## Parachutists Decry Superman Tag; Just Fighters Traveling By Plane

FORT BRAGG, N. C. (UP)—  
A parachutist—to quote a typical  
member of the airborne Command  
—is just like any other fighting  
man except that his heart is a little  
nearer to his mouth.

"The average civilian seems to  
regard us with awe," the "chutist"  
explains, "as if we were some sort  
of fanatical cupemen, or with  
pity, feeling that we are lost souls  
in a suicide squadron. Actually  
we're just fellows with determination  
to do a job."

He's inclined to laugh when the  
word "suicide" is mentioned.  
"Thunder," granted a lanky corporal,  
"the chute always opens and  
if it doesn't, we've got a spare."

Parachutists, to hear them tell  
it, are here on these sprawling  
training camps, are nothing  
more than infantrymen who  
travel by plane. They admit a  
few of a lot of thrills and their  
assert, is the "best and  
toughest" in the Army, but they  
claim that they prove their lot is  
safe.

"As a guy crossing Main  
St., I was pointed out. 'He  
gets a plane in a while too.'  
And why do soldiers become  
'chutists'?"

Off hand they confess "we frankly  
don't know—maybe we're  
crazy," but given time to think  
about it someone will say he wanted  
to go into combat as soon as  
possible. Another will interject  
he craved excitement. They all admit  
the first jump gave them  
plenty of the last.

Pvt. George Seal said he heard a  
parachutist didn't have to do  
"K" or guard details.  
"That got me," he said, "but I  
never had to run so fast and so far  
so often before in my life."

Medes I was stuck behind a  
desk in reception center. I  
was in action. Well, I got it and  
I'm back behind a desk and  
medes I was to there."

Pvt. Ed Atkins, recalling his  
first jump, said "I was a mixture  
of curiosity and nervousness and  
of hesitating or refusing in the  
door than of actually jumping."  
"My worst jump was the third  
one. I really wanted that one  
out, but they come easier now."

A volunteer from the Regular  
Army with two years experience  
in more orthodox military operations,  
Pvt. L. G. Carroll said he  
looked forward to that first try for  
long, building up to it was  
stale he had to hurdle that when  
it came it was surprisingly easy.  
"I thought it would be as tough  
as sticking my head in a lion's  
mouth," he explained, "and I had  
made up my mind to get it over  
within a hurry."

"Then it all happened so quickly  
and so much easier than I had  
expected that I couldn't believe it."  
Cpl. Herb Carney said, "Hell,  
I was too scared to remember. I  
just saw the door come up and  
the next thing I knew I was floating  
down to earth as comfortably as if  
I were in a swing. That canopy  
above me sure looked good."

"It was the fifth jump that  
really got my nerve. I hadn't  
jumped for six weeks and I just  
begin to realize what I was doing."

## Loans For Food Production Are Offered Farmers

The Farm Security Administration is holding thousands of low-income families to increase production at a profit of the needed war foods by loans and help in farm and home management. It is particularly important that farmers who cannot obtain credit from other loan agencies see the county agent supervisor of FSA at their earliest convenience and before the beginning of the peak loan season.

Small farm operators should apply for these loans as to the requirements for a "Food for Freedom" loan and start putting all their labor and land resources to work on the Nation's food production line.

Loans may be made to help the small farmer produce most of the Nation's food needs and a surplus to sell including dairy and poultry products, poultry, hogs, beef, etc. Farmers qualifying for "Food for Freedom" loans must have a desire to make a contribution to the Nation's food requirements and also have possibilities for repaying the loan over a period of time ranging as high as five years if a lease or rental contract on desirable land can be obtained for the period of the loan.

Rev. Truman Crocker, pastor of the first Baptist Church off Weatherford will be the principal speaker.

