and the army want it, and must have it."

- "I've not much time for parties these days, but that's an excuse for losing the delight of stirring up a batch of special Thanksgiving menus or 5-day night suppers have an interesting quick filling."
- Fruit and Nut Biscuits**  
(Makes 12 biscuits)  
Two cups sifted flour, 1 t<sup>s</sup> salt, 1 t<sup>s</sup> baking powder, one shortening, about 3-4 cups milk, 10 Brazil nuts and 16 pitted, chopped, sharp cheddar-washed butter, salt, paprika.  
Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Cut in shortening until well mixed. Stir in milk until mixture is soft, but not sticky. Roll dough lightly on floured board to about a quarter inch thickness and cut into rather large rounds.  
Spread each biscuit with melted butter, sprinkle half the rounds with grated sharp cheddar, chopped nuts, season gently with salt and paprika. Fold butterside of round over filled half, press edges together and bake in a preheated oven (450 deg. F.) for 2 minutes.  
The old-fashioned custom of dipping the cookie jar filled is a good one. These cookies are guaranteed to disappear rapidly.
- Honey Spice Cookies**  
Two cups sifted flour, 1-4 t<sup>s</sup> salt, 1-2 t<sup>s</sup> soda, 1-2 t<sup>s</sup> nutmeg, 2 t<sup>s</sup> allspice, 1 t<sup>s</sup> cinnamon, 2 cup butter, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 egg beaten.  
Sift flour and measure. Add soda, salt and spices and sift together three times. Cream butter and add sugar. Beat until light and fluffy. Add honey to butter and sugar mixture and lastly add beaten egg. Then stir in the flour and spices. Chill and shape into balls about 1-2 inches in diameter. Wrap each roll in waxed paper and chill thoroughly in the refrigerator. Cut into thin slices and bake on an ungreased cookie sheet in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about 20 minutes.

Rebate On Auto Tax Stamp Now Being Suggested

WASHINGTON, D. C. (UP)—Rep. Phil A. Bennet, R., Mo., said today that eastern motorists,

whose gasoline ration is being cut 25 per cent next week, are "morally entitled" to a 25 per cent refund on their federal automobile tax.

"Of course, motorists are too patriotic to ask for a refund," he said, "but it is a fact that the government is breaking faith with them—just as it will be breaking

faith with western motorists if nation-wide rationing becomes effective.

"American motorists paid \$5 each for an auto stamp, entitling them to full use of their cars for 12 months. From this source, the federal government collected \$175,000,000. Can the government afford to break faith?"

Other congressmen showed little interest in any proposal to grant refunds to motorists, and there was no indication that such a plan would be pressed.

Russell, general manager of the American Automobile Association said the AAA would take no steps for the duration, but still considered the auto stamp "unsound."

**War Requires Ample Supply Cotton Products**

HILLSBORO, Tex.—A warning that a shortage of cotton could seriously cripple the United States war effort was sounded today by Burris C. Jackson, widely known cotton leader and Chairman of the State-Wide Committee of Textiles.

Shortages in labor and equipment, plus a possible further acreage reduction, all combine to present a problem of major importance for the conduct of the war, Jackson asserted. His statement follows:

"The United Nations are depending heavily upon cotton to help

win the present world conflict. Cotton is a critical war material. Cotton and cotton products are fighting on every front."

"Cotton also has a great stake in this war. The future of American cotton is tied up with the future of Democracy."

"Cotton is one of the most vital of all materials in waging total war. Cotton helps furnish food, fiber, and munitions, the lack of any one of which could seriously cripple or even cause the war to be lost."

"Not only business but production as usual should be a thing of the past. Far-reaching economic changes are taking place almost daily."

"Cotton is not only greatly aiding the all-out war effort, but cotton has tremendous power in making the peace that follows. The

peacetime economy of every nation on the earth will be completely disarranged after this war. Cotton will play a most important role in re-building the world."

"When this war is over the world will be cotton hungry. The American cotton grower should be in a position to satisfy that hunger."

"Action must be taken now for cotton to continue to exert its full influence in helping win this war and in winning the peace to come. The first step is a ample supply of cotton to meet present and potential demands."

"Despite the fact that we face a shortage of nearly all the products of cotton, we are now only producing cotton in this country at about three-fourths of capacity."

"When this shortage becomes

more acute there are only two ways in which we can overcome the shortage. First, would be to import cotton. This objection to this are overwhelming. Second, would be to produce more cotton in this country. That is the grandest course to pursue for cotton to help this nation and our allies to win both the war and the peace."

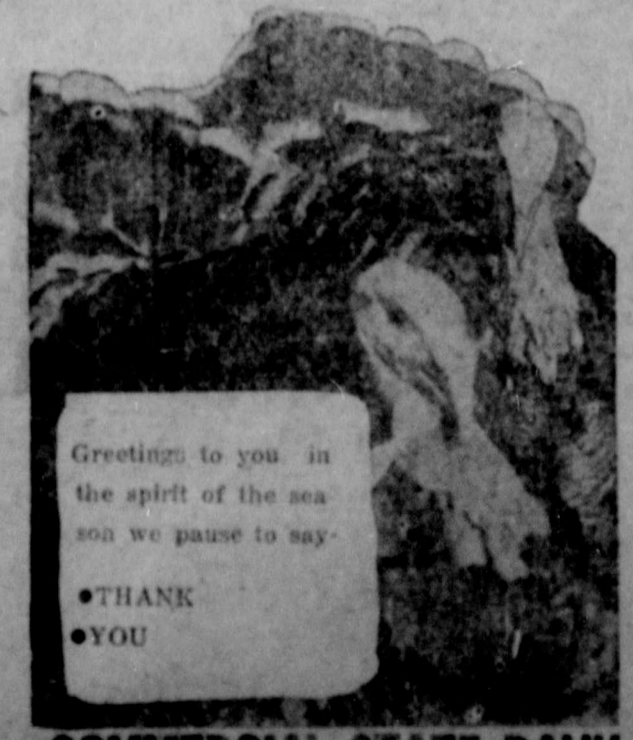

**Plan To Offset  
Gasoline Taxes  
Facing A Fight**

AUSTIN, Tex. Farm district members of the state legislature

are expected to put up a stiff fight against a plan that has been proposed to offset the loss of state revenue from gasoline sales. The proposal is to eliminate the gasoline tax refunds for gasoline purchased for use other than on highways.

For the last state fiscal year these refunds amounted to \$8,728,084 while gasoline tax was paid and kept to the amount of \$60,294,285. Over sixty-five per cent of the refunds went to farmers, and their refund claims numbered 214,146

out of a total of 237,374 refund claims of all sorts. Next biggest amount of refund was on gasoline for exports. This totaled a little more than eight per cent of the total.
