ALLIES TAKE OFFENSIVE ON THREE IMPORTANT FRONTS

Burma, Africa And New Guinea Genters For Heavy Offensive Action By The Allies

Allied action in the war today leaves little doubt as to the intentions of the United Nations to keep the offensive from here one as the war machinery of the United Nations took the offensive on three fronts.

General Sir Archibald Wavell's Imperial Army marched into Burma and penetrated 30 miles down Bengal Bay toward the Jap held base of Akyab. Wavell's front in Burma covered 20 miles between Ma- >yu River and Bengal Bay.