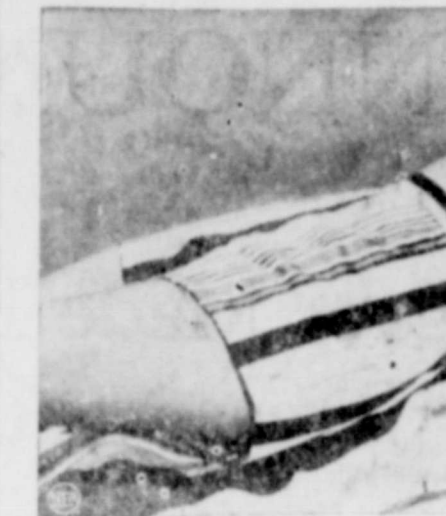

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## War Necessity Ration Mistakes May Be Corrected

WACO—ODT district offices for motor transport will correct promptly any errors made in Certificates of War Necessity, weather due to clerical error in the office or error by the truck operator in giving information on his application, Ray Marlin, district manager for the motor transport, has announced.

Low allotments for gasoline can be corrected promptly when due to error, Mr. Marlin said. Where no error has been made, and the application gave full and correct information, the operator must wait thirty days after receiving his Certificate before he can file appeal. If an operator can get along temporarily on this fuel allotment, he should accept it and ask for a correction after December 10 when pressure on the district offices will be lessened.

## U. T. Credit Union To Be Abolished

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—The war is about to abolish the University of Texas credit union.

Demand for loans is decreasing, members were informed recently, because professors are putting their money in war bonds and tax-exemptive items for which they formerly borrowed money.

Loans have decreased to such an extent that the interest paid is barely sufficient for the \$480 annual salary paid a part-time union employee.

The number of loans outstanding dropped from \$45,000 on Sept. 30, 1941, to \$29,000 on Sept. 30, 1942, it was announced.

## NEGROES IN AFRICA NOW GUARD LINES

With the U. S. Forces in Liberia—a large force of artillery-equipped United States Negro soldiers, led by white officers, which arrived here several months ago, is now firmly established in this strategic West African Negro republic.

The American soldiers came across the 1,000 miles of submarine-infested waters of the Atlantic Ocean, without any enemy interference.

Under the command of Col. John Elliott (Smackey Joe) Wood they have set about protecting this vital link in the United Nations lifeline across Africa. By agreement with the Liberian government, they also are charged with safeguarding the Negro republic's neutrality, and its rubber plantations, one of the few sources of rubber not in enemy hands.

## Lions Are Told Effect Of War On The Oil Industry

Joe Dennis had charge of the Lions Club program today and introduced John Kinde, superintendent of the Lone Star Gasoline Company, who presented an interesting talk on the effect the war has had upon the petroleum industry.

Kinde explained the change-over that is being made locally by the Lone Star Gasoline Company in order to prepare for the expanding need for higher octane gasoline, both in the war effort and in the post-war period of readjustment.

## Aid For Students Still Available

Dr. G. C. Boswell, superintendent of the Ranger Public Schools stated today that there were still funds for aiding needy high school students, 16 years or over through the NYA program.

Either boys or girls, over 16 years of age, who are attending school, may apply at the office of the superintendent for work aid, which amounts to as much as \$6 per month. Students who apply for the work must be able to show their need for the places. Dr. Boswell said.

## Oil Terminal Supervisors Are Wanted By Navy

DALLAS.—Qualified oil terminal supervisors between 25 and 50, with good practical experience are needed by the U. S. Navy. It was announced today at the Office of Naval Procurement, 1530 Allen Building, Dallas.

The men, who would be used for loading and unloading tank cars and for the supervision of tank farms, should have one of the following backgrounds:

Two years of college and five years recent work in bulk plant operations tank storage and loading petroleum products.

Men without college work experience should offer from 10 to 15 years background in this type of work.

Particularly desirable are those experienced in the loading of ocean tankers, and familiar with gasoline, fuel oil and lubricant specifications.

## Highway Patrol's New Winter Hats To Be Different

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—Black hats for Texas highway patrolmen for the winter uniforms, will be quite in contrast to the bulky military caps that have been worn since the highway patrol was established.

Uniforming of the patrol is left to the discretion of Director Homer Garrison, Jr. When the patrol was established there had been quite a lot of complaint of local officers operating speed traps.

The situation had become so bad that one legislature prohibited a sheriff, constable or deputy making an arrest in a motor case unless the officer was wearing a cap and a uniform of blue or grey, and the cap and uniforms were required to be the same color.

Then a diamond shaped badge was designed for motor arresting.

The communication said that 55 more Japanese had been killed in patrol activities on the island.

# ALLIED, AXIS FORCES IN AFRICA LOCKED IN A FIERCE ENGAGEMENT

Direct Word From Battlefield Is Scanty, But Naval Losses By Both Sides Are Suffered, With Axis Taking Brunt Punishment To Supply Line Ships

## State Also Has Ration Puzzles

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—Department of the state government as well as individuals are having trouble over rationing of gasoline.

A committee was set up to centralize the work of taking out rationing books and data was compiled on the past amount of travel required in their official duties. All the applications for state-owned cars stationed in Austin were made through the Travis county board. This resulted in general uniform policy.

But beside the state-owned cars that are used in departmental work many cars owned by individual employees are used in connection with state work.

The state makes mileage allowance for use of employees' cars. Many of these employees are away from Austin. The State Department of Public Welfare, for instance, has a large force of investigators, inspectors and examiners to pass on the application for old age assistance. This staff is made up of employees who use their own cars on the expense allowance basis. In some counties they have been able to get liberal allowances of gasoline; in others the restriction has been sharp.

One departmental employee with headquarters in Austin was found to be driving several hundred miles daily. When she found time to work intrigued a board member who received her application. It turned out that she travels almost constantly visiting schools to supervise their activities.

Gov. Coke R. Stevenson applied for 1,500 miles per month gasoline allotment. That is a reduction of nearly 500 miles from his usual monthly travel.

Another big increase in Texas farm cash income was recorded in October, as farmers of the state received 169 million dollars for their products as compared with 109 million during the corresponding month of last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has reported.

For the first ten months of the current year, total farm cash income was 174 million dollars, an increase of more than 50 per cent over the total at the end of October, 1941, the Bureau report showed.

The October index of farm cash income for the state, based on the average month of the five year period, 1928-1932, was 181, as compared with 119.4 in September and 118.7 in October a year ago.

Should the present rate of increase continue during November and December, total income to the farmers this year will be approximately 950 million dollars, exclusive of government payments. Subsidies from the government will probably amount to another 75 million, bringing total farm income for the year a above one billion dollars, Dr. F. A. Buechel, assistant director of the research bureau, has predicted.

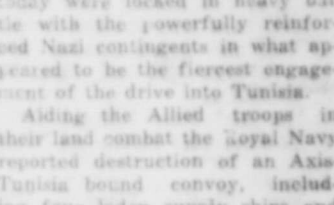

Simultaneously Britain and United States recapitulated their naval losses in the African operations to date.

The British reported 12 ships, mostly small craft, including a small aircraft carrier. The United States has announced the loss of five transports, and damage to five other ships, including a destroyer.

Since the African operation involved approximately 500 transports and escort warships the losses were not regarded as large.

Reports on land fighting in Africa from Allied sources were meagre. The Germans are reported to have developed a powerful opposing force in the Bizerte-Tripoli area.

Axis reports said the Germans had put ashore heavy equipment at Bizet, and Gabon on the Tunisian coast.

By utilizing these weapons, and their growing air strength in Tunisia the Germans are obviously giving the Americans, British and French a tough fight.

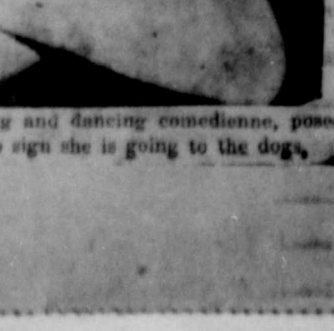
The Axis faces the costly task of keeping a stream of supplies and reinforcements flowing into North Africa.

In Russia the Red Army scored an important new success in the Stalingrad area, capturing Verkhne Gnilovskoy, the keystone of the Nazi defenses on the east bank of the Don River.

The Russian success may force the Germans into a general withdrawal between the Don and Volga Rivers.

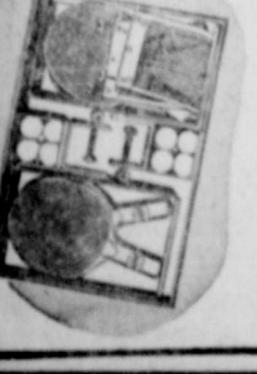

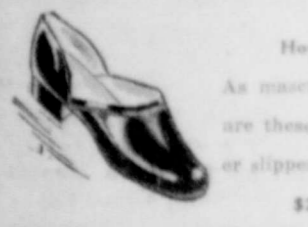

**BEFORE** cold weather sets in serve a Sunday picnic menu for all the family in your own back yard.

Have hot potato salad with frankfurters or Mexican chili plus whole tomatoes, cranberries and other easy-to-handle foods.

**Hot Potato Salad With Frankfurters**  
(Serves 12)

Eight lbs. potatoes, 1 cup water salt, 2 onions diced, 1 large green pepper sliced, 2 tsp. mustard, 1 tsp. paprika, 1 tsp. sugar, 1-2 tsp. vinegar, 1-2 tsp. mayonnaise, salt and pepper, 2 lbs. frankfurters. Peel and dice potatoes. Place in large kettle, add boiling water and salt. Place over high heat and when water steams, add all the other ingredients except frankfurters. When potatoes are almost but not quite tender, place frankfurters on top of potato steam for 15 or 20 minutes.

**Mexican Chili**  
(Serves 12)

One-quarter cup fat, 3 lbs. ground round steak, 2 cup chopped onion, 1 cup chopped green pepper, 2 No. 2 cans tomatoes, 1 tsp. chili powder, 2 tsp. salt, 1-2 tsp. cayenne pepper, 1-2 tsp. black pepper, 2 No. 2 cans drained red kidney beans. Brown round steak in hot fat. Add onion and green, then green peppers. Add tomatoes, chili powder, salt, cayenne pepper, black pepper. Simmer for 25 minutes. Then add beans and heat through about 15 minutes.

## To Unbalance the Axis



**FROM** a puny business employing only a handful of men and producing less than 4 planes a month, Canada's aircraft industry has grown into a giant enterprise turning out more than 400 crafts per month. Money expended on plant expansion, equipment and salaries total half a billion dollars.

The Dominion's aircraft production program has now been narrowed down to nine models: an elementary trainer, the Fairchild Cornell; a single-engine advanced trainer, the North American Harvard; a twin-engine reconnaissance bomber (and bombing and gunnery trainer), the Bristol Blenheim; a coastal reconnaissance amphibian, the Catalina (Consolidated); PBY-51; a single-engine fighter, the Hawker Hurricane; a twin-engine fighter; a four-engine long-range bomber; and a navy dive bomber.

Except for the engines, and certain instruments which are imported, Canadian planes are Canadian built from Canadian materials. There are about eight main assembly plants, and some 100 component instrument and part manufacturers. Among these are a half dozen factories turning out hundreds of propellers of various types to supply the planes being produced in Canada.

The manufacture of constant speed propellers, which is a mechanical work of art, requires rigid balance tests in all stages. The up photo shows a completed metal disc as it undergoes inspection. Small cork and lead weights are used in this "final test" of perfect balance has been achieved their weight is sufficient to start the propeller revolving in the lower position.

Canada's output of aircraft has now been stepped up sufficiently to meet the greater part of the requirements of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan.

In some 29 plants strategically located from Vancouver to Halifax, air and training planes are being constantly overhauled and reconditioned for flight. This is one of the Dominion's major war industries, representing an outlay of several hundred million dollars and keeping thousands of men busy maintaining it in perfect condition Canada's growing air armada.

## Comp Fire Girls Aid War Effort

**NEW YORK (UP)—**An army of 221,000 Camp Fire Girls in every section of the country is serving 100 per cent behind the lines on the civilian front.

To come to join the official women's volunteer war organization, the girls from eight to 18 years of age have notwithstanding enlisted in the ranks of war metal grinders and rubber collectors. They have studied first aid and have become vendors, as well as buyers of war bonds and stamps. Products of their victory gardens adorn their family tables. They knit for the armed services of the United Nations. And they have formed their own messenger service, by way of a Bicycle Corps.

In Independence, Kan., in the summer of 1941, the first Bicycle Corps in the United States, was organized by Camp Fire Girls as an auxiliary to the Red Cross Motor Corps, and in Dec., 1941, the unit became a national project.

Red Cross put in a call to local Camp Fire leaders for the delivery of yarn and the returning of completed garments. Civilian Defense requests the distribution of thousands of pamphlets and the round-up of civilians for patriotic rallies. The Victory Book Campaign
